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Introduction

Limerick Corporation's Night Watch service was established in 1843 with the employment of 10 watchmen, a superintendent and a watch house keeper. The service was modelled on the Night Watch service then operating in New Town Pery under the Commissioners of St. Michael's parish. See L/MP/4 for surviving records of this service. The Night Watch's main function was to ensure public order, the security of property and the lighting of lamps. The service operated from Watchhouse Lane, off Rutland Street. Where records were inspected and a report made to the monthly meeting of the Night Watch committee, a standing corporation committee (see L/SMIN/6).

As a result of the financial crisis created by the War of Independence Limerick Borough Council established a Retrenchment Committee in April 1921 whose report recommended that the Night Watch should be totally abolished. The 23 members of staff were pensioned off thus marking the end of the Night Watch service in Limerick.

Night Watch Reports' Books (1861-1920)

Reports of the night watch service, detailing the number of men on duty, their responsibilities and nightly incidents, 'At half past nine, Mr Hayes brought in Mary Gronin, Eliza Burtell and Mary Ann McNamara for protection', L/NW/3 (5 March 1862), Includes details of lamps being lit in 'Lamps blown out by gale during the night', L/NW/23 (1898-1902) and general surveillance, 'NC O'Brien found door rear of number 54, William Street open at 11.45 a.m. called owner who secured same', 2 October 1906, L/NW/26.

From 1861-1905 reports for the entire city were kept in the same volumes (with the exception of the period 1888-1893, L/NW/16-19), but from 1905 onwards (L/NW/25), separate books were held for the Old Town (Irish Town) and the New Town (English Town and Newtown Pery).

The terminology used to name the men on duty also changed throughout the period; they were called Night Watch Men (NW) from June 1861 to December 1899 (L/NW/1-23), then Night Patrol (NP) until July 1900 (L/NW/23) when finally adopted the name of Night Constables (NC).

Night Watch Inspector's Complaint Book (1866-1892)

44. 11 November 1866 – 26 December 1892 Book of complaints against the watchmen on duty collected by the inspector in charge. The complaints were sent to the Watch Committee by the Inspector. The volume details the cause of complaint- generally being found asleep or drunk on the beat, and the sanction imposed.

Account book detailing the watchmen's weekly wages. Includes the name of the watchmen and supernumeraries, the nights on duty per week, total value of the week's work and observations. From 13 January 1910, volume is titled 'city night constables pay book' and included additional column titled 'occupation'
