Board stating <sup>that they had before them</sup> the Resolution of the Board of Management of the Glin District School of the 29<sup>th</sup> ultimo proposing to grant a War Bonus of £50 a year to each officer of the School, with the exception of the Temporary Cook, the Porter, and Assistant Laundress, whose bonus is to be £15 a year each.

With reference thereto, the Board desire ~~that they~~ to state that they approve of the Clerk and Assistant Laundress being paid bonuses at the rate of £50 a year, and £15 a year respectively in future.

As regards the Master, Matron and Teachers the Board have to point out that their salaries were regulated last May and that consequently, they are, strictly speaking, debarred by the Treasury Regulations which rule the action of the Board in such matters from receiving further bonuses. Moreover, these officers are provided with free furnished apartments, fuel and light, and these items must be taken into account in estimating the value of their appointments. On mature consideration the Board think it fair that their bonuses should be calculated on their salaries prior to May last with a deduction of £10 each in respect of the emoluments mentioned. Under the arrangement they would be entitled to bonuses as follows: - Master £70.8.0, each of the Assistant Male Teachers £22.8.0, Matron £44.0.0, and each Assistant Female Teacher £39.0.0  
The totals of the increases of salaries must in addition, be deducted from these amounts and

consequently, the Master may now be paid bonus at the rate of £35.8.0 a year, each Assistant Male Teacher £47.8.0, and the Matrons and each Assistant Female Teacher £29.0.0.

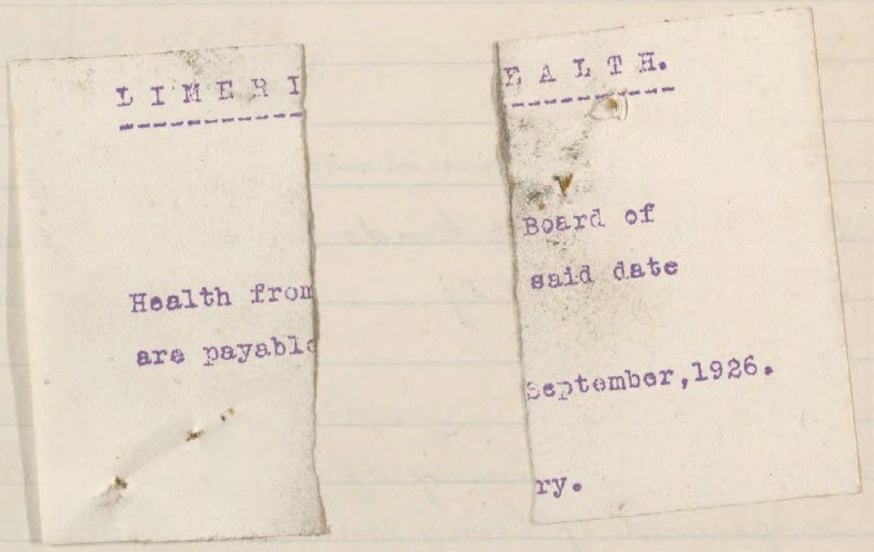

I beg to report for your information that the financial position of the School at present is in a very serious condition. The Contractors who have been heretofore paid monthly have not been paid for the past three months. The same applies to the Trades and Workmen. The officials salaries for the quarter ending 31<sup>st</sup> December last have not been paid.

The only money I received since last Meeting was a sum of £300 from Limerick Union, out of £702. Listowel Union sent me a Paying Order for £416 and this was dishonoured. I have got nothing from Newcastlewest or Rathkeale.

We are at present indebted to the Bank £522.12.5, this added to December, January, and February Paying Orders £2322.3.3 would leave us in debt to the Treasurer to the extent of £2,844.15.8

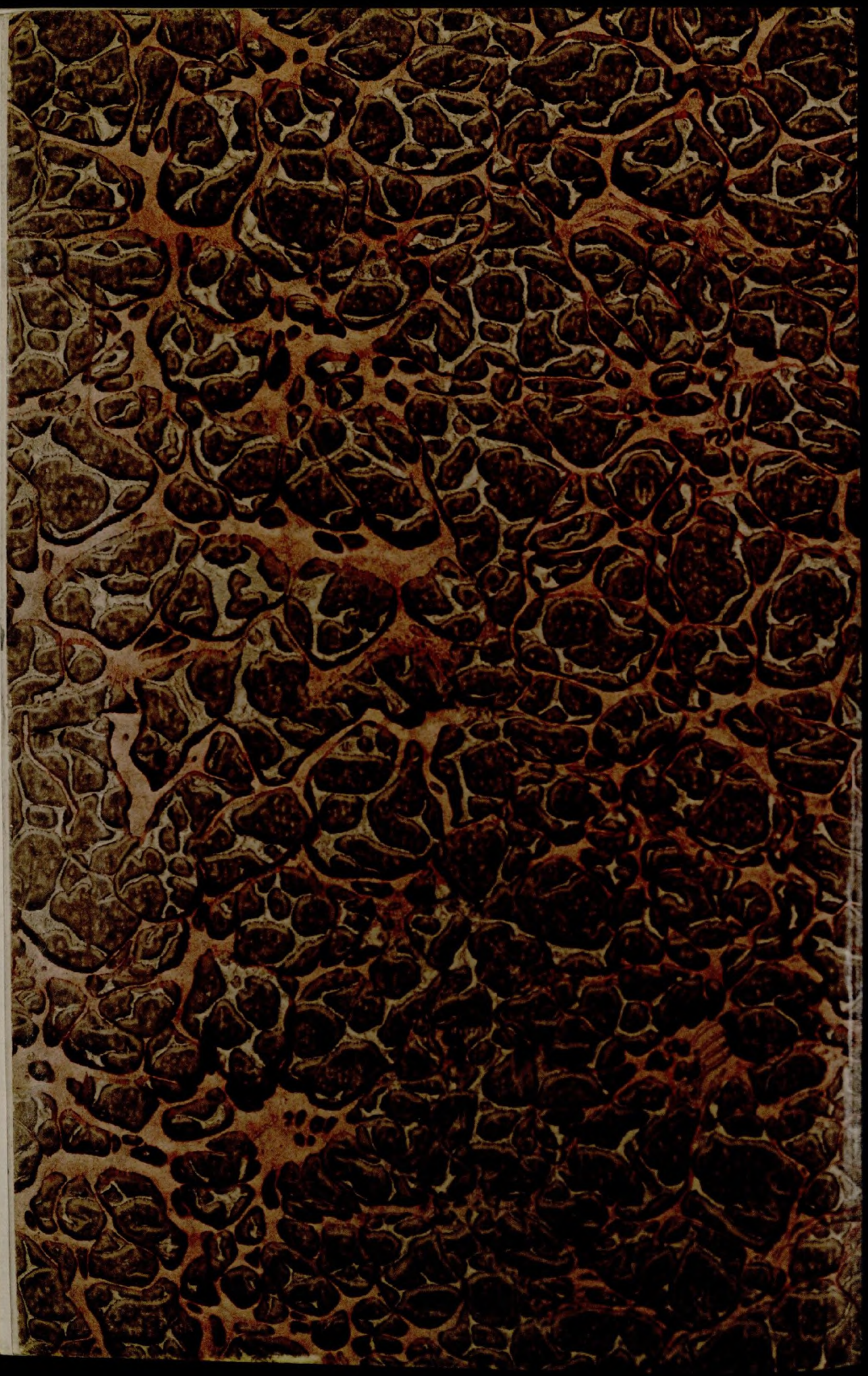
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
