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
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BUNNY IS BOX OFFICE By JEAN HARVEY

SILHOUETTE'S By COBWEB

In most antique shops one will find on browsing at least two or three miniatures of silhouette or shadowgraphy. Profile portraits range from head, head and shoulders to full length, singly and in groups. The actual word silhouette had nothing to do with contours. It arose from the name of Etienne de Silhouette (1709-67) who became, by the Pompadour's influence, Comptroller-General of Finance in 1759. In this capacity, he inflicted so many, needless economies on the French to make him a byword for something cheap and stingy, hence the name silhouette became synonomous with the profilist art which incidentally was a hobby of his.

Sticking plaster portraits of which Thackeray wrote, originated by the use of cutting black sticking plaster out with scissors and many profilists started in this way. Not all profiles were cut. Very many of the best were drawn or painted on paper, card, plaster, wax, ivory or glass. You will also find them on jewellery, fans and particularly handscreens.

After years of the silhouette being a small specialist collectors item there has been a resurgence in interest. London particularly is finding a demand and where once one could pick up a small framed item for £1.75 or thereabouts one is now hard pushed to unearth a worthwhile item under about £4.00. Shadow portraits enhance a room whether it be lounge or bedroom, they can be arranged in sets or one stunning item sited in a very special position.

Of course your folks mean the very most to you but surely after a certain age when you are absolutely sure of yourself and your feelings you owe it to yourself to live the kind of life you want to live for the rest of your time on this earth. By not saying you are very probably committing yourself to many years of double talk, borrowing girls for the yearly office dinner/dance. Hiding away special friends in case everyone catches on, and partings at special times when you need your lover close to you.

Naturally for some it is easier than others. One can easily understand that Mums and Dads have hopes and plans for us all and set their sights high, not the least grandchildren. Tell them about Troy Perry the American evangelist and invest in a copy of his book 'The Lord is My Shepherd and He Knows I'm Gay' which perhaps will help them.

Above all be honest, be prepared to explain and share with them. Try and make them see that homosexuality is a way of life just like everyone's elses. It is not necessarily drag, or bleached hair, or painted nails it is love of a fellow being. But above all this be prepared to put out your arms and hold them close as you want them to hold you. Ask their help and their love and tell them you need them too -very much.

Formy money, he or she who says there is no difference between men and women is a blind idiot. "Vive la difference, say I with conviction, yet I am as gay as you like! But the question whether biological (and hence 'social') differences should be recognised at law is one to watch not only Women's Lib give a firm answer, "No".

I believe the New Year 1973 should see us confirming this 'No' with all the nonviolent resolution we can muster. An offence against a child or juvenile is an offence whatever the sex of offender or offended. Unwilling acquiescence in sexplay remains unwilling whatever the sex; to take advantage of another man or woman's weakness is either way to hurt another person.

To be physically adult is not always necessarily to be emotionally or experientially 'adult', and it is reasonable to realise that these 'adult' states may be attained at different rates by different individuals whatever their sex - indeed any of us may ourselves still be seeking true adulthood.

British law makes the male/female distin-

ctions it does for reasons of historical emotion rather than contemporary intelligent argument. But today it is only consistent intelligent argument before the electorate that will rationalise and update the law. We want to apply pressures, yes - but let's apply the right pressure in the right places to get the right results. On these campaigning issues, neither promiscuity 'nor permissiveness are relevant: indeed the gays' case could be permanently damaged in this old-fashioned country by apparent overdoses of either!

In England and Wales, these are the law's curiosities which the Campaign for Homosexual Equality is directed against.

Sexual acts between a male of any age and a female under 16 are illegal, yet are allowed between a female over 16 and a male under 16; and, while legal between two females of any age, they are illegal between two males if one or both are under 21.

In Scotland and Northern Ireland, sexual acts between males even over 21 are still illegal.

Whether homosexual or not, will you resolve this year to campaign that reason should enlighten Britain's moth-eaten laws of sexual behaviour which are so important socially and personally?

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
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
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
