The centre, like many other organisations and individuals who work for, and belong to ethnic and minority groups, received a hate letter and needed to respond appropriately, to ensure that users and members of our community were made as safe as our limited capacity to do so, allowed.

Following a visit to the Chair of the Centre by Special Branch, certain strategies have been discussed and need to be put to the community.

It is now clear that despite the sometimes negative perception of the Centre by many, there is a clear need for it's existence. However these recent events have made us acutely aware of our vulnerability in the face of crazy facists and extremists, who may wish in their unbalanced states to harm anybody who they feel do not have the right to live a happy and fruitful life.

The centre continues to be an important part of the existence of Black Lesbian and Gays in London and further afield. Evidence which is regularly provided for, and monitored by our funders can vouch for this statement.

However, the Black Lesbian & Gay Centre is the only centre that proudly states who it is for and what it is for. We are still here and are still needed, but this last episode of fear, shock and for some of us sorrow has shown us that we cannot become complacent about our lives and our courage to live our lives.

Serious consideration has been given to the fact that it may now be necessary to change the name of the Centre.

We need your ideas and views on this. Members and groups who use the centre have expressed their ideas and views, some of which are listed in the newsletter. But we need more. Call at the Centre and leave a message or drop us a line. We would like to publish views so please make it clear if you would rather not have your suggestions or views made public.

The year 2000 is on its's way. Should the Centre start the new millenium with a new name or not? and if it should give us a name.....

BLGC MESSAGE

In many of the minority communities in Britain, being gay can be particularly difficult because of the strong emphasis on traditional family and marriage. The family may be doubly important and very tightly knit because it can protect its members from the effects of racism.

So telling your friends and family that your are gay if you are Black might feel doubly difficult. You may end up feeling excluded from your own community.

However, always remember that, even if it's really difficult for you, other people have done it before.

There are groups of Asian and black gay people you can contact and go along to meet.

The BLGC can direct you to a group or organisation that might be able to help you and fill your specific needs. The Centre also has discussion groups and social activities that you are welcome to come along to.
