

LESBIANS AND HOMOSEXUALS

As homosexual women and men, we are facing increasing hostility. The number of people who have come out as gay and kept their jobs is offset by sackings, increased police harrasment and organised queerbashing by right-wing groups. In becoming more visible, we have become more vulnerable to victimization in an anxious, crises-ridden society.

This victimization goes almost unnoticed. Bradford police have boasted that they have enough evidence to bring charges against 1,000 gay people; a recent police purge of gay men in Cornwall has resulted in a number of prosecutions; the Royal Ulster Constabulary have seized over 1,000 documents, including personal letters and diaries, in a recent wave of anti-gay activity all the more sinister when one considers that under the laws prevailing in Northern Ireland and Scotland, homosexuality remains totally illegal and carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment. The media in general ignore these events, and exposure of such contempt for the civil-rights of millions of gay people in this country will be even less easy if Mary Whitehouse succeeds in her attempt to purge the nation of blasphemy by destroying Gay News.

The law provides no safeguards from this reaction against us. Even the liberalization of the conspiracy laws does not extend to homosexuals. We are still liable to prosecution for 'conspiracy to corrupt public morals.' Lesbian mothers find the prejudice of judges an added obstacle in child access and custody cases. 'Administrative charges' which remove the right to trial by jury on importuning charges threaten to limit what little protection we have against such laws. The absence of any legally enforceable rights for homosexuals means that physical attacks on our persons, our homes and our meeting places go on with virtual police approval.

Gay identity has, however, continued to grow, as has a sense of community. Gay switchboards and community centres function throughout the country. A number of 'come-out' homosexuals have maintained and strengthened their position at work, sometimes with trade union involvement. They have begun the long process of ridding work situations of prejudice and discrimination — a source of insecurity for most homosexuals.

The N.U.J., N.A.L.G.O. and local branches of some major unions such as A.S.L.E.F., C.P.S.A. have adopted clauses against discrimin-

ation on the ground of sexual orientation. Parallel to this union activity are the beginnings of gay rights campaigns in the Communist and Liberal Parties, and groups working within the Labour and Conservative Parties, the International Marxist Group and the Socialist Workers Party.

Recent direct action has made it clear to gays that our rights will not somehow be delivered from on high, but must be fought for. For example, in June 1976, hundreds of people at the Coleherne pub in Earls Court successfully resisted police attempts to intimidate them. The squatting of houses and gay centres has demonstrated to local authorities that we have needs which are largely unsatisfied by their present family-oriented provisions. Some concessions have been won from television companies confronted by gays who were incensed at the insulting homosexual stereotypes appearing on the screen. This could go further until their derogation of us is replaced by positive images of ourselves, a process which has hardly yet begun. Education is at present almost unconscious of homosexuality, and neglectful of the needs of gay children, though the coming out of a few gay teachers is beginning to change this situation.

With all this in mind, the Gay Pride March on 25th June begins a week of meeting and celebrations intended to give our movement renewed strength and impetus for another year of positive growth and action.
