



English Queens

ROB FOSTER will be reclaiming a little of our gay past for the Gay Outdoor Club at the end of June.

On Thursday June 20, he follows in the footsteps of James I (1603-25) through Islington. James, with his notorious 'favourites', was a much-maligned gay king, Rob feels, and Islington is rich in his associations.

He established a palace at Theobald's—Theobald's Road was his private 'driveway' to the palace. He also had a passion for hunting because he felt that he looked better on a horse. Nevertheless, he managed to get thrown from his nag into the New River, which the walk will visit.

On Friday June 8, Rob takes his fellow walkers into the world of eighteenth century gay bars, or 'Molly Houses', round the Smithfield area, then known as Little Sodom. "One of the houses was in the shadow of the Old Bailey, and there's even a record of a drag ball there," said Rob.

He'll also visit the favourite cruising ground of the Gray's Inn Boghouse, and the spot where you used to take a mercury bath as a cure for the clap.

The molly houses disappeared in 1725, when they were raided, and many regulars were hanged; but on a positive note, the walk ends in Covent Garden, where the

PARKER and Klein are going to be pretty busy during the Pride Festival. They are presenting no less than three different shows in June, as well as appearing at Jubilee Gardens.

At the Oval House, they join forces with Hard Corps, the lesbian theatre group. The cabaret is described as 'the greatest love affair since Hepburn and Garland' and 'many things but never safe'.

Devilry—a wickedly funny twist on the Faust legend which satirises with affection much of the women's movement—revives for one performance on June 14.

And the two women will also appear in late-night cabaret at the Finborough Arms.

Joined by a mutual interest in "women's theatre, glamour and talking about the meaning of life over large bottles of very cheap red wine", the duo has won itself a cult following because it proves conclusively that lesbians can be camp.

"We hate boring dreary women's theatre, we don't have an attitude of reverence, and we like something with a bit of punch," Debbie Klein explained.

Media Attack

PHIL Adams of the Gay Media Monitoring Group launches two major initiatives at the end of June in the fight to get mainstream press, television and radio to report responsibly on gay and lesbian issues.


In Pride Week, a new set of guidelines for NUJ journalists reporting on gay issues will be unveiled, and at the same time a recruitment drive gets under way for volunteers to take part in a week's media monitoring, starting on July 15.

"We'll need about 100 volunteers," explained Phil.
"We're aiming to watch and listen to a complete week's output. That means four television channels, and seven radio stations: Radios One to Four, Capital, LBC and Radio London. It's about 1400 hours broadcasting."

The findings will be published in a book, along with correspondence which Phil has collected over the last two years. "I've got an extraordinary catalogue of complaints about evasions, distortions, fobbings-off and excuses. The companies always claim they treat lesbians and gay men fairly, but this is the evidence to prove they're wrong."

ICA ARTS FESTIVAL

SALVATORE Santagati has organised a complete festival in itself at the ICA in the Mall, SW1. Entitled The Gav Sensibility in the Arts, it consists of a series of six discussions and a season of films headlined by Improper Conduct, the controversial documentary by Cuban exile Nestor Almendros, about the treatment of gays under Fidel Castro's government.

The event has been generously sponsored by Heaven, and the list of panellists reads like a Who's Who of lesbians and gay men in the arts.

The discussions in turn cover literature, theatre, rock music, cinema, the visual arts and a summing-up: The Gay Sensibility in Question.

Novelists Tom Wakefield and Aileen la Tourette debate the question of what is dangerous about gay writing with critic Alison Hennegan (11), while director Bill Gaskell of the National Theatre, Julie Parker of the Drill Hall and playwrights Bryony Lavery and Noel Greig discuss the impact of gay theatre since the Lord Chamberlain stopped censoring in the late 60s (18).

The ins and outs of gay identity in the rock world get an airing by former Bronski Beat singer Jimi Somerville, singer Steve Swindells, Cheryl Garrett, author of Women In

FORTISSIMO FAGGOTS

THE Pink Singers will be dashing all over London during the Pride Festival; for the fourteen-strong gay male chorus turns up at The Bell in Greenwich (16), Goldsmith's College (20), with guests at the London Lesbian and Gay Centre (28), and on the Pride Parade (29).

Their own concert at the Centre also features Jo Rich-ler, Mark Bunyan and Eric Presland, and on this occasion the choir joins the singer/songwriters as backing vocalists and as interpreters of their

The repertoir ranges from the odd madrigal to I Am What I Am and an obscure 50s Lieber/Stoller rock number, Motorcycle Man, which they found, sung in French, on an Edith Piaf LP. On the way it takes in lots of 20s and 30s standards, and Kurt Weill/ Berthold Brechtsongs—"about as serious as we can get without sticking out like a sore thumb," according to the choirmaster Robert Hugill. They also field a formation dance team at their concerts.

The Pink Singers were formed "to prove that we could do it, to contribute to culture without reference to the straight world. We change words sometimes to make songs relevant. We try to put them over from our point of view. And we enjoy it—that's the most important thing."



MAIN STAGE: COMPERES:

Tom Robinson—the first openly gay singer to make the charts, with three international Top Five hits and eight albums to his credit. He's promised himself a break from performing, but we're still trying to persuade him to bring a guitar along, just in case . . . A Pride Festival without Glad To Be Gay? Unthinkable!

Elaine Loudon—in her incarnation as Mitzi Wildebeest, roving ambassador for white South Africa, and currently Mrs Thatcher's Minister for Culture. No doubt she'll try to persuade us all to go home immeditely.

Performers: The Guest Stars: six-piece women's jazz band voted one of the most popular live acts in recent City Limits poll. They've played Ronnie Scott's and several jazz festivals. "Their warm lyrical swing exudes joy and delight" — Time Out.

Ginger and Spice: Women's reggae band. Bring your dancing shoes for the hottest new reggae band around, with an infectious energy that will lift you to your feet.

Radioactive: Synthesizerbased pop/rock band with extremely catchy tunes you'll find yourself humming days later in the bath.

Snow Leopard: Headed by singer Anna Chen, the band plays a kind of Chinese Rock, mixing English and Oriental styles. Anna has a vocal range of 3½ octaves and a tough approach which belies racist stereotypes of the East.

Popular History of Signs: their single Body and Soul and album Country were released on Jungle Records at the beginning of the year. Their commitment is expressed in moody, synth-based songs such as Lenin, If She was a Car and Justice, not Vengeance.

The Touch: Three-piece women's band who play a kind of 'raw soul' with an emphasis on the power of lyrics.

Spring Chickens: threepiece folk band headed by John Spiers, very popular as a soloist in the clubs, and a man who in his time has toured as support to such topliners as The Oyster Band.

The Pink Singers: 14-strong gay male choir.

The Vilettes: Out gay band with reggae, ska and electro-pop influences catchy tunes and strong lyrics about macho and masculinity.



CONSENTING Adults in Public, which describes itself as "London's only deviant community theatre group", will be back on its now traditional stamping ground of Hampstead Heath, for a midnight matinee on Midsummer Night (June 21). The show is called Campfire, by Eric Pres-



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

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CURIOUS CUSTOMS

LESBIANS and gay men have no right to read about ourselves! That's what HM Customs are going to say in court this summer. They'll be saying it at Highbury Corner Magistrates Court during the week of 24-28 June. That's when the eight directors and the Assistant Manager of Gays The Word bookshop face a total of 100 charges of importing indecent books.

Gays The Word in Marchmont St, WC1 has been run by lesbians and gay men for several years. It stocks a wide range of novels and other books from all over the world that have one thing in common—they're by and about gay people.

On April 10, 1984, Customs officials raided the bookshop and seized all of its imported stock. They also raided the homes of several of the shop's directors. At the same time, thousands of books on their way to the shop were refused Customs clearance, and delayed at the ports. The whole operation was carefully planned, and code-named Operation Tiger.

During the next seven months, seizure notices were issued on 142 books. This covers a wide range of books by respected authors, and could lead to huge personal fines—or even prison—for the directors (who are all unpaid volunteers), and the Assistant Manager.

With these charges, HM Customs are saying that books about gay people are 'indecent'. The committal hearing

in June is to see if a court thinks there is enough evidence to bring formal charges. If it does think so, the whole matter is even more of a setback for lesbian and gay rights in this country.

The court costs are expected to be at least £50,000,

and a defence campaign has been set up to raise funds to cover this, and to organise support for Gays The Word. So far, over £20,000 has been raised from individual donations and fund-raising events, but there's still a long way to go.

If you want to know more, or if you want to make a donation, you can write to the defence campaign at 66 Marchmont St, London WC1, with a stamped addressed envelope if you want information. If you want to make a donation you can make a cheque out to either 'Defend Gays The Word', or to DGTW.

If you want to do something to help here are a few things you can do:

1) Write to your MP (House of Commons, London SW1) asking her/him to take the matter up with Barney Heyhoe, the Treasury minister responsible for Customs and Excise.

2) Write to Barney Heyhoe himself (HM Treasury, Parliament St, London SW1), saying what you think.

3) Tell your club or trade union branch about the case, and ask them to make a donation, or organise a fundraising event.

4) Why not organise a fundraising event yourself?

To coincide with the committal hearings, the Asylum at Heaven is organising a megabenefit for the bookshop on Thurs 27 June.

There are also several meetings either about GTW or censorship in general, as the case attracts increasing interest. They are organised by Gay Humanists (June 14), Gemma and the Gay Men's Disabled Group (15), and Gay's The Word itself (28). See listings for details.

Bristol goes to town



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Greenwich fest

THE GREENWICH Lesbian and Gay Rights Group (GLGRC) has battles on its hands at the moment, as a local council union refuses to implement Greenwich's gay rights policy; but the group are taking time out to put on a series of events both for the Pride Festival and the Greenwich Festival (1-16).

The man at the heart of the row is Charles Maslin, local leader of the Association of Clerical Technical and Supervisory Staff (ACTSS) who has gone on record in the local press as saying, "Yes, I am prejudiced. Homosexuality is perverted." He has instructed his union not to discuss the lesbian/gay rights charter produced by GLGRC as a discussion paper.

But other ACTSS branches are to bring pressure on him; NALGO, the other local government union, is pressing the Council to reprimand him as a council officer (recruiting in Social Services) and the next ACTSS meeting will be pcketed on June 12.

In the meantime, the Greenwich group is organising a series of live events at the

Bell, Haddo St, SE10, featuring live bands and acts every Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Among those booked are Parker and Klein, Consenting Adults, the women's band Impromptu, and Ransome/ Oppenheimer.

There's also a lesbian/gay 'drop-in' day at Greenwich Young People's Theatre on June 23; with workshops and videos, and a disco in the evening. At Woolwich Town Hall there's a Lesbian Strength Bop on 24 June and a mixed bop on the 26th. Both of those will have live music and films as well as a disco. will be available.

If that wasn't enough work, the group will also be joining forces with the Gay-soc at Goldsmith's College for a Gay Day on 20 June. Local gay groups such as the Gay Outdoor Club and the Lewisham Working Party will have exhibition stands, and there'll be discussions, cabaret by the Pink Singers, and

a disco in the evening. The Greenwich Festival, programme itself also features two gay events-the gay outdoor club walk and cycle on 9/16th June.

SIMON Fanshawe, the gay comedian, conducts a unique experiment when he presents a series of live chat shows for three weeks at the Drill Hall Chenies Street, WC1.

night, in two-hour conversations, but details of who will appear on each night are only to be re-leased shortly before each week. "I want to keep a bit of surprise," says Simon. "I love chat shows, but TV kills the format. You can't have an interesting conversation, or talk to the audience in six minutes. That's the time guests get on Wogan."

Though Simon is himself a radical, he hasn't let his politics dictate the choice. "People said I should invite Victoria Gillick, but this isn't a debating chamber. She bores me. She's stupid, inane and imbecilic, and I wouldn't want to talk to the woman.

Simon insists that his personality as a gay perform-

er means that won't have to push gay issues.
"If people know they're talking to someone
gay, they talk to you differently. It becomes the starting point."

He also considers he has the ideal skill as a chat show host: "I'm really incredibly nosey.





The straight media have been irresponsible in their treatment of the issue, and Lesbian Line and Gay Switchboard have received a number of calls from lesbians who are worried about catching the disease.

To act against the straight coverage and as a gesture of

support for gay men, Lesbian Line has launched a campaign called Blood Sisters. The aims of the campaign are to reassure lesbians that they are a very low risk group and to encourage them to become blood donors. This is a demonstration that the lesbian and gay community are reacting to the situation in a responsible way.

Lesbian Line are also asking lesbians and gay and bisexual men who cannot give blood to sponsor the project, either by sponsoring the number of donors, or by giving a lump sum. Sponsorship money will be used to pay the costs of the project, and to help pay Lesbian Line's running costs.

Sponsorship forms and donor cards will be available at many lesbian and gay venues (eg London Lesbian and Gay Centre, Gays The Word, The Fallen Angel, etc). When completed they should be sent to Lesbian Line at BM 1514, London WClN 3XX. Cheques can be made out to either LL or Lesbian Line. There will be collection boxes at Gays The Word and the Lesbian and Gay Centre for completed forms/cards and cheques. The campaign will end after the Pride 85 march on June 29, 1985.
