
PRIDE '86 is NOW. Nationwide lesbians and gay men are launching Britain's biggest, brightest and best Pride Festival ever. We have over three hundred plays, shows, films, talks, walks, picnics and parties laid on.

It's been a startling experience planning this year's Carnival and Festival. More and more people seem to have involved themselves in ensuring the success of PRIDE '86. All sections of the community have helped and shown that we can act as a community—lesbians, gay men, businesses, pubs, clubs, groups, superstars and politicians.

A year ago most of us would have thought it unlikely, if not impossible to have nearly 15,000 gay men and lesbians spending a day parading through the centre of London. Or that we would fill a park, stage a full day of entertainment and be moved to tears by a South Wales miner's wife telling us she would be proud to have a lesbian or gay child. It happened last year because of a lot of hard work, good organisation and gay people's determination not to allow the names we're called by the The Sun, The Sunday Express and the rest of the gutter press to stick.

We have worked just as hard this year and the show is going to be just as good. We still have our enemies and Aids isn't licked yet (but it will be) but we have a lot to celebrate—our support for each other shown by £220,000 raised by the gay community in the past twelve months to support The Terrence Higgins Trust, Gays the Word Defence Fund, London Lesbian and Gay Switchboard, Body Positive and PRIDE '86 itself.

We want everyone to come this year. There are more lesbians and gay men in London than in San Francisco and so the festivities should be bigger here than there. Gay people have realised that the Pride Carnival is fun—a place to meet each other in greater numbers than anywhere else and to be the majority on the streets. If you came last year you'll know what we mean. If you didn't make sure you come along this time.

PRIDE '86 GOES NATIONWIDE

PRIDE '86 is a national festival. In over 20 towns lesbians and gay men have fixed a calendar of festival events from a 'Carmen Miranda Demolition Night' in Liverpool to theatre in Bristol to debates about and religion in gavs Southampton. London still has the National Carnival Parade and the greatest number of events but this year is only one of many centres.

PRIDE NORTH, a group based in Manchester, has called on every major club in the North to lay on a PRIDE event/benefit. Manchester will have its big gay day on 28th June when the Bloom Street area, now christened 'the Gay Village' stages a Fun day-a street party of games, live entertainment, stalls and perhaps a few custard pies. Manchester's clubs are doing their bit with Pride Night too (see Diary).

Liverpool and Newcastle have local events as well as PRIDE NORTH happenings. Both cities have series of film nights and Liverpool's Pride Picnic in Sefton Park is rumoured to be good enough to empty the gay beach at Freshfield for the day.

Avery, PRIDE Colin NORTH co-ordinator said Our aim is to raise £20,000 for gay related charities. As

well as being entertainment we want press coverage for our events so that Northerners will see the diversity of lesbians and gay men and not media stereotypes'.

Scotland's gay scene rivals Manchester's in size. The PRIDE '86 group in Edinburgh have persuaded all Edinburgh's pubs and clubs to festivate (!) for PRIDE. The Assembley Rooms in George Street see an unmissable PRIDE '86 Cabaret with Nervous Circus, Hook'n'Pull Gang, Tina, and lots more on 21st June as a start to Scotland's Pride fortnight. Coaches from Edinburgh to London for the Carnival are almost full so the Scots obviously intend to continue the fun down south.

Leicester Gay Pride are taking over the Town Hall Square on June 21st for an Open Air Festival with stalls, games and continuous live entertainment - women morris dancers, local chanteuse Ginger, and London's Pink Singers are only some of the acts. Citing an obscure 30 year old bylaw about 'not annoying the public' (for which there is a £5 fine) the police have attempted to stop the organisers handing out any leaflets. The leaflet the police object to would give safe sex advice. Leicester

Council has supported Gay Pride against the police interpretation of the law. As we go to press the matter is still in the balance. If you are in the East Midlands make sure you get along to Leicester to support this Festival.

Southampton does not have a big gay scene so the Southampton Lesbian and Gay Pride Festival '86 is selffinancing. All the same Peter Brunnen and his group have put together one of the most extensive programmes in Britain. Theatre, debates, poetry and discos are all laid on as well as an exhibition of work by gay artists held by the city Art Gallery.

Wales has its own PRIDE march on Thursday 26th June. Last year over 600 came. This year it leaves from the Joint Student Union. It is Cardiff Gay Students who make the running in the organisation but the march is for everyone. If you are working during the day don't miss the evening disco at the Tunnel Club to carry the day's celebrations into the wee small hours.

Some Pride Weeks have already taken place a bit earlier than elsewhere.

Nottingham's week coincided with the Civic Festival in late May and saw Gay Sweatshop preview 'Compromised Immunity' and Bronski Beat put in an appearance. The organising group intend to open a Lesbian and Gay Centre in Nottingham. The Festival's success was just a taster of what lesbian and gay people can achieve when they pull together.

Bristol and Bath AVON-PRIDE is timed to end two weeks before the London Parade in order to give Bristol's lesbian and gay community time to recover. The South's most ambitious Pride Week outside London saw theatre in Bristol and Bath, films at the Arnolfini as well as garden parties and walks. The Lesbian Line involvement was a great boost this year and a 12 year tradition of Pride Weeks in Avon is set to be even stronger in the future.

As well as regional Pride Weeks there are single events to be supported in lots of other towns. They are all witness to the determination of lesbians and gay men to affirm who we are. 'All gay life is not in London and PRIDE '86 shows it' commented London organiser David Bunnet 'Next year will be even bigger as people realise they have the power to change their lives and their communities for the better'.

Yours socially -**Kenric**

The name Kenric doesn't convey a thing - least of all, that it's a social organisation for lesbians, and for most of its 21 years, focussed in the Home Counties. With a monthly newsletter detailing a wide variety of events, Kenric established that it was providing a popular, albeit limited, service. About 18 months ago, however, it was decided that Kenric needed to adapt to the

A rather reclusive publicity

attitude - 'responding to requests for speakers/articles' was replaced by a determined promotion, using features, advertisements, etc. The Post Office was persuaded to grant free postage for 1,000 mailshots to helplines, the Samaritans, gay organisations, etc. Kenric appeared at Pride '85, a Lesbian Line conference and other seminars.

Widespread publicity resulted in a dramatic increase in membership, to record levels. As lesbians far from the Home Counties began to join, Kenric created a Regional Reps scheme. The idea is that volunteers welcome new members, suggest places which might accept Kenric publicity. and encourage local social activities. The network's grown fast: there are now nearly 50 Regional Reps, and many have built up thriving groups in their

Non-political

It's clear that in many cities let alone villages - lesbians have almost no social opportunities, and there's no national body comparable to Kenric. It's nonpolitical, but contains many campaigners within its ranks everyone needs time to relax. Kenric is certainly not out to poach members from other societies - heterosexuals have lots of choice, so why shouldn't lesbians?

Basically. there's one paramount objective: the relief of isolation among lesbians. Kenric seeks to overcome this

form the monthly Diary, featured prominently in the newsletter. addition, In informal contact is encouraged through the Special Interests Register. This is a list numbering over 100 subjects, and assists members who share the same obsession - sporting, cultural, artistic or whatever - to get in touch informally.

Kenric is dedicated to nonageism, and many members find this refreshing. Even in some gay groups, there is segregation of the generations - not in Kenric. 20-year-olds may discover a common interest whether in heavy metal or poetry-reading - 50-year-olds. and a Youth Officer ensures that the Exec keeps up-to-date

We are perfect come and join

Hyde Park Gays and Sapphics started as a re-action to a homophobic platform in 1983. We speak every Sunday afternoon no matter what the weather.

The platform for speeches made by the Campaign for Homosexual Equality ceased in 1978 and although attempts were made to revive it, none succeeded and therefore our group was formed.

Editing, censorship and total misrepresentation by all the media made us determined to present a positive lesbian and gay platform, where we expressed without being misquoted. It has directly educate heterosexuals.

Over teh years we have had a number of guest speakers but essentially it has been left to three of us and our merry band of enthusiasts to weather all the

Usually there is a friendly atmosphere found around the platform and lots of relationships have been started there. Alas - a lot have also finished too.

There are squabbles. We admit to them., we often brag about them, but we believe it is much easier and often better to talk things through.

Peter Randall, co-founder of Body Positive, the group for people who are HIV (HTLV-3) positive, talks about his own experiences of coping with the Aids virus.

MY WORLD was destroyed in the summer of 1984. I had felt unwell for a long period prior to then, but that June I began to waste away. Day by day I watched my body falling apart against the onslaught of an unknown and unstoppable disease. I was taken into hospital where I found my fears turn into a nightmare - compounded from the ignorance of the staff, the absence of my friends, and my terror as I saw death approaching. I don't know how I survived, only that I came to a place deep within myself where life and death were hard against each other, and I chose to side with life.

In the months which followed I often wondered why I had made that choice. My world had fallen apart - I had lost my home because I was unable to maintain it, I had lost my job because of

absenteeism, nearly all of my friends had disappeared - their fear being greater than their

The despair I felt at not knowing how to come to terms with my isolation and my illness brought me many times to the point of suicide. It was not until I first met others who were experiencing this illness, or who were trying to adjust to being infected, that I felt any support and could begin to rebuild my life. That sharing of experience led to the creation of Body Positive, and has subsequently been the base for most of my work in challenging Aids.

I have met and worked with many hundreds of gay men who are facing the challenge of Aids.

Bitter

Many things have struck me from that experience. I was at first bitter that the gay scene seemed solely based around a hard-edged sexuality that had no place within it for those who felt alienated from it. But I came to recognise that in a society where the only facet of being gay that is acknowledged is that we have sex with each other, then it was not surprising that most of the expression of our identities as gay men has been through sex.

In the face of this disease I have seen and shared the experience of many men having to relearn and reinterpret who they are. Many have had to do so in order to survive. In doing so they have had to challenge many of the assumptions about gay men which are held not only by society but in different ways also by ourselves. And in rebuilding their lives they have redefined

themselves and their needs from the gay community.

have come to have an enormous respect for the dignity and valour with which gay men have responded to the crisis in lives. We have demonstrated that our care and love for each other goes far beyond the limits which society recognises, and in doing so we have shown - and felt for ourselves - that gay men hold out the most complete model of what being a man is.

DignitySiding with life does not mean that we should pretend that Aids isn't here, or that it isn't devastating our lives and our community. It means, as a community, meeting that challenge with dignity and pride and confronting all those views wherever they are held - which regard this disease as a punishment rather than an illness. Siding with life means celebrating our lives and our love for each other. It means acknowledging our needs of each other and our ability to support and care for each other. It means being proud to be gay.

I do not know what my future holds, whether I shall be ill again, whether I am going to die from this disease. These things seem less relevant to me than continuing to give and share in the love I have found around me, in considering what I am going to do with this moment, this life, this challenge. In blowing the smoke away I see not the fire of my crime, but the fire of my life.

Phranc talking

LAST time I saw Phranc, she was clenched against the penetrating March wind as she ran through her set and a couple of encores on the last night of the GLC.

One woman, her guitar and the neatest flat-top ever. Take Suzanne Vega, chuck out the 'Me-Generation Angst' add a sense of humour and compassion, a political sensibility – and of course, a lesbian perspective. Phranc's now based in Santa Monica, California, where she's a swimming teacher – a born-again water baby – and comes to the UK via a licensing deal with Stiff Records, who put out her debut LP 'Folksinger' and her 45, a cover of Bob Dylan's 'The Lonesome Death Of Hattie Carroll'.

Right now, Phranc is in L.A. where she's been working on a 12" extended dance mix of her tender ode to the chlorine-scented pleasures of being sound chums with the others on the swimming team. 'One Of The Girls'.

She will, during her June/July tour of the UK, be playing a mixture of venues, but like last time, many will have their own built-in straight audience.

"I play a lot in front of straight crowds. I'm always astonished at how well they accept it. I guess self-identity, the expression of this, is something that people feel a sense of unity with. And I feel vedry strongly about going out and playing to the big world."

Something that impressed her on her last UK tour was having women-only venues booked in with her regular tour schedule.

"Over in the States, the womens' clubs would have had to be booked separately, there's no established relationship between the music industry and the womens' scene. What's more, I've played more women-only clubs here than I ever did in the US."

Phranc comes from a Jewish background., Her parents were 'reformed with conservative overtones,' although her grandad was devoutly orthodox. Her first gig was at one of her grandad's celebrations, playing to 100 people under a carport . . . "underneath the hanging plastic fruit!" Coming out at 16 to her parents caused a social rumpus rather than a religious one and Phranc moved out a year later.

She began performing on the blossoming womens' scene, moved out to Hollywood and then came the point of no return. She discovered watersports... "After my heyday on the Hollywood night scene where I was living a very rock 'n' roll lifestyle and I got very ill through drugs, I was consuming everything and I knew I had to clean up my life. I enrolled in all the classes at the community sports college over the road. I wanted to do competitive swimming, but they only did badminton in competitions. Then, I switched to another school, the swim team was open and BOOM! That was it."

Phranc waved goodbye to drink and drugs and became a water safety instructor. She believes swimming is the perfect wayy to balance the draining schedule of touring and performing.

After Gays and Broadcasting...

IN THE week of the 100th anniversary of the criminalisation of male homosexuality, did TV or radio give it any mention? No. Gays and Broadcasting should know: we monitored 470 hours of TV and radio output between August 12th and 18th last year.

Lorraine Trenchard and I were employed to collate information from the monitoring project, to arrive at conclusions and recommendations. We split the work into two categories, Actuality and Entertainment. Lorraine found that in Actuality programmes gay and lesbian issues accounted for between 1-2% of airtime; this was almost solely in relation to Aids. In Entertainment programmes, gay representation occupied over 4% of TV time, but only 0.05% - one twentieth of one per cent! - of radio output. The difference is attributable to the lack of sitcoms and adult drama on radio; John Inman's transvestite episodes don't translate well to the soundwaves and, although the week was chosen at random, it included the films Victim and Scarecrow - both obsessed with images of gays as criminals. Most astounding was the absolute invisibility of lesbianism, which amounted in total to no more than a few minutes in a whole week of brodcasting.

Response

What matters now is not the research, but the response to the results. A day conference in February highlighted the plurality of potential strategies and also our disarray. Some people wanted a gay magazine programme, others wanted more gay characters in soap operas. Another emphasis was on the importance of having more gay media workers come out, whilst other people proposed the dismantling of our current broadcasting system altogether. This incoherence stemmed largely from misunderstandings about how the media works.

Gays and Broadcasting should take some of the blame for not following the conference with a media training day, or with a series of regular meetings for core group interest (although the Campaign for Press and Broadcasting Freedom has successfully developed some dis-

cussions).

But it was Channel Four's access programme 'Right To Reply' that kept the torch burning for a couple of weeks at least. They held an extended discussion, with Gays and Broadcasting pitted against Channel 4 deputy head Paul Bonner and Robin Midgely of BBC Pebble Mill's drama department. This was the most instructive lesson yet in how TV works: although this was meant

to be 'our' right of reply, we were instructed not to mention Aids or documentary coverage, the Winston Churchill/Mary Whitehouse lobby, or issues affecting gay employees within the institution. In short, we were re-packaged as just another we-hate-stereotypes-in-sitcom' lobby.

Lesson

Another lesson 'Right To Reply' taught us is the importance of persistent and immediate campaigning. A C-4 mole passed on the Duty Officer's records from that evening, including synopses of all telephone calls received. Twenty-three people called in to comment on the programme. Only seven were complimentary. According to the Duty Officer, the first eight all harked on the same theme: "Homosexuals are perverts, they are killing the world with Aids, etc. They're mentally ill, encourage the abuse of small boys and are criminals. Gay means happy and they're always miserable. C-4 is wicked to encourage them." The calls came from around the country. Clearly homophobic lobby organised one.

The problem with the Gays and Broadcasting project is that,

even before it was over, its ambition was an out-dated one. An empirical head-count of gays on TV does little more than confirm our fears; it doesn't help us understand how representation works. Few of the volunteers who came to monitor programmes could agree on what, to them, would be an 'ideal' gay characterisation. But our monitors were all surprised at how quickly they built up skills for close analysis of TV images and radio sound.

WHAT NOW?

The results of Gavs and Broadcasting's research have merely unearthed the mire of a fastapproaching Dark Ages. BBC banned Horizon on Aids and Churchill launched his Obscene Publications Amendments Bill soon after the monitoring project. In this context it might be easy to praise Channel Four's up-coming lesbian/gay movie season, if we didn't know that a gay documentary series, Six of Hearts, has been postponed for another six months because the channel doesn't want to be seen to be catering too much for gays.

What we need now is blatant, strident lobbying of the most persistent kind coupled with far more sophisticated analyses of the strategies of media power and representation. The impetus that simmered below Gays and Broadcasting should be hotted up and developed in both directions.

Haringey leads the way

THE recent council elections in London showed beyond any doubt that the Labour Party is the only major political party to take lesbian and gay rights seriously. Whatever the Tories and the Alliance may say to the gay press, the fact remains that at a local level they are prepared, as part of their campaigns, to attack lesbian and gay rights as a way

of smearing the Labour Party. The good news is that these smears did not stick and the Labour Party did very well, particularly in those places where it was up-front and open about its lesbian and gay rights policies.

This was particularly true in Lambeth, Camden and Islington but also in Haringey where lesbian and gay rights was, by no means, the only controversial policy of the Labour Party. The Council is a left-wing one, which is eager to improve its services and to make them more accountable. A notable part of this programme is its Equal Opportunities policy.

As far as the media was concerned, however, the major issue in the election was not so much these policies but the personality of the council leader, Bernie Grant. In their racist fashion, they were not content just to dub him 'Red Bernie'; they went further and

dubbed him 'Barmy Bernie', implying mental instability in a way which they have not done with any white left-wing politician.

Hatred

The Tottenham section of the Tory Party were the most vicious in their anti-Labour campaign. Their leaflets told us next to nothing about what the Tories would do, if elected, but their general design made them look as if they might have been designed by Goebbels. All they did was provoke hatred against three groups in particular – against gypsies; against muggers who are all, they implied, black; and against lesbians and gay men.

They made particular propaganda out of the fact that the Council had set up a £100,000 Lesbian and Gay Unit and also planned to introduce positive images of homosexuality into the school curriculum. Needless to say, on their anti-gay leaflet, they included the phrase 'Aids is a

killer'. The more middle-class

section of the Tory Party in Hornsey produced less crude leaflets with longer sentences but their fundamental message was the same. A hatred of outsiders was what they wanted to inspire.

Racist

The Tories were frequently accused of being racist but they always denied this and pointed to the large number of black and minority ethnic candidates that they had, without mentioning that they were all in unwinnable seats. Their racism was not, for the moment, of the 'Send Them Back' variety. Rather, it was incorporated into a melange of fear and hatred of groups who are different from the Tory idea of normality. They attempted to build an alliance of houseowners, small businessmen, ppies and the traditionally religious. Lesbians and gay men, they thought, would be one of the easiest targets for this alliance of hatred. They did not imagine that lesbians and gay men would respond in their own

Active

The Haringey Labour Party was, happily, able to show that they felt no shame about the lesbian and gay rights poliy and they responded vigorously to these attacks. A number of Labour Candidates were openly gay; The local group of Labour Campaign for Lesbian and Gay Rights was actively involved in the campaign; and, most importantly, the lesbian and gay rights policy was seen as the responsibility of the whole

It was frequently discussed during canvassing and the lesbian and gay leaflet was readily available. It was also seen as part of the Equal Opportunities policy and part of the politics of opposition to oppression. The oppression of lesbians and gay men is not identical with that of racism or that of sexism, but what Haringey Labour Party showed is that when oppressed groups organise together within a Socialist context they can begin, as the GLC said, to Change the World.

A victory for Labour in one Londón borough is only a small beginning and we should not expect too much of it. But the message is clear – Labour is the only party which is committed to Equal Opportunities for lesbians and gay men; Labour is now more habitable for lesbians and gay men than ever before; lesbians and gay men with radical and socialist views should join the Labour Party.

POLITICS BEGINS AT HOME

IF WE'RE to trust Capital Gay's first ever gay paper partypolitical opinion poll (this May) there's a bigger gay block vote for Maggie even in 1986 (at 33%) than for any other party leader.

Moral? Gays don't want to be co-opted by party-politics? See socialism as puritanism? The men subconsciously see Maggie as drag? Feel that Reds rock beds?

Who knows... but it's a funny vote. Maggie closed London's County Hall at midnight this 31st March, plus six 'Met Counties'. So no Jubilee Gardens for the Carnival this year, though maybe next, and no Divine walking on the Thames by Parliament for the second time.

As "our Ken's" administration sank into oblivion the staff struggled to set aside funds to go on helping out (eg) the London Lesbian & Gay Centre and the lesbian/gay police monitoring units through 1986-87, but were defeated when a Tory London borough took them to court.

Goodwill

Goodbye GLC. Ken told us we should beware "leaning on" non-gay politicians of goodwill. Dear Ken, we were glad to hear from you while it lasted, very very glad—but standing on our own two feet is what we're best at.

Crushing the "lesbians on the rates" GLC cost Maggie one Minister, Patrick Jenkin, reputation irretrievably ruined, but was the making of another one, Kenneth Baker, promoted this May to Education Secretary.

So he's now in charge of keeping realistic teaching about lesbians and gays (and lesbian and gay culture) out of the schools, and in charge of continuing to shove "heterosexism"—as if the media, the textbooks, and people's families weren't doing that job already.

How that last term "heterosexism" infuriated the "opinion-formers" during 1985-86. There are those, moaned the Times from behind barbed wire in Wapping this May, "who do not want equal-value indoctrination on homosexuality and against 'heterosexism' to which their children are increasingly subject".

'Immoral' teaching

Just as rate-bills got blamed on grants to gays, so demoralisation of teachers and the education system was increasingly blamed over the year on "Lefty" teachers and "immoral" teaching. By this June, the law had been changed to compel praise of "family values" in any sex-education class.

Got a long memory? The "Mc-Carthyite witch-hunts" of America in the 1940s smeared people from Hollywood to the State Department as "pinko commie faggots". Flailing around for fear they'll lose the next Election, Tory Central Office went openly McCarthyite this year.

Nothing so openly hostile to gays, from any party, has been seen in Britain since the 1950s.

Norman Tebbit (Tory chair, predecessors removed respectively for incompetence—John Gummer—and adultery—Cecil Parkinson) floated the idea of "amending" the 1967 Sexual Offences Act, which partly took the police off our backs.

Gobbling Tebbit

John Mortimer, defence counsel for the old Gay News when Mary Whitehouse hauled it before the Old Bailey in 1977, asked Tebbit what on earth he thought he was playing at in an interview in the Spectator, and described Tebbit gobbling, unable to answer.

McCarthyism smeared its way over Gay Men's Press's book Jenny Lives with Eric and Martin, pretending, when ILEA had one copy, that it was on every desk in every school in the country.

Books, ah books! The '67 Act was supposed to leave our bodies our own (as long as we're over 21) but our minds remain fair game. Last August a London magistrate sent nine of our community's voluntary workers—two lesbians, seven gay men—for trial at the Old Bailey, set for this 6th October as I write.

They are of course the directors and one employee of Gay's The Word. Lavender Menace, of Edinburgh, Gay Christian Movement, and the entire British book trade are among those anxiously waiting to see if Customs will succeed in their accusation that Gay's The Word were "smugglers" in their efforts to get lesbian and gay reading matter from America to England.

Fair

Chris Smith, our one and only "out" gay MP (the semi-out Matthew Parris having departed during the year for rich pickings as a TV presenter) tackled the new Minister, Peter Brooke, about it and everyone "understood" that Brooke was going to "send for the papers" and see if everything is fair.

And then: this March Customs stopped another Gay's The Word import from America. And at Gatwick seized gay mags (27th May) from a passenger. And in June, Irish Customs seized Gay Times.

Get back in your closets! The message got louder over the year, a last cry of rage from the generation, now in power, who still can't bear what 16 years of lesbian/gay liberation has done to their adolescent fantasy of "queers" as rare, furtive, and the children of someone else.

Winston Churchill MP, grandson of Sir Winston whose private secretary Eddie Marsh was gay (as Winnie well knew) brought in a Bill to "tighten" the law against "indecent displays" in newsagents and on TV.

Clare Short MP caught him short by promptly introducing her own Bill to outlaw Page Three Girls. It didn't get anywhere, but nor did Churchill's Bill after yells of protest from the (male) arts establishment and some fast footwork by the Opposition. The Bill collapsed on 25th April.

Hypocrite

Ungrateful brute, Churchill. The

press slyly mocked him as a hypocrite for his notorious extramarital affair with Sorayah Kashoggi. They didn't mention that his family (the Dukes of Marlborough) owe their fortunes to the homosexual William III.

Nor that his ancestor Sarah, Duchess of Marlborough, wrote furious letters to Queen Anne, their other benefactor, in 1708 denouncing the Queen as a lesbian. The only objectionable material on TV that Churchill could think of in the House of Commons was Derek Jarman's "gay sensibility" movies recently run on Channel 4.

But the uproar had its effect. In April distributors refused to handle Gay Times, with its cover of a boy clutching a fountaining bottle of champagne to his naked self (no naughty parts visible), for fear of an obscenity prosecution.

Labour's middle ranks and grass-roots continued (whether the 33% like it or not) to keep holding the door of the closet open or prising it still further off its hinges. Notching up the first "out" Mayor, Bob Crossman took office in Islington, having won his seat again in the May elections: the electorate can live with "out" lesbians/gays.

Churchilliana

But there's still plenty of pockets of "churchilliana" flourishing like weeds in Labour. At the time of writing, Leader Kinnock and Shadow Home Secretary Kaufman are still evading interviews by the gay press.

This despite a first-ever "plenary" session about lesbian and gay rights at the last Labour Party Conference. Energetic lobbying got a card-vote majority of 3.4 million to 2.8 million committing Labour to campaign for lesbian and gay rights. Jo Richardson MP spoke vigorously for us.

The majority wasn't enough to force a modernised commitment throughout all the sections of Labour's next Election manifesto. But the politicking is already on to achieve that at this October's conference.

Desperate to distance itself from the "extreme Left", Labour stays timid about publicity for its achievements. The Chair of the October '85 Conference manoeuvred to keep Chris Smith off the floor while the cameras were running.

Another politician (besides Kinnock and Kaufman) who wouldn't speak to gays this year was Barney Heyhoe. Having slept through the Customs raids on lesbian and gay reading while he was responsible Minister, he got shifted to Health Minister in Maggie's autumn reshuffle.

This spring he held a press conference to announce details of the government's £2.5 million Aidsinformation campaign. Who was there to ask him questions? Why, the straight press. The gay press were shunted off to a separate press conference which he didn't even bother to attend.

Aids grants

We all learnt more about Aids and "safer sex", but it wasn't the Health Ministry's doing. London Lesbian and Gay Switchboard—the 'Lesbian' added on this January, after 12 years of Switchboard's existence, during which lesbians have always been both volunteers and callers—got a £2,700 DHSS grant in recognition of the service it offers callers about Aids.

The Terrence Higgins Trust got £100,000 from the DHSS. Good. But negligible compared to the task, even bearing in mind the other money pressures on the DHSS. Specialist doctors estimated that £10 million would fund promising research the Americans aren't doing—but no sign of government cash yet.

Cara Friend, over in Belfast, got a small DHSS grant. The Scottish Office failed to open any genuine debate about how best to deal with the alarming rise in HTLV-3 or—newest term—HIV transmission among needle-sharing IV drug users in Edinburgh.

Standing on our own feet? The defence fund for Gay's The Word reached £50,000, a Hippodrome benefit for Switchboard raised £10,000, an Adelphi benefit for Action against Aids raised £40,000...our charitable efforts for ourselves are running at maybe £200,000 a year. Politics begins at home.


