Reflection: Holy Cross Day

The festival that the Church of England celebrates at this time is very different from the one that has been celebrated for over 1500 years by the Catholic Church. In fact before 1960 the Catholic Church had two separate feast days, one celebrating the discovery (in the 4th Century AD) of the buried cross on which Jesus had been crucified, and the other celebrating the return of that relic to Jerusalem after it had been looted by the Persian army in the early 7th Century.

Our readings today instead focus on Jesus' sacrifice on that cross, and what it means for us. Speaking to Nicodemus, Jesus refers back to the incident recorded in today's Old Testament reading from the book of Numbers, when the people of Israel were beset by poisonous snakes in the desert and Moses was told to put a bronze effigy of a serpent on a pole so that any who had been bitten could look at the snake-on-a-pole and not die of the snakes' venom. Jesus refers to his own coming death and says that, in a similar way, anyone who believes in the Son of Man who suffered and died while nailed to the cross would escape spiritual death and instead have eternal life.

The images we have in our church building of Jesus on the cross do not attempt to show the suffering our Lord had to endure. In reality, crucifixion was a brutally violent and humiliating experience, and often the suffering lasted several days; but our East Window, for example, shows Jesus in his kingly triumph in front of the cross. Does such an image reduce our sense of gratitude of what Jesus went through so that we could spend eternity with God in Heaven?.

God is not a sadist, inflicting pain on his Son unnecessarily, but Jesus is clear that his death, and the way it happened, were always his Heavenly Father's intention, so what does that mean for how much God loves us? And what should our response be to such love?

Numbers 21: 4-9

From Mount Hor, Moses and the people of Israel set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food. Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us.' So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, 'Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live.' So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

those who seek the Lord shall praise him; their hearts shall live for ever.

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord,

Philippians 2: 6-11

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him

and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus very knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

John 3: 13-17

Jesus said to Nicodemus, 'No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.'
