This means that there was an 87% pass rate for Higher with 64% of our pupils achieving an A or B grade National average for an A-C grade across Scotland is 75.9%


23 Pupils achieved an SCQF Level 6 National Certificate in Communication and Literature


- **RUAE (PAPER 1) EXAM 30%**
- CRITICAL READING (PAPER 2) EXAM 40% (ESSAY/SET TEXT)
- •FOLIO- EXTERNAL 30% (ONLY ONE ESSAY THIS YEAR)

RUAE – 1HR 30MINS N5 – 1HR




- RUAE stands for Reading, Understanding, Analysis and Evaluation.
- Pupils will be tested on their understanding of the passage, their analysis of language and evaluating how successful it has been in getting across the main ideas.
- The RUAE paper will consist of 2 non-fiction passages.
- They will both focus on the same topic but may express different views.

RUAE – 1HR 30MINS N5 – 1HR




- ➤ The majority of the questions will focus on passage one. The final question will ask the candidate to consider both passages (5 marks).
- > Pupils are encouraged to answer in bullet point form.
- ➤ The big difference from N5 is that there are no longer marks awarded for quotes or references (still need to go through that process).
- **→** Higher average out of 30 = 15.8
- ▶ N5 average out of 30 = 15.7

CRITICAL READING 1HR 30MINS



- ➤ This paper consists of two different sections Scottish Set Text and Critical Essay
- **▶** Both sections are worth 20% each
- Candidates will spend roughly 45 mins on each section
- Time management is a key skill for this paper
- ► Higher average out of 40 = 22
- ▶N5 average out of 40 = 27.6


SCOTTISH SET TEXT





- ➤ Section one is Scottish set text a study of Scottish literature.
- > The class teacher will have chosen one of the following options:
- 6 poems
- 3 short stories
- A play
- A novel.
- They will have detailed notes and annotations for each poem in their possession.
- They will receive one poem in the exam and the majority of questions will be based on this poem.


SCOTTISH SET TEXT





- The last question will always be worth 10 marks and it is the only time they must bring in evidence from the other poems. There is a set structure to answer this question and every pupil will have detailed notes explaining what is required.
- The big difference between N5 and Higher is that <u>candidates will</u> <u>no longer receive marks for references or quotes</u>. All available marks are based on analysis.


CRITICAL ESSAY





- > Section two is the critical essay of the exam.
- Each candidate will study either a novel, play or short story. They will work though the text in detail and take notes on aspects like characterisation, theme, conflict etc They will also be given model examples of responses to the type of questions that arise in this section.
- ➤ Candidates will be asked to choose one question from various different sections of questions. They <u>must</u> answer the questions under the genre of text they studied e.g. If they studied a play, then they must answer one of the questions from the Drama section.

CRITICAL ESSAY





Candidates will have roughly <u>45 mins</u> to write this essay. It is important that candidates practice writing essays within this time frame (unless they are entitled to extra time). This will give them every chance of writing a detailed and thorough response in the time allocated.

FOLIO





- ➤ This is the coursework that is completed throughout the year and is usually submitted to the SQA before the Easter break to be marked.
- Candidates can select between a Discursive/Persuasive or Reflective/Creative genre for their piece. Candidates usually have to submit two pieces but the SQA have removed one piece this year in response to the impact of COVID.
- The class teacher can help each candidate plan their essay and they can mark one draft of their work and provide feedback in how to improve their work.

FOLIO



- ➤ The final piece should be no longer that 1,300 words. There is a 10% allowances above this, however we try to stick to the advertised word count as much as possible. There is no minimum word count but any piece that is less the 1,000 tends to be self-penalising in our experience.
- The essay will be marked out of <u>15 marks</u>. Due to the changes, this mark will then be doubled to give the candidate a percentage out of <u>30</u>.
- **→** Higher average out of 30 = 19.7
- **▶** N5 average out of 30 = 21.3
