I hope this message finds you well. Policing in Tendring has been particularly busy over the past month, with the hot summer weather drawing thousands of visitors to our district each day. Alongside our operational work, I've been out on my Chief Inspector Tour, visiting local areas and meeting with councillors to hear directly about the issues that matter most to our communities.

It's been incredibly encouraging to see the excellent work being done to tackle local concerns, but we know there's always more to do. My message is simple: we're committed to working hard to reduce crime and bring more offenders to justice. Some may say, "Isn't that what you're supposed to do?"—and my answer is absolutely yes. That's our mission, and it's one I'm proud to lead.

This month, our roads policing officers have been actively enforcing speed limits across the district. While this often sparks debate on social media, it remains one of the most consistent concerns raised by residents during my visits. We're listening, and we're acting.

Our neighbourhood team has also been busy, seizing nuisance e-scooters and e-bikes, and continuing our partnership work with local shops to arrest and charge shoplifters. Our marine unit has been patrolling the coast, making arrests and engaging with communities at fetes, schools, and local events. We believe policing should be visible and part of the community, and we'll continue to attend these events wherever possible.

As the warm weather continues, please remember to secure your vehicles and property, don't leave windows or doors open unattended. Looking ahead, we're preparing for the Clacton Airshow towards the end of August. There will be a significant policing presence to ensure the event remains the fantastic day it always is for our district. I'll be there, and I hope to see many of you too.

On Thursday 19 June officers from the Harwich Neighbourhood Policing Team were on patrol when they observed an e-scooter being ridden at speed into Gateway Retail Park, Parkeston. The vehicle was seized under Section 165 of the Road Traffic Act 1988, which permits police to confiscate uninsured vehicles used on public roads.

Later that day, the same team seized a second e-scooter in Weeley, also under the same legislation. One of the scooters was carrying two people, which is both unsafe and illegal!

A reminder to parents and guardians: Privately owned e-scooters are not legal for use on public roads, pavements, or cycle lanes. They are classed as motor vehicles and must meet strict legal requirements, which most do not.

Please ensure young people are not using e-scooters as a form of transport.

Misuse can lead to:

A £300 fine 6 penalty points on a driving licence The e-scooter being seized

<u>E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under UK law, meaning they must:</u>

Be insured

Be registered with the DVLA

Have MOT and road tax

Meet strict construction and lighting standards

Most private e-scooters do not meet these legal requirements.

There is currently no e-scooter trial in the Tendring district. Only rental e-scooters in approved trial areas are legal, and even then, riders must meet age and licence requirements.







On Friday 20 June 2025, officers from the Clacton Neighbourhood Policing Team stopped a vehicle in Kirby Cross following a proactive stop triggered by an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) alert.

The vehicle had previously been reported as stolen due to non-payment of a finance agreement, and a court order for its recovery was issued in October 2024.

The vehicle was subsequently seized.



Illegally Converted E-Bike Seized in Jaywick

While searching for a high-risk missing person in Jaywick, one of our PCSOs came across something else that required immediate attention, an illegally converted electric push bike.

The rider, however, wasn't keen to stick around and quickly fled the scene, leaving the bike behind. The vehicle has since been seized and will be dealt with appropriately.

Illegally modified e-bikes and scooters pose a serious risk to both riders and



the public. If they don't meet legal requirements, they cannot be used on public roads or pavements. Riders could face fines, penalty points on their licence, or even prosecution.

We remain committed to keeping our communities safe and will continue to take action where necessary.

Speeding jet ski prompts police response at Point Clear

On Saturday 21 June, an off-duty marine unit officer spotted a jet ski speeding through Brightlingsea Creek near Point Clear, where a 4-knot (4.6mph) speed limit is in place. With the warm weather, the area was busy with swimmers, paddleboarders, and yachts navigating in and out of the harbour.

Concerned for public safety, the officer contacted local officers from the Neighbourhood Policing Team in Clacton, requesting they attend the area. Upon arrival the officers stopped a black Ford Transit towing the jet ski. Checks revealed the vehicle had no insurance.

The driver, a 35-year-old man from Epping, was reported for driving without insurance and issued a warning regarding his conduct on the water.

Operation Targets Street Drinking and Anti-Social Behaviour in Clacton

A recently launched operation aimed at tackling street drinking and antisocial behaviour in Clacton town centre has already led to four arrests.

The Neighbourhood Policing Team continues to enforce a long-standing Public Space Protection Order (PSPO), designed to curb disruptive behaviour in public areas. As part of this effort, officers have also issued five Community Protection Notices to individuals, helping deter repeat offences and enabling swift action against further incidents.

In one recent example, officers on patrol responded to reports of drunk and disorderly behaviour near Christmas Tree Island. A man was directed to leave the area. Later that same day, the same individual was seen consuming alcohol on Jackson Road and was again asked to leave. After refusing to comply, he was arrested.

A 39-year-old man has since been charged with failing to comply with a PSPO and is due to appear at Chelmsford Magistrates' Court on 23 July.

Inspector Aaron Homatopoulos said:

"We receive numerous complaints relating to disorder arising out of street drinking. This kind of antisocial behaviour will not be tolerated, and we're keenly aware that it can often fuel wider crime.

Clacton town centre should be a safe place for residents and tourists to visit without witnessing or experiencing this type of behaviour.

My team is all about visible, proactive policing. Alongside other issues like burglary, car theft, and drug dealing, we're out and about tackling these offences.

Please keep telling us about the issues you see in Tendring – your reports are valuable and help us with this work."

Marine Unit patrols Essex waters and responds to safety incidents

Essex Police's Marine Unit was out on patrol aboard Police Boat Sentinel, covering the River Blackwater and River Colne as part of their ongoing Operation Wave-Breaker.

On Saturday 5 July, the crew visited Brightlingsea following reports of antisocial behaviour involving personal watercraft (PWC) riders. While there, officers engaged with two PWC users, taking the opportunity to explain local byelaws, including where speed limits begin and end. Afterward, the team moored at the town jetty, where they spoke with families interested in learning more about the police boat and its role in keeping the waterways safe.

On Sunday 6 July, the Sentinel was back out, this time patrolling the waters near Harwich. The Marine Unit joined forces with officers from the Local Policing Team to check in on the area following further reports of antisocial behaviour. They also spent time engaging with members of the marine community, including visitors who had arrived

members of the marine community, including visitors who had arrived via the Harwich foot-ferry.



The day took a more urgent turn when the team was tasked by HM Coastguard to investigate reports of a small children's inflatable drifting offshore near Frinton-on-Sea. The crew launched a search from the last known location and eventually located the inflatable more than a mile out to sea. With support from local Coastguard Rescue Teams, they confirmed that no one was missing from the beach and safely recovered the inflatable.

PC Craig Stoker commented:

"The distance and speed that this inflatable travelled from shore highlights just how dangerous they can be at the seaside. We strongly recommend avoiding the use of inflatables along the coastline, they're designed for

swimming pools, not the open sea."

We understand the growing concern in the community around the misuse of e-bikes. This action reflects our continued commitment to tackling antisocial and unsafe riding in our district.



Improving road safety across Tendring: speed enforcement activity

As part of a coordinated effort to improve road safety, the Safer Essex Roads Partnership (SERP) conducted three days of enforcement activity across Basildon, Thurrock, Braintree, Southend and Clacton.

Tendring District Activity

Point Clear Road, Clacton - A total of 27 drivers were reported for exceeding the 30mph speed limit, with the highest recorded speed being 42mph.

Mill Street, Clacton Road, and Colchester Road, St Osyth - 18 drivers were reported for speeding offences.

Dave from SERP Road Safety commented on the positive community response during enforcement in both Point Clear and St Osyth, noting that one resident expressed appreciation for their presence, while others welcomed the activity and one even kindly offering a cup of tea!

<u>Enforcement Totals for the Tendring District</u>: 45 offences recorded.

Across all districts: 259 offences recorded.


District Commander tours the Tendring District in July

Fresh law banning 'ninja-style' swords welcomed ahead of amnesty

We will once again play a leading role in supporting a surrender scheme ahead of a change in the law to ban the ownership and sale of 'ninja-style' swords.

Police forces across England and Wales are participating in the Home Office-led amnesty, which runs from 1 July until 31 July.

The change to the legislation will assist us in removing these weapons from our streets and prosecuting those who would use them to cause harm.

The surrender scheme grants a chance for the current owners of such items to hand them in ahead of this change in the law.

It will follow a similar track to a zombie knife and machete surrender scheme held in summer 2024.

During last year's amnesty, members of the public, together with businesses and sellers, handed in more than 200 knives at police station front counters across Essex.

Hundreds more were deposited in our many knife bins, located outside police stations across the county.

Temporary Superintendent Ian Hughes, of our Serious Violence Unit, said: "I do see this as an opportunity. I welcome any moves from the government which will help us in our work tackling knife crime.

"Every dangerous weapon taken out of circulation is potentially a life saved."

Tendring DAIT July Update

Hello from us here at the Colchester DAIT hub once again. We have had a particularly busy June/July, with lots of commitments for our team, including dealing with suspects in custody, appointments with victims, arrest attempts for outstanding suspects, manhunts for those attempting to evade us and cross force border working to stop perpetrators of domestic violence in their tracks.

We are always thinking about what we do well and what we can learn from in our profession – such is the way that we reflect on our actions and seek to educate and develop ourselves to become better police officers who are equipped to face the perpetrators of domestic violence head on and contribute to the movement towards eradication of violence towards



women and girls in our society. It is fair to say that the issue of violence against women and girls is a hot topic in the media presently, and I would say rightly so. In 2023, the National Police Chiefs Council released statistics that just under 20% of crime recorded in England and Wales is classed as violence against women and girls. Admittedly, not all of this would fall into the remit of the Domestic Abuse Investigation Team – but our work is aligned to this statistic in every sense. In the same data release, it was said that a woman is killed by a man every three days. That is a shocking statistic that 121 women on average are killed per year, at the hands of male violence. I think all will agree that there is no place in our society for any violence, let alone that which results in tragic loss of life.

So, what does that look like for DAIT in practice? DAIT is made up of officers who are specialists in their field, with extra training offered and officers who are on Detective Career Pathways – or nationally accredited DCs on the department, the standard of investigation is high. This is fuelled by an unwavering passion and determination to play our part in reducing domestic homicides, supporting vulnerable victims and bringing the perpetrators to justice. Our daily duties span from interviewing suspects to casefile building, assessment of evidence and presentation of casefile to the Crown Prosecution Service. We have a proactive arm to our department that seek to identify those most at risk of domestic homicide and put interventions in place to safeguard and apprehend perpetrators at the earliest possible opportunity.

As always – we will continue to do our best to safeguard/support the vulnerable and bring the perpetrators of domestic violence to justice. The people of Clacton, Colchester and Braintree can be reassured that we are here, and we are active in our communities.

Molestation orders are protective and preventative measures designed to safeguard individuals from domestic abuse. They also give police the power to act if the conditions of the order are breached.

These orders are often issued in partnership with The Next Chapter, a charity supporting people affected by domestic abuse across Tendring, Colchester, Maldon, Chelmsford, Braintree, and Uttlesford. Safeguarding Tendring's Historic Sites: Raising Awareness of Heritage Crime

Rural Engagement Officers regularly patrol historical sites across Essex to raise awareness of antisocial behaviour and heritage crime, what it is, why it matters, and how to report it.

In Tendring, officers have been focusing on protecting local heritage as part of a national initiative led by Historic England. The campaign aims to prevent damage such as graffiti and vandalism at sites of historical significance.

As part of this work, the team carried out foot patrols along Clacton seafront, visiting the historic Martello towers. These towers are designated as Scheduled Monuments due to their national importance. Officers also visited the Naze Tower near Walton, a Grade II listed building that continues to be a landmark of cultural and architectural value.



Did you know?

Martello Towers were built in the early 19th century as coastal defence structures, each equipped with a large

cannon. Of the 11 originally constructed in Essex, six still stand today. Some, like the one in Jaywick, have been transformed into vibrant arts and heritage venues for the community.

By engaging with the public and maintaining a visible presence at these sites, officers are helping to protect our shared history and encourage responsible behaviour.

Marine Unit Highlights Threats to Coastal Birds During Operation Wave-Breaker

"Human activity can pose a significant threat to wading birds, sea birds, and their nests," says Sergeant Alex Southgate of our Marine Unit.

Marine officers are currently in the midst of their annual Operation Wave-Breaker campaign, which focuses on tackling antisocial behaviour and promoting water safety along the Essex coast. The campaign encourages all water users to be mindful of one another and to adhere to speed limits.

As part of this initiative, the Marine Unit has partnered with Bird Aware Essex Coast and the Essex Wildlife Trust to raise awareness about the dangers beach-nesting birds face due to human activity—both on land and in the water. Many of these birds are protected by law due to their vulnerability.



"We want to raise awareness of how sensitive some of these sites are. We ask people to avoid landing on beaches where signs request them not to, and to consider the disturbance they may cause from the water, whether they're using a personal watercraft or kitesurfing."

Recently, Sergeant Southgate joined Adam Nixon, Coastal Recovery Officer at Essex Wildlife Trust, and Leanne Brisland from Bird Aware Essex Coast, on a patrol along the River Colne to Point Clear and the nearby Colne Point Nature Reserve

Adam Nixon added: "In addition to natural pressures like tides and predators, we've seen a significant rise in







Marine Unit patrols Tendring coastline and promotes water safety

On Wednesday 25 June, officers from the Essex Police Marine Unit carried out high-visibility patrols along the Tendring coastline, covering the area from Jaywick Sands to Harwich as part of their ongoing efforts to promote safety and tackle antisocial behaviour under Operation Wave- Breaker.


While in Harwich, the team moored alongside Ha'penny Pier, where members of the marine community were invited aboard the police boat. This provided a valuable opportunity to learn more about the unit's work in keeping Essex's waterways safe and to raise any concerns.

During the visit, officers were informed about groups of young people jumping from the quay into the water. They engaged with some of those involved and issued safety warnings, highlighting the dangers of jumping from height, especially when water depth or underwater hazards are unknown.

On their return journey to Burnham Marina, officers encountered both of Clacton's Lifeboats, which were

conducting a training exercise off Clacton Pier.









Tammy's top scam alert this month!

Impersonation Scams

Major high street retailers have recently experienced cyber-attacks. Be extra cautious with emails or messages claiming to be from these stores. Fraudsters often use current news stories to lure you in, impersonating trusted brands to conduct phishing scams aimed at stealing your personal information. If you receive an email that you are not sure about, take these steps:

- Look at the sender's email address scam emails are typically sent from random addresses comprised of a mix of numbers and letters. Brands might have their official email addresses listed on their websites, so make sure to check these out. You can find the sender's email address by hovering your cursor over or right-clicking on the sender's name.
- See if the greeting is impersonal, as most brands will address you by name.
- Look out for blurry, pixelated and out-of-date branding. Beware of pressure tactics, such as a short deadline, to claim an offer.
- Check the links in the email by hovering over where you would expect to see one, such as where it says, 'click here,' to see where the message leads.
- Be suspicious of emails asking for your personal or financial details.
- Watch out for poor spelling and grammar.
- Always be wary of messages asking you to click on a link, as these will take you to a website that maybe under the control of criminals.

If you receive an email from a brand, you have an account with and you are not sure whether it's genuine, you should log in to your account using a website you've used before and know can be trusted or, you can use a website that you are independently searched for on a search engine. Once you have logged in, you should verify the information in the email before following any links from the email. You could also call the customer service number using details from its official website or a recent letter.

Tendring's Fraud Prevention Coordinator

Supporting communities, fraud prevention talks across Tendring

Throughout June and July, Tendring's Fraud Prevention Officer, Tammy, has been actively engaging with local groups to raise awareness about scams and share practical advice on how to stay safe.

One of the first sessions took place at the Harwich Hub, where Tammy delivered a Fraud Prevention Talk to the Harwich Friendship & Bereavement Group, hosted by Community Voluntary Services Tendring (CVST). The event was very well attended, with 54 participants. The group asked insightful questions and shared personal experiences, many expressing surprise at the scale and sophistication of modern scams. Everyone left with a



Fraud Prevention Pack, including a card defender and purse bells—small tools that can make a big difference in staying safe.

Tammy also visited Gunfleet WI at Emmanuel Church in Walton, where attendees received the same helpful resources. PCSO Diss joined the session, introduced herself to the group, and encouraged members to sign up for the Tendring Dispatch newsletter for local policing updates.

Another well-received talk was delivered to St Osyth WI, where 62 members took part. The group was highly engaged, asking plenty of questions and showing strong interest in the advice shared.

These sessions are part of our ongoing commitment to supporting residents in protecting themselves from fraud and scams. By working closely with community groups, we aim to build awareness and resilience across Tendring.




We are investigating a series of burglaries in the Frinton and Walton areas where cars have been stolen.

Nitrous Oxide: What You Need to Know

Recreational use of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) is now illegal.

While nitrous oxide is safely used in medical and industrial settings, using it to get high is dangerous and can be fatal.

Since 8 November 2023, nitrous oxide has been classified as a Class C drug under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971.

This means it is a criminal offence to possess it without a legitimate reason, particularly if it is, or is likely to be, wrongfully inhaled.

This change in the law is part of the Government's Anti-Social Behaviour Action Plan, aimed at reducing drug-related harm and nuisance in communities. Misuse of nitrous oxide is often linked to antisocial behaviour, including littering, drug driving, and public disorder.

Watch Out for Distraction Burglars!

Distraction burglars are criminals who trick their way into your home by pretending to be someone they're not. Their goal? To catch you off guard and steal from you.

Common tricks include:


- Claiming to be from a utility company (gas, water, electric)
- Asking for help to leave a note for a neighbour
- Pretending to feel unwell and requesting a glass of water

Stay safe with this simple rule:

- "If in doubt, keep them out."
- Always ask for ID
- Call the company they claim to be from—don't use the number they give you, look it up yourself
- Never feel pressured to let anyone in


Don't feel pressured into something, a genuine trader won't rush you. They'll be happy to come back later so you can check out their credentials and compare prices.






Keep Your Vehicle Safe – Tendring District

With a recent rise in both theft of and theft from vehicles in the Tendring District, it's more important than ever to take simple steps to protect your car and belongings.

- ⇒ Always lock your vehicle, even if you're stepping away for just a moment.
 Unlocked cars are easy targets.
- ⇒ Close all windows and sunroofs to prevent thieves from reaching in or unlocking doors.
- ⇒ Secure your number plates with tamper-proof screws and use locking wheel nuts to protect your alloys.
- ⇒ Don't leave valuables on show—phones, wallets, sunglasses, and even loose change can tempt thieves.
- ⇒ Hide tech and remove clues like cables or suction marks that suggest devices may be hidden inside.
- ⇒ Protect tools in vans by marking them, locking them in secure cabinets, and considering onboard cameras.
- ⇒ Park in well-lit, busy areas to reduce the risk of being targeted.
- ⇒ Take your documents with you logbooks and insurance papers can help thieves sell your vehicle.
- ⇒ Choose safer car parks with the Park Mark award when possible.

Every day we answer thousands of phone calls from members of the public asking for our help. And we are dedicated to helping people, especially in an emergency.

But we are continuing to see an increase in people ringing 999 for something that isn't an emergency. Just 20% of the calls we are receiving to 999 actually need an emergency response.

So, we are asking people to think about whether they need to call 999. Or if another way of getting in contact us would be better.

By doing this, it will help make sure we are free to answer those phone calls from people who need our help the most.

Calling 999 must be a last resort. You should only use this service if you are reporting an emergency.



What is an emergency?

Listed below are a few examples of emergencies when it would be necessary to call 999. This is not however an exhaustive list and common sense must prevail.

General circumstances of an incident reported to the police, when there is or likely to be:

Danger to life

use, or immediate threat of use, of violence serious injury to a person and/or serious damage to property.

Criminal conduct

The crime is, or likely to be serious and in progress.

An offender has just been disturbed at the scene.

An offender has been detained and poses, or is likely to pose a risk to other people.
