This month began with Remembrance Day, where I had the privilege of laying a wreath in Clacton on behalf of Essex Police. I know many of you attended events across the district. It's always a special time to pause, reflect, and honour those who gave their lives for others, while coming together as communities.

In recent editions, I've shared some thoughts from my tour around the district. One topic that came up time and again was road safety and driver behaviour. I'm pleased to say we've seen positive results from our efforts—and we'll keep pushing forward to make our roads safer for everyone.

As we head into the festive season and the colder months, let's look out for each other. Please avoid drink-driving, keep your belongings secure, and make sure those new gifts aren't easy targets for theft or burglary. A little care goes a long way.

Now, a quick reflection on crime levels. You often hear the narrative that crime is spiralling out of control—but here in Tendring, crime has actually fallen over the past 12 months. That's something we should all be proud of. In Clacton Town Centre alone, crime is down 20.5% over the last 3 months compared to this time last year. This is thanks to the investment in neighbourhood policing and town centre teams, and similar improvements are happening across the district.

Of course, safety isn't just about numbers—it's about how people feel. That's why we're working closely with Tendring District Council and other partners to make our communities and town centres welcoming and vibrant. It takes a team effort, and we're committed to it.

There's still plenty to do, but good news deserves to be shared. Tendring is a fantastic place to live—I choose to live here with my family, just like many of you. Yes, there will always be challenges, but there are incredible people working hard every day to make this district safer and stronger.

Tendring roads made safer – Results from vehicle crime operation

On Friday 24 October, officers from the Tendring Neighbourhood Policing Team were deployed to Frinton & Walton for a vehicle crime operation, focusing on road safety and driver behaviour.

In just five hours, the team issued a total of 52 tickets, made 2 arrests, and seized 3 vehicles. Below is a breakdown of the results:

• Mobile phone offences: 7 tickets

• Seatbelt offences: 15 tickets

• No insurance: 3 vehicles

• Due care and attention: 1 ticket

• Drug driving arrests: 2

• Cannabis possession, community resolutions issued: 2

• Positive stop and searches: 3

• Words of advice for driving offences: 16

• Speeding in a 30mph zone: 26 tickets issued, with the

highest speed recorded at 41mph.

This proactive operation reflects our ongoing commitment to keeping Tendring's roads safe and holding those who break the law accountable.




Standing together in remembrance

RET removes uninsured drivers from Harwich roads

On Saturday 1 November, the Rural Engagement Team (RET) were on patrol in Harwich when they stopped a vehicle suspected of having no insurance.

Checks revealed the driver only held a provisional licence and was driving uninsured. The vehicle was seized under Section 165 of the Road Traffic Act, and the driver was reported.



Shortly after, officers witnessed another driver using a mobile phone. When they stopped the vehicle, they found it was also uninsured. That driver was reported for no insurance and using a mobile phone while driving.

RET inspires pupils at St Andrew's Emergency Services Day

Quick response leads to arrest after theft in Clacton

On Wednesday 12 November, at around 17:45 hrs, Clacton officers received a report of a theft at One Below where approximately £50 worth of laundry products had been stolen.

Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) were nearby and responded immediately. Thanks to the



staff's real-time updates to control regarding the suspect's direction of travel, officers quickly located and detained a female on West Avenue with the stolen goods in her possession. She was subsequently arrested by the Local Policing Team (LPT).

This incident demonstrates excellent teamwork between One Below staff and officers, ensuring a swift and successful outcome.

Tendring DAIT update November from T/DC ELSEY

Hello again from all of us at the Colchester DAIT Hub.

This month, domestic abuse has been front and centre in the media—and that's a good thing. Actress Jaye Griffiths recently spoke on Loose Women about surviving five years of abuse. Her courage is inspiring, and it sends a clear message: these conversations belong in the open. Specifically, one line of her TV appearance resonated with me and I want to share it with you: "When I finally went to the police they said on average a woman is hit 37 times before she tells anyone. All I did was



lie – 'No, I'm fine thanks, I'm fine', and that's exhausting." Our commitment to you – the people that we serve, is that we will listen, we will help and we will work with you and our partner agencies to keep you safe.

Domestic abuse isn't just a private issue; it's a societal one. When survivors share their experiences, it helps others recognise unhealthy dynamics and seek help sooner. It also builds confidence in the systems designed to protect them—police, courts, and support services.

We know trust is earned. That's why Essex Police prioritises victim safety and dignity at every stage. From the first call to the final court hearing, our goal is to make the process as supportive and straightforward as possible. Protective orders, strong evidence, and partnerships with charities like The Next Chapter all play a role in keeping victims safe and holding offenders accountable.

Media coverage is vital, but awareness must lead to action. That means victims feeling confident to report abuse and trust the system to protect them. We are committed to making that happen. Our officers work with local charities, secure protective orders, and build strong cases so perpetrators face justice. Every conviction, every safeguarding measure, is a step toward safety and healing.

Many domestic violence survivors are unaware of the available support services and legal protections. Police officers can bridge this information gap by equipping victims with knowledge about their rights, available resources, and the steps they can take to protect themselves. Providing victims with information regarding support groups, counselling services, and local helplines empowers them to make informed decisions about their future.

In addition, Essex Police can support victims of domestic abuse in obtaining a **non-molestation order**, this is carried out in conjunction with **The Next Chapter** who are a charity working across **Tendring**, **Colchester**, **Maldon**, **Chelmsford**, **Braintree & Uttlesford**, they provide free and confidential services to support people who are currently experiencing or have previously experienced domestic abuse. These orders are both of preventative and protective, and are designed to offer long-term safeguarding, they also provide a mechanism for the police to deal with offenders who choose to disregard the conditions imposed on them.

Tammy's top scam alert this month!

WhatsApp Gold Scam Alert

There have been new reports that criminals are circulating fake messages about a premium version of WhatsApp called "WhatsApp Gold", claiming it offers exclusive features like video calling, new emojis, enhanced security and rewards. These messages often include a link to download WhatsApp Gold, however this is a scam! There is NO official WhatsApp Gold. Clicking the link may install malware on your device, steal your personal data, or compromise your accounts.





There has also been reports of WhatsApp users receiving a fake text messages warning about a dangerous video link called "Martinelli." The message claims that if you open this video, it will hack your phone and steal your information. The message also falsely claims that "WhatsApp Gold" — a supposed premium version of WhatsApp — will protect you from this threat. There is no verified evidence that a "Martinelli" video exists or poses any threat to WhatsApp users. WhatsApp Gold is a scam — it is not an official product and may lead to malware or phishing sites. These messages are part of a scam designed to spread fear and convince users into clicking malicious links or downloading harmful apps!

How to Protect Yourself:

- Ignore and delete any message promoting WhatsApp Gold or warning you of the video "Martinelli"
- Never click on suspicious links, even if they come from friends their accounts may be compromised.
 - Update WhatsApp through official app stores (Google Play or Apple App Store) ONLY.
 - Enable two-step verification in WhatsApp settings for added security.
 - Educate others share this alert with friends and family.



Action taken on reports of antisocial behaviour in Frinton

Reports of low-level antisocial behaviour outside Tesco and Iceland at the Triangle Shopping Centre in Frinton on Sea.

• Officers attended the location, spoke with staff and the young people involved, continued patrols, and secured apologies from the youths to the stores. They can return if they behave; otherwise, they'll be banned.

Targeted vehicle crime operation delivers results in Frinton & Walton

Concerns about vehicle crime and road safety in Frinton & Walton.

Deployed officers for a targeted operation. In 5 hours: 52 tickets issued, 2 arrests, 3 vehicles seized.

Our monthly infographic offers a glimpse into the activities of Tendring officers over the past month.

October 2025 Highlights:

- Located 76 missing persons and provided them with necessary support.
- Investigated 94 reports of antisocial behaviour, addressing community concerns.
- Responded to 52 road traffic collisions, ensuring safety and smooth traffic flow.
- Handled 327 domestic violence-related crimes, addressing the criminal behaviour involved while providing victims with support and connecting them to specialist services.
- Solved 134 crimes, holding offenders accountable.
- Submitted 542 intelligence reports to target criminal activities.
- Conducted 52 stop-and-search operations in the Tendring District to prevent harm.

The past two months have been very busy with several important activities. Most notable was the collaboration between Essex Police and



the African Families in the UK charity in October 2015, held in celebration of Black History Month. The event, titled "Pride in Our Roots, Power in Our Future," was a remarkable occasion and a strong example of the sustainable and positive relationship between our Police Force and the communities across our district. Many other events also took place to mark the month, reflecting its importance and significance.

Last week, we came together once again to honour and remember the brave soldiers who fought gallantly—many giving their lives—so that we may enjoy the freedoms we sometimes take for granted today. They answered the call to stand against hate and prejudice based on race, ethnicity, and religion. We remembered them with gratitude, with Chief Constable BJ Harrington in Colchester and District Commander Stuart Austin in Clacton representing Essex Police at local commemorations.

Despite this spirit of unity, we continue to experience concerns regarding hate crimes. I encourage everyone in our community to remain vigilant and to support the police in tackling all forms of hate crime in Tendring.

Our young people also face risks, particularly from knife violence. This is why initiatives such as the **Young Persons' Crucial Crew** remain vital. Their recent event in Clacton provided valuable interactive sessions focused on crime prevention and personal safety.

If you do not already follow it, I urge you to visit and engage with our Essex Police Tendring District Facebook page. It is encouraging to note that crime in Clacton Town Centre has decreased by 20.5% over the past three months—a reflection of the hard work of our District Commander and his dedicated team. We are grateful for their efforts and will continue to support them in every way we can.

Thank you for remaining law-abiding, community-minded, and committed to keeping our district safe.

Essex Police Marine Unit


During the week of 17 October, the Essex Police Marine Unit is supporting the European Aquapol Operation.

This intensified week of action focuses on commercial shipping, with Marine Units across the UK increasing their presence at ports and harbours.

Officers will also be boarding vessels at sea to provide a highly visible deterrent to those attempting to exploit the maritime domain for criminal gain, while strengthening maritime security efforts across Europe.

On Monday and Tuesday, our team was on patrol in Harwich, a key area for commercial shipping, with busy ports at Parkeston, Felixstowe, and Ipswich seeing significant traffic in and out of the region.

Keeping our waters safe is a priority, and this operation demonstrates our commitment to tackling crime wherever it occurs.





Road Crime and the Safer Essex Roads Partnership

October on Essex roads – here's what our teams have tackled.

Officers from Road Crime and the Safer Essex Roads Partnership worked tirelessly throughout the month to keep you safe and make our roads safer for everyone.

Sadly, five lives were lost in traffic collisions and 76 people suffered serious injuries. These figures are a stark reminder of why road safety matters and why enforcement is so important.

Our officers took decisive action against dangerous and illegal driving. In October alone, they seized 486 uninsured vehicles, made 94 drink-drive arrests and 179 drugdrive arrests, and dealt with 148 mobile phone offences and 176 seatbelt offences. They also prosecuted 379 careless driving offences and made 200 arrests through Roads Policing operations.

Education is just as vital as enforcement. That's why 12,172 road safety courses were delivered, alongside 1,219 Community Speed Watch warning letters and 427 Extra Eyes submissions from vigilant members of the public.

Every stop, every course, and every warning helps make Essex roads safer. Thank you to everyone who plays their part in reducing harm and saving lives.







Help Us – Help You!

Every day we answer thousands of phone calls from members of the public asking for our help. And we are dedicated to helping people, especially in an emergency.

But we are continuing to see an increase in people ringing 999 for something that isn't an emergency. Just 20% of the calls we are receiving to 999 actually need an emergency response.

So, we are asking people to think about whether they need to call 999. Or if another way of getting in contact us would be better. By doing this, it will help make sure we are free to answer those phone calls from people who need our help the most. Calling 999 must be a last resort.

You should only use this service if you are reporting an emergency. What is an emergency?



Listed below are a few examples of emergencies when it would be necessary to call 999. This is not however an exhaustive list and common sense must prevail.

General circumstances of an incident reported to the police, when there is or likely to be:

Danger to life use, or immediate threat of use, of violence serious injury to a person and/or serious damage to property.

Criminal conduct The crime is, or likely to be serious and in progress. An offender has just been disturbed at the scene. An offender has been detained and poses, or is likely to pose a risk to other people.



Violent criminals don't care who gets caught in the crossfire.
