# <u>Celebrating National Care Leavers Month: your journey, your future</u>



Throughout November we celebrated National Care Leavers Month in Essex. Leaving care is a big step, and in Essex, no young person takes that step alone.

We are committed to helping care leavers feel ready to embrace independence. Whether looking for a place to live, planning your education or simply needing someone to talk to.

### What's Available?

#### A place to call home

Care leavers can <u>explore housing options</u> with help securing accommodation. This includes discretionary rent and deposit payments and support acting as a guarantor.

There's also a Setting Up Home grant of up to £2,000 to help furnish your new space.

#### Financial support

From managing bills to accessing student finance, we offer <u>financial</u> <u>support</u> tailored to care leavers.

Care leavers living in Essex are exempt from council tax until age 21. Support is also available while waiting for benefit claims to be processed.

#### **Education, training and employment**

Continuing studies, starting an apprenticeship or looking for work? We provide bursaries, interview prep and even help with travel and clothing costs. You could also be considered for apprenticeship schemes within the council.

#### Health and wellbeing

We have professionals <u>available and ready</u> to support your emotional and physical wellbeing. This includes personal advisers to help arrange and access healthcare.

#### Relationships and community

You'll be supported to <u>build relationships and connect with others</u> in your community, including other care leavers.

Even if you stopped receiving support at 21, you can reconnect with your local Leaving and After Care Team. They're here to help with any concerns, big or small.

Parent groups and family hubs also offer safe spaces and practical <u>parenting support</u>.

#### Legal and immigration support

If you're <u>navigating the justice system</u> or have <u>immigration needs</u>, we provide non-judgemental services to help you move forward.

Care leavers are encouraged to <u>give feedback</u> and help shape the services they receive. We believe in listening to your views and making sure your voice is heard.

# Report shows benefits of Essex Pedal Power project



A new independent research report has set out the huge benefits free bike schemes bring to residents.

The research assessed the impact of <u>Essex Pedal Power</u>, alongside similar schemes in Birmingham and Southall. It was authored by economic consultants <u>Volterra</u> on behalf of the <u>Active Wellbeing Society</u>.

The three projects distributed a total of 12,000 bikes. The report estimates for every £1 spent, the projects generated £12 in Social Return on Investment. This is much higher than Active Travel England's expectation for schemes. It's also "Very High" Value for Money according to the Department for Transport framework.

The social benefits of the free bikes also include:

- improving people's access to work and opportunities
- increasing recipients' physical activity
- contributing to the move towards Net Zero
- boosting community cohesion

A health Impact Assessment estimates the schemes could prevent 58 new cases of disease a year. This would save the NHS £1 million annually.

Councillor Tom Cunningham, Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Sustainable Transport, said: "Essex Pedal Power is a shining example of how transport initiatives can change lives.

"By removing barriers to cycling, we're investing in individuals and enabling more people to access jobs, training opportunities, and local businesses, boosting productivity and supporting a stronger workforce.

"This report proves that investing in active travel delivers outstanding value for money and can help to power our economy."

Councillor John Spence, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Adult Social Care, Public Health and Integration, added: "Essex Pedal Power is helping residents become more active, reduce the risk of preventable diseases, and improve mental wellbeing.

"The evidence shows this scheme isn't just good for transport, it will help create healthier communities, as well as saving the NHS money."

Since launching in 2021, Essex Pedal Power has distributed more than 4,000 bikes. These have been given out across Tendring, Colchester, Basildon, Canvey Island and Harlow.

### **Apply now for 2026 primary school places**



Parents and carers in Essex can now apply for 2026 primary school places. Applications opened on 10<sup>th</sup> November until 15<sup>th</sup> January 2026 for parents and carers of children born between 1 September 2021 and 31 August 2022

Councillor Tony Ball, Essex County Council Cabinet Member for Education Excellence, Lifelong Learning and Employability, said: "Starting primary school is an exciting time for children and their families, and applying on time and making sure you use all of your preferences it will help to ensure there is the best possible change of securing a place at your preferred school next September.

Applications received after 15 January will be considered after on time applications. This means applying late could reduce your chance of getting a place for your child at your preferred school.

# Colchester Library reopening after spectacular revamp



Colchester Library has reopened today Monday 1<sup>st</sup> December 2025 following a spectacular refurbishment.

The revamp has seen the creation of a new Children's Imagination and Literacy Centre on the ground floor. The vibrant, interactive space is designed to spark creativity and a love of reading among children. It provides a warm and welcoming environment for families and includes innovative play equipment and resources that encourage learning through exploration.

The centre was funded via a £337,500 grant from the Department for Culture, Media and Sport through Arts Council England's Libraries Improvement Fund. We also put £112,500 into the project.

In addition, further upgrades at the library also include:

- fresh decor and modern furniture
- upgraded heating and ventilation systems

- energy-efficient lighting
- new air-conditioning
- upgraded meeting rooms
- improved study areas
- a refreshed exhibition space
- enhanced public computers and better printing facilities

These improvements have created a more modern and comfortable space for visitors.

Colchester Library is the busiest in Essex, with an average of 26,000 visits a month.

The library's book stock has undergone a complete refresh, with around 3,000 new titles added. Staff worked tirelessly on the refurb, returning almost 4.2 tonnes, or 1,300 containers, of stock in advance of reopening.

Councillor Mark Durham, Cabinet Member for The Arts, Heritage and Culture, said: "The transformation of Colchester Library has created a spectacular new facility that residents can be proud of.

"We're excited for children and families to experience the new Imagination and Literacy Centre, which celebrates the importance of literacy and learning for young people in Essex.


"While this is the centrepiece, the entire library has been completely revitalised to ensure it continues to meet the evolving needs of the community.

"We thank residents for their patience while works were completed and look forward to welcoming everyone back to enjoy the incredible new facilities."

# Interim CEO appointed for Greater Essex Combined Authority



Statement on behalf of Essex County Council, Southend-on-Sea City Council and Thurrock Council.

Greater Essex has reached another stage in plans to radically simplify local government in Essex, to improve services and save taxpayers millions of pounds over the years ahead; following recent agreement on the decision to create a mayoral combined authority in Essex, plans are shaping up to build the new organisation.

As part of this, Tom Walker has been appointed as Interim Chief Executive Officer of the Greater Essex Combined County Authority, and his appointment follows a joint recruitment process by Essex County Council, Southend-on-Sea City Council and Thurrock Council.

Tom, whose current role is ECC's Executive Director for Policy, Economy, Investment and Public Health at Essex County Council will lead the crucial next stage in establishing the future Greater Essex Combined Authority because of his extensive experience both in Essex and previously in national government. He brings experience in economic growth, regeneration, housing, planning, and environment policy to the role.

This appointment marks a significant milestone in Greater Essex's devolution journey and the ability to seize the opportunities that devolution will bring, to drive growth, attract investment and create prosperity across communities.

The combined authority is not a service delivery body, like a council. It is a strategic body that will drive economic growth across a whole economic area using powers and funding devolved from central government.


A multi-million-pound investment fund is expected to be confirmed shortly as the legislation is laid in Parliament to create the new combined authority.

On his appointment, Tom said: "I look forward to working with partners across Greater Essex over the coming months to create a new organisation working for the whole system and ensuring the new Mayor of Greater Essex and the combined county authority they lead delivers real impact from day one and strengthen our economy and invest in the skills that will power prosperity for generations to come."

The new combined authority will come under the leadership of the Mayor of Greater Essex due to be elected on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2026.

Currently Essex County Council, Southend-on-Sea City Council and Thurrock Council are working on the operating model, constitution and governance framework to ensure the organisation is ready to deliver from the outset.

# Partners, residents and businesses to have their say on future shape of Essex local government



You will shortly be able to share what you think about our proposal for Local Government Reorganisation – '<u>Three new councils</u>, one <u>bright future</u>'. This outlines how Local Government Reorganisation will achieve a more sustainable future for Greater Essex.

Our proposal, supported by Braintree District Council and Epping Forest District Council, recommends moving from 15 councils to a model of 3 new all-purpose unitary councils. We want to simplify services, strengthen accountability and deliver better outcomes.

The Government has also confirmed that it will also be inviting your views on the three other proposals submitted for Greater Essex. These have been developed by other councils in the county.

The public consultation opened on 19<sup>th</sup> November and will run until 11<sup>th</sup> January. It is open to anyone living or working in Greater Essex and is your chance to shape the future of local government.
