### **Statement from Essex County Council**



The Cabinet at Essex County Council is demanding answers as to how an email was sent from its Children's Services to staff about concerns they could have around flying the Union and St George's flags.

Leader of the Council, Councillor Kevin Bentley, said: "At no time was this discussed with politicians at Essex County Council which has infuriated the Leadership. It is not the policy of the Council.

"We have been clear that we support people who wish to raise the two flags, and they will not be removed unless there is a hazard to motorists or pedestrians."

The investigation will report directly back to Cabinet when further actions will be considered.

## Clacton Library redevelopment receives planning permission



Planning permission has been granted for the redevelopment of Clacton Library.

The redevelopment will bring together reading, learning and essential services under one roof.

The new multi-storey building will be built on the existing library site. It will include:

- a modern library
- a centre for Adult Community Learning (ACL)
- local registration services

The new building will include more functional and modern spaces. The number and variety of books will be maintained. Residents and businesses helped shape the plans during a public consultation. Temporary arrangements will be put in place to maintain services during the redevelopment.

Full details will be announced in advance of construction.

The redevelopment is part of a wider programme of regeneration projects in Clacton town centre. Last year, Tendring District Council, supported by Essex County Council, was awarded almost £20 million in government funding for these improvements.

In March, Tendring District Council was granted planning permission for the neighbouring site. Plans include a new car park, modern homes and a vibrant mixed-use community space.

# Childcare Reforms Expansion: upcoming changes to accessing early years and childcare places



The Department for Education (DfE) Childcare Reforms Expansion has been designed to better help parents and carers manage childcare alongside their work responsibilities. These changes are part of the government's ongoing commitment to support families and enable parents to return to or remain in the workforce, while ensuring their children receive the care they need.

### What's changed?

Expansions to the current Funded Early Education Entitlement. Funded Early Education Entitlement hours can be used over 38 weeks of the year during school term time or, depending on the provider, up to 52 weeks as a stretched offer.

### **April 2024 Since**

Working parents have been eligible for up to 15 hours of funded childcare per week in term time, over 38 weeks, starting from the term after your child's second birthday.

### Since September 2024

Eligible working parents have been entitled to up to 15 hours of funded childcare per week in term time, over 38 weeks, available from the term following your child turning nine months old.

### From September 2025

The support extends further, with up to 30 hours of funded childcare per week in term time, over 38 weeks, available from the term following your child turning nine months old.

Parents of 2-year-olds that are not eligible for the working parent entitlement should check their eligibility for the 2-year-old entitlement for families receiving government support. Read more about <u>funded childcare for 2-year-olds</u>.

### How do families apply?

To apply for funded childcare, eligible parents need to register for a code by the end of the month before a new term starts. For the autumn term families should have applied and received an approved code by Sunday 31 August 2025.

Check your eligibility and apply on the UK government's dedicated childcare support page.

For the spring term families need to apply and have an approved code by Wednesday 31 December. Once you receive the code (usually beginning 50) please share this with your childcare provider.

### Wraparound childcare for parents and carers of primary school-aged children

From September 2024, the national wraparound childcare programme commenced with the ambition that by September 2026 most working parents will be able to access wraparound childcare that is either on their school site or within the local community. This wraparound childcare offer will be available during term time for parents with primary school-aged children.

#### What does this mean for you?

### Wraparound care hours

During term time, parents of primary school-aged children can pay for their child to access childcare from 8am to 6pm. This includes breakfast clubs and after-school care.

#### **Providers**

These services can be offered by schools or private, voluntary, and independent (PVI) providers like childminders, out of school and early years settings.

Residents have until Friday 29 September to register their interest. It's a free, easy and secure way to cut energy bills without wasting time on comparison sites.

All resident's need is a recent gas and electricity bill. There is no obligation to switch supplier or tariff once registered. Spread the word to friends and family and help more people see if they can save.

Everyone who registers will receive a personalised offer. The offer details how much they could save by switching energy supplier. It's up to you if you choose to accept the offer and switch.

After the registration period closes, energy companies will compete in an auction to offer the lowest tariff. Once the winning bidder is selected, anyone who has registered will be sent an offer. ### **Councils launch new LGR website**



A new website is available to help people understand possible changes to local government in Greater Essex.

Councils across Essex, Southend-on-Sea and Thurrock have launched <u>essexIgrhub.org</u>. This is a central, impartial hub for updates on Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) in Greater Essex.

By 2028, the number and structure of councils may change. The Government is encouraging simpler, more efficient local services that bring decision-making closer to communities.

#### The website includes:

- an overview of LGR
- a short explainer video
- the latest news and FAQs
- Government aims for LGR

Councils are currently developing business cases that explore options for unitary arrangements. These business cases will also be added to the website as they are finalised before being submitted to government. The deadline for submission is 26 September 2025.

Following this, government will run a public consultation. This is anticipated in the autumn. A recommendation to the Minister on a final proposal is expected in March 2026. <u>Visit the Essex LGR Hub</u> to find out more.

Praise for students on A-level results day

This year is the first time formal exams have taken place for two years due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

We will not be publishing our usual headline figures this year and will not be making judgements on performance based on 2022 results data.
