Greetings all

Let me start by saying a big thank you to those of you that came along to our emergency services open day at Clacton on Saturday 25th March. The event was hosted by a number of our partner agencies and the turn out from the community far and wide was amazing to see. It's great to see the interest the community have in us and are keen to learn what our partners and we can do for you. With over 3000 people in attendance it was a packed day and one that was enjoyed by many. We have included a number of photos from the event which gives a great variety of just some of the activities and partners in attendance, thankfully the weather held out too! I think it's fair to say next year's event will be just as big and fun.

I've also taken the opportunity this month to venture out with my teams from response and community policing. I went out with some officers from response and conducted some proactive patrols. E shift were a great host for me and we ended up arresting a male for Possession with intent to supply Class A drugs and seizing a vehicle whereby the driver was driving otherwise in accordance with his licence. Some great work conducted by the response shift in reducing drug crime in the area and dangerous road users. I also joined our community policing team during the execution of a drugs warrant in Wash Lane, Clacton whereby two males were arrested. A significant amount of cannabis has been taken off the streets and I really enjoyed getting out and about proactively with the team to see the great work they continue to do.

Our summer plan is really starting to come together now and we have invited a great deal of support from our partner agencies to ensure that we provide the right response to you as a community and the visitors that choose to make Tendring their holiday destination. We are looking to increase furthermore our visibility, continue to reduce antisocial behaviour by identifying it early on and putting in support mechanisms within the community to keep you safe and allow you to enjoy the summer period.

As a result of the great work completed I wanted to send on some facts regarding the reduction of antisocial behaviour and violent crime below within Tendring to offer some reassurance that we are making a difference in the community we serve:

Reports of antisocial behaviour are down by 589 incidents which equates to a 24% decrease in the 12 months to March 2023.

Violent incidents are down by almost 10% - that's 695 fewer incidents of violence in the last 12 months when set against the previous 12-month period.

I hope you all get chance to enjoy some celebrations with the Coronation on Saturday 6th May, I look forward to catching up with you soon.

























Several young people from Tendring were away last week in the Lake District, as part of the Respect Project run by the Essex Boys and Girls Club.

Police Community Support Officers, Taylor and Michele from Tendring Police joined the young people climbing mountains and walking many kilometres each day, visiting Castle Crag, Jonny Wood, Derwent Water, Milligan Dawn Cave to name a few....

They had a 24hr expedition carrying their 65 litre ruck sacks walking from Castle Crag to Fellside where they camped for the night, sleeping in the open air under the stars. Thankfully, it didn't rain too much!

The Respect Project helps young people to increase their ability to deal with life's problems and become more resilient, the series of challenges throughout their week away taught them coping strategies and developed positive self-esteem and self-confidence.

On Wednesday 29 March, Officers executed a drug warrant in Rosemary Road, Clacton and arrested 1 man on suspicion of producing cannabis.

Acting upon information received, officers from our Community Policing Team secured a warrant under Section 23 of the Misuse of Drugs Act, which was carried out early on the Wednesday morning, where a quantity of cannabis plants with a street value of up to £47,00 was located and seized from the address. The arrested male has been charged and remanded and is currently awaiting sentencing.

On Sunday 2 April, Officers from the Community Policing Team responded to a call from concerned residents reporting four young people scrambling across farmland in Little Clacton on two motorcycles.

The young people were spoken to by Officers, whereby one of them advised he owned both the bikes. He was given a Section 59 warning, which means the bikes will be seized if they continue to scramble on the farmland.



Uninsured vehicles off our roads!

On Tuesday 21 March, the BMW was brought to the attention of Officers from the Community Policing Team, who were out on proactive patrols in Clacton. It was soon established the driver didn't have an MOT, tax or insurance.

On Monday 3 April, a Volkswagen was brought to the attention of same officers who were out on proactive patrols in Kings Parade Holland on Sea, they established the driver didn't have any insurance.

Both vehicle seized and drivers reported!








On Monday 3 April, Officers from the Tendring Community Policing Team conducted a day of action in the Clacton area.

This involved high visibility joint patrols in Clacton Town in partnership with the anti-social behaviour officer from Tendring District Council, where they dealt with young people causing ASB. Officers also carried out speed checks along various roads in and around Clacton area, offering words of advice to drivers.

Two arrested during drugs warrant.

On Tuesday 4 April, two men have been arrested in Clacton on suspicion of drug production offences, following an organised warrant at an abandoned building.

Officers attended the building on Wash Lane in Clacton to execute a warrant as part of an ongoing investigation into drug supply.

On attendance, officers located multiple cannabis plants with an estimated street value of around one million pounds.

A 42-year-old man and a 19-year-old man were both arrested on suspicion of production of a controlled class B drug and abstract use without authority electricity. They remain in custody and enquiries are ongoing.

Chief Inspector Ella Latham, District Commander for Tendring said:


"The action taken by our officers this morning means a significant amount of harmful drugs has been taken off our streets.

"We hear a lot of comments, particularly on our social media about how cannabis is a harmless, recreational drug, implying that the police should not be spending time executing warrants such as these.

"It's been discussed a lot recently in the media, how cannabis use and production plays a significant part in criminal activity in the UK.

"Those who are responsible for producing these illegal drugs regularly exploit vulnerable people for financial gain and we continue to make it a priority for the force to tackle drug related crime."









On Thursday 13 April, Officers from the Community Policing Team conducted high visibility foot and mobile patrols and speed checks in Brightlingsea, St Osyth and surrounding areas as part of the 'Days of Action'

Speed checks were conducted in various locations, the highest speed recorded was 39mph in a 30mph zone and 50mph in a 40mph zone.

Community Speed Watch volunteers also carried out speed checks along Harwich Road, Little Clacton, they recorded several vehicles exceeding the 30mph limit with vehicles travelling over 39mph.















Thursday 13 April, Police Community Support Officers from Clacton visited the young people at the Primal Combat Academy in Valley Road, Clacton.

The young people asked the officers many questions about their role in the Police, along with playing a few games with them, trying on some of the police uniform and having a look around their police vehicle. – A great visit, thanks Primal Combat!

More uninsured vehicles off our roads!

On Tuesday 18 April two vehicles were brought to the attention of Officers from the Community Policing Team, who were out on proactive patrols in Clacton.

It was established the driver of the Vauxhall Corsa only had a provisional licence and was trying to add himself to his mother's insurance policy, whilst the Officers were carrying out their checks.

Vehicle seized and driver reported for no insurance!

The Hyundai i30 was brought to the attention of the Officers due to the manner it was being driven. On stopping the vehicle, a 2-year-old child was sitting on a lap of a passenger in the back seat, next to an insecure infant baby seat.

Driver reported for offences and the vehicle seized due to no insurance!

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED IN ESSEX!

Community Speed Watch is an initiative, supported by the Safer Essex Roads Partnership, where dedicated volunteers monitor the speed of passing vehicles. Keepers of vehicles measured travelling at more than 10% above the speed limit receive an advice letter from Essex Police, with the records also informing police patrols.

Advice letters are designed to reduce reoffending, by showing community support for compliance with speed limits, helping to reduce the devastating consequences of driving at excessive speed.



The Partnership has adopted an ambitious target to achieve ZERO deaths and serious injuries by 2040, known world-wide as Vision Zero.



Janet Willey, Community Speed Watch Co-ordinator for Essex, added: "The vital role our Community Speed Watch volunteers play in helping to keep their communities safer for all road users cannot be underestimated. The dedication, enthusiasm, and passion they demonstrate in helping to achieve Vision Zero benefits us all.


We are always looking for more volunteers to join us, whether that is to support existing groups or to set up new Community Speed Watches in other communities, so please do get in touch if

The Domestic Abuse Investigation Team (DAIT)

Since the March Update, Clacton Domestic Abuse Investigation Team continued to work hard to support victims of domestic abuse and to robustly deal with those individuals who committed domestic offences. PC MILES shares this month's DAIT News.

This month the department secured 10 charges with CPS against an individual for a high-risk domestic abuse investigation including Controlling and cohesive behaviour, Threats to Kill, Criminal damage, theft among others in relation to a sustained incident of domestic abuse. These charges followed a remand after the hard work by B shifts TA/DS Lumb and the team the perpetrator was refused bail by the courts and will stay on remand until the trial comes up.

During April another 4 charges were secured by both B & C Shift with an individual

from HARWICH for Stalking, Controlling and cohesive behaviour as well as 2 assaults. This individual was also remanded by the courts until the date of the trial.

At the time of writing this update, remands have also been secured for Breaches of restraining orders as well as two Domestic Violence Protection Orders authorised and served.

In addition, Essex Police can support victims of domestic abuse in obtaining a **non-molestation order**, this is carried out in conjunction with **The Next Chapter** who are a charity working across **Tendring**, **Colchester**, **Maldon**, **Chelmsford**, **Braintree & Uttlesford**, they provide free and confidential services to support people who are currently experiencing or have previously experienced domestic abuse.

These orders are both of preventative and protective, and are designed to offer long-term safeguarding, they also provide a mechanism for the police to deal with offenders who choose to disregard the conditions imposed on them.

Spotlight on Student Officer

This month shines a spotlight on one of CLACTONS Student officers, during student officers' probation on the Local Policing Team there are a few departments that the new officers visit in order to gain experience in Investigation roles, this month we shine the spotlight on PC CROSS.

PC CROSS joined Clacton DAIT B shift in the middle of March. Asked what experience he would take back to LPT with his DAIT attachment PC CROSS said, "I have enjoyed learning about case files and how to build them PC CROSS added "Its shown me a general understanding of what DAIT do, I enjoyed interviewing and also I was very interested in learning about Section one of the computer misuse act".

Thank you PC CROSS it's been great having you on board, come back to visit any time!







Emergency services teamwork helped to save the life of a van driver in Clacton, says the police officer commended by Essex Chief Constable Ben-Julian Harrington for the part she played.

PC Victoria Price has a background in military trauma surgery and so she was able to use East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust specialist medical equipment at the scene of a collision in September 2022.

She worked with a paramedic to supply the man, who was initially unresponsive, with oxygen, 'shock' him with a defibrillator and monitor his vital signs while firefighters from Essex County Fire and Rescue Service performed CPR.

After 30 minutes of treatment, he was able to be flown to Basildon Hospital by Essex & Herts Air Ambulance for immediate surgery and later made a full recovery.

Victoria, of our Clacton Local Policing Team, says: "I knew what I had to do so it was just a matter of getting everyone else there to do what I needed them to do," she says.

"It's nice to be recognised with a Commendation but I feel more elated and happy that the man survived and we all worked as a team to make that happen. It was a great result."

Mr Harrington says: "All police officers are trained in first aid but PC Price's medical background means she was particularly well-placed to help the injured driver that day.

"I have no doubt that, were it not for her quick-thinking actions and her specialist knowledge of trauma and lifesupport procedures, the casualty would not have survived his injuries."

After the visit, they went onto Hastys Adventure Farm on West Road, Clacton to chat with another group of young people who were finishing a busy day of activities on the climbing frame, a great time was had by all the young people and Officers!









Harwich CPT


On Tuesday 21 March, Officers from the Harwich Community Policing Team successfully seized this Sur Ron electric bike and an electric scooter.

Sur Ron motorbikes are not road legal and have a top speed of 45mph, they were also being ridden by riders with no helmets and without consideration for pedestrians and road users.

The electric scooter was also being used illegally, we would like to remind everyone that unless hired through a government licenced company these should not be used on the road, pavements, or public spaces, they travel significantly faster than a mobility scooter and cause great concern to pedestrians.

We continue to receive reports of electric bikes and scooters causing antisocial behaviour including concerns of safety in and around Dovercourt, Parkeston and Harwich due to bikes and scooters like these being ridden dangerously along pavements, roads, and public green spaces.

We will continue to take appropriate and proportionate action against anyone found to be driving or riding in an antisocial manner, this is part of our **#YouSaidWeDid**

Monday 20 March, Officers from the Harwich Community Policing Team were on mobile patrol when they received a call regarding a vehicle left in a dangerous location on the corner of a T junction in Dead Lane, Ardleigh.

The vehicle was recovered immediately to ensure the safety of other road users and the registered owner was spoken too and given words of advice. **#YouSaidWeDid**



On Friday 14 April, Police Community Support Officers from Harwich Community Policing Team carried out a Street Meet along The Walls in Manningtree offering Crime Prevention advice.

They were joined by an officer from Essex County Fire & Rescue Service who was offering home safety advice and free smoke alarms.

Throughout April, Officers from the Tendring Community Policing Team have held 'Days of Action' at different location across Tendring.

They carried out high visibility mobile and foot patrols in Harwich, Manningtree, Lawford, Dovercourt and Parkeston.

Officers from the Road Crime Team **#Epmotorcycleunit** joined local officers where speed checks were conducted on roads previously reported to us by the public as part of our **#YouSaidWeDid**.

All checks were on 30mph limit roads, several drivers were captured exceeding the speed limit, with a top speed of 49mph.

Three drivers were stopped for having no insurance, their vehicles were seized under Section 165.

Two drivers were arrested for drug driving.

A trailer was also stopped and found to be in a dangerous condition whilst carrying an insecure load.

A successful proactive day, mainly focusing on our roads in the District.


This is a great way for Officers to engage with young people, the special guest Baloo is a retired Essex Police dog who was injured in the line of duty




where she sustained life changing injuries after being struck by a suspect in a stolen car, Baloo sadly had to prematurely end her career in 2018.


All checks were carried out on 30mph limit roads, officers captured 4 vehicles travelling over 40 mph along Thorpe Road, Kirby Cross.

3 vehicles were captured doing over 38mph along Kirby Road, Walton at the junction of Gouldings Avenue.

There were also 2 vehicles seized for having no insurance, 1 drug driver, 1 disqualified driver and 3 drivers were also issued tickets for not wearing a seat belt.

- We have received requests from residents in Thorpe le Soken for Officers to be more accessible, so they can meet with them and discuss concerns they may have in the community.
- Officers from the local Community Policing Team have attended the locations, where two riders were stopped by officers and have been issued Section 59 warnings. We will continue to monitor the area and

work with landowners to prevent

further issues.

Police Community Support Officers have attended the Baptist Church in Thorpe and now carry out street meets at their fortnightly coffee mornings. They have also arranged future meetings at different locations in the area.



Our monthly infographic provides a snapshot of some of the things your Tendring Officers have dealt with in the previous month.

During March 2023:

We helped to find 111 people who were reported missing and helped them to get the support they needed. We responded to 69 mental-health related incidents and worked with local partners to help those concerned get the help and support they needed.

We investigated 88 reports of antisocial behaviour having listened to local communities about the things which were causing them concern.

We attended 48 road traffic collisions, helping to keep those involved safe and our roads moving. We investigated 282 reports of domestic violence incidents and made sure victims were given help, support, and advice, putting them in contact with relevant organisations where appropriate.

We solved **127** crimes, ensuring those intent on committing crime are held accountable for their actions. We have submitted 588 pieces of intelligence which assists us in targeting criminal activity in our community. Our officers also stopped and searched 102 people within the #Tendring District to make sure they weren't carrying anything which could cause harm to themselves or someone else.





'You Said, We Did'—March/April—Speed Checks.

On Wednesday 29 March, a Police Community Support Officer conducted speed checks after reports from residents of speeding vehicles in Thorrington Road in Great Bentley.

In an hour, 20 drivers were captured exceeding the 30mph speed limit and will be receiving a letter in the post, the top speed recorded was 43mph in a 30mph zone.

During April, Officers have been conducting speed checks after reports from residents of speeding vehicles in Plough Road Great Bentley and Little Clacton

31 drivers in total were captured exceeding the 30mph speed limit and will be receiving a letter in the post, the top speed recorded was 49mph in a 30mph zone.

Thank you to all those recorded doing 30mph and below!

We will continue to listen to your concerns and monitor this and other locations across Tendring during different times of the day.

Crime Prevention

Cash Machine scam alert!

Fraudsters have been known to insert a strip of metal or plastic into an ATM card slot.

When the ATM tries to eject your bank card, the strip prevents it from appearing. Leaving you to think it has retained your card.

Someone may try & encourage you to retype your pin or they might have been 'shoulder surfing' the first time you typed it in.

They then remember your pin & when you walk away take the strip out and withdraw as much cash as they can.

Remember to always shield your pin and check no one is standing too close behind you.





If you're installing a new shed this spring put it somewhere where you and your neighbours can see it.

This will help to deter potential criminals from breaking in.

Also check your sheds and gates are secured with close shackle padlocks and pad bolts. Remember to replace them if they have start to rust over the winter.
