Reflection: Holy Cross Day

Today we celebrate Holy Cross Day; an unusual event in the church's calendar in that it focusses on an object rather than a saint or other inspirational figure. It is day, taken slightly out of the rhythm of the lectionary readings in which we look back to the events of Easter, when we could hardly get much further away from it

Why does it occur now? One theory is that Emperor Constantine dedicated a group of buildings near the place of Jesus' crucifixion, on the 14th of September in the year 335. During this work, a relic was discovered which was believed to be part of the cross of Christ. Other theories are that it was found near the site of Jesus' tomb. Historical sources note that this might be difficult to prove!

Even having such a day to commemorate a form of torture and death may seem distasteful and abhorrent; something to rush past and ignore perhaps.

Yet St Paul shocking insistence claim is that this punishment, designated for slaves and low-grade criminals, is all part of God's plan of salvation. A plan which will restore not only the lives of individuals but the whole of creation. For without the crucifixion, there is no salvation, no forgiveness of sin, no resurrection from the dead or life everlasting. St Peter reminds us:

'Jesus himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from our sins, we might live in righteousness' (1 Peter 2.24). How shall we respond to this challenge? *Revd Sarah*

And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.
