Reflection for 2nd Sunday before Lent

The Gospel for this Sunday is one of the most loved and well-known passages in the Bible, the first 14 verses of St John's gospel. But we only had it back at Christmas and this year, because Easter is early, we have it again 7 Sundays after Christmas. We have had all the physical stories and evidence of Jesus, the baby born in a stable and visited by shepherds and wisemen, his showing to world at his baptism and his Presentation at the temple where he is greeted by Simeon and Anna. All these events confirm his humanity.

However the passage from John reminds us of his divinity; it reminds us that Jesus, the Word was ever there at the beginning of time. It also reminds us that the Light cannot be quenched by the darkness that engulfs the world. Lent is one of the darker times of Christian year leading up to Good Friday and the awful events of that day. It is with us in a week and a half. This Gospel gives us a timely reminder that God does not give in to that darkness and does not let go of us! He is with us through thick and thin and his glory shines through.

Proverbs 8: 1, 22-31

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth— when he had not vet made earth and fields. or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth. then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race.

Colossians 1: 15-20

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him

all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

John 1: 1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.
