Reflection on today's gospel: Mark 4: 26-32

The short parable at the beginning of our Gospel today, describes amongst other things, the sense of mystery of God and faith; the person who scattered the seed does not know <u>how</u> it sprouts and grows – yet they still plant it, in the faith that it will grow and yield plants.

Growth and change are often insidious; it can be encouraging to look back over a span of time prayerfully reflect on our journey. We may notice things as subtle as a shift in attitude, which will allow us to see things more as God does. Often other people see change and growth in us, that we cannot see ourselves.

Growth in nature similarly requires patience. It can feel like an eternity before we see shoots from the seeds or bulbs we planted. They cannot be hurried, but we can prepare the way for them as best we can, be this through clearing the ground of weeds that may stifle them, or preparing the soil so they grow in the best way they can. Are there things that we need to weed out? How can we nourish our soil? Now that lockdown's easing, retreats, times away and quiet days are becoming possible again, as are meeting face to face with a soul friend or spiritual companion.

Thank you to all those who have made suggestions about how we move forward out of restrictions, and back to a new normal. Ezekiel 17: 22-24

Thus says the Lord God: I myself will take a sprig from the lofty top of a cedar; I will set it out. I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs; I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain. On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it, in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar. Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind. All the trees of the field shall know that I am the Lord. I bring low the high tree, I make high the low tree; I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish. I the Lord have spoken; I will accomplish it.

2 Corinthians 5: 6-10 (11-13) 14-17

So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord— for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. For all of us must appear before the judgement seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil. [Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to

boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you.] For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

Mark 4: 26-34

Jesus also said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.' He also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.' With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.
