There were some astounding images in the newspapers recently of Zaatari in Jordan, home to some 120,000 Syrians, and now the world's second largest refugee camp. It was a timely and chilling reminder that whilst we have some family fun making a home under the stars and then walking back into our homes when it starts raining, around 10 million people are forced to live in such temporary structures rather further away from their normal residence. Most never go home.

The reason we are supposed to move into sukkahs for a week is not unconnected. Part of the idea is to make us appreciate the luxuries we have and so reflect on how far we have come since we were forced into such flimsy transition, back when we took a right turn out of Egypt. We may no longer be the wandering Jews, but we mustn't forget we once were, when circumstances over which we had no control made us flee in an instant. As the old joke goes, "Why do so many Jews play the violin? Ever tried running with a piano on your back !".

Others today, of which several million Syrians are only the latest wave, remain in that awful position. Sukkot gives us the opportunity to recognise what was our own plight in those of others' today. Deuteronomy reminds us "you shall love the stranger, for vou were once strangers in the land of Egypt". Some of those Zaatari Syrians may soon be with us.

And there are things we can do for the rest of the ten million. Like support the UNHCR - UN Refugee Agency, or better still, work to avoid such mass movements happening in the first place. History shows that refugees rarely return. Rather they travel around, settle and start communities in foreign lands, as of course we did ourselves after we left Canaan. The world is a richer place for that, and so it is for many peoples following in our footsteps through to today, although it probably doesn't look like that from a tent without running water, light or electricity. Seeds cast in the wind though do settle, and in many cases thrive; not all who wander are lost. Something to think about perhaps as we look up at the stars.
