Reflection Palm Sunday Don't avoid St Paul!

I detect that we may have been avoiding St Paul during this Lent, in a very polite Anglican sort of way. So on a Sunday we have tended to prefer a combination of Old Testament and Gospel, which does make sense as they are deliberately linked. This has relegated the New Testament reading (the Epistle in 'old speak') to private consumption or to our consideration on Zoom with a smaller group in the evening, albeit with very active discussion. Even then, the thought of addressing the Pauline reading has filled some with dread.

So why is this and what is a good response?

St Paul can be complicated especially the Letter to the Romans, and it doesn't help to read it in small chunks. He is addressing different practical problems and theoretical positions in the new churches with which he was involved around the Mediterranean basin, two thousand or so years ago. Some focus and concentration are needed as we read, but longer chunks will make more sense. Additionally, remember that he was primarily a missionary not a theologian, so sometimes he contradicts himself, gets carried away, and is just plain enthusiastic, and as we read we enter his world, and are taken up into his concepts, without always understanding everything – and that's ok. I would suggest a memory too of The Epistle on a Sunday morning BCP from King James Version Bible almost certainly has put us off!

So here's a challenge and a Holy Week discipline before Easter: read St Paul's Letter to the Galatians in one go. You can have a little break in the middle, but no small chunks. And you will enjoy it, I almost guarantee it.

Liturgy of the Palms

Matthew 21: 1-11

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, "The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately.' This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, 'Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.' The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting. 'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, 'Who is this?' The crowds were saying, 'This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.'

with a word. Morning by morning he wakens—wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord God has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backwards. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord God helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord God who helps me; who will declare me guilty? All of them will wear out like a garment; the moth will eat them up.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.
