## **Newbridge 15 v RGC 22**

RGC assistant coach Josh Leach believes the weekend's 22-15 win at Newbridge shows how the players have developed in the Championship.

"This was a game we would have lost six months ago, we have come away with a win and adapted to the conditions," he said.

"We know it is a tough run-in to the end of the season, but we have depth in the squad now and with the conditions beginning to change weather-wise that can only benefit our style of rugby."

It was Newbridge that opened the scoring with a penalty in the opening minute, but RGC soon took control of the game as they looked to shift the ball and go through the phases looking for a gap in the home side's defence.

The Newbridge players were making some big and important tackles and the opening 15 minutes was a physical one for both sides.

Lewis Barker left the pitch with a knee injury and was replaced by Rhodri Carlton-Jones.

The RGC try came after a superb zinging pass by Alex Schwarz to Tom Blackwell who skipped through in the corner. Carlton Jones kicked the difficult conversion.

The home side answered back with a try after some pressure on the Gogs' line, but it wasn't long before the RGC forwards showed their power when Tallis Karaitiania crashed over under the posts giving Carlton Jones an easy conversion.

RGC spurned a few opportuni-

catches and loose passes, but they visitors did extend the lead just before half time when a Carlton Jones penalty sailed over the posts.

The second half started brightly when Ollie Cracknell powered through to score the try as RGC started to think of that bonus-point fourth try.

But the game began to change as RGC couldn't keep control of the ball as well, and they began to invite pressure on themselves.

Winger Richard Hopkins made a couple of superb tackles when the Newbridge attack looked dangerous.

The home side started to kick behind the Gogs' defence putting pressure on the RGC line out. Andy Baston was given a yellow in the 60th minute, not long after coming on as a sub, and the man advantage told instantly as Lewis Blacker scored and with the conversion made it a seven-point difference. Newbridge then had a player yellowed for an elbow to make it a 14-man game.

RGC dug in with Huw Worthington and Andy Baston both making a big difference at the breakdown as Newbridge looked for that important try.

Skipper Kelvin Davies began to show some good kicking skills as he hit three decent kicks into the corner to release the pressure on the RGC defence.

Compared to similar games like this in the past away from home, this result has to be viewed as just as impressive as the 10-try Tondu victory last week, as lessons from the past appear to have been taken on board.





## **RGC In the Community**

#### **Saturday 22 March**

### **RGC 31 v Tata Steel 15**

RGC consolidated second spot in the Championship after seeing off previously third-placed Tata Steel 31-15 at Parc Eirias on Saturday.

The win over Tata moved RGC four points clear in second place with Bargoed taking over in third place.

Saturday's victory means RGC remain unbeaten in the league in 2014, with their only loss since the turn of the year having been in the Swalec Cup against runaway Championship leaders Ebbw Vale.

RGC were dominant in the opening 25 minutes, running in three converted tries without the visitors actually having one attack themselves.

The Parc Eirias crowd, which included Wales head coach Warren Gatland, watched the Gogs score the opening try from Tallis Karaitiana when he drove over after a quick tap penalty, even managing to power through three defenders in the process. Rhodri Carlton Jones, in at fly-half for the injured Lewis Barker, added the conversion.

Harri Evans was next to get the crowd excited when the Wales under-20s star broke through four players, only for his pass to escape the hands of Carlton Jones. The RGC backline did click together for the second try with two superb offloads giving winger Tom Blackwell the opportunity to race down the touchline for the score. Carlton Jones fired over a difficult conversion.

Another of RGC's Wales U20 players, full-back Afon Bagshaw, claimed the third try racing under the posts, and with the Carlton Jones conversion it was 21-0 after 25 minutes.

It wasn't just about the RGC backline, though, as the forwards were putting in a big shift, chasing down every ball and making life difficult for Tata Steel.

The visitors needed to get back in the game and they did so with a big rolling maul that pushed over the line for the point. Tata Steel then began to get a foothold in the game with Stuart Edbrooke making a break and causing problems. The wind was causing a few problems for the boot of Simon Evans as, after he missed the conversion, he followed it up by pulling a simple penalty wide of the posts.

RGC lost their own flow and began to get involved in situations that were not really part of the game, which looked part of the visitors' game plan. After a number of stoppages in the breakdown the final score of the half went to Tata Steel with a penalty.

The second half opened with a penalty try for Tata Steel which was converted, and the visitors were using the rolling maul on a number of occasions to try and gain momentum.

The weather began to play a part as the wind and rain made handling tricky, with RGC missing a few opportunities to score, including a great break from Blackwell whose pass didn't make it to Andrew Williams.

Scrum-half Alex Schwarz was next to make a break for the line, and after some good footwork he was strangely called back by the referee, who had fallen and couldn't keep up with play. After a few infringements Tata were reduced to 14 men with a yellow card, and the RGC pack started to dominate again in the scrum. Carlton Jones hit a penalty facing the wind to cap what was a good day with his right boot.

As the clock ticked down the home crowd were given the bonus point try they wanted when winger Blackwell raced down the line, and Bagshaw fired over the conversion on the final whistle.

Once again RGC put in a big performance and it was a true team effort. The forwards were tenacious in the breakdown and they enabled the platform for Alex Schwarz to set up the backs, who used the ball well for the 80 minutes.

## **Warran Gatland impressed at Eirias**

Warren Gatland was at Eirias to watch RGC beat Tata Steel 31-15 in the Swalec Championship match which keeps the Gogs in second place.

He also took a tour of the facilities at Eirias, including the Indoor 3G training barn and the state-of-the-art gym. The Wales Head Coach spoke after the game on his first visit to the stadium.

"The set up here at Eirias is as good as I have seen anywhere, and the support from Conwy Council is great to see. I enjoyed the game with both sides competing well, and for RGC to pick up the bonus point win certainly ended the game on a high for them.

"North Wales is definitely important from a WRU point of view and with the region having a million people we have to look to develop rugby across the whole area.

"Hopefully looking long term, we can now provide the vehicle for the talent to develop players that will have the opportunity to progress in the professional and international game. It is good the processes are now in place, and it won't be immediate but in 3 or 4 years the results will be seen for everyone involved at RGC."

Gatland also took the time to catch up with a family friend, Tallis Karaitiana, who has joined the RGC set-up from Hamilton Boys School.

The 18 year old back row scored the opening try on Saturday with a barn-storming run and earned the man-of-the-match accolade to boot.

Gatland said, "Tallis spent a lot of time at my house growing up as he is a good friend of my son's. He's a very talented player and has come over to try his luck in Wales as he has Welsh heritage."

#### **Saturday 29 March**

### Beddau 6 v RGC 24

RGC came away from the Mount Pleasant ground with a hard-fought bonus-point win, gained against a Beddau side who belied their Championship league position by never making things easy for the visiting North Walians.

Playing down the slope in the first half, RGC, who welcomed back Llangefni hooker Andy Baston from injury, had by far the best of both territory and possession but had nothing to show for it until 30 minutes in, when Wales U20 ace Harri Evans exploded through a group of Beddau defenders to touch down under the posts. His Wales under-20 teammate Afon Bagshaw added the extras.

From the re-start a misunderstanding among the RGC team led to the ball being re-claimed by the hosts, and a couple of moments later man of the match Tom Hughes found himself in the sin-bin when he made his only mistake of the game as he was adjudged to have deliberately knocked a pass down. From the resulting penalty the Beddau fly-half knocked over the penalty kick.

With the home supporters screaming for the referee to blow the half-time whistle, RGC scored with the last play of the half when a flowing move down the left-hand side of the pitch resulted in another Wales U20s star, Olly Cracknell, crossing the white-wash to give the visitors a 12-3 half-time lead.

Unsurprisingly Beddau came

out at the start of the second half with all guns blazing and a penalty conceded by RGC brought them to within six points as they converted a second effort of the afternoon.

Shortly afterwards RGC fly-half Bagshaw was forced to leave the field after receiving a bang on the head while tackling a charging Beddau back-row player.

Beddau then had a chance to score another three-pointer but with the kick falling short, RGC full-back Llywarch ap Myrddin launched a howitzer of a clearance to return play very firmly into the opposition 22. Although Beddau relieved the pressure on that occasion, shortly afterwards they were found out when Harri Evans scored his second try and scrum-half Alex Schwarz slotted over the conversion.

The final try of the game, and the one that secured the bonus point, came from Llywarch Ap Myrddin following neat interplay between forwards and backs.

## **RGC 57 v Bridgend Ath 6**

RGC head coach Chris
Horsman was delighted with
his team's response to his
half-time team talk as a strong
second-half performance
against Bridgend ensured their
unbeaten league record for
2014 rolls on.

The North Wales representative side overcame another hurdle in the race for second spot in the Championship with their victory at Parc Eirias over Bridgend Athletic, who had beaten RGC in south Wales back in November.

Although RGC were leading at the break, frustration was building as try-scoring opportunities were proving hard to come by.

But the Gogs scored seven of their nine tries after the restart, and after the game Horsman praised his players for their reaction.

He said: "It was another pleasing performance today, and once again it shows how far we have come after we lost this fixture at Bridgend earlier in the season.

"It is great to see the development of the side and after the conversations at half time the players took on board the messages from the coaching staff and solved the problems in the second half.

"Every player played well today as we scored nine good tries, but I have to praise Rhodri Carlton-Jones who I thought was outstanding and was key to our attacking game in the second half."

The home side were looking for the win from the kick-off, especially after Bridgend's win earlier in the season.

Scrum half Alex Schwarz was involved in much of the positive play with an early 20-yard gallop to test the visitors' defence. And it was Schwarz who opened the scoring after the ball was spread wide for the number nine to run in the first try of the game.

Bridgend hit back immediately with a penalty from Steven Lewis, and soon after hit another three points to take the lead without having actually caused problems for the Gogs.

Much of the first half was fairly scrappy as RGC failed to convert possession and territory into points.

The forwards set up some good platforms but the try-scoring opportunities failed to materialise and the home side were turned over at vital moments.

It was more a case of the RGC players causing problems for themselves rather than the visitors, and it was clear to see the frustration building on the pitch and on the touchline.

The crucial point of the half came just before the break, when fly-half Rhodri Carlton-Jones made a dart for the line and evaded three Bridgend players to touch down in the corner.

That try probably made the half-time talk by the coaching staff a little easier for the players as they went into the dressing room with the lead.

The players certainly took on board whatever was said in the dressing room as Tom Blackwell touched down early in the half, with Carlton Jones converting.

Winger Blackwell has been impressive all season when he is given the ball, and it was another good score for him.

The backline were linking up well, with Carlton Jones offering options to Evans and Tom Hughes in the centre.

The differences from the first half to the second were the options and running off the ball, which led to some strong breaks from all parts of the pitch.

RGC were going through the phases on the Bridgend line and after the ball was spun wide, Andy Baston powered over for the all-important bonus-point try, with another Carlton Jones conversion.

Next it was man-of-the-match Harri Evans's turn to put his name on the score sheet after a break from Carlton Jones, who cleverly offloaded for the Wales U20 centre to outpace the defence and go over. Carlton Jones hit the conversion. Evans quickly scored again when he scorched down the line to run in under the posts, leaving a simple conversation for Carlton Jones.

Three more tries followed as the Gogs' pace and good hands opened up the Bargoed defence, with Carwyn Ap Myrddin, Blackwell, Olly Cracknell all scoring to make it a nine-try win against a team who previously had also been unbeaten in 2014.

One of the most impressive and pleasing aspects of the game was the fact the players came out in the second half and ironed out all the individual mistakes from the first period, and once again played rugby with skill and pace.

#### **Saturday 12th April**

### Llanharan 10 v RGC 17

Some games you just count the win and move on, and that was the case as RGC kept alive their winning run at Llanharan to remain in charge of the race for second spot.

The game was a messy affair for 80 minutes with handling errors and the referee's whistle being the only consistents throughout.

But head coach Chris Horsman knows the fact his team came away with the win was more important than the performance.

"I gave 10 out of 10 to the players for resilience and effort but not really in terms of composure and control when we had the ball," said Horsman. "That said we got the result and to be fair we played all the rugby in the second half.

"They got the try from a bounce of the ball but we scored some good tries today. At this part of the season it isn't about the performance but the result that counts.

"I have to credit our defence which has been pleasing for the past four games with the effort from the players being a pleasing aspect. We regroup on Tuesday and go again on Saturday."

The opening try went to Llanharan after they lost their own line-out but the ball bounced into the hands of Scott Malone to score a converted try.

The game was being played out by the forwards, with both sides struggling at the breakdown meaning the flow of the game was stop/start.

It was the RGC forwards who set up the Gogs' try after the scrum drove forward before the ball popped out to allow Carwyn ap Myrddin to scamper over the line.

Llanharan then edged back ahead with a penalty, before RGC added their second try, Llywarch ap Myrddin the beneficiary of Tom Hughes' break to dive over.

The second half was even messier, with a succession of knock-ons and penalties from both sides.

RGC had a couple of penalties in kickable range but chose a scrum or line-out only to give the ball away cheaply. Llanharan played 20 minutes with 14 men after seeing two players sent to the bin, but the Gogs couldn't take advantage of the extra man.

RGC were getting turned over on a few occasions which added to the frustration on the pitch, and it wasn't long before the away side were shown a yellow with captain Andy Williams being sin-binned on 68 minutes.

It was predictable that the winning try came from a mistake and a loose clearance kick was superbly taken by Andy Baston, who turned on the gas to sprint in under the posts leaving Rhodri Carlton Jones with a simple conversion.

The remaining minutes were played out with RGC making some big tackles and working hard at the breakdown, making sure the Gogs left South Wales with another win in the chase to seal second spot.



#### Saturday 19th April

### **RGC 78 v Bonymaen 3**

RGC may have run in 12 tries on their way to securing a revenge win over Bonymaen on Saturday, but the most telling statistic for Chris Horsman was that it was another 80 minutes of rugby without having their own line breached.

The North Wales outfit were never really in any danger of losing this match against a side who slipped to the foot of the Championship standings.

Bonymaen had claimed a 7-5 win over RGC at their own ground before Christmas and it was clear the Gogs were up for revenge over their visitors.

But it was the fact they kept their opponents down to just a Richard Cunniffe penalty which was the biggest achievement for Horsman.

"It is great to go from a 7-5 loss to a 78-3 win," said the head coach. "But the pleasing thing for me is that in the last four games we have only conceded one try and that was from a lucky bounce, so defensively we have been on the money.

"We had a couple of issues we needed to address which we have worked on in the week. The line-out was one area where last week we put a lot of pressure on ourselves, but this week I think we addressed that issue with 100% line-out where we were about 60% last week, so that is another pleasing stat.

"It is just pleasing also to see the depth of the squad. We did have some boys away and missing for us, but everyone has stepped up. I thought Mei (Parry, who has had to bide his time, came in and did outstandingly and I think the production line is working. Cam Davies, 18 today, comes off the bench and scores a try

on his debut, and that says testament to what the academy are doing and generally it is very pleasing."

RGC were ahead after only 10 minutes, Harri Evans crossing after a break from fellow centre Tom Hughes, who then set up the home side's second try moments later after he took an inside pass from Evans to race through. While Hughes was caught close to the line, suffering an injury which would see him leave the field, the ball was recycled for secondrow Bryn Williams to crash over from close range.

Cunniffe fired over a penalty to ensure Bonymaen were not scoreless, but from there on it was all one-way traffic with Evans scoring his second of the game, before Andrew Williams added a fourth and bonus-point try just before the break.

Sean O'Rourke was sent to the sin-bin before the interval for some 'lazy running' as he attempted to get back onside after a ruck, but RGC continued to add to their score after the break, Mei Parry going over before a brace of Afon Bagshaw tries.

Cam Davies came on to make his debut on his 18th birthday and celebrated the occasion with a try, the youngster mobbed by the whole of the team.

Evans completed his hat-trick before Llywarch ap Myrddin race clear late on and replacement prop Joe Jones 'weaved and side-stepped' his way to the line in the dying seconds to add some gloss to the total. Rhodri Carlton Jones enjoyed a good day with the boot, slotting five conversions, while Bagshaw added four.



## **Bargoed 36 v RGC 17**

RGC owe a debt of gratitude to Bridgend Athletic after the North Wales side and their closest rivals for second place – Cardiff Met – both lost at the weekend.

RGC went down to a 36-17 loss at Bargoed, to end their hopes of extending their unbeaten run of matches to 10.

However, they stay five points clear of third-placed Cardiff Met in the race for the runners-up spot, having played a game more than the side from the capital and knowing they face a trip to take on the students in their final match of the campaign.

Although disappointed not to be able to make it 10 wins in a row in the Championship, RGC could have no complaints about the final outcome of this highly-charged encounter against Bargoed.

With the wind at their backs RGC had the majority of the play in the opening quarter but a combination of their own errors and strong defence from the home side meant that they struggled to convert this possession into pressure.

The opening score when it did come arose from the first time that RGC managed to spin the ball wide and led to full-back Afon Bagshaw shrugging off tacklers to score under the posts, with Rhodri Carlton-Jones adding the extras.

From the re-start RGC failed to take control of the ball leading to a period of concerted pressure from the home side who thought that they had scored in the corner shortly afterwards after a quickly- taken tap penalty.

However, although the referee called them back on that occasion, they scored shortly afterwards when their pack, who had the advantage in the set-piece throughout the afternoon, drove over from short range. Although they were unable to convert the resulting conversion they were able to go into the break with a 12-7 advantage as they scored their second try, again from close range, just before the referee blew up for half-time.

With the wind against them the RGC side knew that they were going to be in for a tough second half and their task was made even harder when the opening score of the second half went to the home side, their hooker forcing his way over from a couple of metres out.

Although RGC reduced the deficit when replacement winger Richard Hopkins showed great speed to go over in the left-hand corner, three further scores from the home side ruled out any chance of a comeback.

To their credit RGC kept on playing right up until the end and Hopkins was rewarded with his second score when he won the race to touch down after Bargoed had dropped the ball just outside their 22.

Although obviously disappointed to lose their first league game of 2014, results elsewhere mean that if they win their remaining two games, away to Pontypool and Cardiff Met, RGC can still finish second in this season's Championship, which would be a remarkable achievement.

#### **Saturday 3rd May**

### Pontypool 23 v RGC 7

RGC kept alive their hopes of finishing second in the Championship, but needed results to go their way after a disappointing defeat at Pontypool.

The North Wales side went down to their second loss on the bounce as they crashed to a 23-7 defeat in the South Wales valleys.

However, RGC remain in second place heading into their final game of the season next Saturday after Cardiff Met and Narberth both crashed to defeats in their outings.

Although RGC went down to their second away defeat in a row at Pontypool Park they could walk with their heads held high after a much improved performance from the previous week's at Bargoed.

The opening score to the home side came after a flowing backs move leading to their left wing offloading to scrum-half Aaron Quick, who touched down in the corner. Shortly afterwards RGC had a chance of their own to put points on the board from a long-range penalty attempt by Rhodri Carlton Jones, but unfortunately his effort came back off the upright, allowing Pontypool to clear.

Further scoring opportunities came RGC's way via breaks from Olly Cracknell and Harri

Evans, but on both occasions scrambling defence from the home side snuffed out the chances and it was in fact Pontypool who were to score the only other try of the first half when after a cross-field kick their full-back Clayton Gullis dived over in the left-hand corner. With the conversion missed, half-time came with Pontypool holding a 10-0 advantage.

The hosts extended their advantage by three early in the second half with a successful penalty kick before RGC got on the scoreboard themselves when Llywarch ap Myrddin showed tremendous pace to cross under the posts, having made a break from all of 40 metres out, Carlton Jones adding the extras.

From the restart Pontypool looked to keep the RGC side pinned deep in their own half, and following a great chase the visitors were penalised for holding on just inside their 22. From the resulting penalty the hosts extended their lead by another three points, and they were to score their third and the final try of the game shortly afterwards when left wing Josh Hurley picked up a chip to touch down under the posts.

#### **Saturday 10th May**

### **Cardiff Met 36 v RGC 24**

RGC came away from the capital knowing they gave everything in the last game of the season against Cardiff Met - but in the end it was the students who claimed the win and second place in the Championship, with Chris Horsman's North Wales side finishing third

The weather conditions were more suited to November rather than mid-May with a strong wind to contend with throughout the 80 minutes, but both teams played some great attacking rugby.

It was all RGC in the opening 10 minutes as they controlled the ball and went through the phases, driving home side back on their line. Their opening try came from a great 30-yard break from scrum-half Josh Leach, full-back Morgan Williams giving the ball to Richard Hopkins to score in the corner, the winger beating five players to get the score. Rhodri Carlton Jones hit a great kick against the wind to take a 7-0 lead.

Cardiff Met, as expected, looked dangerous when they had the ball, but their try was more from RGC's own making after the ball was spilled and Tim Thomson picked up to score. Cooke added the extras.

Mei Parry was having an impressive game with some good runs and a couple of important tackles when Cardiff Met were attacking.

The home side's second try came after RGC were punished for bringing down a rolling maul and the referee gave a penalty try with Cooke converting.

Leach was making some positive breaks but it was the students who scored again after the Gogs were turned over on the halfway line and it was punished with them breaking for the try and conversion.

With the lead extending it was important for RGC to get the next score, and so they did with the best try of the game. The ball was spun from the touchline with Williams and Hopkins swapping quick passes for Hopkins to touchdown.

If that score was down to skill and quick hands the next try was sheer power with the pack driving 15 yards, and Llywarch ap Myrddin credited with the try. It was as good a half of rugby as you could have seen in the division this season as both sides looked to play with ball in hand and the scores reflected that.

It was Cardiff Met who crossed the line early after the break with Chris Leversley going over for the try. With both teams going for the win, the game got a bit feisty as tensions spilled over off the ball. RGC were putting in some big tackles as Cardiff Met broke on a number of occasions and as a result a few bodies were down on the ground. Andy Williams went off and Leach ended up moving from scrum half to flanker, with Joe Simpson and Parry soon to follow Williams off the pitch.

The Cardiff Met centres combined to run down the middle to get another score as the game edged away from RGC.

Cam Davies, on at scrumhalf, made a couple of direct runs and the Gogs still kept on pushing for the score but it was a penalty from Cooke that added to the Cardiff Met score.

The last score of the game and the season came from Andy Baston when Cam Davies took a quick tap penalty before the hooker dived over for the bonus-point try.


