



Campaign overview

The next phase of activity will focus on meeting ECB's ambition of ensuring all affiliated recreational cricket clubs engage with the SHMS by the end of 2023.



The rollout aims to encourage club engagement with the SHMS in four key areas:



Club management

By inputting details of individuals in key regulated roles or with responsibilities for running club activities into the system, clubs can then track and verify the qualification statuses of club officials associated with their club.



Meeting safeguarding responsibilities

The SHMS helps clubs to ensure that they are meeting ECB minimum standards, highlight known safeguarding risks to clubs, and empower clubs to take mitigating actions to reduce such risks.



Club development

Engagement with the SHMS allows clubs to work towards Clubmark accreditation if desired, recruit to and lead safe junior sections, and support the development of the volunteer workforce within the club.



Free liability insurance

By onboarding onto the SHMS, clubs can also easily access and complete a risk assessment to redeem the offer of free liability insurance provided by Howden.

Rollout stages

The rollout of the SHMS is looking to attract the remaining recreational clubs that are not currently onboarded.

The scale of this work dictates that a single stage of activity is unlikely to develop sufficient awareness of the system and its benefits across this number of clubs. As such, the rollout will be based upon a number of stages of activity which will allow us to start the process of bringing new clubs onboard now, whilst also giving us the agility to adapt the campaign and land further initiatives and resources if required.

This approach will enable us to work collaboratively to reflect on progress made, identify ongoing barriers to engaging clubs and refine our approaches based upon key learning and best practice.







Rollout stages

Stage 1:

Launch the rollout

We sent a communication to all counties on 6th February 2023 to launch the Phase 4 rollout. The intention of this first phase is to allow CCBs to target clubs already on their radar to onboard onto the system. This may be clubs who have come forward for Clubmark accreditation this year or who have come to the attention of CCBs through engagement in other areas of their work.

Stage 2:

Energising the rollout

The ECB will make available digital assets which can be used and adapted by CCBs to help promote the SHMS and its benefits more widely within their network in May 2023. The inclusion of Safe Hands branding will help create a consistent visual message around the campaign. These assets can be used in conjunction with any local promotional resources which have been developed.

Stage 3:

Review and refocus

The exact nature of the challenge in terms of engaging those clubs currently not using the SHMS is not fully known at this point. There is likely to be some variety in these clubs in terms of the scale of their operations and their existing level of engagement with safeguarding responsibilities. It will be necessary to evaluate progress made and identify further supports that may be necessary to reach this next group of clubs. It is proposed that this initial review will take place in July 2023, with any actions identified being communicated.

Stage 4:

Evaluate

At a suitable point, it will be necessary to reflect on progress made in onboarding clubs and analyse the impact this has made on the wider safeguarding landscape within the recreational game. The first opportunity to evaluate will take place in stage 3, with a comparative analysis of key metrics related to the number of clubs onboarded to the SHMS. There will also be engagement opportunities with counties to undertake insight gathering related to their progress and to capture the nature of ongoing challenges.



What is the Safe Hands Management System (the SHMS)?

▼ The SHMS is an online, volunteer management tool which allows clubs to understand and identify risk associated with the running of their club. The ECB will require all County Boards and clubs to input the details of individuals in key regulated roles or those with responsibilities for the management and running of county and club activities.

Why is the ECB making the Safe Hands Management System a requirement?

- ✓ Safeguarding children across all cricket networks is an ECB priority, it is also a legal requirement under the Children Act 1989. Working Together to Safeguard Children 2018 (Working Together to Safeguard Children 2018 (publishing. service.gov.uk)) places a specific requirement on sports organisations, to ensure they have minimum safeguarding standards in place.
- The process will enable the ECB as the national governing body of cricket to provide consistent credibility to those organisations which meet the required standards of safeguarding. As the national governing body, we have a responsibility to demonstrate that cricket is a safe sport for everyone. The process will help us to understand where we are with this and demonstrate that we have a safe sport for children and those around them.

What are the key safeguarding responsibilities for clubs to meet through the SHMS?

- All clubs must meet safeguarding standards, particularly those with a junior section or where under 18's are participating in open age cricket.
- The club must adhere to the ECB Safe Hands Policy and Procedures.
- Each club must have a trained and vetted Club Safeguarding Officer.
- All adults who instruct/supervise children at the club must have a current ECB DBS check in place.
- All adults who instruct/supervise children in cricket must have undertaken the appropriate ECB training.

How does Safe Hands connect to Clubmark?

The national standards set out in the registration process for the SHMS are not new - they are already required under the Safe Hands policy (ecb.co.uk/about/policies-and-regulations/safeguarding/safe-hands). They provide the foundations for a safely run club or squad. These national standards are also captured in the Clubmark criteria (PLD6) which considers a clubs compliance status and the accuracy of information provided on the system. These are considered indicative features of a safely run club.

What benefits are there to clubs by registering to the SHMS?

- ▼ The SHMS provides a secure platform for you to store and manage all your club information in one easy and accessible place – based on feedback you have told us that it can be difficult to manage all of your records and data.
- ✓ The SHMS draws data from other ECB data sources, so that it can accurately reflect your DBS validity status as well as any other required qualifications for your role.
- ✓ Upon registration and completion of the insurance risk assessment, clubs will be invited to take up free club insurance provided by our ECB partner, Howden. The insurance policy will commence on the clubs next renewal date and run to the 31st January each year. Renewal will then always commence from 1st February each year.
- ✓ Clubs will have direct access within the SHMS to contact the ECB Customer Support Team through a dedicated Help Centre on any queries or assistance you may need with registration/maintenance/ compliance, including how to apply or renew DBS certificates and access Course Bookings for Safe Hands.

What is the role of Club Administrator?

- All clubs need to nominate a Club Administrator.
- The nominated Club Administrator at each cricket club will have the following responsibilities:
 - i. view the online training video's before completing registration.
 - ii. complete their own profile and accept the role of Club Administrator via an email invite that will be sent directly from the ECB.
- Check and complete all the necessary information requested in the SHMS including:
 - Club Information (Address/ Contact Details).
 - ii. Invite all club officials to register.
 - **iii.** Teams/programmes run by the club.
 - iv. Any venues used by the club.
 - v. Complete insurance risk assessment.
 - vi. Communicate the use of the SHMS to your club officials and explain the requirement for them to register and accept their role.
 - **vii.** Monitor compliance of all officials against DBS and qualifications required for each role.

- viii. Work alongside your primary
 County Cricket Board and
 County Safeguarding Officer to
 develop your club and officials
 to ensure maximum compliance
 to meet the policy and standards
 outlined by ECB Safe Hands
 Policy and Procedures.
- ix. Actively follow up on any outstanding invitations, DBS applications and course bookings as required.
- x. Maintain your club/officials details by logging into the SHMS periodically.

How do clubs register?

It is the responsibility of County Cricket Boards to onboard clubs in their local area to the Safe Hands Management System.

How will the SHMS benefit the growth of cricket and club members?

- Clubs will be able to demonstrate their commitment to the safety of young people helping to attract more members and players.
- The process will provide a mechanism to support those clubs who require additional help or who are unable to meet the required standards.
- The entire sport will be faced with huge reputational risk if we cannot demonstrate a clear commitment to safeguarding at all levels.
- ✓ The process is an additional layer of safeguarding that is embedded in your club, helping parents to know they are choosing the right club for their young people.
- Registration will provide clubs with confidence and reassurance of their approach to safeguarding.

Why can't clubs see more information about their club and Officials in the SHMS?

The system has been designed with security in mind and is GDPR compliant. We only ask Club Administrators and officials for the necessary level of information we require to report accurately against club compliance (as set out in Safe Hands policy) and to ensure we match officials accurately with their DBS and related qualifications held in other ECB databases.
