Surrey Championship Umpires Panel

I offer a very warm welcome to the new umpires joining our Panel this season, and hope very much that they enjoy their first season with us in the Surrey Championship. The Panel operates in the 1st XI League from Premier Division down to Division 4 only. I would also like to express the thanks of the Panel umpires for the warmth of the hospitality that so many clubs offer our members over the summer months.

We continue to see a steady flow of younger umpires wishing to join the Panel each season, and this is vital as the Panel has been seeing a rise in retirements, particularly from some of our most experienced Premier umpires, in recent years. It should be noted that just as the Surrey Championship is a pathway for talented young players to progress towards the professional game, the same is true for umpires. The ECB has established a clear route for the very best umpires in the Championship to progress to Minor Counties or County 2nd XI matches. To find out more about becoming an umpire please visit the Umpires section of the Championship website or <http://www.surreycricketofficials.org.uk/index.htm>.

The Championship now offers subsidies to clubs who send their members on the Level 1 Umpires Training Course, pass the exam, and who then go into to stand as umpires in at least two Championship matches at any level. The subsidy will offset the cost of the course. It should be noted that Level 1 Training courses are held from January to March each year at four centres around Surrey – details available from the link above. If every club were to have a target of getting one of their members each season through the Course, the exam and some practical experience, not only would it be of great benefit to the club, and cricket in Surrey more generally, but it would also provide a greater pool of potential umpires for the Panel to choose from and meet its long term target of covering all Surrey Championship 1st XI matches down to Division 5.

There are only three changes to the Playing Conditions this year in Panel-umpired matches. The use of the old ball at the beginning of the second innings is no longer permitted, there are no bonus points now available in Divisions 2, 3 and 4 when the limited overs formula is used to adjust the first innings score when matches have been interrupted, and the adjusted score of the side batting first will now ignore any fractions of a run, so making a tie a possible match result in such a situation.

Surrey Championship Ground and Facilities Grant Scheme

Every year, the Championship receives funding from the England Cricket Board (ECB) in recognition of its status as a Premier League. Traditionally ECB have earmarked most of the money for distribution to clubs with 1st XIs playing Premier Division cricket. However, from 2013 Leagues were given discretion as to its use in the best interests of league cricket within its area. The Executive Committee decided to retain a partial distribution to Premier clubs but to use the rest of the money (up to £5k) to experiment with a pilot programme of grants for clubs needing some help with improvements to their grounds and/or playing facilities. This was advertised to Clubs in February 2013.

A number of Clubs responded and a small sub-committee of the Executive Committee, including the League Chairman, Treasurer and Chair of Grounds and Facilities adjudicated on the bids. In the event not all applicant clubs were able to proceed with their projects, but the following grants were made on presentation of proof of expenditure:

Beddington	New sightscreen	£500
East Molesey	New sightscreen and other works	£1,000
Reigate Priory	Boundary rope	£500
Walton	Water sopper	£250
Warlingham	Improvement to practice facilities	£500
Worcester Park	New sightscreen	£500

A further round of the scheme was announced in November and the results of that will be announced in the course of 2014.

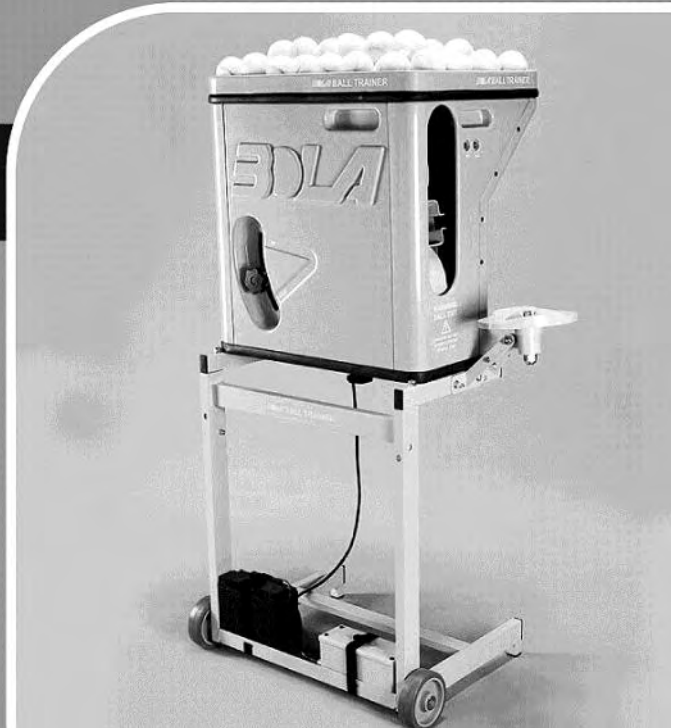

Overseas and County Contracted Players – **ALL** must be registered before they play in any Surrey Championship match and no later than 9.00pm on the Wednesday before the relevant league match. The closing date for registration is 31st May, unless a County Contract is obtained after 31st May when they must be registered immediately they obtain the contract. Just one Full Overseas Player per club per season is permitted. Contracted Players may only play for 1st XIs. (*O & PCs 12, 13, 14 & 15*). See Schedule One paragraphs 7(d) (2) for Premier 1st XI regulations for Contracted players.

In addition, ALL 1st XI players of whatever category, who play in Premier and First Divisions, must be registered on Play-Cricket by midnight on 30 April. Any subsequent registration must be made by 9.00pm on the Wednesday before the relevant league match. (*Schedule One, paragraph 7(b)*).

Any County Contracted player CURRENTLY registered for a club in the previous season does not have to re-register each year if he continues to play for that same Member Club. However, if he changes County Club or Member Club he must be re-registered with his new details.

Any Contracted Player who subsequently leaves a club must be de-registered from that club with immediate effect. (See Playing Conditions 12 (d))

Notification of Match Results and Details

RULE 10(d)

If a representative of the home XI in any 1st, 2nd or 3rd XI league match fails to update Play-Cricket with the summary result of the match, including scores in abandoned matches and matches where there is no play, by 10:00 am on the Sunday morning following the match, the Member Club so in default ("the defaulting club") will be fined £20 on the first occasion, £40 on the second occasion and have a one point deduction on all other occasions. For failing to provide summary result details, as defined in (i) below, the home XI will be fined £10 for the first two occasions in any season and thereafter during that same season £20 for each default.

- For the purpose of this rule the summary result shall consist of: Name of Teams, including Division and XI, Toss details, who batted first, Runs scored, Wickets lost, Overs faced, the result of the match and points for each side.
- In addition to the above, but NOT subject to fine if not given, the following should be reported: performances of individual players of 50 runs or more, five or more wickets, hat tricks, four catches or three stumpings.

If by the Thursday following the league match in question, any missing information detailed in paragraph 10(d) and 10(d)(i) above has not been received by the Results Secretary a fine of £20 will be imposed on the defaulting club. On each Thursday thereafter, until such time as the information is received by the Results Secretary, the defaulting club will be deducted one point in the relevant division.

Conventional photography with negatives allows the print to be enlarged to almost any size, provided that the negative is of reasonable quality. With digital images the size is pre-determined by the resolution, i.e. the number of pixels per inch (ppi) that make up the image. If these are enlarged, then the pixels can start to show.

For the technically inclined, images viewed on a monitor, or output to a digital printer, are equivalent to 72ppi at same size (100%). Images reproduced in this Year Book are at 300ppi, i.e. nearly four times larger. This means that images viewed 100% at 72ppi will reproduce at only ¼ of the size when printed in the Year Book.

So, always shoot important pictures on your digital camera (**not** mobile phone) at the **highest resolution** it will allow, and save to disc. They can always be re-sampled smaller, or compressed, later but they cannot be enlarged without loss of quality. The bigger, the better!

One last request: When supplying photos for inclusion in the Year Book do I.D. all shown; and, please ensure that you have obtained the relevant permission to print the picture and the name of any young person under 18 involved. Sad, but necessary these days I am afraid.

Standout overall performers were Dan Goodwin (373 runs @ 41.44 and 28 wickets @ 23.79), Tom Eadon (381 @ 42.33 with back to back 100s), Will Murday (288 @ 36 including a century), Ryan Foley (26 wickets @ 21.88) and Will Bevan (21 @ 28.71).

The best innings came from Will Murday (121 vs. Old Hamptonians), Tom Eadon (108 vs. Maori Oxshott and 105 vs. Kingstonian) and best bowling from Ryan Foley (7-23 vs. Old Emanuel, and 5-8 vs. Old Ruts), Will Bevan (6-23 vs. Met Police) and Dan Goodwin (6-27 vs. Old Emanuel and 5-19 vs. Maori Oxshott). Ben Precious (5-19 vs. Old Hamptonians) was outstanding in the field and consistent with the ball. Jim Bridgeman took 13 catches both with the gloves and without.

With the right preparation the 2014 season will bring real success for this young and exciting team. More results like the 149 run victory over 2nd place Old Ruts and the 6 wicket win over Oxted will be the norm.

A season of two halves for the **2nd XI** would be no understatement, as the team registered five wins out of 8 in the limited over format but only one further win in the remaining 9 time games. The season started well with early wins over contenders Stoke D'Abernon and Chertsey but tailed off mid-season with availability; the only victory registered at Warlingham. The run-in proved fruitful as the team showed great character as the relegation spots loomed with victories in three out of the last four games.

The batting was held together by vice-captain Ben Yeo whose 521 runs included 6 fifties with a top score of 73. Only 3 others managed two hundred runs; Gavin van der Merwe 366 including a splendid 94 against Cobham Avorians, Greg Mclean a hard hitting 224 in only 6 knocks including 82 and 88 against Chessington and the skipper Russell Clayton mustering 258. Other performances of note included Chris Foster's dogged 62* at Hampton Wick, Dan Westinghouse's hard hitting 53 at Stoke and Phil Gay's 58 in the return fixture.

On the bowling front the skipper was leading wicket taker with 20 wickets @ 15, supported in the spin department by Nigel Walker (18 @ 16) and Sean van der Merwe (15 @ 22). The seam department was, as ever, reliant on the accuracy of Alistair Reeves (15 @ 29), ably assisted by recruit Mark Streather (17 @ 18).

The fielding was variable, with the 'blindlers' caught and easy catches dropped more often than not. Special mention must go to the youngsters who broke into the side towards the end of the season; both Harry Millett and Max Tidmarsh showing maturity beyond their years. The side look to having them around regularly next season.

Thanks, as ever, to clubmen Ray Tucker for umpiring and Colin Gay for keeping an immaculate book. Thanks also to tea ladies Bernie and Maria.

The **3rd XI** repeated its performance of the previous campaign – a promising start results-wise, good individual performances across the board but ultimate disappointment as commitment fizzled out and the team was expelled from the League following its third scratched fixture.

Captain Mati Haidar led the team with aplomb all through the season whilst contributing with both bat and ball. Indeed Mati took the batsman of the season award for his consistency and application. Bowler of the season honours went to Anurag Verma who finished as leading wicket taker despite not always getting the just rewards that his nagging and disciplined line and length deserved. The evergreen Dave Owen was fielder of the season and was the perfect team man as usual.

It was disappointing that early wins against East Molesey and Chessington did not translate into consistent success or even the ability to finish a full league programme. It seems that the team reflects the modern cricketing economic situation and the committee have much work to do to ensure that the 3rd XI can be an on-going concern. With the help of the members and the admirable core players of the 3rd XI the side believe that this can happen.

The bare facts of the **1st XI** season make for disappointing reading. The team recorded only 3 wins and 2 draws from 17 matches, amassing 38 points to finish bottom of Division 2.

Relegation is often a reflection of a disunited team, but that was singularly not the case at Ashford. This was the most together squad for some years. The decision was made to cease to offer selected players inducements to play, the result being that every member of the team knew he was playing with 10 other guys who were turning out because they cared about the Club not because they were receiving an inducement. The positive effect on team spirit, despite the generally adverse results, was tangible.

The strength of the squad was understandably weakened by the change in policy, but hopes had been high that the team could perform and hold their Division 2 status. The loss of last year's leading run scorer Dan Rose to work commitments was an unforeseen setback, and was undoubtedly a significant element of the team's main shortcoming this year; a lack of runs. Only two batsmen totalled more than 250 runs and not once did the team pass 200. Low totals gave the bowlers little opportunity to influence results. Only four bowlers passed 10 wickets, although all ran in valiantly to the last ball in often hopeless circumstances.

Was it the right decision to remove inducements? Time will tell, but it is in many ways a sad reflection of modern club cricket that the side even needs to ask the question. Despite the lack of prize money, increasing numbers of clubs seem to think it is a necessity to purchase talent, often just to hold their position in a non-Premier Division. This cannot be a sustainable model in the long term either financially or in terms of bringing youngsters through for the club, county and national sides of the future.

This year's **2nd XI** season was seen as successful. The side maintained its place in the league and relegation was never a threat. The team started with a point from a rained off game. Although not the ideal start, it got the side off the mark and a good streak of wins at the start of the 100 over games left the team in a good position with a possible chance of promotion. Unfortunately, the side once again showed on its day it could beat anyone but when it was not its day it could collapse with ease. A solid mid table position is a fair representation of the season. This season saw limited availability for some members of the team, who when they did play made vital contributions, but it is pleasing to report that when these players were unavailable the team stepped up and performed with distinction.

Leading the way with bat in this year's league campaign were Gareth Evans with 258 runs @ an average of 51.6, Chris Davies with 255 runs @ 36.43, and Ben Simper who played a crucial opening role and was nothing if not consistent getting the team off to a good start most weeks, with 254 @ 23.09.

The main bowlers this year were: Graham Doggett with 23 wickets @ 16.13 from 101.5 overs; the returning Zain Hussain made a good contribution after an absence from the club with 16 @ 17.69 with figures of 6-86 against Sinjungrammarians; and Paul Wilson whose tight lines definitely accounted for more than his 15 wickets. A mention to Ian Doggett as well who floated between 1st and 2nd XIs this year with a contribution of 12 wickets with the ball including a 22 over spell taking 5-60.

Thank you to Rob Ford for standing in when the captain was not available.

A season with some highs and lows ended with Ashford **3rd XI** finishing a respectable 5th. Overall this position was a fair reflection of the season with players often showing good qualities, but sometimes without consistency from week to week. As in previous seasons the team spirit won many games; the players gave their all every week.

Three players scored over 200 runs with Hasib Butt again topping the 3rd XI totals with 238 @ 59.5. Chris White scored 231 @ 25.67; and Paul Cousens scored 215 @ 19.55. Players scoring over 100 runs in the season included: Gareth Evans with 164 runs in 4 games before playing the rest of the season in the 2nd XI; Daniel Simper with 151 @ 25.17 (who missed half the season through injury), Christopher Lunn with 140 @ 35; Zafir Dar with 105 @ 17.5 and Tahir Malik with 115 @ 19.17.

Bowling for the 3rd XI was led by Taimoor Anwar with 15 wickets. He bowled with great consistency throughout the whole season. Young Jamie Tilt took 11 wickets and is surely one for the future. Excellent backup was found in Patrick Daye (10 wickets), Iffy Anwar and Craig Simpson. Hafeez Khan, Tahir Malik, Molla Islam, Kevin Antonio, Zafir Dar and Liju Lazar also took wickets.

Wicket keeping was shared by Daniel Simper, who snared 5 catches, and Chris Lunn with 5 catches and 1 stumping. Both kept very solidly behind the stumps. Daniel constantly saved possible byes from bad balls and made a real positive difference to the team.

Thanks are due yet again to the groundsman for preparing the pitch, which really is one of the best. Teas, produced by Nevin and Amber, were greatly appreciated by the team and opposition throughout the season.

The **4th XI** earned a fifth place finish in the Western Division. Leading an Ashford side for the first time, Qaisar Sheikh captained a 4th XI with a typical blend of youth and experience based around a core of Short Lane stalwarts - Jasdev Rehncy, Safdar Butt and wicket-keeper Keith Pryke (until he dislocated his finger). The team continued to provide a vital opportunity to introduce colts to longer-format cricket, and hopefully those that have played have enjoyed their experiences and the team will see more of them playing next year in the 4th XI and higher elevens.

Farhan Boota (28 wickets @ 15.14) led the attack picking up 5 or more wickets on three separate occasions, supported by all-rounder Fahad Bhatti (18 @ 13.56) picking up two five wicket hauls and the return of Sean Culley is good news for the Club. Other notable bowling performances came from Zeeshan Hussain (6 for 10 against Egham) and Zafir Dar (5 for 25 against East Molesey).

The batting was led by Fahad Bhatti (336 runs @ 112) with contributions made by others during the season with three individuals scoring 50 or more in a game: Qaisar Sheikh (65 & 61), Liam Manning (57), and Safdar Butt (63)

Although the season had its ups and downs, to finish fifth in what was a difficult season with varied availability is very respectable. Everyone that played this season gave 100% and the two outstanding players were Fahad Bhatti and Farhan Boota. Thanks to all the players; without whom there would be no team. Everyone's contribution to the team is important whether that was in the field, batting or bowling. Thanks are due to Nev and Amber for producing the teas, which were greatly appreciated by everyone and to the groundsman, Andy Goulding, for preparing the pitches throughout the season.

The 2013 season was bitterly disappointing for Ashtead **1st XI**, resulting in relegation to Division 2; a complete contrast to 2012 where the team fell one point short of cementing a place in the Premiership.

After an encouraging win at Farnham in the first week, the prospects looked bright. A lack of consistency resulted in a string of defeats which proved to be the defining feature of the season. There were some encouraging signs, notably beating Dulwich twice and the eventual league winners Leatherhead. Losing can become a difficult pattern to break, but the efforts shown by the entire squad leave very encouraging signs for the forthcoming season.

Fred Davies (448 runs) was a standout performer and was justifiably rewarded with a few Surrey 2nd XI games towards the end of the season. Fred, a former Ashtead colt, is certainly a name for the future. This season also saw the emergence of left arm spinner Tom Homes (10 wickets). At just 15 years of age, he is a real prospect! Little Tom Deighton (29 wickets @ 41) was, once again, very reliable but with no other bowler managing 20 wickets, it was no wonder that bowling sides out was a major challenge.

After a slow start, Stewart Cameron (409 runs) found form, including a blistering 87 at Cheam, only to be outshone by Danny Miller's 70 ball century for the opposition. Dom Sibley contributed massively with both bat and ball; all the Club were delighted to see his progression into the Surrey 1st XI and the history books.

The side was once again led by the ever reliable John Vaughan-Davies, a man small in stature but big in heart. He leads from the front and had a commendable year with the bat (429 runs @ 29). With a wealth of talent in the ranks, the 1st XI aims to bounce back into Division 1 next season.

Having gained promotion to the Premier Division of the **2nd XI** league, the Ashtead 2nd team set out to consolidate their position in the highest form of 2nd team cricket in the County. However, just as was the case in 2010, the Stags found the jump in standard from Div 1 to Premier 2nd team cricket too high a barrier. There were a number of strong individual performances and indeed some good team victories, but very unfortunately for the Stags, the place in Premier League which had been fought for so hard was lost and the side found itself relegated to Division 1.

The side was very well led by the experienced Steve Tyson who managed to work with a young side, which bodes well for the future. The skipper was more than ably supported by the experienced Gary Martin, who contributed 594 runs at an average of 54, with two centuries and four half centuries. George Tyson also scored his maiden century in averaging over 30 across the season. Young Sam Homes, was not far behind him, scoring over 300 runs at an average of 28 and with young players such as Tom Dunn, Hayden Storey,

Seb Stewart-Taylor and many others coming through, there is room for optimism.

The bowling was led by off-spinner Sam Homes who picked up 20 wickets at an average of 29 and Tom Dunn with 18 wickets at an average of 23. Plenty of other young bowlers showed signs of promise and it is hoped that all players in the squad will have benefitted from the experience of Premier League cricket and will come back all the stronger next season.

After a slow start losing the first four games, things looked bleak for the **3rd XI** with no points on the board. The very young squad, with no one performing consistently, were under no illusion how tough a season it was going to be but it was to give everyone a chance to perform with the bat, the ball or both.

A close one wicket loss away to Dulwich when defending 230 gave the side some confidence to turn things around and a convincing victory against Guildford and a valiant losing draw against Spencer followed.

The use of a young squad invariably means results improve once schools and universities have broken up and so it was to be with the Ashted 3s. Better availability from June meant victories against Beddington, Weybridge, Sutton and Guildford and a close fought 2 wicket loss to the eventual league leaders Wimbledon. The upshot was that Ashted retained their position in the 3rd team Premier League.

In a very young attack, top wicket takers were Nick Williams, Connor Caprano-Wint, Aaron Rose and Marcus Caprano-Wint, all of whom are still at school. The batting was lead by Charlie Poutney with 314 runs and young Hayden Storey, who made his way into the 2nd team eventually and also was the Club's leading run scorer with 1100 runs in all forms of cricket.

The **4th XI** were the first of the Ashted XIs to have attained Premier League status, it was very disappointing to say "goodbye" to Premier League cricket, albeit, hopefully, temporarily. Premier League cricket is a hard school, whatever level it is played at and the 4th team is no exception. As is the case throughout the Club, the 4s rely heavily on school boys and students so the early part of the season is always a battle. Getting sides out in the early days of the season was hard work and all credit goes to skipper Peter Suddell and Andy Storey for the hours they put in in this regard. Consistency of availability was also an issue, with the Club using a staggering 57 players in its fourth team!

There were some bright moments, notably the development of Sam Gale who scored 174 runs at an average of 43 and the introduction of young Ben Sidwell who scored a maiden unbeaten league half century. Veterans Gyan Vishnoi, David Whiteley and Paul Williams undertook the brunt of the bowling, but again there were promising signs of youth in Patrick Murray, Connor Caprano-Wint and Ollie Cooper.

The main challenge for next season is better availability. If this can be tackled over the winter, there is every reason to hope the Club can come back strongly next season.

Harpo did a good job opening the batting and keeping, standing up to almost every bowler.

All in all the season has marked something of a changing of the guard with 6 players making 1st XI debuts this year. With an additional player or two, the side has potential to go much further next year.

Congratulations must go to Epsom for their remarkable season and Chipstead for being promoted. Thanks to the Bank staff for the superb playing area.

The pre-season optimism and verve demonstrated by new **2nd XI** skipper Walder was unfortunately eroded by the manner of early season defeats. 2013 was a transitional year for the **1st XI** with a lot of new players joining the club. Overall the side can be satisfied with the year and will now look to push on so that it can challenge the top of the table. The Player of the Season was Daniel Newton (617 runs @ 41) scoring two fine hundreds both against Wimbledon. Lastly, thanks must go to Harsha the overseas player and to Chairman Richard Condie for their help during the season.

Over the winter the **2nd XI** were much talked about as a lot of regular players from the previous season were not going to be playing. Captain Liam Burns broke his thumb badly playing rugby even before the season had got underway. Clive Offer led the first four games and managed one win before he also had to pull out through injury. Having suffered relegation in 2012, the **3rd XI's** primary objective for 2013 was to gain promotion back to the Premiership – a feat just managed (thanks to some help from Valley End, who beat the side's closest rivals in the last game of the season). Ian Thorley (391 runs @ 33), Jamie Stainer (371 @ 34) and Jack

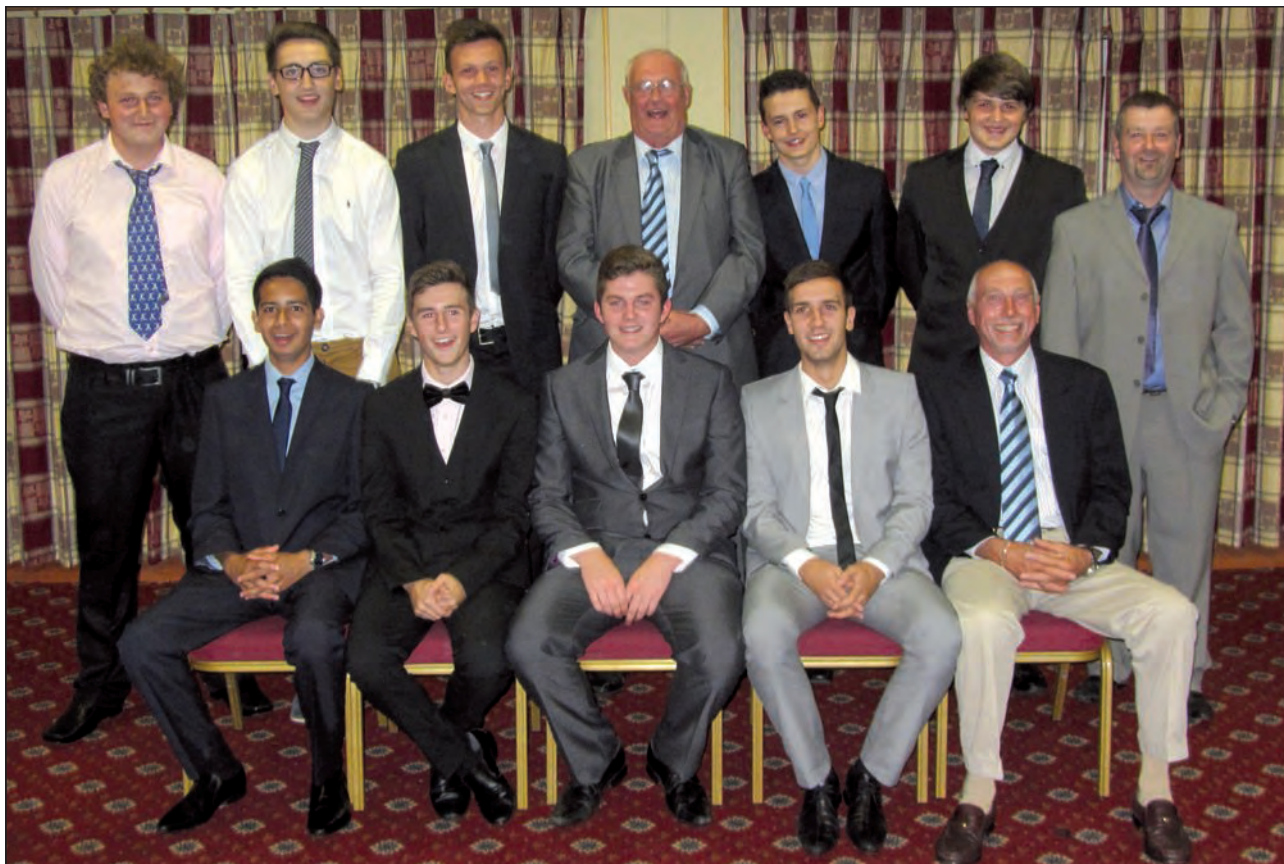

2013 proved a tumultuous year for the **1st XI** as poor availability and mixed performances resulted in a lower mid table finish.

With the ball, Cummins (28 wickets @ 22), Lack (25 @ 35) and Caines (24 @ 25) were the main stays of the attack providing both control and wickets throughout the year.

Highlights of the year were; firstly the two tied matches versus Old Whits, with the return fixture providing Tom Bevan the opportunity to score his maiden century for Beddington with a blistering knock which nearly single-handedly won Beddington the game chasing 212. Secondly David Lester's hat-trick versus Camberley removing three of the top four and leaving the home side reeling at 2 for 3. This strong start led to a fine team victory as Beddington knocked off 142 in a tight game with Caines and Lack taking the team over the line with a partnership of 80 for the 6th wicket.

As usual the team dynamic was strong with home grown players forming the backbone of the side, which

was well supported by recent acquisitions who have fitted in well with the club and its ethos. Thanks must go to the sterling work of Chris Burton who kept an immaculate book and provided much comedy throughout the year and particularly Mike Lewis who continues to drive the club forward throughout the sides.

Alex Basson bowled consistently well throughout the season taking 18 wickets @ 33. Shaun Lewis (332 @ 30) took 18 wickets @ 26; Fawad Bajwa (300 @ 25) plus 15 wickets @ 25. There was an excellent 92no against Trinity Mid-Whitgiftians from Gareth Williams as he amassed 223 runs @ 41. Scott Dance scored 191 @ 31; Antony Down scored 251 runs @ 41 and Nathan Pearson 245 @ 18.

So with a different side most weeks it was hard to play consistent cricket and make a real impact on the division. However, with the youngsters coming through including Jack Hargreaves, Seb Chmielinski and Louis Cooper-Stewart, combined with the return of a couple of senior players, there is a side that can contend at the other end of the table next year. Thanks to Tango for his scoring and especially Robbo for umpiring and his overall assistance.

A real struggle for the **3rd XI** this season that ended with relegation on the last day of the season, a lack of depth in the batting meant that totals of less than 100 were all too common place; it is a credit to the side that they fought until the final day of the season before relegation was confirmed. All 4 wins were achieved in the 50 over format, winning a couple of the closer timed games would have made all the difference.

The batting was led by Adam Trigwell with 402 runs at an average of 50 from 9 games, Chris Austin was next with 231 from 11 games, Seb Chmielinski performed well with the bat with 203 runs in six games and stood in as wicketkeeper on occasions and did an excellent job. Leading wicket taker were Sam Bartram with 17, skipper Kevin Horkan 14 and John Young 11 from his 7 games.

The **1st XI** season began full of hope and expectation. Spirits were high, recruitment had improved the team and pre-season was productive. However, after a bright start, Cheam's propensity for shooting itself in the foot, meant early promise faded as the summer drew on.

A perfect start of four wins from four games, led by Bradley Scriven's fantastic feat of scoring three consecutive hundreds, gave the side the belief that a serious push for promotion was a realistic goal. However, a long-standing inability to adapt its game to the longer format and a poor record against direct rivals, contributed to the side's ultimate downfall. Just three wins and importantly four defeats from nine 120 over games was hugely disappointing, as was the team's reluctance to learn from mistakes that were made.

Despite a late run of wins, the season effectively ended with an abandoned fixture against Normandy and a defeat to Old Whits in consecutive weeks. The last day loss at Leatherhead with a weakened side was irrelevant in terms of promotion, but cost Cheam a higher placed finish.

The season was not without exceptional performances. The stand out individuals were the aforementioned Scriven, whose 800 runs @ 57 including five centuries was an awesome return. Michael Burgess with an Australian winter behind him and batting at three throughout the season, responded with 783 runs @ 49 with two hundreds. On the bowling front, Jordy Thomas, an 18 year old Australian, was superb throughout the season: 29 wickets @ 22 does not do his skill and consistency full justice.

The overwhelming feeling at the end of the season was disappointment. Fifth was a massive underachievement for a side with these talents at its disposal. The fact that the problems and mistakes made over the season were almost entirely of the side's own making, make it even harder to accept. The 2014 season will pose many more challenges for Cheam Cricket Club.

With the 1st XI looking strong there were high hopes for the **2nd XI** at the start of the 2013 season. The return of Dan Johnson from a self-imposed exodus would add great strength with the bat, and with Michael Burgess playing each week MOD would provide some solidarity behind the stumps.

The early season dreams were soon put into perspective with 3 defeats in the first 4 limited overs games (which should have been the preferred format!). After stumbling through the middle part of the season, with 5 games left, relegation was a serious possibility. A 160 run stand between Kevin Brown and Max Gardner against Beddington meant only the rain could prevent a win.

Back to back victories against fellow strugglers Sanderstead and Mid Whits ensured safety for another year. Kevin Brown finished top run scorer with 402 run from 9 innings, with an average of 80. Paul Warbiss proved to be an excellent addition to the side with his 13 wickets coming at an average of 35.

The most promising aspect of the season was the emergence of 17 year old James Fenwick. Having played last year in the 3/4s, this year he made himself one of the first names on the team sheet. His 13 wickets came at an average of 25, including 6/38 vs. Beddington. When he wasn't taking wickets, he bowled with great control; a youngster to watch closely next year.

An allocation of 420 words, but it could be summed up in just three; "What a year!" A mix of up-and-coming talented youngsters and some senior **3rd XI** stalwarts (plus a couple of jokers masquerading as captain that fit in to neither category!) have somehow managed to come top of the pile and take the side back to the Premier Division for the first time in many, many moons. Winning 11 of the 18 league games has been a true team effort; the consistency of the side has paid dividends and has made the notoriously tough issue of selection a no-brainer for the majority of the season (no complaints here!).

On the bowling front, new signing Dean Carter led the way with 20 wickets (at an average just over 10; better will be expected next season!) with Alexander Kington in hot pursuit on 18. There were also another 5 bowlers (Tom Horwood, Daniel Archer, Edward Stovell, Arjun Amin and James Fenwick) all claiming over 10 wickets apiece. All of whom were backed up by some amazing efforts in the field, Jonny Cowlard claiming 17 victims although the entire side can be congratulated on a truly professional effort in the field all season long.

Batting has been a little more erratic, although there have been some standout performers. Toby Aiston has become an immovable object (ironically his running between the wickets is quite ok), irritating bowling attacks with his wall-like defence, resolute back-foot drive and determined mind set, as well as amusing us all with his pained attempts at six hitting! He finished the season with a remarkable average of 95. Dave Henry has also been getting his punishment in, scoring over 300 runs in his regular swashbuckling manner with strike rate to coincide, and Alexander Kington must surely win all-rounder of the year with his batting average of 42 to go with the aforementioned wickets.

The least consistent aspect of the side has been the captaincy... James Caddy (Team Administrator) and Tom Horwood have both rotated the helm over the course of the year and owe a great debt to Dan Archer for his role as Chief Motivator; couldn't have done it without that!

Finally, it's only appropriate to thank everyone who's played for the 3s this year; it's been a wonderful season played in a great spirit with a tremendous group of lads (and terrible, terrible banter). Here's to the Premier League!! DOLPHINS!!

In 2012, Cheam **4th XI** saw it all; from 'not quite disaster' to 'complete disaster' and from 'bottom of the Premier league' to 'not even in the Premier league!' So surely, now they were back where they belong, things could only get better this season...

After that however, came 4 losses on the trot, before bouncing back against Old Ruts meaning that the team finished in the obscurity of mid-table.

There were moments of complete farce, most notably in the away match to Crockham Hill, when two players entered the wrong postcode in their satnav and did not realise their mistake until surrounded by sheep in Ashford Forest. In the three campaigns that they've contested 18 Division 4 matches (2012's compliment was cut short by opposition sides folding) Phil Boast's team have enjoyed a year-on-year increase in the points tally. 2013's haul of 103 bettered the previous

record of 94 and ensured a second fourth place finish in three years. Three games of differing fortunes came and went before dreams of promotion became a realistic proposition, as the side won four games on the spin. However a run of two defeats, to eventual top-two Dorking and Stoke D'Abernon scuppered those chances while a points penalty against Allyn Honor Oak put paid to the idea altogether. Undeterred, the side continued to play with authority, winning four of the next five games, to end a very satisfying season.

Winning cricket and strong individual performances go hand in hand and that was no different here. With the willow, no less than nine squad members passed fifty, with middle-order aggressor Jake Taylor and opening stroke-maker James Richards both enjoying coming-of-age seasons. Taylor led the side with 339 runs @ 48.43. His top score of exactly 100 came in a memorable partnership with Richards (289 runs @ 26.27), who contributed 81, as the pair helped chase down 260 against Chessington. Boast and Tim Beer scored 258 and 236 runs respectively to make up the rest of the batting's main contributors. Meanwhile with the ball, Boast led from the front with 31 victims at an average of 16.8 and his best return of 5-25 helped set up the six wicket victory over Cobham Avorians. He was closely supported, as ever, by Mark Nuti who spun his way to 22 wickets @ 25.14, while the emergence of Jamie Chapman (20 wickets) as a new ball threat means the side will take a strong nucleus of players on to next season's promotion push.

Usually reliant on their consistency with the ball, the **3rd XI** enjoyed renewed collective batting form to ensure they will be playing third division cricket for another year. The 3rd XI had four batsman pass the double-ton threshold for the season; the first time since 2006 the team had more than two players score over 200 runs. What will please new skipper Dennis Perks most is that two of the three men to achieve the feat were new to the team. Kevin O'Flynn paced the side from first drop in his debut season, scoring his 238 runs aggressively and at an average of 29.75, with two half centuries. Falling one run behind O'Flynn was Sam Salt (237 @ 29.63), who spent much of his previous time with the club as a bowler in the Sunday and 4th XIs. His transformation into a capable top-order batsman was complete with his match winning knock of 75* against Esher, chasing 160 to win. The third member of the 200-club was the ever-dependable Martin Allen, who showed his class once again with a haul of 222 @ 22 while Richard Ley (166) and another newcomer, Phil Cork (121), also chipped in. The bowling department, somewhat surprisingly given the side's historical strength in this area, failed to contribute an individual five wicket haul this season, but still thrived thanks to its collective power. Last year's skipper Mark Pulling led the way with 22 scalps at 11.45 while a trio of youngsters gave him ample backing. John Bailey (13 wickets at 11.15) and Josh Jackman (13 at 23.46) impressed many with their consistent line and length, while Jamie Anthony claimed 11 wickets at a 10.18 average Ebenezer Scrooge would have been proud of had he ever donned whites. Those performances, along with many others, helped the side to a 12th placed finish and promise much for a higher finish in 2014.

Congratulations to both Cranleigh and Esher on their deserved promotions; thanks to the Brian Whittle and his grounds team who produce excellent facilities every week, the tea ladies for the best spread in the league, John Yarnley for scoring every week and finally the bar staff.

The young players continued to show signs of development. Alex and Ben Dombrandt both look increasingly comfortable at 2nd XI cricket while Alex Boosey continued to show promise as a fast bowler. Bring on 2014!

An ultimately disappointing, but nonetheless enjoyable **3rd XI** season initially promised a great deal but fell away badly in the latter stages. Lack of regular availability and numerous call ups from higher sides meant that the team changed considerably from week to week, which made it difficult to gain any form or consistency, such are the vagaries of 3rd XI cricket! Of those regularly available, Mark Bradley was consistent with the bat, often playing important innings in differing circumstances, sadly he lacked regular support, and too often the side was unable to post sufficient totals. Having said that, two innings which were the highlight of the season were Ammar Gujral's magnificent 120* vs. Kingstonian and Kris Sterling's undefeated ton against Esher. Mention must also be made of Paul Huitson's fantastic undefeated 80 odd at Malden Wanderers, where, after a generous declaration from the home skipper, CCWCC needed 4 from the last ball with the last pair at the crease and came up just short in the game of the season, having to settle for a draw 2 runs short of an unlikely victory.

The bowling suffered from a lack of strike bowlers from last year's successful side and despite everyone's best efforts the side was unable to pick up wickets regularly enough to maintain pressure and to achieve results. Hopefully things will improve in 2014.

Dulwich **1st XI** had one of their toughest seasons of recent years and were relegated to Division 2. The opening match epitomised the campaign ahead for the players. Having been bowled out for just 105, Dulwich managed to take Old Whitgiftians down to the wire. With two runs required and only one wicket left, Old Whitgiftians made it past the post thanks to a dropped catch at third man. Had that catch been taken the season could have been very different.

Many of the players showed resilience and strength of character in the face of great adversity. Anil Mahey managed to compile the highest runs total (463 @ 27) and Chris Lester included two five-wicket hauls amongst his 20 wickets.

The highlight of the season was the great effort of the players in the two games against Farnham. Having travelled for what always seems a life-time, the team managed to produce a fine bowling performance away from home, reducing Farnham to 181, helped by a superb spell of off-spin bowling from Salaar Waqar (18-5-36-5). Following Nick Hudson's lead with 68, the total was chased down, albeit with a few hiccups along the way. The return fixture (the final game of the season) was equally successful and the team's only other victory. Excellent bowling from Naeem Iqbal (9-1-26-3) and Levi Oliver (10-5-16-3) saw Farnham dismissed for 131 before Anil Mahey (43), Jonathan Lewis (28) and Gareth Cornick (28*) led a solid run chase.

Although a season to forget, that win in the last match helped restore a little confidence and acted as a basis upon which to build the team's campaign for 2014. Sincere thanks to John Lewis for his first-class scoring and unfailing support.

The **2nd XI** had a reasonably successful season and finished fifth in Division 1. A run of five wins and just one defeat in eight games midway through the summer gave the team a real chance of reclaiming their Premier Division spot at the first attempt, but a crucial defeat at the hands of promotion rivals East Molesey on 17th August put paid to their hopes.

A more settled side would undoubtedly have done better, but availability was mixed and as a result the team was constantly chopping and changing. One of the more regular players, Stuart Ferguson was the leading run scorer with 315 @ 28.6. Skipper Gareth Cornick (264 @ 44) batted really well early on before being promoted to bolster the 1st XI batting; Ed Kemp hit three half-centuries in just seven innings, totalling 220 @ 44, whilst Nick Hudson made 251 @ 35.9, which included an excellent 124, the team's only century, in the home win over Valley End.

Tom Gatenby led the bowling department with 17 wickets @ 13.8, and there were match-winning returns from spinners Alex Gledhill (7-25 vs. Sanderstead), Daniel Anthony (6-29 vs. Cheam) and medium pacer Kieran Reeves (6-41 vs. Trinity Mid-Whitgiftians). Many thanks go to regular umpire Mel Stevens.

The **3rd XI** also showed many changes during the season but still managed ten victories and finished in

fourth position. A highlight was defeating eventual champions Wimbledon both home and away.

Euan Johnson showed increasing maturity and scored most runs, 278 @ 34.8, whilst Raj Tulsiani (262 @ 29.1) and Andy Bailey (210 @ 26.3), who shared the captaincy, were the other batsmen to exceed 200 runs.

Richard Beckett bowled steadily throughout with 16 wickets @ 16.8, but the only other player to take ten or more wickets was late recruit Seb Ullah who also recorded 163 runs @ 40.8 with some explosive batting in the middle order.

A number of promising youngsters were given chances in the latter half of the season and most acquitted themselves well, in particular 16-year-old Chris Stone, who made 68 against Reigate Priory, and Patrick George with his left-arm spinners. Thanks go to umpire Alan Edwards.

After back-to-back triumphs, the **4th XI** was hunting a hat-trick of Premier Division titles.

Despite losing to old rivals Wimbledon in the second game of the season, a string of impressive victories saw the team top the table in mid-June, when they managed to win at Normandy on a day that saw many fixtures abandoned due to persistent rain. A mixture of wins and winning draws saw the team in second place when Wimbledon visited Dulwich in early August. As with the first meeting of the sides, Wimbledon proved the better team and won by four wickets, the loss all but ended the hat-trick dream for Dulwich.

The title may have eluded the side and a final day loss at Reigate Priory meant being nudged into third place by Sunbury, but it was a season full of fine performances. Ten different batsmen passed fifty, with Kamran Munawar making a century at Guildford with some breath-taking batting. Obafemi Shokoya chipped in with two half-centuries on his way to 180 runs for the team and, most pleasing of all, three of the Club's younger players, Greg Bond, Sam Ellison and Chris Stone each scored fifties. With the ball, it was medium pacers Rezaul Haque (18 wickets @ 12.2) and captain Simon Bailey (16 @ 14.6) who led the way, with Mangal Nasiri also making a considerable contribution to an ever-reliable attack. A season containing 11 wins and just three losses will certainly go down as a success and the team will be looking to come back in 2014 to mount a serious challenge for the title again. Following a successful 2012 campaign, the **1st XI** returned to the Premier League for the first time in over 20 years. The side was strengthened by the arrival of Tom Scollay and Tim Handle alongside the return of opening bowler Henry Jones and former captain Sam Burge. Confidence in maintaining Premier League status grew after a narrow 13 run defeat in the opening game against Wimbledon which saw the team compete well throughout. Unfortunately, this was a theme which continued throughout the season with a slight lack of experience contributing to the team not being able to press home the advantage in match winning positions. Nevertheless, memorable victories were managed against Sutton, Malden Wanderers, Reigate Priory and Guildford, the latter two being thanks to match winning bowling performances from Henry Jones (18-7-31-3) and Ross Paxton (10.2-3-16-5) respectively.

Notable performances came from Sam Burge (604 runs), Tom Scollay (483 runs and 24 wickets), Henry Jones (21 wkts) and Ross Paxton (20 wkts).

Despite finishing 9 points adrift of safety the season was an enjoyable learning curve for a young side, the majority of whom have been developed through the club's thriving colts section. The experience gained will stand the side in good stead in future years as the long term ambition of playing Premier League cricket continues to be worked towards.

2013 has obviously been a successful **2nd XI** season and is a product of many years of hard work from a lot of people within the club. There is no doubt that the 2nd XI are about to embark on a standard of cricket that is long overdue, and thoroughly deserved!

Batting wise: there was some excellent dealing in the January transfer window and EMCC managed to secure the free transfer of Toby Green from Woking & Horsell. Toby scored well over 300 runs for the 2s before getting the call up to the 1s where he then went on to score 95* against one of the best sides in the league, Weybridge. Other notable contributions with the bat came from Nick Stevens who scored 367 runs, and took 16 wickets behind the stumps. Neil Campbell again chipped in with 312 runs.

Bowling wise: this year the side was very much blessed with having too many options, which is always a great position to be in when captaining. Most teams were subject to a very hostile opening burst from Gavin McMillian (36 wkts) and Nuno Bernades (19 wkts), and tended to be followed up with the usual guile from Ben Campbell (16 wkts), Henry Glynn (12 wkts), Jack Miller (26 wkts) and Nilesh Odehra (8 wkts).

There were quite a few highlights this season: batting wise the performance of the season was George Cairns remarkable 170* away at Valley End.

Player of the year: It was a relatively easy decision and pretty unanimous, Gavin McMillian. His bowling has been superb this year, with some very hostile spells at 2nd XI level, taking 36 wickets. His batting has also been a serious asset, scoring >200 runs with the majority being scored in boundaries.

Obviously next season is going to be tough, however it is definitely not beyond the realms of the team, and not beyond the realms for every team within this club; this is just a starting point, and will look to cement a place in the top division of 2nd XI cricket. Hopefully with the 2nd XI in the Premier league it will aid the 1st XI in its quest to regain Premier league status. Equally for those youngsters at the club, it will be a very good standard of cricket, and something to aspire to play in. It will require hard work from all involved, and there will be no room for complacency; the side looks forward to the challenges that await in the 2014 season!

It was a **3rd XI** season that brought back pride, the winning habit and self-belief to the Moles plus many positive outcomes which Moles will be taking to the 2014 summer.

The promising young bunch of players such as Billy Dawson, Micky Strang and Senura Jayasinghe, the return of some of the experienced players such as Kevin Ingram, Chet Stringfield and Tom Whitehead and two veteran seam bowlers (Kevin Lawler and Pal Sarai) who claimed no. 2 and 3 spots in the leading wicket takers table in the league. In addition, there were improved performances in the batting department, in terms of averages and total individual scores.

In summary, 2013 was one the best seasons for East Molesey 3rd XI cricket team for some years. However, now the side is challenged with a bigger task, competing on a higher level with more competitive and talented opponents. Thus, it is essential that Moles start planning and preparation for the season early and make sure the players are trained for the bigger challenges both mentally and physically.

Many thanks, as always, to Jan and family for the best teas in the league, and to Debbie for scoring, running round after the team and generally making things happen off the pitch.

The turning point of the **2nd XI's** season was the game against Streatham & Marlborough. With four games of the season left it was imperative that the side win all its remaining matches to stand a chance of going up. Streatham batted particularly well to a total of 278 for 4. Egham were up against it but managed to chase it down with 4 overs to spare. The next big challenge was against Oxted & Limpsfield, who were in third place with a game to go and Egham fourth. Egham won the toss and batted to 228, with the help of a Bradley Staight hat-trick the side had enough on a wearing wicket. Due to Maori Oxshott being docked 20 points (after already being promoted) and losing the same weekend the team jumped from fourth to second. On the final league game of the season the side managed to overcome the new champions Old Whitgiftians to achieve its first promotion for five seasons. For the most part the team was excellent except for an

indifferent run at the start of the summer holidays, due to poor availability.

Mention needs to be made to Wayne Johncock, Jamie Hamilton and James Sprackling all of whom scored over 400 league runs. As for the bowling Egham had four bowlers averaging 20 or below making it a particularly miserly bowling attack, especially on the slower paced wickets. Particular mention has to be made of Amod Pandit and Bradley Staight who performed well with the ball in hand. As for the all-rounders, two young lads Adam Dix and Harry Morris both scored invaluable runs and very useful wickets when the situation was most demanding. An outstanding season the team can barely wait for a new one to begin.

It was a frustrating season for the **3rd XI** with a nasty sting at the tail. The first half of the season was marked by limited availability and the fielding of understrength sides in comparison with recent seasons. The high point was a good win against Purley. Good, consistent batting performances were in limited supply in the first half of the season, the notable exceptions being Charlie Newton's 97 at Chessington and Toby Prior's 53* vs. Alleyn & HO. Chris Nash produced some superb knocks vs. Woking & H, Alleyn & HO and East Moseley at the front of the order in the later stages to good effect. There were some strong bowling performances across the season. Gavin Byrom (25 wickets @ 15) and Rohit Moudgil (22 @ 17) were excellent throughout and should take much credit. The club wishes Gavin well as he moves back to Merseyside. With 2 wins versus Leatherhead and Alleyn & HO pulling out of the league it was thought relegation had been avoided. Unfortunately an administrative error meant a 19 point deduction and consequently relegation, to much disappointment, at the season's close.

The **4th XI** year started with light availability and quite rightly a number of last year's side getting their chance to prove themselves as budding players for the 3rd XI. As normal the team turned to the colts for new talent. The team says a big thank you to all the colts' coaches for doing such a good job during the closed season giving the 4th XI a nucleus of colts from which to rebuild the side.

The colts provided a good selection of batsman and bowlers: Crawford Wilson, Cam Clark and Dan Telford all performed well and have matured throughout the season. The team was also lucky enough to find 2 new adults to bolster the team this year Tim Campbell and Danny Richardson who gave the 4th XI a little more rigidity in the batting and bowling areas.

The season showed some real personal efforts with the bat and the ball as well as fielding: Ram Bala scored 272 @ 24.7, Crawford Wilson 146 @ 16.3 and Danny Richardson 148 @ 24.7. The bowlers were George Matthews with an average of 13.9, Crawford Wilson 10.3 and Michael Hawes 16.9.

In the field a young man for whom it was his first year playing senior cricket ended up showing that in the field he had the heart of a lion, Cam Clark. If he continues to improve the way he has this year, who knows what lies ahead for him.

Thanks must go to everyone who once again put so much into their cricket this year with bat, ball and fielding to make this season as enjoyable and special as ever. Also it was nice not to end up last in the league. Thanks also to everyone behind the scenes at Egham CC who make it possible to enjoy cricket every weekend during the season, without these people there would be no Egham CC.

Esher's successful campaign was founded upon excellent contributions from their top six batsmen. The

prolific openers Hopkinson (637) and Ahmed (538) produced an average partnership of 74. Mason (439) and Lowe (426) also scored heavily and several match winning innings were played by Mutucumarana (264) and Scott (227). The bowling was led, once again, by the excellent Irshad with 40 wickets. He was ably supported by Lowe (20), Scott (16), Mason (15), Lane (14) and Winder (13).

Esher started the season in grand style with emphatic wins against Chessington and Trinity. The first set-back came in game three against Walton. At the start of June, back to back wins were completed against Worcester Park and Ashford. A superb 145 from Hopkinson helped to chase 264 for a thrilling last ball victory against Worcester Park.

The timed matches did not start well; an abandonment against Pyrford and winning draws against Purley and Cranleigh. July saw Esher return to form with victory against Horsley & Send. Walton outplayed Esher again and it was left to the last pair of Winder and Meadows to bat for 25 overs to salvage a losing draw.

On a bowler-friendly pitch, Esher posted a very decent total of 229 against Worcester Park, after being 122-8. Worcester Park were then shot out for 89. This started a run of 5 consecutive victories which took Esher to the top of the table. On another bowler-friendly pitch, Chessington were bowled out for 51 (Irshad 5-13 and Lowe 5-28). After another comfortable win against Trinity, totals of 314-2 and 319-5 were too good for Ashford and Pyrford, respectively.

With 2 games to go, Esher travelled to Cranleigh knowing that victory would secure promotion and the title. Esher batted first and were bowled out for an under-par score of 213. Cranleigh made light work of chasing down the total. However, promotion was secured as Chessington had lost!

Esher faced Horsley & Send in the final match, knowing they had to better Cranleigh's result to be champions. Esher secured a bonus point victory but news filtered through that Cranleigh had won by 5 wickets. So Esher had to settle for the runners-up spot. Congratulations to champions Cranleigh, who claimed their 3rd consecutive promotion!

Esher are looking forward to the return of Division 1 cricket in 2014. Many thanks to scorer Gary Furness.

Esher **2nd XI** season promised a lot after a strong finish last season that saw the team push close for promotion. Disappointingly, this season was very different and, following a string of spilled catches, batting collapses and underperformance, the team was relegated.

At times there were glimpses of the form of last summer, as Henry Witten and Joseph Gilhooly recorded centuries; there was the occasional fifty and some mid order power hitting. Generally speaking across the season the top order failed to score the runs required; it was not for a lack of ability or starts, but application.

The bowling was solid throughout the season, with Ejaz Hussein and Jim Steven being notable performers. However, the old cliché that catches win matches rings true. Certainly holding more of them would have helped to stave off relegation. With a few exceptions (some flyers taken by Mesome Hussein and John Woollhead in the slips and by Henry Witten and Joe Gilhooly in the outfield), the catching was shambolic. This is an area that, along with application with the bat, needs to be addressed if this team is to bounce back next year. Fielding and catching in particular are an area that, across a season, a team has some control over through solid preparation, but this year Esher 2s regularly failed to prepare as they should.

The season has finished and pride needs to be restored next year. Esher 2s had the talent and opportunities to build on last summer's successes, often fielding stronger sides than had been possible for a while, but failed to do so. Next year let's hope it is a different story.

It was definitely a **3rd XI** season of two halves. The club struggled at the start to raise a side but later in the season, with a settled side and emerging juniors, it picked up 5 victories to end up finishing 10th.

The stand-out batsmen was Callum Allbrook, who at 16 developed promisingly from last season to be top run scorer (228 runs @ 32). His 86 not out against West End was a well-constructed match winning performance. Guy Simpkin (159 @ 27) and Chris Burton (131 @ 33) contributed well. Three more juniors, Ben Littlewood, Harry Alderson and William Tilston, showed tremendous application and technique, each scoring undefeated big fifties. However, to challenge for promotion next season, the batters will have to contribute more and bat with more patience.

Bowling remains the strength, with plenty of variety and threat. The bowlers stayed positive, applying themselves well throughout the season. The stand-out bowler was Azhar; regardless of conditions or age of the ball, he moved it both ways, troubling every batsman, resulting in 3 "5 fers" and great economy. Richie Harrison put it on the spot from first to last, always troubling batsmen with flight and spin.

The stand-out game of the season was played in front of the biggest crowd, in the rain and dark, when the side lost by a narrow margin to the eventual league champions. The game ebbed and flowed and in the end the conditions proved to be harder to bowl and field in that to bat in. Throughout the season, the team played in fantastic spirit, umpired neutrally and respected the opposition: well done to all.

This season 48 players represented the 3rd XI. Many thanks to all who played and supported, to Dimi for acting as vice-captain again with great enthusiasm and to Chris Burton and Imran Khan, who both filled in as captain when necessary.

Five home victories for the **1st XI** against the top five sides in the league were eventually enough to stave off relegation in Farnham's return to Division 1. The first half of the season was defined by missed opportunities and the side languished at the bottom of the table. Only 18 year-old George Dale shone with some fine fast bowling; 20 wickets in his debut season make him a real prospect. He led the way amongst many young players who are securing first team places as the squad continues to rejuvenate. Mention too should be made of Joel Walker who showed class with the gloves before being promoted to the top of the order where he struck back-to-back fifties and Angus Boobbyer whose 143 versus Leatherhead was as good a knock as you will see.

However, it was the old guard that came to the fore when the club needed them and it was the home game against Cheam that turned fortunes. Captain Guy Hicks (top run-scorer) led from the front with a gutsy hundred that allowed the rest of the top-order to express themselves on the way to 320-4 declared. This was the highest score at the Park for many years and testament to the improvements made by groundsman Rob Dale who also chipped in with 17 wickets. Farnham then bowled out a strong Cheam line-up for 171 thanks largely to the ever-beguiling spin of Tom Hicks. Tom was, once again, leader with the ball and his 23 wickets in only half a season were vital in claiming four of the five victories.

After this victory, the side grew in confidence and Aaron Williams stood up to be counted with some stylish late-season innings. It was left to the Dorset pair of Williams and Hicks to steer the team to victory and safety in a crucial game against Camberley, ready to make a bigger impact on the league next term.

The **2nd XI** season never really ignited. Six wins and six losses with a final league position of 6th. Good positions were squandered too often and only a couple of games will be remembered from the season: almost beating the league champions Sunbury in a great run chase at the Park and the tied match away at Sanderstead when taking their last 3 wickets for only 1 run. There is enough talent in this side to challenge at the top but too often if one discipline succeeded the other failed in what ended up, ultimately, a very frustrating season. Of the batting, Toby Ward scored 363 runs at an average of 30 and Tom Grimes reached the 300 aggregate. Nathan Thorpe scored the only century and another half century in his limited appearances and, those apart, only Alec Goldsworthy would reach 200 runs.

He, though, can look back on a successful all round season. He finished leading wicket-taker with his slows, taking 24 in total including the only 5-for, ahead of his brother Robbie who led the seamers with 17. Newcomer Jamie Jones bowled some impressive spells and there were other limited successes for skipper Ian Thorpe with 13 wickets and George Osborne with 11.

On the field, bowling options were not an issue, with the majority of the team able to turn their arm over. Derek Agge (despite bowling on one good leg all year) still managed 200 overs and bagged 38 wickets @ 17. O'Day bowled with enthusiasm and found his stride later in the year taking 15 @ 27. Elgar opened smartly taking 23 @ 22 while veterans Nigel Churaman and John Milner bowled fewer overs than they would have liked but still picked up 24 and 11 wickets respectively.

Skipper Harri Mayne led from the front with the bat, scoring 538 runs @ 36, O'Day achieved 474 runs including a magnificent 141*, and Shepherd 445 with a top score of 156*, both highlights of the year. Strong middle order support came from Tom Hickey including a maiden century (115*).

Starting with three wins from three and the tails were up but after a few games got away from the team it became a frustrating middle season and the side knew August was going to be the hardest month as most of both teams were on holiday or attending events. Position in the table mid year not so good!

Finishing 4th this season therefore (our highest spot to date) came as a result of a great run at the end of the season and bodes well for 2014. Thanks to Helen Ross for scoring, John Milner for preparing more great wickets and umpires John Allen, Roger Cornelius and Simon Steel.

Having finished in the top half of the Premier Division for the first time since 2006, Guildford **1st XI** was keen to progress. Winning the opening three matches against Malden Wanderers, Spencer and East Molesey offered hope but a heavy defeat against Sunbury was then the start of a chastening run of results,

which brought one point in seven weeks.

The lowest point began when Guildford bowled out East Molesley for 116 thanks to Tom Jewell's remarkable 9-49. A collapse from 73-2 to 99 all out left scars which lasted the rest of the summer despite the best efforts of captain-coach Jeremy Greaves. Ironically it was a victory over Sunbury one week later which gave Guildford their only win in the time format – repeating 2012's poor form in these matches.

Guildford's record in 50-over cricket was far better so when relegation seemed a real possibility, finishing the campaign seeing off Banstead, Sutton and Weybridge meant a rebound to seventh.

The loss of key players from the previous year, irregular availability and asking too much of some of the youngsters at Premier level, were all negatives. Left-arm spinner Joe Pipkin's 30 wickets made him consistently the most reliable bowler although he lacked the support of Chris Coombs's off-breaks for much of the time due to injury and his finishing power at the end of an innings proved crucial.

With many injuries and absences among the bowlers, Tom Collins and Phil Nicholls did a steady job with the new ball in the final weeks. Alex Senn was comfortably the most consistent batsman with 507 runs and will be much missed. No one scored a century all season. Chris Thompson's 58, 5-23, three catches and a run out in the crucial match at Sutton were vital in securing victory.

Guildford must learn from the struggles of 2013, and become much better at the longer form of the game, to become a threat again.

A difficult year for the **2nd XI** ended in a relatively comfortable league position something which looked unlikely during the first half of the season. The season was split into 2 halves with the team really struggling until mid July when players released from school commitments ensured the club had improved availability.

The batting during the 1st half of the season was the primary reason for the struggles. Apart from Julian Hare, no batsmen imposed themselves on games and made significant scores. The bowlers however performed very well and consistently dug the batsmen out of the hole and almost won numerous games. Phil Nichols, Chris Weill and James Ashton all led the bowling during this time backed up with good performances by Neil Harding and Tom Shrives.

During the second half of the season the batting started to match the bowlers' standards and performances and results improved, culminating in victories over Banstead, Reigate Priory and Sutton to ensure Premier league survival. Then Nick and Jon French scored big and important runs during the second half which, in conjunction with aggressive opening batting from Henry Straw, allowed platforms to be built for significant scores. Cameron Spence and Jon French added to the good bowling performances to show how a full second team could have challenged for honours.

With good club recruitment over the winter the second team should be able to contest with the best teams of the league avoiding the drop zone. One benefit of the lack of availability this year has been the exposure of some of the younger players to regular 2nd team cricket and in Jon French, Freddie McMillan, Alex Sweet and Jonny Charles the side has found some quality juniors who will play an increasingly important role next year. Thanks to Ed Bailey for his scoring, Peter Twitchens for umpiring and Dave, Kev and Jane for the food.

Having been promoted to the **3rd XI** Premier following an undefeated season in 2012, the 2013 season could not have been more different. Due to a number of changes in personnel it was difficult to compete at the much stronger level offered by the Premier league. Guildford were able to win only two games but can take heart from the fact that they competed well early season without quite managing to get across the finishing line. Standout performances were few and far between. However, Josh Rix made excellent contributions with the bat from the lower order, with Neal Harding and Nick Armstrong making some devastating contributions with the ball. Tim Goodman put in enormous effort as skipper. Thanks go to Barry Williams for umpiring and Derek Morgan for scoring.

Following a year in which Guildford won 10 and lost only two games on the way to winning the **4th XI** West Division in 2012, 2013 was always going to be tough. Given the clear step-up in the standard of cricket, to win six out of eighteen and finish 6th in a league containing the strongest clubs in Surrey was a considerable achievement.

Guildford struggled early in the season in the limited overs format, often getting into winning positions but lacking experienced heads to drive home the advantage. Signs of improvement showed throughout the season and the experience gained by the youngsters in dealing with pressure situations will stand them in great stead for the 2014 campaign. Once the longer form kicked in, the side fared better, with four wins.

Initially the bowling was led by Andy Green (19 @ 7), whilst Mike Tilley (17 @ 8) and Mainul Hossain (7 @ 16) formed a formidable opening partnership towards the end of the season, keeping runs to a minimum. Although overall results show that the side struggled to build on these starts, there were real positives in the development of Bradley Eustace and Harrison Charles, who both bowled with good pace, taking regular wickets, whilst Will Jenner made some useful contributions and showed real improvement in his consistency.

Lack of runs was an issue, reflected by the fact that only three players scored more than 100 runs or averaged more than 20, with only four 50s registered throughout the year. Plenty of players got starts, but these were rarely converted into match-winning innings. One notable exception was Philip Hodgson (228 @ 38), who, as captain for the first half of the season, led from the front with some vital knocks, including two match winning half centuries. Youngsters Benji Thomas and Nathan Tilley showed great potential with promising innings at important times – ones to watch in the future.

After promotion from the Fullers League as Champions, there was justified optimism in the **1st XI's** chances of winning Division 5 with some good recruitment.

Usually with a team of all rounders, not everyone gets a full game. However there were no complaints and a fantastic team spirit emerged. The fielding and catching reached new heights as the season went on.

With four seamers, and six genuine spinners in the side there were options that were a luxury to captain Chandra Mutucumarana who, again, encouraged an attacking and expansive game with bat and ball with his side. Of the seamers, Abdul Hai, Kamran Abassi, Abid Ahmed and Amila Peris all took wickets consistently. Abdul led the attack with his metronomic accuracy. With his late movement either way, he took wickets and was very hard to score off. His experience as a first class cricketer and as a young man was evident to everyone. Kamran, Amila and Abid backed him up superbly all taking plenty of wickets at miserly averages.

With three off-spinners, two left arm spinners and a leg break bowler in the side, Chandra had a very strong bowling attack at his disposal. In reality the team often used just two spinners, as Ishara Dilshan, and Sajith Dissanayakka quite often ripped out the middle order between them.

Sajith and Abid scored heavily for the 1s throughout the season, with a notable 200 partnership at Stoke D'Abernon. With everyone able to bat, notable innings from individuals flourished throughout the season to either set up, or secure wins. Everyone chipped in. The most pleasing aspect was to see players prepared to sacrifice wickets for the team, in an attempt to score quickly and get totals on the board.

A very good all round team performance and the side deserved promotion as Division Winners.

The **2nd XI** was looking to get promotion to Division 4 after missing out in 2012. The season started off very slowly as the team was missing some players and had to bring in players from the 3rd XI. This resulted in two early defeats.

Once the side managed to get the full squad back, it went back to winning ways which resulted in being unbeaten for the remainder of the season. The team had a very good balance with both the bat and ball.

Despite losing a number of key **1st XI** regulars at the beginning of the club's 150th season, the 1st XI managed to do what no one thought possible at the beginning of the season and secured promotion to Div 4. A total of 28 players were used in the 1s this year which is testimony to the strength and depth of the club and bodes well for the future.

However a lot of hard work went into making this achievement possible. During the hottest summer for many years and on mainly very good tracks, the 1s found themselves bowling first on 14 occasions out of 17 played (1 abandoned). The effort that goes into bowling first, sometimes for a full 55 overs and not letting an opposition's batting order get on top of you, cannot be underestimated.

The tactic of bowling first paid off well as the side managed to win 6 out of 9 of the crucial timed games mid-season, which formed the backbone for the promotion push. Bowling well is one thing, however you need to be able to chase and hold your nerve when entering tight periods late on in games. The Wick managed to hold their nerve to secure close victories. 3 games come to mind; chasing down 233 at home to Dorking and single wicket wins at Old Paulines and Guildford City were crucial to the team's success.

Despite this promotion being a team effort, two players stood out and must be mentioned. Nomaan Ali, another great year, 660 runs @ 55, and 34 wickets @ 17 make him the most valuable player in the league. The commitment of Iain Tong, with 25 wickets @ 22, has been fantastic. The responsibility he has shown in opening the bowling as a strike bowler and then bowling leg spin later on in the innings when needing a spin option was crucial in giving the team balance to the bowling attack. He also contributed 279 runs @ 20 whilst other useful contributions were made by Imran Rashid with 274 runs and 16 wickets, Matt Davies 261 runs and skipper Graeme Tong with 22 wickets.

The side looks forward to commencing battle with some familiar and some new teams in Div 4.

Having been promoted in 2012 it was always going to be a challenging **2nd XI** season. Might the team gain back to back promotions? Or would the side find the standard too tough? The team ended up 7th, which would have been taken at the start. Imran Rashid last year's skipper was promoted to the 1st XI, just a few weeks before the start of the season, and coming out of semi-retirement Ben Stephens captained.

As with many 2nd XIs there was a mixture of up and coming talent, stonewall 2nd XI players, and last minute replacements, using a total of 46 players in the 18 games. Some brilliant individual performances won a few games, but some collective poor performances resulted in a few games being lost when they were there for the taking e.g. Dorking at home. The most memorable game of the season was at Horsley & Send where two players Matt Goldborn, with a broken jaw (don't hook bouncers without a lid) and Naveendra Weerakoon, with a dislocated shoulder, met at Guildford A&E. Despite these injuries and a brilliant hundred from Zohaak Tughral the team ended up just short of a daunting total of 271.

The side had excellent team spirit and all enjoyed the season. With a little more stability in the team and application with the bat, promotion is not an unrealistic target for next season. Some of the highlights included a 16 ball 46 to finish a game off before the rain set in by Zohaak Tughral at Warlingham and Fahad Tanveer's 2 spells of 25 overs of genuinely quick bowling in the July heat will be long remembered. Zohaak starred with the bat, 302 runs @ 43 whilst Fahad Tanveer with 28 wickets @ 16 was well supported by Aqeel Ilyas 18 @ 22 and Ed Charlton 15 @ 16.

For the **3rd XI**, an ultimately unsuccessful campaign with relegation confirmed with a washout; a collective lack of runs costing the side. The most telling stat was that on only two occasions did the side pass 200. Amongst the batting wreckage, Ian Collier stood out, scoring 393 runs @ 44 and almost twice as many as any other contributor. Matt Goulborn made a defiant 100 against Old Wimbledonians on the opening day but after that only Tom Simcock, Paul Sayce, Nick Clark and Rob Sayce accompanied Collier in passing 50.

For all of the defeats, the side had many memorable moments with plenty of bright spots and signs of promise. The side turned the form book on its head three times, finishing the season with consecutive victories over champions Cheam, by 5 wickets, and completing the double over fellow promoted side, Banstead on the last weekend in a low-scoring thriller with a 7 run victory. The side was competitive in most games, clutching defeat from the jaws of victory at Malden Wanderers when falling 9 runs short of the target and losing by one wicket at Epsom.

On an individual basis, Ian Collier's runs and keeping stood out while the bowling attack on most weeks stood up to the challenge, Old Wimbledonians 325 on the opening day excepted. The swing bowling of

youngsters Jack Smith, 13 wickets @ 29 and Dan Kemp, 10 wickets @ 15, took wickets at an economical rate; higher XIs next summer. Schalk van Vuuren 15 wickets @ 19 had many top orders in difficulty with his opening bursts while Alex Dare continued to show his ability to find prodigious turn and cause problems for many good batsmen without getting the reward he deserved.

The Wick is looking to bounce back in 2014 and despite the trials of 2013 there is plenty of optimism.

Hampton Wick Royal **4th XI** entered only its second year in existence, yet it gave true testament to the health of the club, winning the league by 46 points.

Throughout the season, no less than 43 players were called upon; from the wily, experienced club members to the raw talent of youth. This perhaps says more about the difficulty facing a 4th XI captain in fielding a side each week, but none the less, with a record of 12 wins, 3 losses and 1 winning draw, it is clear that there is a wealth of talent from which to call upon at the club.

The season highlights include a club record innings of 180* by Mark Mackie against East Molesey, a nine-man victory at Egham by chasing down 190 in the last over with one wicket remaining and the all-round clinical display at Ashford, whereby dominance with the bat (278 for 3 off 32) was matched with an equally clinical performance with the ball, bowling out Ashford for 75.

Phil Linter led from the front with both bat, 186 runs @ 37, and ball, 28 wickets @ 13. Support came from Nick Clark and Mark Mackie with the bat and Tom Donnelly with the ball.

Perhaps most notably of all though were the performances of the numerous and very talented colts who represent a very bright and exciting future for the club.

Spirit in the side was good and the first game of the season proved the only debacle.

Vikram Singh finished 4th in the league batting averages with 376 runs from 12 knocks at an average of 42. Nigel Angus (7th) scored 342 from 10 innings and Nick Freeman 245 from 9. Rob Micklewright showed class when he played. Richard Bottomly started the season far too late to add any real benefit.

Bowling-wise the side was good with Mohsin Bashir, Ben Hook and Abid Hussain's consistency resulting in them all appearing in the league's top 24 performers. Bilal Hussain, although the league's swiftest, was disappointingly erratic. Sheraz Ahmed was ever-present and ever-reliable.

A blend of improving youth with the experience of some of the older guys is the recipe for promotion next year. The pitches were excellent and made for good cricket; thank you Catto.

This was the **2nd XI's** first season back in the Surrey Championship and it can best be described as a season of two halves. The first seven weeks brought seven victories and gave the side a real sense that back to back promotions could be on the cards. Of those seven, by far the most outstanding, was the defeat of eventual league winners, Guildford City, where Dan Loveridge took 7–12 in skittling the oppo for well under the 130 set by us.

Unfortunately week 8 saw a washout against the other, until then, perfect team (Cranleigh) and from there all momentum was lost. Defeats of the bottom two sides were interrupted by a defeat at the hands of Godalming and confidence within the team clearly waned as the second half of the season arrived. Further losses followed as the team was ravaged by unavailability and it became clear that you need strong teams to compete in this league. The final position in mid-table did not do justice to the early season form but in the words of almost every league winning manager; "the league table does not lie". On its day the side proved capable of beating the very best teams in the league, but in this higher division, you cannot afford to go with under-strength XIs.

Massive thanks must go to Roy Beard the ever consistent (and unfailingly fair) umpire, and also the tea ladies for their support. A creditable first season back in the championship, so roll on 2014 and hopefully more consistent availability!

A promising season for the **3rd XI** ultimately ended in disappointment with a third place finish. While this is a fantastic achievement considering the mid-table mediocrity of recent seasons, the poor home form (lost two and one losing draw) did not match up to the perfect away form. Highlights from the season are not hard to find, with the batting frequently hitting over 200 runs and several instances of bowling teams out for less than 100, including the eventual league winners, Worcester Park. One of the most impressive features of this team was the ability to get results when it mattered, most notably at Thames Ditton where the side fell to 70–6 before eventually putting up a match winning total of 227. This strength in depth was the greatest difference between this year's team and previous seasons. A great deal of positive cricket was played by all sides in the division, and the low number of drawn games suggests concerns over negative attitudes in timed games may be overstated.

If it had not been for the fact the team suffered more weather affected games than any other team in the league, including one match rained off when the side was in a winning position, the season could have ended on a much happier note. This is a Kempton team that will rightly feel that it can get over that promotion finish line next season.

The **4th XI's** 2013 season consisted of some great highs and lows. After two losses, the team gained an initial win followed by the first ever winning draw at Staines & Laleham. The next five games brought two wins, two losses and another winning draw, interspersed with the odd rain abandoned game. The team then got into its stride with an awesome run of five wins, including the first ever home win (over S&L) and completing the double over Hampton Wick Royal, who won the league by a big margin. Finishing runners-up in the division was the conclusion to an amazing season.

The side's progress can be seen from 2012's 18 points (P16: W1, L10, 2LD, 3A) to 2013's 114 points (P18: W8, L4, 2WD, 2A). All credit to the players and their commitment, what a season.

Highlights were fifties from James Hennessy, Rohan Scott, Sukh Singh, Harry Lee, Jay Dhillon, Luca Seneviratne and Simon Pipe and five or more wicket hauls from Trevor Warne (6–40, 5–9 and 5–40) and Stephen Crossley (7–28). As ever the team looks forward to the next amazing season.

The **1st XI** produced the outstanding performance of the season in their last game. It was a theme that ran through the club, the second team only learnt of their nail biting promotion to the Championship after they had finished their last match and the third team only being certain of survival on the final day.

In the case of the **1st XI** it was certainly worth waiting for, with a 58-run win over champions, and at that point undefeated, Egham. Ks led the way with 319 all out and were delighted to restrict their opponents to 261-4. The win secured a satisfactory fifth place in the table after promotion the previous season. However, it summed up the nature of the team, capable of being good enough to beat the best and equally capable of being beaten by teams way below them in the table. This was reflected in statistics that read seven wins and seven defeats with just two draws and two games falling foul of the weather. It was a more than decent effort in their first season in Division 4, and one that gives cause for optimism going forward. Imran Khalid took the individual honours with the bat, but even 443 runs @ 31 with three 50s probably does not really reflect the ability of the most destructive batsman in the club who is capable of changing the course of most matches. Sajjad Ali also chipped in with 413 runs at nearly 28. Raza Sikander topped the bowling list with 20 wickets at just over 18.5, followed by Hamid Malik with 15 @ 15, but that is an area that clearly needs strengthening if the team is to challenge for promotion. The 2014 season will be the first time all three of the club's league teams have competed in the Championship at the same time and everybody at Windsor Avenue is looking forward to the challenge.

The **3rd XI** season was a transitional one with many old players leaving or moving into the 2nd XI which gave league opportunities to new players. The first three games were a tough start for the team with defeats to Chertsey, Addiscombe and Kempton. The team bounced back with consecutive wins against Ashford and Chipstead who were already near the top, thanks to significant contributions from Imtiaz Khan. With a core group beginning to emerge, the bowling was always strong with the batting performances slowly improving. Andy Berg's magnificent 104 against Worcester Park nearly bought a positive result. Vice captain Junaid Khan's 118* was a mammoth effort in a losing game against Sanderstead and set the tone for his consistency for the remainder of the season yielding 224 runs. Taha Siddique's conversion to an opener was fruitful and bodes well for next season ending just behind on 219 runs.

Tom Sanger (6 wickets), Jim McEvoy (8), Rupert Sutton (9) and Shaha Riadh (11) were learning with every match and producing strong performances especially with Rupert's 4-46 against SinjunGrammarians and Shaha's overall economy rate of 3.77. Hossain Malik joined midway through the season and his memorable 8-22 against West End Esher grabbed a deserved win for the team and he finished as the leading wicket taker (16 wickets). Rain then forced a cancellation against Merstham which led to the final fixture against Staines being pivotal. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the opposition had to pull out which resulted in avoiding relegation. This is the least the team deserved after building on performances and being competitive in a tough league. The team learnt a lot this season in batting out overs when needed, preserving wickets and being tight in the field when defending a small total. Team morale was ever improving and with each cricketing department being fine tuned and the core group a year wiser, next season holds a lot of promise.

The **2nd XI** had an exceptional year and performed at a consistent level with a strong player group for a good part of the year. A strong promotion push was hampered by a loss of players at crucial times and a negative outlook to the way timed cricket was played.

On a positive note individuals were able to provide solid support to the 1st XI when required on their way to securing Premiership cricket. Congratulations! Overall a third place finish for the team was a good effort.

Key performers with the bat were D Baker (510 @ 39) and J Musgrave (471 @ 47) who ensured Leatherhead posted very competitive totals (apart from the odd blip!). Bowling was slightly under par this year with the exception of D Leach (25 wickets @ 14) and M Wakefield (23 @ 17.5) with the latter also contributing 344 runs @ 48 with the bat.

Congratulations to Sunbury as Champions and East Molesey as runners up; it was well deserved.

Thanks to all those umpires, scorers and providers of teas throughout the season, without your contributions Saturdays would become even more stressful!

Leatherhead **3rd XI** began the season full of promise under the new leadership of Metin Huseyin. The aims of the season were to stabilise the side in the division and to encourage and promote a nucleus of more senior colts. The wickets were shared around with the impressive Ben Heane (21 wickets) leading the seamers and Junior Simpson (18) leading the spin/slow bowlers. Outstanding performances with ball included Ben Heane taking 5 for 46 against Reigate, brother Chris Heane 6 for 27 against Malden, Sam Tunbridge 6 for 61 against Ashted and Johnny Nolan 6 for 59 against Weybridge.

Thanks to the team of umpires Dave Walter, Dave Iliffe, Mike Carter and Rob Woods – your skills, time and company are greatly appreciated and enjoyed. Thanks, as ever, go to the band of ever impressive tea ladies who once again have produced, voluntarily, fantastic feeds each week.

After two successive relegations, new **3rd XI** captain Michael Collins finally halted the slide with a return to mid-table mediocrity that the side had previously enjoyed for so long. Availability played a huge part in determining the side's fortunes with over 40 players used in the year, and greater commitment from the core players would certainly help in future. There were highs and lows, the latter being two hidings at the hands of Old Ruts and the former victory over a sporting Woking side, who were vying for promotion, in a high scoring game that reminded all concerned just why we play this funny old game.

Between family commitments Mikey Scott provided banter and most runs (314), while older brother Peter Scott ground out 225. Hidden away behind the stumps for much of the year was Richard Burton and it is of testament to his excellent glove work that he was noticed more when he was unavailable than when he was there, and his impressive batting has enhanced his reputation as one to follow in the future.

This was always going to be a difficult **4th XI** season due to the lack of regular availability at all levels and the statistics tell the sorry tale, one win and two losing draws in sixteen completed games.

The **1st XI** finished runners-up of Division 4 and proved that the team is by no means ossified nor sclerotic. "Evolution, not revolution" is the epithet that summarises the team's promotion achievements this year. After coming fourth the previous season, the Ruts were hungry from the outset to go one better and secure promotion, for according to Winston Churchill "success consists of going from failure to failure without loss of enthusiasm". The 1st XI had reason to be enthusiastic. With a vibrant young Aussie gracing Merton Park, some esteemed Birmingham University alumni and a core young group (a proud product of the youth set-up) the resources were there to achieve the ambitions. Only a robust, determined attitude and plenty of hard-work ensured that by the end of the season everything was realised.

The 1st XI kicked off the league campaign in style winning the opening four fixtures. A good start is always vital to any promotion push and it provided the foundations upon which the team constructed its second-place finish. There were some stand-out performances in those first few games that are worthy of mention. Dan Wood marked his league debut against Kingstonian with a classy century. 50s for Riches,

Mohammed (x2) and Shackleton ensured the runs were flowing. On the wicket-front, the Ruts welcomed Alex Barnicott to the party who took wickets on regular occasions including a five-for against Old Emanuel – it was to be the first of four in a very impressive season for the thirty-year-old.

Into the longer format and with wins more difficult to come by, there was no room for indolence or pusillanimity. The Ruts managed to accumulate plenty of wins throughout this period, only failing to secure victories against Oxted & Limpsfield (losing-draw), Egham (lots of rain) and Alleyns (a crushing defeat). The ability to secure wins in this format proved the difference come the end of the year. In the run-in, the 1st XI won the crucial game against Oxted which all but sealed promotion. James Shackleton was the stand-out performer with 5 wickets whilst Riches chipped in with another 50.

Special mentions must go to Sal Mohammed (530 runs and 43 wickets), Dan Wood (560 runs), Alex Barnicott (42 wickets) and James Shackleton (30 wickets despite a broken finger). There is plenty of reason to be positive at the Ruts and with such a young side, including the likes of Ryan Patel, Richard Woolland and Alex Fox, they will be hoping the season is not 'sui generis'.

2013 brought around one of the most memorable and successful seasons for the Old Rutlishians Cricket Club; the 1st XI was promoted, the 3rd XI promoted as Champions and the Sunday 1st XI winning the Surrey Trust League for the second year in succession! Sadly, the **2nd XI** could only manage a mid-table finish.

The first few games appeared to be a tale of two halves with a bowling unit that could restrict the best sides to low totals and a batting unit short of confidence. A close drawn game against Walton, victory over Bank of England and a narrow defeat to Esher saw Ruts slip into the relegation zone.

However, there then followed a fine close win against run-away leaders Spencer and within 7 games the 2nd XI went from relegation candidates to having a realistic chance of promotion following 4 wins out of the last 7 games. However, other results, a shock defeat against Woking and the weather contrived to produce a mid-table finish; a fine effort from all 30 players involved.

There were some stand out performances with the bat and the ball. George Tidey scoring 437 runs @ 29 was ably supported by Nick Pryce (341 @ 26), Liam Flanagan (262 @ 22) and Jon Mapp (260 @ 29). The bowlers stood out even further with Daisy leading the way with 26 wickets at 22 and Kam Khan (20 @ 25) following. Other notable performances with the ball included Fawad Anis (16 @ 16), Dan De Leon (15 @ 16) and Evan Watson (11 @ 14).

The future of the club is definitely a bright one with many of the current colts and colts graduates appearing this season. The Foxes, Errol Morre-Amadzie, Richie Woolland, Henry Peuble, Matt Vandepeer, Isaac Braithwaite, Eshen Patel, Ross Trimmings and Corey Nelson all played vital roles in the games they played and made a good account of themselves at this level.

After falling the wrong side of the league split last year the **3rd XI** had high hopes for 2013. A strong start to the season induced a sense of belief into a new and young team. Salim Yasin and Waseem Ahmad led the way. Yasin showed great responsibility with his tight bowling yielding 22 wickets at an average of just 9.86 and his batting resources largely untapped still averaged 31.33. Ahmad bagged a 5 wicket haul at Normandy and scored half-centuries at Purley and Leatherhead. His all-round potency reflected by 12 wickets @ 12.58 and 187 runs @ 46.75. A strong side was made stronger by additional young players coming into the fold in July. However, it was the experience of Daman Chugh that stood out, scoring two superb centuries: 122* against Leatherhead and 124 against Normandy. Daman finished the season with outstanding figures of 400 runs @ 66.67.

Overall the 3s had one of its best ever seasons being crowned champions and promoted to Division 1. The talent, unity and desire of the side were pleasing to see and ambitions remain high for the team in 2014.

The **4th XI** season started with a bang amid the April showers; a vicious assault by G Padgett consigned Sinjuns to a one wicket defeat! Ultimately, the side managed to finish 3rd in an extremely competitive league demonstrating the club's future is in rude health.

Throughout the season, the side had a wonderful bowling attack, led by the ever present Tony Green and the metronomic M Lever. There was some exciting young bowling talent in M Basit, W Duffy, H Khan, C Holden, H Hamad, S Oswald and H Crocker; their emergence will stand the club in good stead for the future. M Basit proved to be exceptional at wrapping up tail enders, helping to win several games in the process.

Batting proved to be somewhat problematic, quite often managing to get off to a good start before collapsing. There have been several notable performances with the bat this season, S Corbey's ton against Old Wimbledonians, G Padgett's 50 against Sinjun's in the first game of the season, I Braithwaite's assault at Oxted, a couple of classy fifties from R Lever and K Yamin against Streatham & Marlborough and a classy knock from M Vandepeer against Worcester Park.

Special mention must go to a fantastic rearguard action by M Lever and T Green, defying Sinjun's bowlers in the darkness and rain for nearly 20 overs to earn a losing draw in Wandsworth. Cameos have also been provided by A Chandler, I Beardwell, E Patel, S Atkins, M Condrón, W Duffy, M Basit and T Green at several points throughout the season which have helped chase down scores or set respectable totals.

The side only lost 2 games at Nursery Road all season, but away performances proved less than fruitful and was the only real negative this season. Although the side put up some valiant efforts, the only away win came against Banstead in a low scoring affair.

Congratulations to the promoted sides Leatherhead and Valley End, many thanks to the umpires' panel and finally to the excellent scorer David Hagger and his impressive command of DL.

Old Whitgiftian **2nd XI** had a great season, winning 10 out of 18 games. The season got off to a great start, winning 3 out of the first 4 games. Capitalising on other teams putting out weaker teams during this period was key to the success. June was crucial to keep up the momentum; other teams started to strengthen as players came back from school and university. This was a massive boost, as the team's dynamics completely changed from old and experienced to young and fiery.

Not the best season, as far as results are concerned, but once again fantastic **1st XI** team spirit. In a very competitive division, a difficult start to the season left the OWs **2nd XI** playing catch up. The side had to wait until the 4th game before registering its first points of the campaign. The club entered a **4th XI** into the Surrey Championship with youth development the key objective of the season. Results overall were disappointing although the team was competitive in more than half its matches. More than 11 Colts, drawn mainly from the U15s age group, played regularly and the aim to involve 5 or more Colts in each game was broadly achieved. To score over 2500 runs at an average of 160 per match and to take 103 wickets at an average of 6.5 per game demonstrates the huge strides the club has made in developing youth talent. Three Colts players took five wicket hauls with C. Hearty getting 2 "michelles" and four players managed maiden 50s with J Thomas scoring three 50s and a magnificent 103 against Cheam. The other teams in this league were very sporting and hospitable and it was the right environment for the Colts to flourish. The team looks forward to welcoming a new wave of young talent into next year's 4th XI and providing more challenges to those who want to progress their cricket in the higher leagues.

Of the batters, aside from Simon and Gordon, only Stuart Fletcher registered a reasonable return with 442 runs. Finally, Michael Wood had a decent season behind the sticks.

The 2013 season can be labelled 'nearly but not quite'. The performances in the second half of the season lacked the required consistency. So much work to do, but the side can reflect on a good showing from the first year in the division and hopefully it can go one better next year.

So nearly back to back promotions but the **2nd XI's** first defeat in 32 games to eventual second placed Egham ultimately proved to be the difference between a good 3rd place finish and the promotion to Division 2 it hoped for. The Os 2nd XI started well, winning all 3 limited overs games after the first game was rained off. It also finished well winning 3 of the 4 completed limited overs games in the run in and took the outcome of its season to the last game for the 7th year in 8. However it was the middle of the season and too many draws that really cost the chance of 2nd place, or even the title. There were 3 wins but missed opportunities saw points dropped in 2 winning draws and 2 losing draws. There were 2 more losing draws but in both the Os were out played by eventual Champions Old Whits and 4th placed Maori Oxshott although they showed enough character to obtain something from the timed game. Overall, though, a good season for the Os and they will return with renewed enthusiasm for another crack at promotion in 2014.

The batting was led by the skipper, Michael Adamson with 491 @ 30 and Joe Kourea with 425 @ 35 (4 x 50s), whilst both Adam Ranson and Alex Pizzey scored the team's only 100s as the side posted 340 against Old Whits in the limited over game. The bowling was also topped by the skipper with 38 @ 11, including 2 six wicket hauls, while David Staines took 20 @ 26.

There were also one or two magical moments in the field, the highlight being a superb one handed catch from Andrew Davis running round the fine leg boundary.

Thanks as always go to the ever present umpire David Adamson and scorer Jack Oliver.

This was a decent season in the 1st Division with the **3rd XI** narrowly missing out on promotion to the Premier league. Overall 4th place was a good outcome, especially as the pre season objective had been a top 6 finish. That said, the team should and could have secured promotion with two games remaining; a win in the penultimate game against promotion rivals Banstead would have been enough. Having scored 223 the side had the opposition at 160-9 with the last pair scoring 63 to win. Even a victory in the last game against Valley End would have secured promotion as Banstead, surprisingly, lost to demoted Hampton Wick. The team played 17, won 9 with 3 draws and 5 defeats. Over the course of the season the side used 35 players with a hardcore of 8 playing more than half the games. There was good use of junior players with the likes of Toby Thomas, Ed Thomas, George Miles and Ed Knight benefiting from competitive games.

In summary it was a fun and competitive season against strong oppositions with the club benefiting from playing at 1st Division standard. The runs were led by Bharath Rangarajan with 437 @ 29 and Guy Goodwin 363 @ 36 including 105 against TMW. The wicket taking was led by Nick Emmins and Eddie Knight who both took 16, although both only played half a season in the 3rd XI. O&L 3rd XI looks forward to next season and a focus on promotion, then hopefully to challenge in the Premier league in 2015.

Finally!!! At the third attempt, after two very near misses, the mighty **4th XI** of OLCC gained its place in

the Premiership as champions of the Central Division. The team finished with 12 wins from 15 matches, losing only the last game when the title was already secured.

Starting impressively, with consecutive 9-wicket victories against Merstham, Trinity and Purley, the bowling attack dismantled the opposition cheaply, with Nigel Pearce (including a 5-fer 2), Jay Mastin and Toby Thomas doing the damage. The batters took their turn against Epsom, President Bob Dalziel and Mastin scoring undefeated centuries in a 190-run win. Opener Dalziel was not out until his fifth game of the season, at which point his average was 224!

A winning draw with a depleted attack against Sutton and a 7-wicket win over Sanderstead set up the head-to-head against main rivals, Banstead. From 88 for 5 the side gritted out a total of 201 (59* from young 'keeper George Miles), before an excellent 5-22 from Dave Paisey sealed a 69 run victory.

With a game in hand and a comfortable points cushion it was then a question of not slipping up; easier said than done! Good wins followed against Addiscombe and Trinity, including a club record opening stand of 271 from Bob Dalziel and Greg Miller and a 5-fer 13 for Toby Greenwood. A tense fighting draw away to Purley and one-sided contests against Merstham and Epsom (Toby Thomas 5-25), and a satisfying 184 run chase for 3 vs. Sutton, meant the team only needed to avoid defeat to Banstead in the penultimate fixture. Ben Fullard (5-21) teed up an 8 wicket win in an excellent team fielding performance, and the title was won!

The 4s benefited from a spine of seasoned stalwarts; Bob Dalziel (541 runs), Alan Schmidt (241) Greg Miller (316), the excellent Pearce (33 wickets @ 10.7), James Harrison, Rhys Buckley and Paul Greenwood. Most encouragingly, this season also witnessed the development of U16s Greenwood and Thomas as a genuine opening partnership (41 wickets), and the blooding of many other colts from U12-U16.

Another great season for the 4s; now bring on the Premier Division!!

Winter 2012 saw big change at Purley CC **1st XI** both in personnel and club objectives. Nonetheless consistency in results was elusive and good performances were offset by poor ones like the team dismissal for 55 to Worcester Park at home. Ultimately unease about relegation was avoided by a strong finish to the season with wins over Trinity Mid Whits and Ashford.

Savion Lara ended up with 669 runs @ 51.46 with a top score of 129*, whilst Shane Patel in his first full season opening scored 460 runs @ 30.67. Razi Khan led the bowling attack with his ever reliable off spin capturing 29 wickets over the season. There were also notable performances from Kapilan Bala, Harry Hanford and Tishan Wanigaratne, whilst new 1st team players like J. Sugarman, A. Kelly and J. Johnson showed great promise. A new lease of life to team spirit and club morale bodes well for 2014!

It has been a good year for Purley **2nd XI** finishing 4th in the table and only 18 points away from promotion. The season started with a loss away to Walton although 3 wins in a row thereafter helped kick start the season, setting a good foundation. However inconsistency led to some poor performances throughout the season which hindered any promotion chances. There was some very good cricket played with great team spirit which especially showed in the game against Old Wimbledonians which was won by 102 runs.

The batting this year was dominated by Sunny Bowry who scored 486 runs in 13 innings and finished the highest run scorer in the 2nd XI Division 2. He was closely followed by Kapilan Bala who scored 402 runs in

The side is getting stronger each year especially thanks to some good young cricketers stepping up to the mark and great team spirit, this will enable the team to fight even harder next year towards promotion.

Overall each player within the side performed at various stages throughout the season but the notable performances of the season were Michael Thake taking 8 wickets for 19 runs against Epsom and Adam Bayley scoring 101* against Epsom. Hopefully next season the team will be in a position to field a consistent eleven, week in week out, and maintain the challenge and ultimately gain promotion.

Losing home and away to Wimbledon and Sunbury, and at home to Weybridge (the away fixture was abandoned), Reigate Priory **1st XI** was never going to challenge for the division leadership. Given that, to finish in 4th spot, “best of the rest”, was a highly creditable performance under new skipper Neil Saker.

Last year’s handbook made mention of “a team in transition” and this state continued particularly as player losses at the end of 2012 weakened the batting still further. For all of that, Chris Murtagh (576 @ 48.00) had his fifth year in a row scoring over 500 runs in the league, with an aggregate since 2009 of 3,031 runs @ 49.69. In 2013 he scored one century and had four scores between 72* and 88. Priory’s overseas player Andy Delmont (531 @ 37.93) had three 60s in his first four innings to get the Priory’s season off to a good start. Henry Tye, one of several 2nd XI players to be tried out in the firsts, cemented the number four batting spot as his own with an impressive debut season of 301 runs @ 27.36, and a top score of 90. Jason Roy (234 @ 58.50), played four games including a magnificent 124 at Guildford made in a 3rd wicket partnership of 197 with Murtagh (72*).

Reigate’s strength was its bowling. The captaincy seemed to inspire Saker and he finished joint top wicket taker with 29 wickets at an average 23.93 with a best bowling of 4-26 against Banstead including a hat trick. New recruit Luke Beaven, a slow left-armer, had a standout season with 29 wickets @ 19.93 and an economy rate of 3.16. Will Hodson, last year’s top wicket-taker in the league, nabbed 27 wickets (including two fifiers) @ 22.44. Both Steven Hirst (14 @ 21.21) and Richard Stevens (14 @ 32.93) contributed to this strong attack.

The **2nd XI** had a mixed year; unlike the seasons before, the side started very well beating a strong Wimbledon side in the process.

However, it was not meant to be and unfortunately it was once again the batting department which let the side down. Regular poor starts from the top 5 cost Priory on many occasions, leaving too much work for the middle order and tail enders. The senior batsmen, Loft, Gale, Mirza, Halton and Macdonald all averaged above 30 (special mention to Ben Donovan averaging 37), but poor availability and a lack of support from the younger players really showed, as the side posted weak totals on a regular basis.

It was however a different story with the bowlers and in the field. The bowlers were fantastic all year and the regular attack of Cross, Donovan, Harmer, Briggs and Newbold (Mirza proved very useful too) would keep the 2nd XI in the game, whatever the situation. Harmer took top spot with 30 wickets at an economy of 2.96 per over. Cross was fantastic and unlucky not to have more scalps to his name and it was particularly exciting to see Newbold and Donovan develop as the season went on. Both these youngsters will be a real threat in the league next year and will push for a 1st XI spot.

Finally the fielding was one of the side’s key strengths and special mention goes to Jordan Bunyan, who was superb behind the stumps all year; another youngster who has deserved his spot in the side and keeps improving both with the bat and the gloves. Despite the disappointing 4th place finish, the future does look bright, as the club is currently developing some great youth players across all the sides. It is now up to these players to drive towards the 1st XI, which is very realistic for a number of these talented lads.

A much strengthened batting line-up made the **3rd XI** a formidable opposition for the first two thirds of the season, and wins against Wimbledon, where the side chased 270 and a comprehensive victory over Sunbury were the two highlights of the season. A loss of form in the last six games, including crushing defeats at the hands of Sunbury and Sutton saw the team drop from first to third. Despite the disappointing end, there were many positives to be taken from the season, especially the increasing consistency of performances from the younger players.

Consistency was a problem for the **4th XI** with 56 different players fielded, while losing key tosses meant that few points were taken from the declaration games. However, the limited overs games were more successful, with points taken from 6 of the 8 games played. Several young players made their senior debuts, and key contributions were made by Wilbur Tile, George Elliston, Rory Haughton and Sam Hall, all of whom are U15. Of the seniors, Manoj Rajarethinam scored most runs including a brutal 114* on debut, and Geoff Chay gave Priory some good starts with runs at the top of the order. Skipper Justin Dempsey topped the bowling stats with 26 wickets during the campaign. A win on the final day against Dulwich meant that Priory avoided relegation, and for a 5th XI to compete and survive in a 4th XI Premier League while giving full playing roles to its emerging youngsters, the season may perhaps be considered a successful one.

An inexperienced team with talented stroke makers and obdurate blockers could not develop the game plan and strategy to build scores in the manner of a 1st XI Surrey Championship team. This was so often seen by opposition batting line-ups that seemed to find a way to put an innings together even when put under immense pressure during periods of the game.

The team hopes to say 'Au revoir' as opposed to goodbye to the Surrey Championship.

In parallel to the first team, the **2nd XI** also saw relegation after a 2 year stint in Division 3. The damage was done early season where on 5 occasions it failed to defend scores around the 200 mark. On early season wickets the team might expect to win at least 2 of these games, but performances as a unit in the field did not create the necessary pressure to force a victory.

Vital wins against Thames Ditton and Camberley, in which Adil Latif's figures of 7 for 41 and 5 for 26 respectively set-up victory, gave hope. However despite Rashid Latif's 27 wickets for the season, time and matches ran out for SGs and Division 4 beckons for 2014.

Early promise for SG's **3rd XI** team, including a rolling over of Mertsam's batting line-up for only 20 runs, failed to materialise into a substantive promotion run. After skipper Ollie Williams had to resign due to work commitments, Indi Dhalivaal stepped 'unto the breach' only to find stiff competition against increasingly impressive sides playing at 3rd XI level. After some early losses during his captaincy, once firmly at the wheel, Indi steered the team forward to mid-table respectability with some solid wins and laid a platform to tackle season 2014 with renewed vigour.

The success story for SGs was a new look **4th XI** that ran away with the league title and promotion to the 4th XI Premier where new challenges await. Skipper Carl Holding, in his first season, shaped consistent personnel into a strong unit with an excellent team spirit.

Added to that, strong individual performances from Jeet Basak with 27 wickets and Johan Raaths with

396 runs including a fine century ensured the league was wrapped up with matches to spare. Also of note, a mighty 173* from Ettienne Massyn stood out as a fine innings.

The side really lacked a consistently reliable (or available!) 5th bowler, especially in the limited overs games.

Definitely room for improvement next year, but a season the side has learnt from and it will be determined not to let next season be a repeat performance.

The longer games were more of a challenge. East Molesey and Banstead were both 9 down, but a 10th wicket could not be found. Humbling defeats to Sunbury and Wimbledon, before a trip to Malden Wanderers where Carberry's 5 for and 124 supported by a maiden 50 for Hugo Darby secured an 8 wicket win.

Defeats at home to Weybridge and away at Sutton meant the side was still in a relegation battle. Carberry produced a master class to score 117* against Reigate securing 4 points. The final long game was a trip to Guildford and after posting 250, Danny O'Shea's 6 wickets secured a valuable win.

East Molesey visited for the return to limited overs and was crushed by 8 wickets thanks to an opening stand of 193 between Batty (106) and Darby (79). A professional win at Banstead secured Premier League Cricket with three games remaining. A tough loss to an excellent Wimbledon attack followed, before a victory against an already relegated Malden Wanderers meant Spencer finished 5th.

Darby 469 runs @ 33.5, Batty 364 @ 40.44 and Baumann 335 @ 37.2 were the mainstays of the batting supported by Carberry's two hundreds. O'Shea led the bowling attack with 45 wickets @ 17.76; Edwards 12 @ 12 when allowed out to play plus strong mentions for Turk, Speller and Lewis.

Thanks to Chris Lowe for scoring and the Browns for teas.

The **2nd XI** having faced relegation from Div 1 in 2012 had a new look and feel for the 2013 campaign. With the appointment of new skipper Samad Lone there were early signs of what was to come by some early

preseason victories.

The final tally was a total of 11 victories, 2 WD, 1 LD, 3 losses and a washout against Worcester Park (which ironically resulted in confirming champion's status). Promotion was gained with 5 games remaining which is a testament to the team's domination and professionalism through the campaign.

The batting honours were shared by a number of players. Prasit Ghosh 351 runs (master class 85 vs. Walton) and James Smith 341 runs provided a solid opening partnership and some fine 50s from both players set up good targets and run chases. The middle order was always strengthened by old campaigners Khawar Saleem 340 runs and Samad Lone 310. Saleem's brutal performances against Walton, home and away, cemented the team's credentials as winners by ensuring the eventual runners up never got within sight. Other performances were 199 runs total by Luke Billingham (83 vs. Woking) and a fine 150 not out by Chris Baumann. Kiyo Jason and youngster Calvin Williams kept superbly through the season and Calvin's contribution with the bat averaging over 50 proved a stabilising ingredient late season. There must also be mention of Jamie Blackwell and Mohsin Jafri for some valuable contributions.

Aqib Sindhu was superb with the ball taking 40 wickets at an average of 10, and a wicket every 3 overs. He took 4 wickets or more 6 times including an incredible 8-48 vs. BoE in a low scoring game. His control and ability to move the ball proved too good for many teams. Mohsin Jafri's leg spin took 26 wickets and proved invaluable to the overall team achievement. Julian Hodges and Samad Lone contributed well through the season and with the arrival of new comer colt Babar Hussain the future is bright.

Gus Grant was beaten to the top catcher status by the skipper primarily from first slip. Sorry Gus! Jamie Blackwell and Saqib Malik were excellent in the field.

There is great hope for next year and with the other 3 club teams reconfirming their status in their respective Premier Leagues the team already has a clear objective in sight for 2014.

Thanks go to Hugo De Mel for umpiring, Ian Brown for scoring and Louis McGuire for preparing the strips.

The **3rd XI** ended up mid-table in 5th position. The bowling was generally the strength with the batting, appearing stronger on paper, struggling throughout the season. This is illustrated by the fact that Aymun Ali had the highest aggregate run score of 204 at 20.4. Aymun and Rehan Malik both scored a couple of fifties with 8 other batsmen scoring a fifty each. Even in a generally young side these figures are disappointing. The bowling was generally very strong. The strong pace battery headed up by Monty Sajdewa (17 wickets @ 10.88) who was outstanding every time he played for the threes, and two very promising colts who will play at a higher level, Wasim Malik and Babar Hussain. Rehan Malik, Peter Tilley and Ollie Williams all bowled well when called upon. The spin department was left short, especially when the 2nd eleven decided they needed 4 spinners. Shakir Farooqi was mostly the only spinner in the side and topped the league with 43 wickets.

Overall the season could have been more successful with more application in the batting and more focus in the bowling. Some very good positives though. The side had several new faces that fitted in well, Ollie Williams, Chris Willmer (who substituted as captain very well), Adam Fradgley and Harry Bardon, though not new certainly added another dimension. The most rewarding aspect is watching youngsters get stronger and better each year. Alex Rackow went on to play in the first eleven, Wasim Malik and Babar Hussain are surely just passing through the threes, Archie MacPherson and Aymun Ali are both going to be pushing hard for a 2nd XI place and there were good debuts from Cyrus Azariah and Cameron Ponsonby.

Thanks to Faizan Ahmed and Greig MacPherson for umpiring, Jay John for scoring, and of course the Browns for tea.

Spencer **4th XI** enjoyed an impressive season and although a league position of 4th was identical to that of 2012, the team was a useful year-on-year 17 points better this time. The season was not helped by the skipper's ineptitude with the toss, which played a key role in at least two defeats. However, it would be wrong to focus on the negatives, for they were comfortably out-weighed by some impressive performances. Hussain Jafri was solidly personified contributing 346 runs with two hard hit 70s. Omer Shad's bowling got better as the season went on culminating in a standout 5-30. It was delightful to see so many of the U15s age group come through and begin to fulfil their promise. The batter of the year was Toby Harrison who was one of just three to score more than 200 runs in the season and ended it scoring 40+ in four of his last five innings. So, fourth, with a great second half of the season, including a bonus point win over the always strong Wimbledon. Lots to build on for 2014.

Staines and Laleham **1st XI** made the decision in 2013 to try and give youth a chance. Whilst this was not always possible for various reasons, ultimately the team does believe that certain individuals benefitted from being given opportunities that they may not have been afforded in previous seasons.

With both Epsom and Chipstead playing by far the best cricket, it was no surprise that they deservedly finished in the promotion places. For the 1st XI it was an inconsistent campaign and one that ultimately meant a mid-table finish. Very much the undoubted star was all-rounder Dilan Peris from New Zealand. After a slow start he became the king pin of the team around which many wins were built. He amassed over 600 runs along with 40 plus wickets employing both medium pace and leg spin! Behind Dilan came Sanjay Basnayake with over 400 league runs and important wickets plus possibly the safest hands in the Division! Before a freak injury cut his season short, Chris Bolton was more consistent than he had been in recent years with 300 league runs with both Ryan Ramdin and Adam Smith contributing 250 each. With the ball the side missed the edge afforded them by Tim Bloomfield whose appearances were few and far between. Once again Dilan was the star along with support from Sean Archer and Basnayake. On the whole it was a pleasing season, having started without key performers from recent years and it is hoped that with Dilan set to return in 2014 that the inclusion of further young talent can make for more consistency and a higher finish.

The **2nd XI** season started with Steve Weller taking over the captaincy. Mark Stevens had led the side through the Surrey County League and just missed out on promotion in 2012. This season was to be a period of change, mixing youth and experience and fielding 31 different players including over a dozen teenagers. After losing the first two games, there was an unbeaten run that lasted until mid-July. In the end the side finished 3rd, just behind the deserved top two Cranleigh and Guildford City.

The backbone of the batting were openers Andy Cranston (483 runs @ 40.25, including 106 vs. Ripley) and the youthful Harvey Parsons (232 @ 21.09) who usually gave the side a great start. The middle order varied but there were notable contributions from Sam Barrett (175 @ 25.0), Ben Nannery (148 @ 18.5), Steve Weller (137 @ 22.83), Gary Turner (131 @ 18.7) and wicketkeeper Liam Harper (113 @ 18.83). Youngsters Ben Nannery (77) and Gordon Leeks (57*) made breakthrough innings.

The bowling effort was spearheaded by seamer Gary Turner (29 wickets @ 18.41), veteran Alex Ardis (29 @ 14.24) and recruit Sunny Shariff (22 @ 15.27). Their ability to take wickets regularly was the basis of several victories, with all taking five wicket hauls during the season. Other useful contributions came from spinners Richard Coverdale and Peter Roberts plus seamers Steve Weller, Adam Fearn and Peter Gyves.

The bowlers were supported by some great fielding, based around wicketkeepers Liam Harper and Sam Barrett. The athleticism of Harvey Parsons, Ben Nannery, Gary Turner and Majik Patel helped inspire the rest of the side and was crucial to the success.

Thanks to Andy Cranston for his support as vice-captain and for acting as skipper when required. A big thank you to umpire Dickie Bowden, who was the only ever present throughout the year plus thanks to all the ladies who produced such great teas.

The **3rd XI** could have achieved so much more but with reduced availability, ultimately, the side was not as consistent as it needed to be to achieve a top two finish. Young Gordon Leeks was the revelation and contributed 253 league runs before being hauled into the 2nd XI where he recorded a half century score. Behind Gordon came stalwarts, veteran wicketkeeper Paul Barrett (215), skipper Paul Donlevy (174) and all-rounder John Nannery (162). With the ball it was Deepan Ayasamy's 22 wickets that led the way with another all-rounder Chris Hunt (21) just behind. Many of the younger members, Nathan Hunt, Peter Gyves and David Robinson, to name just three, were often the match winners. Hopefully availability will improve for 2014 leading to a more concerted effort.

This season proved a challenge for the **4th XI**. Most of the colts who had been the backbone of the side in recent seasons had progressed to higher XIs, performing with distinction, thus proving that 4th XI cricket in its current form is an excellent way of developing younger players.

With a vastly reduced colts' contingent, it tended to be an aged side that took the field most weeks. Disappointingly, availability problems led to the side having to cancel two fixtures, something not done in previous seasons. With the make-up of the side changing, repeating last season's second place finish was always going to be difficult. This proved to be the case with a sixth place finish and victories only coming against lower teams.

As usual there were some significant individual performances. A hundred for Irfan Ali Khan, fifties for Dave Lansdowne, Tim Evans, David Gyves, and Tom Howick, Mitchell Bonnick's valiant rearguard action against Kempton which so nearly saved the game, Dave Lansdowne's runs showing that hip replacements do not interfere with cricket and Tim Evans' tactical awareness and consistent batting, despite dodgy knees.

Five wicket hauls for David Gyves, Graham Cole and Tom Oades plus excellent bowling from Jay Pabari, without due reward. There was also fine fielding and batting from Duncan Bailey and it looks like the big score is just around the corner.

New captain Will Gudgeon led the way with the batting aggregates, (568 runs @ 47.33); and Ramdin put a high price on his wicket, averaging 61.33. Adrian Taylor was a welcome returnee to open; Billy Newman, a popular new recruit, steered the side to victory on home debut against Paulines. When schools and universities broke up, those youngsters took their chances. James Trower and Dan Douthwaite shared an opening stand of 139 at Paulines; Surrey EPP player Olly Trower, James Corbishley and Nico Spreeth, (5-for on debut vs. Paulines), all impressed and should score heavily and take many wickets in future seasons.

With the ball, Fowler took 42 wickets at less than 15-a-piece and was destined to lead the league before injury curtailed his workload. Douthwaite took 22 wickets @ 14.50 including back to back 5-fors against Godalming and Hampton Wick; Alex Bond, (19 @ 11.74), was a reliable pace option in the middle overs, one of many to benefit from Fowler's guidance. Jack Raimondo took a 5-for against Hampton Wick, consolation for a poor season with the bat. Adrian Mills, a 2nd XI stalwart for a decade, earned a 1st XI spot off the back of a good pre-season and was accurate and economical throughout; truly Mr. Consistency, even if the same couldn't always be said of his hamstring.

Occasionally the fielding was surprisingly erratic, although Ramdin's keeping was first class. Gudgeon, Fowler and Matt Gottschalk stood out. If the players stay hungry, the side hopes to build on this season.

A memorable season, exceeding all expectations, for the **2nd XI** after a disappointing 2012 and the loss of the first two games of 2013. More players were coaxed out of hibernation and a better feed from the 1st XI led to improved results; one fourteen week period saw just two matches lost, a run of 100-over wins compensating for the early season defeats.

Everyone who played can look back at one or more games where they contributed to a win. Last-over run chases at Hampton Wick and home to Chessington showed bottle; but the season-changing partnership came at Chertsey when Greg Routley (70 off 30) and Tom Gudgeon (56 off 58) rescued the team from 86-6 to get 244. The game was won by 119 and the side never looked back.

Whenever the side was 5 or more down for less than 100, it still managed to score over 220; lower order runs in plentiful supply from Jase Earl and Gudgeon. Ever present vice-captain Malcolm Dickson made important scores at various positions in the order to glue innings together. Routley's belligerence and whole-hearted approach to the game was a massive boost.

Five-fors were at a premium, although Gary Harkett's 7-49 against Hampton Wick and Andy Page's 6-17 at Avorians stood out. Harkett and Ralph Coleman shared all ten Warlingham wickets, the latter taking his first ever hat-trick. Spreeth bagged five at Alleyn & Honor Oak before a 1st XI call-up. In any given week, all the bowlers shared wickets and made important breakthroughs. Earl bowled much better than his stats; Page, Watson, Will Thomson, Donovan Hall, Stephen Anderson, Lo and Baz Medlycott helped to win games that appeared lost.

The squad was bolstered by making full use of the youth system; Medlycott, Thomson, Morley, Spreeth, Giacomo Gray, Lian Meyer and Marcus Mahne all performed well.

Andrew Mortimore consistently chipped in with wickets to top the averages with 29 wickets @ 19, Zakir Rostami (18 @ 28) bowled some great spells without much luck, Devon Carr (14 @ 28) bowled some unplayable stuff when not testing out the middle of the pitch and Shareef (13 @ 26) also enjoyed a strong finish to the season. It was crucial that the side backed up the promotion of 2012 with a year consolidating in Division 3 and it just managed to achieve that in the final game of the season. Many thanks to Natalie Hill for scoring, Roger Price for his fine pitches and Eileen De Ruyter for her wonderful teas.

A 5th place finish for the **2nd XI** was a fair reflection after a season that promised much but saw results unattainable at key times. After an opening day defeat to would-be champions Old Whits, the 2nd team went on a 9 match unbeaten run, tasting defeat only twice in the opening 13 matches. However the season-defining moments came with an inability to force results against Egham, despite a blistering M Thompson century, Oxted & Limpsfield and Thames Ditton; when the side was unable to convert dominant performances into 13 points. A return win against Old Whits, included an inspired spell of 5 for 40 from K Hassan, and an excellent chase in deteriorating conditions, left a glimmer of promotion hope alive. The following week versus Sinjuns gave the most comprehensive victory of the year, which resulted from the best bowling return of the season from A Sharif (6 for 9 from 8 overs). All promotion hopes were dashed in the next fixtures, against O&L and Egham. The Egham game being particularly punishing, after a K De Ruyter ton left Egham chasing 280, the side watched Egham fashion a 200 run unbeaten partnership. A solid chase against Maori Oxshott included another stand out performance from A Knott, with 5 catches and 71*. Another season in Div 3 beckons, but with the same squad and a little more cutting edge at key times, the 2014 season is one to look forward to.

A good season for the **3rd XI** began with defeat to eventual champions Worcester Park, then victory at Ashford. After a rain-affected pre-season, the bowlers were taking wickets and the batting looked to be shaping up well, but there then followed consecutive defeats to Staines & Laleham, Chipstead Coulsdon & Walcountians and Sanderstead. The batting, which had looked good against Ashford, scored a combined total of 292 runs. Approaching July, the team was in the relegation zone and starting to think the unthinkable. However, against West End, the luck changed. The bowling fired (again) and the team chased down the runs and went on a run of seven straight wins that brought the side to the brink of promotion. However, the poor start caught up with the team and defeat in a great game of cricket to Addiscombe, and an abandonment against Sinjuns, ended all hopes. Victory in the final game at Esher secured fourth place, giving the team the feeling of a job well done, but wondering slightly what might have been. As the season was a solid effort by the whole team, no names will be mentioned but it was good to see the club growing and new members fully playing their part. Best of all, colts and young players put in key positions flourished and developed; it will be great to see how they progress in 2014.

The **4th XI** went into the season looking to bounce back from relegation the previous season. The plan for an instant return to the Premier Division was ultimately scuppered by a dominant Sinjuns side but was also undone by a regularly changing team and batting performances that failed to deliver. Hobbs was the top run scorer with 325 at an average of 54 in the eight games he played. Unfortunately he was only joined in the top 25 league run scorers by skipper Henderson (244 @ 27) and Rai (195 @ 65 from just three innings). On the

bowling front the ever reliable Gladstone led the team and the league in wickets taken with 26, Henderson took 20 and the never aging Hardy 11. Hughes took 10 wickets in his debut season for the side and with youth coming through the ranks in the form of Viren Patel (7 wickets) the future looks strong for a promotion push in 2014. Second in the table was a decent result although disappointing for a side confident of more.

This was another strong year for the **1st XI**, but ultimately another year without a trophy. 3rd in the Championship and runners up in the T20 competition, reflected the side's obvious ability, but also the failure to perform to their maximum potential across the entire season.

John Maunders was the team's outstanding player with 666 runs, 10 wickets and 19 catches. His importance to the team clearly emphasised by the fact that the three games John missed due to coaching commitments (trips to Sutton, Guildford and Wimbledon) all resulted in losses, putting paid to any chance of winning the title.

Adam London (519 @ 43), Stuart Poynter (388 @ 43) and Andrew Balbirnie (291 @ 41) all made excellent centuries, but equally would have hoped to have been more consistent in their contributions.

Matthew Todd (41 wickets) was the leading wicket taker and at times the team was overly reliant on his wickets in the longer form of the game. That being said, the efforts of Smith (29), Granger (21) and Stanier (23), who took most of the seam bowling workload, were fantastic and all created wickets for each other through consistent pressure.

Sunbury continues to be the benchmark in Surrey for producing home-grown players; Stuart Poynter has been awarded a 2 year deal at Durham, while for the most part at least 8 players on the pitch had come through Sunbury's colts system. The continued development of Amar Verdi, Vishal Manro and Rhythm Bedi is further proof that the talent pool is strong and the future is bright.

Flirtations with success continue to make the side stronger and this squad continues to enjoy each other's company on and off the field and with each year that winning the league evades the team, the desire to win gets ever greater.

A successful season for Sunbury **2nd XI**, promoted as champions back to the Premiership. Wins in the first 4 limited overs matches established a healthy lead. The timed games presented more of a challenge due to the winning of only 1 toss; however 5 wins were attained keeping the side top going into the last 5 games. Here the side was dominant and secured the promotion with 3 games to go. Unbeaten until the last game, Sunbury fielded a strong team all season. The main contributors with the bat were Ross Wright 524 @ 52, Charlie Holcomb 472 @ 52, Elliot Shaw 424 @ 42, Sean Ventham 386 @ 32, Rhythm Bedi 310 @ 39, Max Hall 294 @ 98 (including 168*, league record) and Charlie Sayers 204 @ 41. The bowling was also consistent with Vishal Manro 34 wickets @ 8.50, Charlie Sayers 23 @ 18, Amar Verdi 18 @ 20, Ishi Sohi 14 @ 22, Salik Awan 17 @ 17, Ruari Crichard 10 @ 14, Sean Ventham 10 @ 14 and Rhythm Bedi 10 @ 19. Retaining the nucleus of this side for 2014 should result in a strong performance in the Premiership.

The **3rd XI** continues to go from strength to strength in the Premier Division, going one better than in 2012 finishing second behind Wimbledon by only 11 points. A total of over 30 different players were used, showing the strength in depth the club possess throughout all the XIs.

A disappointing and difficult start to the season resulted in only 3 wins from the first 6 games, leaving an almost insurmountable gap behind the likes of Reigate and Wimbledon. Fortunes were to change as university and school students returned, which led to 7 wins and a winning draw in 8 games and closing the gap on Wimbledon at the top of the table.

A hard fought game away at Wimbledon unfortunately resulted in defeat and effectively ended the title challenge for 2013. 2 wins in the last two games with two other players scoring centuries confirmed 2nd place above Reigate Priory.

With the bat, Sam Burgess and Matt Nichols particularly impressed towards the back end of the season scoring 325 @ 36 and 312 @ 39 respectively, both scoring centuries. Matt Golding only batted 6 times due to injury at the start of the season but still managed to score 253 @ 50. While other centuries for the season were Gurvinder Bains, Alex and Robbie Hughes. Young batsmen Mike Smith, Harveer Mahajan and Rajan Soni all impressed and the team hopes they will progress further next year.

With the ball, it was mainly down to Matt Nichols 22 @ 12 and Shirsh Bedi 21 @ 15 to take the majority of the wickets, but Saran Kalsi, Sam Burgess, James Birch and Alex Hughes picked up regular important

wickets. This young developing side will be even hungrier for success and to go one better in 2014.

The **4th XI** made vast improvements from the previous year and had a very strong season mainly due to the continued development of the younger players, a few wise old men and excellent availability. The side ended runners up to Wimbledon the eventual champions by 16 points. A total of over 40 different players were used showing the overall strength in depth in the club.

After a heavy defeat to Dulwich and an exciting second game tied against Woking, the team went on a fantastic run of 8 wins in a row. With the ball, Nobby Clarke was the outstanding performer and finished with 33 league wickets and ended the season as leading wicket taker in the Premier Division. Other main contributors were Bill Kincaid, James Birch, Steve Smith and Ranjit Gopi who all bowled very well and all picked up over 10 wickets.

Overall the team played good, hard, competitive cricket in the right spirit and with the right balance between youth and experience the side will be even more determined to go one better next year and become champions.

At the bottom of the table, with 3 points from 6 games, could have led the **1st XI** to some despondency but the squad remained positive, maintaining the belief that it was not far from turning the corner. A run of good results followed, taking the side as high as 5th at one stage as players worked hard and began to perform to their potential. There were some standout individual performances. In particular, during the win against Banstead, when Gary Outram batted superbly for a century that gave the team a defendable total and Matthew Cawood's bowling figures of 6 for 53 resulted in a nail biting last over victory. These two contributions enabled the win which led to a month of very solid cricket from the team. Although the Banstead success triggered the start of a change in fortune for the side, the two draws secured against East Molesey and Malden Wanderers at home proved to be just as important. Both of these matches ended with the team batting out the final overs, which turned out to be the difference between remaining in the Premier Division and being relegated. Mention must be made of Matthew Cawood, Greg Betz and Callum Henshaw, all of whom were able to keep their nerve at crucial times in securing the draws. The match of the season was undoubtedly the win achieved against eventual champions Wimbledon, away from home. The side managed to post a total of 167 which included some good contributions on the batting front from Sam Woods, Dan Edwards, Arun Harinath and Garth Foote (who top scored). The team then pulled together and with a much improved fielding display, led by Josh Allen, along with some good spin bowling, it managed to bowl out Wimbledon for 105 to secure the win. Special thanks to Sarah and Chris for their culinary skills throughout the summer and to the magnificent scorer, Anne.

A disappointing campaign for the **2nd XI** ended in relegation from the Premier Division. The season started promisingly with a win against Epsom, but the team had to wait until August for the second victory away to Ashted. Over 45 players were used and five captains tells its own story. At least five games were lost from winning positions due to a lack of experience and poor decision making. Unavailability was a problem throughout and the same XI never featured more than once. On a more positive note, experienced interim captain David Lewis led the way with 410 runs in 12 innings, Mark Rose 367 runs including a century against Banstead and a stunning 130 from 16 year old Sam Wright against a strong Wimbledon attack. The bowling was good at times with the highlights being Bhavin Vaghela 5-39 against Malden Wanderers, 14 year old Owen Kennett's 5-43 at Weybridge, James Wright's 6-50 against Guildford and the experienced Nick Clark's match winning 4-24 against Ashted. A special mention also has to be made of 13 year old Jamie Smith who scored an excellent 68 at Epsom in his only appearance. The 2013 season will be remembered for some major batting collapses, lack of continuity and also some inventive field settings by

David Lewis including a 9-0 offside field against Normandy. A mix of experience, youth and better availability will be needed for a swift return to the Premier Division. A big thank you to Brian Webb for his white coat skills and also to scorer Sam Griffin for his phenomenal ipad scoring.

Having secured Premier League status on the final day of last season, the 2013 **3rd XI** campaign began with a cautious optimism that, if availability was good, the side could be a competitive force within the division. This was enhanced after winning 2 of the first 3 games. However, poor availability led to only 4 players appearing in 14 or more games. On the plus side, the performance of the youngsters was excellent and notable mentions must go to Rehan Ratna, Gus Leonard, Jon Eales and Matt Gardner for their discipline and commitment. They have all shown themselves, on a consistent basis, to be competent 3rd XI cricketers and the win at home to Guildford, where the team had 7 players under 16, was a particular highlight of the season. Of the more experienced players, Jamie Griffin and Manish Srivastava formed an effective opening partnership with Manish getting plenty of starts and Jamie batting consistently well all year, including a couple of vital 50s. However, the undoubted star of the show was the ever enthusiastic Simon Bliss, who in his 11 games scored 421 runs at an average of 61, including two 50s and a 100, statistics unrivalled in the division by anyone who played more than 5 games. Other 100s were scored by Sam Schofield (156 vs. Reigate) and Chris Moore (106* vs. Spencer). Special mentions also to Josh Blake (51* vs. Wimbledon) and Harry Neale-Smith (71* vs. Guildford) who both scored their first league 50s. Of the bowlers, Rob Griffin, Steve Hall and Nick Clark provided vital experience and plenty of wickets. So, in summary, it is pretty much as you were from last season. Premiership status was secured and the team has a promising platform to build on. Many thanks go to Dave F and all the other umpires, as well as Chris and Sarah for excellent teas.

The 2013 season was an up and down affair for the **4th XI** with inconsistent availability throughout the club taking its toll on the team at various points of the season. The mid-table finish was probably what the side deserved but there were performances during the season that showed this team has the potential to push for a higher league position next year. Standout games were at Addiscombe, where a spell of bowling from Rob Barnard (8/56) won the game after some great batting from Paul Eldridge (69) and a mature innings from Shanaal Nathan (44*). Also, at home to Merstham where, an opening stand of 153 between Sam Clarkson (128) and Dan Krayenbrink (59) led to a total of 257 which proved too many for the opposition as controlled bowling from Steve Hall (4/52) and accuracy from Robbie Quinton (3/5) saw Sutton home to victory. The end of season dead rubber against Sanderstead is also worthy of a mention. Captain Clarkson scored 117 and followed up with figures of 7 for 24 in a last-ball victory. The younger players in the side, notably Sai Patel, Shanaal Nathan, Achal Srivastav, Lekan Ogunlana and Gus Leonard, performed well throughout the season. Of the more experienced players, Dan Krayenbrink scored 274 runs at an average of 24.9 and Rob Barnard took 22 wickets at an average of 13.8. Thanks to Clive Quinton, Nathan Dhevarajah and Dennis Blake for umpiring and Simon Clarkson and Chris Clapham for scoring, not forgetting Helen for her wonderful teas.

Having lost six players from last year's **1st XI** squad over the winter, this was always going to be a tough season for the Mids 1st XI. So it proved, with an eighth-place finish probably a fair reflection of a difficult summer. However, the side showed enough positive signs to warrant its place at this level and can look forward to rebuilding next year and climbing the league.

In the early matches, a comprehensive six-wicket win over Pyrford and a nail-biting victory over Cranleigh hinted at what might have been. However, a couple of costly dropped catches led to close defeats against Walton and Ashford, and the team then lost its way until the introduction of overseas player Abhishek Jhunjhunwala, who immediately hit two successive centuries, which sparked a six-match unbeaten run in the middle of the season that ultimately ensured the side's safety. Poor availability blighted much of the campaign, and with two of the last three games washed out the season stumbled to a disappointing close.

There were, however, a number of positive performances. Matt Winter led the seam attack before injury struck in August and was well supported by Mark Roberts and Ben Ives, who showed much potential for the future. Raj Chatwal took 27 wickets with his left-arm spin, including 6-for at Walton, and with more consistency will no doubt pose more of an attacking threat next year.

As usual, Mids' batting failed to deliver with any regularity. Jhunjhunwala scored 403 runs to go with his 27 wickets, while Kunal Patel (366 runs @ 33) was the most noteworthy of the other three who scored 300+ runs, stepping up to perform consistently at this level for the first time. Will Page's stunning hundred at Purley shows that he has the class to score big runs and will be the player to watch next summer.

Well documented retention and availability issues were significantly compounded for the **2nd XI** as they conducted their campaign without an elected captain. Thanks are due to Nick Bradwell, Stuart Clarke, Phil Mander, Robert Warne and James Wilson who filled the breach at various times. Ever present umpire James Gibson also deserves the thanks of the 44 players who represented the side.

A paltry single victory and sole draw were perhaps scant reward for efforts that at times, although on far too few occasions, deserved greater return: high flying Leatherhead's 29-run 10th wicket partnership in a total of 144-9 to win being a prime example.

Fluctuations in personnel meant there was hardly a core of the same XI available 2 weeks in a row. Consequently, the side struggled in all departments. With the ball, only Bradwell (19) and Bob Cowlard (10) took more than 10 wickets and it is difficult to remember more than an occasional spell whereby you could assert that an end was contained. Clarke (346) and Wilson (289) both struck 3 half-centuries, the latter pleasingly stepping-up to score runs at this level for the first time.

A regular captain is needed as is greater stability in selection, which means more consistent availability. Assuming off-season efforts to rectify some of these problems are successful then it is highly probable that a more competitive outfit will take the field next season.

Inconsistent availability at the start and poor commitment towards the end thwarted any realistic hopes of the **3rd XI** competing in Division 1. However, had Mids managed to win any of a number of close games they may have been fighting to stay up at the end of the season.

The league was particularly competitive having been split into 2 for the first time. Overs cricket did not suit with the 5th and sometimes even the 4th bowler being a problem. Close finishes in limited over matches are

rare and not a format suited to this level of cricket, producing poorer games.

Conversely, the timed format produced a number of thrilling finishes, the highlight being a tie against Banstead when their last man was run out going for a second run to win the game. Runaway winners Cheam were pushed all the way, whilst there were close finishes against Hampton Wick and Malden Wanderers. The one win of the season came in emphatic fashion at Wimbledonians, a target of 171 being chased down for 1 wicket in 25 overs. Hopes of this being the catalyst for a winning run were thwarted when 7 of this strong side were missing the following week.

Only 4 players played over 10 games and a massive 53 played at some stage. The bowling continually let the side down with only Gary Revel-Chion, Mike Asbury and Nick Cook taking over 10 wickets. The batting was encouraging at times with scores around 200 being posted regularly until the final few games. The skipper led from the front with 442 runs; eleven 50s were scored by 7 different players. Youngsters Cameron Lagerberg and James Warburton showed promise with bat and ball; Angus Whitfield scored a first 50 at this level in the final game.

Hopefully being able to compete in 2014 with more consistent availability will allow youngsters to progress in a more stable environment.

It turned out to be a very difficult and tough **4th XI** season as the lack of availability and unexpected absences were felt hardest lower down in the 4th XI. Finishing second from bottom in the Central Division was probably a fair result as the side threw away a handful of matches it probably should have won. For next season, the team will need to look at capitalising when in strong positions to win matches. This will be achieved with several younger players that performed consistently well throughout the season.

A shaky start against Sanderstead was one of the matches in question having bowled the opposition out for 108 thanks to Ian Sutcliffe's 6-for; a collapse saw the side all out for 75. The 4th XI picked up their first win in an exciting match against Sutton, successfully defending a target of 181. The only other wins were achieved against Woodcote Epsom and Merstham.

The positives to take from the season were the performances of the younger players, including Aidan Barton, Michael Hughes, Bhavin Jethwa and Paul Morgan to name just a few. Another pleasing element was the commitment that this younger generation showed, an example that some senior players would do well to recognise. It is hoped that their enthusiasm will continue, will grow and spread to others and combine to help generate a more competitive squad for next year.

Beddington batted to their potential rather than their league position and were looking very good needing just 59 from 10 overs with 6 wickets left. The end came surprisingly quickly as the side finally wrapped the game up taking 6 wickets for 9 runs in just 3 overs. The 40 run margin does not really do justice to this exciting match.

The bowling was led by Alex Mendis and Alex MacQueen, with Newbery, MacDougal and Harpley all making big contributions. Overseas Chris MacDougal topped the batting with 593 followed closely by Darren Redwood (567). These two both scored centuries on the last day to set up the winning score. Alex MacQueen (354), Ben Kingsnorth (341) and Paul Williams (350) all scored vital runs over the summer.

Six promotions in 7 seasons is an amazing progression for a relatively young but very talented team of players, the majority of whom have grown up at the club. Added to this, the development of the new ground and facilities are due entirely to the collective efforts of a group of very hardworking people behind this club.

Our thanks go to Steve Redwood who prepared the best pitches in the Division all summer, to John Williams for scoring and Fran Agar for preparing (officially) the very best teas.

After being promoted for the third season in a row, the **2nd XI** always knew that this year would be a

much bigger test with the likes of Sunbury and East Molesey in the league. The team continued its good run of form from previous seasons, by winning the first three league games which included an away win at East Molesey. The team then struggled due to club availability to put a consistent run of wins together throughout the remainder of the season. The side finished fourth in the league which was a good effort by all. Team stats for the season were: P18, W7, L6, D4 and 1 game being abandoned.

Top performers with the bat for the 2nd XI this season were Justin Gray scoring 400 @ an average of 33.33 and Stuart Tomlinson scoring 394 @ 56.29. The top performers with the ball were Sam Reedman taking 25 wickets @ an average of 22.44 and Mark Tomlinson taking 20 @ 14.75.

After a strong 3rd place finish last year the **3rd XI** had high hopes for 2013. Unfortunately, as is often the case in lower XIs, injury and commitments higher up the club denied the team key players throughout the season. Even the skipper played all but two games in the 2nd XI.

In these circumstances, that Steve Mitchell led a young side to mid-table security in the first season of a new format was a great effort and a reflection of the team spirit that was cultivated despite the disruption.

The silver lining to the cloud of losing a number of players was the opportunity for the youngsters. U17 Dan Vernon continued to progress and became a key member of the 2nd XI squad. Also gaining 2nd XI experience was a pacey U16 bowler Jake Dunbar and wicket keeper Ryan Watt; whose development from the 4th XI last season saw him voted the 3rd XI player of the season.

With other youths such as Ryan Adams, Jamie Chatfield and Ali Huse all contributing and surely not far from 2nd XI debuts, the envied Valley End production line driving the current 1st XI fairy-tale success shows no sign of slowing down!

The senior players played their part. Ian Wordley had another renaissance year featuring in the two most memorable wins. He made 96* on the final day as promotion chasing Oxted were beaten by an incredible 10 wickets; having earlier taken 5-43 to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat against Old Wimbledonians.

Charlie Barkham, a 4th XI stalwart from seasons past, took his chance to cement a place in the 3rd XI by leading the team's batting averages. Jason Coleman also played a significant hand keeping the youth in check! A 2nd XI regular for well over a decade, Jason took 11 wickets at an impressive average of 16.

Playing at Windlesham Park with its ridiculously impressive pitch, access to the old VE pavilion, new kitchen and bar, the **4th XI** could not really ask to have a better home. The pitch resulted in a torrent of runs on occasions, the kitchen great teas and the bar some genuine social after match entertainment.

Unfortunately the on pitch results were generally not as good as the venue but in delivering its main aim of providing access to cricket with over 40 people representing the 4s this season from U13 to those who should really know better, the youth shows great future potential for the Club with the usual mix of ages proving the true Valley End spirit.

The team finished disappointingly down the table and failed to fulfil 2 fixtures, something unheard of at VE and not to be repeated next season. To make amends for this, team building will start early in 2014, once the Club has brushed the snow off the synthetic pitch in the "cage", and the side will be off to a flyer in 2014.

Outstanding performances from seasoned performers Andy Monk, Wayne Gregory, Anil Chauhan, Steve Gould, Malcolm Lea and co. were ably assisted by the younger players in Ed Ames, Stuart Morgan, Ali Huse and the Barkham boys. The stand out performances, as usual, were from the fresh blood of the youth led by Jamie Chatfield, Andy Freeman, Percy Fagent, Dominic M-White, Tom Walker et al. And the Sun Shone!

The **1st XI** had a really good 2013 season, finishing a solid 5th having pushed the top sides all the way and seen off the sides beneath. But for losing top players in Stu Houghton and Bilal Chohan to injury and falling agonisingly short in some close fixtures, it could have been a remarkable one. The season was a real coming of age for a number of the team who had something to prove. Sam Gorvin led the batting line up with some excellent stroke play along with Storm Green whose consecutive hundreds and 554 runs were a class above; Shaun Cox looked good for his average of 30, Paul Bainbridge scored well as ever and bowled some useful overs and skipper Matt Haddow scored some long overdue runs. The bowling was good throughout the season, Chris Williams shone as the new opening bowler working well with the consistently probing Jimmy Newell while Ben Monk emerged as a very useful off-spinner. As always Mark Bainbridge was the leading wicket taker and continues to bowl superbly, taking many weeks to concede a boundary and bowling

nine consecutive maidens in one spell; he also chipped in with valuable runs.

Others also made important contributions when required; James Madoc-Jones showed some serious class, scoring a 50 on debut; both Rory and Frano Annandale showed they can cut it at first team level, while evergreen Iain Collis along with Jared De Jesus were excellent early in the season. Others still made selfless contributions to winning teams when selected.

The side entered the season confident that it could compete but to have been within reaching distance of a win in 14 out of the 18 fixtures listed was a great effort and it is to be hoped the team can capitalise more on those positions next season in order to make that potential to fight for the league a reality.

After the disappointment of 2012, the aim for the 2013 **2nd XI** season was to enjoy playing cricket again and return to winning ways. Jonny Stephens retook the reins, aiming for the right blend of youth and experience. Added to an existing plethora of young guns and solid experience were the returning Iain Turner and Jon Akhurst, as well as new faces Andrew Milnes, James Madoc-Jones and Rory Snowball.

Normally when a side gains promotion you would expect to read tales of people scoring 600 runs in the season or taking 50 wickets, but the beauty of this campaign was that so many players made at least one match-winning contribution. The team's never-say-die attitude was the reason why it gained promotion. Whether it was a tie at Woking & Horsell off the last ball or winning by one wicket at Old Ruts, matches were won as a team. The philosophy was to look to win every match and even when there were occasional defeats, the players' resolve meant that it always bounced back the next week and won.

There were outstanding individual displays throughout the year. Seamer Andy Milnes (19 @ 18) was excellent, confusing many a batsman and going at less than 3 an over throughout the season. James Madoc-Jones averaged over 50 before being promoted to the 1s. Arthur Vaughan finally beat his brother's top score, falling just short of a hundred, while Tom Chappell stroked a classy hundred against Bank of England. There were other classy knocks from Nick Wright and Ian Turner, Alex Pindar when fit, Joe Button when available and skipper Stephens slogged a few here and there. One of the major pluses was the fielding, which was led every week by Jamie Mann. The fielding was exemplified by the home match against Woking, when 8 of the wickets were caught at keeper or first slip. Other bowling highlights included George Vaughan bowling out Woking and Iain Collis bowling out Old Wimbledonians, as well as tidy middle over performances from Hougasian, Snowball and Mann and canny spin from Stephens, Stanley, Button and Thom.

Thanks go to everyone for putting in a real shift for the cause. Next year's aim must be to ensure that the team stays in Division 1 and help ensure that the 1s and 3s can make it a full set.

The season started with a lot of expectation for the **3rd XI**, following the disappointment of being 'relegated' to Division 2 after the old Division 1 was split into two. The season got off to a bad start, with poor availability hitting the side hard on the first weekend of the season. However, that loss was the only blemish for a couple of months thereafter as it started a fantastic winning run. The turning point in the season was losing to East Molesey at the end of July, from a seemingly winning position.

Even then, promotion was in Walton's hands until another club was excluded from the league towards the end of the season, which distorted the table and left the side having to rely on other results. The players did all they could, playing some good cricket and winning the final matches, but unfortunately it was not meant to be and the team must play another season in Division 2.

There were some very good individual and team performances throughout the season. In the batting department, the side found a very solid opening partnership in Max Saidman and Ian McAllan. Max made over 350 runs and Ian scored over 250 runs; expect to see more of the same next season. There were also good batting performances by Graham Neale when he was available. Bowling was again strong for the 3s with Cameron Allen and Jack Dominy bowling extremely well. Ed Hougasian did well with the ball too, as did the underrated Jon Greet. Ed Thom was ever reliable, when his shoulder let him. One of the other positives of this season was 15 year old Olly Davis who ended up being the leading catcher in the league with the gloves on and also scored his maiden senior fifty for the side. Onwards and hopefully, upwards next season.

In its second season, the **4th XI** again put its focus on youth, with the side often more than half colts. The eventual outcome of a 3rd place finish in the West Division was very pleasing. A few too many draws cost the team a shot at the title, but the courage shown by such a young side to turn countless matches in their favour was an inspiration. 11 of the 14 concluded fixtures ended with Walton in the ascendancy, with seven wins and four dominant winning draws, while the side dug deep to save the other three matches and finish the season unbeaten. Indeed, the team's last defeat in any match came in June 2012.

Adult stalwarts Chris Derham, Oli Clarke and Rob Clarkson were consistent with the bat, Derham top scoring with 222 runs. Two U15s shone all year, Will Hagger's destructive shots at the top of the order bringing 155 runs @ 31, while George Sharpe's compact strokeplay earned 122 runs @ 24 in a number of crucial partnerships. A vast array of youngsters from ages 13 to 18 including Joe Norton, Joe Sale, Matt Phillips, George Cates, Callum McLeod, Sid Ravishankar and Sean Derham all played important knocks when available. Toby Dabell, another U15, led the side in the field and also scored vital runs.

Ever-present duo Ravi Tumuluri (35 @ 13) and Oli Clarke (22 @ 13) led the wicket taking but the finds of the season were two exciting young seamers. Paceman Cameron Allen (U15) quickly progressed to the 3rd XI, while even younger Sammy Davis (U13) was a revelation with his prodigiously accurate swing and seam, taking 9 wickets @ 18. Tommy Richards took 14 cheap wickets with his cultured left arm spin, while Rohan

After several seasons struggling to consistently compete in the Premier League, the **1st XI** performed superbly to finish in second place, taking the title race down to the last day. With several new recruits, a fantastic overseas and a maturing core of young players, the side emerged as genuine title contenders.

The batting was led by Sarel Erwee who topped the league batting stats with 974 runs @ 64.93. His run of four consecutive league hundreds broke the Surrey Championship record and was an incredible feat. Luc Durandt's aggressive style brought him 597 runs @ 42.64 and often got the team off to a flying start. There were important contributions from Thushara Managei (284), Joel Pope (255), Adam Hose (251), Harry Cripps (248), as well as Jack Windslade, Tom Curran and Tom Winslade.

The opening bowling attack of Henry Turner (23 @ 21.48) and Robbie Joseph (19 @ 27.21) were a constant threat and often deserved more reward than they got. Thushara Managei (23 @ 21.61) was a vital contributor and off spinners Phil Mann (20 @ 22.75) and Sarel Erwee (15 @ 31.27) bowled well throughout. There were also important spells from Tristan Caviat, Nick Kent, Tom Curran, Adam Hose, Jon Gonszor, Jack Winslade and Imran Lodhi.

With a young side the fielding was excellent and a huge factor in the success. Joel Pope executed 27 dismissals, with Luc Durandt claiming 14 catches; 12 run outs highlighted the standards the side set.

A disappointing opening three defeats ultimately cost the team but the potential of this side was unquestionably proven, not least by victories over champions Wimbledon both home and away. A host of superb run chases vindicated the attempt at a brand of aggressive, entertaining cricket. Many thanks to Val Gibbens, as always, for her continuing efforts with the scorebook and to Jon Molloy for all his contributions.

After finishing 6th, 7th and 8th in the previous 3 years, a rejuvenated **2nd XI** claimed the Premier League title in fine style in 2013. With a squad of 37 players aged between 15 and 47, the 2013 season proved to be a real team effort and highlighted the strength in depth this club possesses. A 2nd XI club record of 12 wins and just 2 defeats was a fantastic achievement. With disciplined bowling and aggressive batting, at times, it seemed the side could chase anything.

The first half of the season saw the bowlers leading the way and the lower order dragging the team over the line time and again, highlighted by nerve jangling wins at Ashted, Sutton and Guildford and at home to Reigate. The second half was dominated by the top order with brilliant run chases at title contenders Wimbledon and Malden, as well as a mammoth score of 334-9 at home to Sutton.

Cameron MacDonald led the batting with 441 runs @ 49, ably supported by Jordan McKinlay (378), Tim Cross (353), Mike Arnot (342), Imran Lodi (246), Dan Mullins (232) and Phil West (198). Alongside these there were vital match winning knocks from Ben Curran, Oli Bennett, Rob Arthur, Sam Curran, Darren Livett, Tristan Caviat and Rob Taylor.

The bowling, as always, was led by Tan Asghar, who topped the league bowling charts with 35 wickets.

Jon Gonszor (20) and Darren Livett (12) backed him up throughout and 5 wicket hauls from Tristan Caviat and Nick Kent were highlights. There were also excellent contributions, especially in the limited over format, from Jack Barton, Mike Ferris, Imran Lodhi, Ben Rogers, Ben Curran and Dan Mullins. The fielding was, for the most part, superb with Mike Arnot claiming 18 dismissals and Tim Cross 12 catches.

With a host of talented youngsters, alongside some experienced heads, this side has the potential to push on from these achievements and enjoy more success in the future.

Many thanks go to John Harris for his sterling umpiring efforts and to Jo Gaydon for her magic with the scorebook. Thanks must also be extended to all those who supported the side throughout the year and made playing at the club so enjoyable. Finally, a special mention and thanks to Glynis Morrison and Jon Molloy for their fantastic work, without whom this great club would struggle to function.

It was a pleasure to captain such a fantastic group of players and all should be extremely proud of this season's achievements.

For a first season back in the Premier sixth place could be considered a decent effort for the **3rd XI**, but it eventually felt disappointing as a number of strong sides took the field. A mid-season run of four wins and a winning draw and then the straight forward task of chasing down 74 with 8 wickets and 18 overs in hand at Spencer should have taken the side into 4th. However, capitulation in that game seemed to take all the wind out of the sails. The final stats do not lie; of the eight wins achieved only two were gained from the nine completed games against the sides higher up the table. A fair reflection then, although it only felt as if the worthy champions were actually a stronger side.

Bowling was the strength with new recruit, Masud Javaid leading the way with 22 wickets and an impressive economy rate of 2.5. Dan Unger bowled well in the games he played and Alex Tough, Ralph Day and Ben Rogers all produced pace and quality when available. Chris Smith and TMS trialist Jason Stocks supplied the spin, with decent success when they were able to exercise some control. All these guys would have had considerably better returns if the, at best average, fielding had matched their efforts and a concerted effort must be made to rectify this.

The batting was solid if not spectacular and a collapse often seemed just around the corner. Highlights were hundreds from captain Andy Bell and vice Rob Taylor and nineties from Joe Griffiths and Fraser Aitken. Chris Smith had a great run of four consecutive fifties late in the season ending as top run scorer. Cameos from Toby Ashley Collins, Dan Unger, Andy Pope, Ralph Day and sailor Dave Wotherspoon bode well.

This is a strong squad; with some tinkering and more belief in 2014, expect a serious challenge!

As always the **4th XI** evolved over the course of the season drawing from a diverse squad across nations and age groups. The finishing position of fourth accurately reflected the team's performance; not quite consistent enough for a top three, but showing promise for next season.

The core of the team comprised of Paul Xiberras, Dave Curry, Pete Fraser-Brown, Andy Evans, Fraser Aitken (later to be called up to the 3rd eleven), Sheldon Cummings, Anthony Shawyer and Anthony Rourke.

Valuable contributions were made by Toby Ashley-Collins with a debut hundred and a good seventy odd from young James MacDonald. Paul Xiberras was the team's stand out fielder at gully taking a host of important catches. Nick Lucena, Oli Selby, Charlie Behan and Patrick Kenney showed great promise on the bowling front and should be looking to gain promotion to more senior sides in the near future, whilst Anthony Shawyer and Anthony Rourke showed cunning and guile to winkle out many an unfortunate batsman. On the wicket keeping front Henry Lee did very well and also contributed well with the bat when he opened.

Overall it was an enjoyable season and there was a good spirit within the team. This was impressive as well over 20 players took the field over the course of the season. A good balance of youth and experience helped in many ways from fielding and field position to batting tempo and general attitude.

Next season promises to be a good one with a good pool of players from which to choose. The areas of improvement will be to train more regularly, especially in the fielding aspect, as a few more catches taken would have made a difference of at least one place, if not two, in the final analysis.

This enabled the team to control its own destiny again in the 50 over shoot out at the end of the season.

As ever Sunbury at home loomed large on the horizon but Chris Benham scored one of the best hundreds Church Road has seen and with runs on the board; the bowlers did the rest.

It was now just Weybridge left to apply pressure. Going into the last match knowing a win would mean a hat trick of titles, Banstead were bowled out fairly cheaply but then Wimbledon faltered and were nine down with still 42 required. Young Ben Compton and Jack Snape incredibly won the game when they had no right. In one of the strangest ends to a season, all the players who were out knew the title was won by following the Weybridge score online but the two out in the middle had no idea, making their performance all the more remarkable.

The league is the priority at Wimbledon and it always will be. However, the history making was not confined to the league. Winning the 2013 ECB National T20 Cup at the Oval meant Wimbledon became the first club to defend its National title and the side is rightly proud of this achievement. The 2013 season will live long in the memory.

The **2nd XI** experienced a disappointing season, losing games it should never have lost and eventually finishing runners up in the league.

The classy Joe Lukens was the leading run scorer while 15 year old Tom Lace showed great promise for the future. Kristian Piolet, Nick Brothers and Hiran Marambe also contributed at various points in the season while retro wicketkeeper-batsman-retiring captain Tom Eaves played some flamboyant cameos! With the ball it was the slow(ish) bowlers Charlie Leonard, Johnno Gordon and Hiran Marambe who led the way. Thanks must go to scorers Alex Anderson and Bob Cairns and also to umpires Martin Conway and Crispin Lyden-Cowan for their dedication throughout the season.

2013 was another successful season for Wimbledon **3rd XI** coming out on top of the table to do its part in another illustrious season for the club. A closer season than last year (4 weeks from the end of the season only 2 points separated the top 3 teams) the side managed to get its nose in front and held its nerve in a difficult run-in to clinch the title. Credit must go to Sunbury and Reigate Priory who pushed the team hard throughout the season.

Due to erratic availability (36 players were used this season), it was hard to have a settled batting line-up, however the top of the order consistently fired, setting a great foundation for the team. Thanks go to Dulwich and Spencer for making this year one of the most challenging years in the **4th XI** Premier Division. The title for Wimbledon was all but secured with three games to spare. Only rain and Spencer (twice each) prevented the 4th XI recording a 100% record. Such a successful season was not based on stand-out individuals (no player took more than twenty wickets but seven took ten or more) but on match winning contributions from a wide range of sources, making winning the league all the more satisfying.

The stats show a 6th place finish but as has become tradition, the Woking & Horsell **1st XI** season went down to the wire. In the end the team survived in Division 3 and this is no less than a young and improving team deserves. The season started poorly with 5 straight loses. Confidence was gained with a draw against Bank and then a 220 run chase at Wimbledonians, led by 'player of the season' James Woods, gave the team a first win and a major boost. Consecutive wins against Cobham Avorians and Churt proved crucial but then Staines somehow recovered from 19 for 5 and 3rd placed Addiscombe nudged over the line with a narrow 2 wicket win chasing a low total.

The following week the team arguably gave high flying Epsom their hardest test of an unbeaten campaign. A solid all round show left Epsom still requiring 50 with just 3 wickets left, but they showed they were worthy champions blasting the winning runs to leave the side very dejected.

With many absences Woking turned to experience for the crucial game at Streatham, with club 'batsman of the year' Malcolm Eddington scoring a 'run a ball' 70. A superb all round bowling display then ensured a total of 250 was easily defended.

The last game became a relegation decider and the hosts, Avorians, got off to a flier but a brilliant come back led by newly promoted Indi Fernando restricted the score. Woking were cruising in reply but after the inevitable collapse the 9th wicket pair of Fernando and Jack Allen heroically scrambled 21 runs to stay up.

Tom Dunbar (334 runs @ 33) was the most consistent batsman and Damien Honey (25 wickets @ 17) led the bowling. Availability was awful in the 2nd half of the season but if this can improve and with maturing displays from many of the young players, next season promises much more.

That old sporting cliché says the table doesn't lie. In the end the **2nd XI's** final league position boiled down to losing key moments in games, but there is still plenty to be optimistic about.

David French (31.43) returned to WHCC this year and became a key man, slowing the opposition scoring or leading the tail in pursuit of a good target, most notably with 87 at Bank of England when the team had been 11 for 3. Mark Worgan (308 runs @ 25.67) continued to lead the run scorers with another good season but indifferent middle order performances meant the side failed to capitalise to win more key games. This year the side was joined by Saul Allison and after a slow start he found form in the Purley game, scoring a solid 83. After good performances in the 3s Arun Aiyer joined the 2nds taking wickets at crucial times.

Next season promises much for the younger generation; Abdul Zafar and Angus Hargan, who both demonstrated huge potential. Abdul has a golden arm and potential to make the tail wag as demonstrated at Addiscombe with a fine 58*. Angus showed promise at Worcester Park with a fine 65 and followed this up against Old Ruts with 30* in supporting Qais Nawas (61).

Player of the season was Indi Fernando, playing with an outward joy for the game, always present at practice, the first to arrive at games and first to help with match day tasks. His performances earned a final round place in the 1st XI, where he took 5 wickets.

In summary, the team was relegated and that is disappointing but the potential in this side is too great for this to be more than a blip. The team will have grown and learnt from this season. The spirit in the team could never be faulted and next season will see a return to better fortunes.

After a successful championship winning season the **3rd XI** found themselves in a competitive Division 2 in which the side would have to play good cricket, week in week out, to progress. The season started well with wins against promotion candidates Walton and Old Ruts. New recruit Mohammed Wasim bowled well with the new ball all season and took 20 wickets @ 15.5 to compliment his more experienced partner Mandar Khedekar (28 wickets @ 16.8).

The bowling attack was in full flow with excellent all round contributions from Arun Aiyer, Stephen Jones and Matt Allan among others. The batting was expertly held together early season through important knocks by Malcolm Eddington (38.83) and Nick Tune (30.9) with others chipping in.

The season took a turn for the worse at the half way point with disappointing losses to eventual winners East Molesey and Normandy, but there were plenty of spirited performances in the later season.

Jonny Ayling had a pleasing summer taking 2 five wicket hauls and proving that he can be a big part of the team in the future. There were also good contributions by Qasim Asghar, Tom Harlow and the ever present Peter Grafton. One man stood out this season, Vaibhav Bhade finished as the league's top scorer.

Section 3 – Club Details and Reports

Bhade scored consecutive tons and finished 2 runs shy of 500 in the league, no mean feat.

Overall a respectable fourth for the 3rd XI; the first year of limited overs cricket and promising young players gaining experience there is every reason to be optimistic in the future. Thanks to the opposition for a fantastic year's cricket played in the right spirit and to the tea ladies who always provided a fantastic spread. Last but not least thanks to Ken Rapley and James Williams for their hard work behind the scenes with ground keeping and admin – very much appreciated.

In the **4th XI's** third year in the Premiership the side achieved its highest finish of 5th. As in previous years the team started well, fell away in mid-summer and then came back strongly with two good wins against Normandy and Epsom to finish comfortably on 77 points.

There were a number of close matches, most noticeably the tie at Sunbury where a fantastic 60 from Jack Mathews came so close to winning a match after being 97 for 8 chasing 186. Another highlight was a great team effort where the side scored 282 in 45 overs and then Tom Sharpless and Shahid Khan bagged 4 wickets apiece to beat Epsom by 202 runs.

On the batting front; Sagar Nayyar (284 runs @ 20.3) top scored with other contributions coming from Stephen Wernberg (250 @ 19.3) and Tom Sharpless (21 @ 19.2) plus vital innings from Khayam Ali, Richard Thompson, Jamie McMahon and others. Imran Tehal and Tom Sharpless were leading wicket takers with 19 each plus Peter Smith and Sheri Khan not far behind taking 16 wickets. Other bowlers made excellent contributions. Sagar Nayyar excelled as wicketkeeper with 16 catches and 5 stumpings. A highlight was his 7 dismissals against Epsom in a huge victory. Stephen Wernberg weighed in with 10 catches and overall the fielding was much better than in previous years.

Tom Sharpless (U17) was player of the year; he was joint leading wicket taker, made many valuable batting contributions, was third highest run scorer and took some fantastic catches. Tom also won the WHCC Young Player of the year award in recognition of his consistent performances with both bat and ball throughout the season.

A big thank you goes to all the players and supporters for another enjoyable season. Thank you also to Ken Rapley for all his hard work in preparing the ground at Westfield and to cricket Chairman James Williams for all his support.

A fourth place finish offered fair reflection of a solid, if unspectacular, **1st XI** season. An opening day victory over Cranleigh should have given the perfect platform; instead the next 3 games were lost. The last of those defeats, off the final ball in a brilliantly paced run chase by Esher, meant promotion hopes were all but gone by the first day of June. However, now at full strength the team would only lose one more game all season, crucially again at Esher. The majority of the time games were dominated, although four consecutive winning draws in mid-season halted any possible charge. It took until the end of the season to gather momentum, all the final five games ending in victory, but the relentless performance of the top clubs meant they could not be caught.

The batting fired consistently for the first time in a few seasons. It was led by overseas pro Sandeep Ganguly who, batting at his own pace, just went on and on; 652 runs @ 59 was a huge effort. Rob Hill returned to somewhere near his best in scoring 482 @ 48, including the team's only century of the season away at Ashford. Joe Hill started strongly with four 50s in the first 7 games, but faded after for 416 @ 32.

The bowling was dominated by two newcomers. Left arm spinner Grant Helm led the wickets with 28, and always contributed in victories. Scott Payton, arriving via Southern Railway & Kenley, took 19 wickets in limited appearances and also produced the finest all round performance of the season in scoring 64 and taking 4-35 in the final day victory over Walton. Eight bowlers reached double figures in what was a well varied attack, although the seamers will be looking to make a greater impact in 2014.

Thanks to Barry and Adrian for producing an excellent wicket and Alan for scoring.

The 2013 season was an improvement on the previous year for the **2nd XI** and despite the top three sides rightly occupying those positions for the vast majority of the season, the feeling was that a consistent run of results would put promotion within reach. To therefore need one more win from the last two fixtures to guarantee survival was a disappointment. The three disciplines were rarely seen in form together and this inconsistency was telling. Points were gained against the top three, Spencer, Walton and Addiscombe, but four losses were recorded against Old Wimbledonians and Old Rutlishians.

The batting was led by the talented Scott Kent who amassed 404 runs including a brilliant 122* vs. champions Spencer. Dom Fell recorded a season's best 326 and Ben Davies, Travis Scott, Ian Burrows, Mark Turner and Dyan Sellayah all scored well. In total 12 players scored fifties for the team.

The bowling was led by two experienced players, Chris Turner, released from First XI appearances, claiming 28 wickets and Dom Fell with 25. John Drake was always consistent for his 13 wickets but the surprise package was 15 year old Rayan Hafeal who captured 17 wickets including a maiden 5-for vs. Woking with his off-spin. Adam Powers with 9 and James Harrison with 8 wickets in his 3 games impressed and another youngster Tom Donegan showed real promise.

Regularly fielding 6 players under 21, the potential is there for a challenge for honours in 2014.

A very successful season for the **3rd XI** winning Division 3, which ended up very tight but did not reflect a dominating performance from the side this season! Losing only one game away, at Kempton in testing conditions, the team regularly had strong performances, arriving back at Green Lane by 5pm most weeks.

The start of the season saw Park take an early lead at the top of the table and they were never dismounted, winning 10 out of 13 games, with a notable win coming against Esher off the final ball in monsoon like conditions (credit to Esher for their positive attitude in playing on). Towards the end of the season it got a little bit closer as the first defeat, and bad weather, saw a stutter but the side managed to hold on with a comfortable victory over Chipstead on the final day to be crowned champions!

Jonathan Mayhew led a talented batting line up scoring 326 runs @ 40. He was well supported by Stuart Bradshaw 284 runs @ 47 and Ricky Geale 255 @ 36. A young bowling attack performed well all season with spinner Tom Cronk being the leading wicket taker with 30 wickets. He was supported by the experienced Dave Daniell (20), Stewart Powers (19) and Matt Saunders (17).

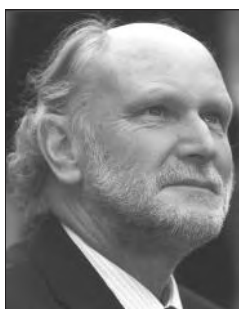
The aim for next season will be back to back promotions as this talented team has been playing well below their level for far too long. A big thank you must go to Adrian Barratt for all his help, both on matchday and during the week, and to Stuart Bradshaw, who stood in as captain at short notice and did an admirable job in leading the side to the championship.

WPCC **4th XI** had a most enjoyable but not outstanding season, finishing in the bottom half of the Division East table. The main task for the season was to provide the 3rd XI with a reasonable pool of

reserves in their push for promotion. In that, the side was extremely successful. For most of the season the numbers were tight and there was a noticeable lack of quality batsmen. Although several of the players had a good pedigree, they played so infrequently and did not net so that they only began to show their true potential as the season drew to a close. Apart from the captain only three of the players played in over 7 matches. The leading batsman with 210 runs was Ravi Deva at an average of 21. Andrew Botting was the only player to score a century before he disappeared upwards. The leading bowler was Chaminda Hewage with 13 wickets @ 11.46. New boy Paul Wearmouth was the only other bowler to take over 10 wickets. Dave King kept wicket immaculately, when work did not impede. Three or four youngsters, such as Steven Roberts, Harry King and Matt Browne, acquitted themselves well with bat and ball when not on duty with the 3rd XI. For a club with such a small pool of players it is often difficult to turn out 4 sides but the team only failed once to honour its fixture. An earlier start time next year could make it rather more difficult for players who work on Saturday mornings to play. The team therefore has to pray that there will be an influx of new players over the winter if it is still going to be able to turn out a competitive side.

Michael Webb 1950 – 2014



It will come as a great shock to the local cricketing community to learn of the sudden death on 2nd March of Michael Webb, one of it's best known and best loved characters. Michael was a delightful individual, an entertaining companion and a true cricket enthusiast. Prevented by haemophilia from playing the game he loved, he did the next best thing and became a scorer. And, unlike the vast majority of those involved in the game, Michael could surely claim to be amongst the very best in his chosen metier.

His father, John, a talented batsman/wicket-keeper, first took Michael along to score for his club side, Warlingham, when he was just ten years old and for most of the next 53 seasons he continued to perform that task with great diligence, as well as later becoming the club's official statistician and press officer. In later years he also frequently scored for both the Surrey over-50 and Surrey over-60 sides and the MCC.

Invariably neat and accurate, his scoresheets were a mine of information. Always an innovator, he was one of the first club scorers to record the number of balls faced by each batsmen and even devised a system to show which bowler was responsible for each delivery.

In recent years he embraced a computerised scoring system in tandem with the traditional scorebook. He also did much work on the Warlingham and Surrey over 50s and over 60s websites.

Michael was always much more than just a scorer though. His quick wit and impish sense of fun combined with his constant good humour made him a hugely popular figure wherever he went, with many friends throughout the club cricket community. He was also a devoted family man and will be much missed by his wife, mother, sisters, children and grandchildren.

Brian Ray 1940 – 2014

Brian Ray, a resolute opening batsman for Mitcham in the '70s and '80s, passed away on 26 February. Born in Sunderland, his team mates assumed he was from Yorkshire as he was a great supporter of Yorkshire CCC and Geoffrey Boycott. He moved to Scotland and made excellent progress as a cricketer making a name for himself with consistent displays for the West of Scotland CC. This brought him to the attention of the selectors and he was called up by Scotland for the twelve to play against New Zealand in 1969; disappointingly he was 12th man.

At 30, a career move saw Brian coming south and making his debut in the Surrey Championship for Beddington. His form meant he was selected to represent the league against the champions Mitcham; he top scored with 82 against their full attack and was so impressed by their competitive approach, professionalism and team ethic (his words) that he joined the club in 1971.

After four games in the 2nd eleven he was promoted to the premier side and proved to be an extremely consistent performer for nine years in two separate spells. He was proud to have been part of two Championship winning sides in 1971 and 1973 and formed a very successful opening combination with the stylish Peter Johnson. Among their highlights were two stands of over two hundred, both away at Sunbury; the first, 206 in 1972 with each scoring a hundred, the second was an undefeated 236 in 1981, Ray 135*. Each of these partnerships set league records at the time.

In a long career Brian played for a variety of clubs. Brian often recalled that the years he spent in Mitcham colours were the most enjoyable and satisfying and remained uppermost in his mind.

ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS – If your club fails to send a representative to any Annual, Special, Council, Divisional or Yearbook/Cricket Balls Collection Meeting you will be fined £20 for the first occasion, £40 for the second occasion and £80 for each further occasion in any year. (Rule 10 (j)).

END OF SEASON TEAM REPORTS – Please forward all your XI's reports to the **Secretary** or the **Year Book Editor** at latest by the **October Council Meeting**. The fine for each report not received in time is £30. (Rule 10(k)).

HAVING ALREADY PLAYED FOR A CLUB in the league in the current season, no player may play for any XI of another club in the league (which includes the Surrey County League) in the current season after 31 May **without first obtaining permission**. Contact the Registration Secretary, **Virginia Edwards**. (O & PC 14 (b)).

MATCH RESULTS – Summary results must be placed on Play-Cricket by **10:00am** on the Sunday following the match. Financial and/or points fines for non-compliance. (Rule 10 (d) and 10(f) (i) - (v)).

PAYMENT FOR TEA – In all Divisions lunch and / or tea shall be provided by and paid for by the home side for the umpires and scorers and also for all the away players. (O&PC 3).

REGISTRATION - The Registration Secretary is **Virginia Edwards**. Premier and First Divisions 1st XI – Players in whatever category must all be registered on Play-Cricket by **30 April** or by 9.00pm on the Wednesday before relevant league match. (Sch. One – paragraph 7 (e)). **Overseas and Contracted players** in the above and in all other divisions must be registered **before they play in any match and by 31 May**. Players obtaining contracts **after 31 May** must be registered immediately and before they play. (O & PCs 12, 13 and 14).

SCORERS - If you fail to have a competent scorer for any **1st XI** match you will be fined £25 for the first two defaults, £30 for the third and £40 for each default thereafter. (Rule 10 (c)).

SWEEPING AND RE-MARKING – Premier, First, Second, Third & Fourth Divisions - **1st XIs only**. Fines of £25 are applicable for not sweeping and re-marking. (Rule 10(i)).

CAPTAINS REPORT FORMS - To be completed electronically within 10 days of the match. Details of the coordinators can be found on the Umpires page. Financial and/or points fines for non-compliance. (Rules 10 (e) and (g) (i)).

Club Profile No. 42

LEATHERHEAD CRICKET CLUB by Matt Joblin

Leatherhead is part of a rich history of cricket, with the earliest records dating back to 1730 and a reported fixture against Dorking Cricket Club. This fixture still exists today as the traditional curtain raiser at the beginning of a new season. The club is particularly fortunate to have preserved original scorebooks as far back as 1892 and an unbroken sequence of minute books from 1906 through to 1972. It has always been widely accepted that cricketing activity has been identified within the area from as early as 1730, but confirmation was not identified until recently that Leatherhead Cricket Club was actually officially formed in 1850.

The first recorded match took place on Saturday 20th of July, 1850, against Ripley and was the first official loss for the club as Ripley completed a 3 wicket victory. In 1865 the club became 'Leatherhead United CC' and therefore merged the existing 'village' and 'amateur' teams. It was a big year for the club, with Leatherhead United CC moving to a new ground on the site later to become the London Transport bus station, adjoining the railway embankment. The club currently has residence at Fetcham Grove, where they moved to in 1875.

Between the years 1865 and 1880 there were approximately 8 matches a year and regulars in the fixture list were Ripley, Ockley, Shalford, Guildford and Dorking. 1881 was a significant year in the club's history as the 'United' was dropped, with the club seeking expansion from local residents and new members from further afield. More members created more fixtures and there were now approximately 30 matches in a season, although the expansion was met with mixed feelings, with some records documenting that the club had 'lost some of its local character'.

'Cricket Week' became a long standing fixture and the earliest records are from 1882 with all games being fully covered in national press reports from 'Cricket; A weekly record of the game'. As so many other clubs have found in the modern era, cricket week soon became too much of a burden to continue for a variety of reasons and it was decided in 2004 that the club would not continue this fashion with the majority of the membership favouring a commitment to competitive cricket - a trend which has not just seen the end of cricket weeks, but has also affected participation with Sunday cricket in more recent years.

The 1890s saw further expansion in membership numbers and an impressive fixture list which now boasted Eton Ramblers, Old Wykehamists and the MCC & Ground. It also saw a record breaking effort in a fixture against Wimbledon where Leatherhead were bowled out for just 16, still the lowest score on Wimbledon's ground. It was a record that was narrowly avoided in 2010 when the club's 1st XI was bowled out for 19 in a league fixture against Farnham.

Cricket seemed to thrive in the area at the turn of the century with, on occasions, no fewer than 6 Leatherhead sides playing. In 1905 a significant ground redevelopment took place with local firm Buchanan & Curwen installing an electrical supply to the club house for the princely sum of £2.50 - a small amount compared to the club's current ambition to redevelop the changing rooms!

As with the majority of recreational activities, the club suspended activities during the War years, with a brief 're-form' in between WW1 and WW2 under a new name 'Leatherhead & District Cricket Club'. In the club's detailed history, the first mention of a junior section was in 1924 when Leatherhead & District ran a 'boys team'. The inclusion, promotion and engagement of younger cricketers has been championed by the club throughout its history and it has played an imperative part in the club's recent success. It wasn't until October 1945, after the war, that cricket would be properly reinstated in the area.

In 1949 the club's committee unanimously voted against the introduction of any form of competitive cricket in Surrey, however this would change in the future. 1956 saw a Jim Laker XI play at Fetcham Grove as part of the legendary bowler's benefit year and by mid afternoon there was a crowd of over 3,000 people. Although losing the game, Leatherhead gave a good account of themselves against a star studded team, but more importantly managed to raise over £350 for the benefit fund and this was the beginning of a strong relationship with the County which is still intact today.

The 1970s will be best remembered for a very strong 1st XI, twice being beaten in the Decca Cup final (Surrey knockout competition) and led by John Waterman who later went on to play minor counties cricket for Wiltshire. A strong social scene has always been at the forefront of the club's ethos and in 1982 the club went on tour to Devon. This was to become a famous event in the club's calendar and remained a permanent fixture until 2006. Amidst the regular Devon tours, the club has a recent history of touring abroad. This started with a tour to Australia in 1999 when a mixed side unfortunately did not manage to win a game. 2003 saw the club tour the Caribbean Island of Barbados and this registered the club's first ever

international victory,, winning 2 of their 6 fixtures whilst also doing their upmost to drink the Island dry during their 2 week stay! Spain in 2005 was the last time the club toured abroad, again returning home without a victory to their name but a fantastic time had by all.

In 1987 the club's committee embarked on an enormous fundraising drive, with an attempt to raise enough funds to add a two storey changing facility to the original clubhouse structure. The main fundraising effort was a match against the Lord's Taverners and the day was undoubtedly a great success with the club making in excess of £12,000. The changing facilities are still in place today, with plans to improve them in the forthcoming years.

A structured colts section was implemented in the mid 1980s, as with many clubs in Surrey, and this has been fundamental to the club's successes. Derek Baker was instrumental in its growth, which at the time, boasted around 110 colts members. Today, the number is around the 160 mark and the section continues to thrive and generate a number of highly skilled senior players. With the club regularly fielding a well run Sunday team and a Surrey Trust League team, colts today have an exceptional platform to go on and progress into senior cricket.

The start of the millennium initiated a period of sustained success at the club across all senior sides. The feat will undoubtedly go down as the club's most successful period in its elaborate history. Built around a core of young players who had come up through the clubs youth system, the run began in 2004 when the 1st XI won promotion from the Fullers League. Successive promotions followed and in 2013 when the 1st XI won the Surrey Championship Division 1, this meant 6 promotions in 9 years and only the second club ever to move from the Fullers League to the Premier League. During the same period of time, the 2nd XI moved from the Fullers League to the Surrey Championship Division 1 and the 3rd XI won promotion to the Surrey Championship Premier Division before unfortunately being relegated and now lies in Division 2. A number of individuals (both on and off the field) have been instrumental during this period, far too many to name in this brief summary of the club's history. It is far more important to note that the success has been built around nurturing home grown talent, engaging players within the whole club and not simply the specific team they play in, some influential sponsors (namely The Big Bus Company and Keith Michaels PLC) and a

friendly, family atmosphere which welcomes people through its doors.

The future for the club looks strong with colts numbers at a record high in 2013 and all three senior sides in strong leagues. The continuation of the Sunday friendly team and the environment that they have created is a testament to the club staying true to cricket's traditions in an era when friendly cricket seems to be dying a death. 2014 will see the club's first ever outing in the Premier League, the committee embarking on an enormous fundraising drive to build more modern changing rooms and the club welcomes back the summer tour with a first ever tour to Somerset.

OBITUARIES

John Lane 1947 – 2013

John "Lois, Grumpy Groundo" Lane sadly passed away on the 1st March 2013 after a brave battle against cancer. John was a member of Avorians CC for 55 years with brief spells at Ockham CC and B.A.C.

John followed his grandfather Ernie Snr, father Ernie, uncles Harold and Cliff and cousin Malcolm as a proud Avorian member, and was followed by his son Daniel and in the future, grandson Ethan will become the 5th generation to follow on the Lane's proud association with the club.

John started his playing career as a fast/medium bowler and dogged middle/higher order batsman taking hundreds of wickets with his away swing and scoring numerous 100s and 50s; playing alongside Bob Willis MBE, Geoff Howarth and Graeme Labrooy, as well as club stalwarts Peter Smith, Tony Longman and Brian Gathercole and representing the league at different levels during his playing days.

One of John's memorable days was when New Zealand brought a full touring XI to Convent Lane to play an Avorians Invitational XI and John took the notable scalp of the Kiwi captain, Martin Crowe. In the later part of his playing career, John successfully captained Avorians 2nd XI for several years, whilst slowly dropping down the order in search of yet another "red asterix".

Another of John's passions saw him take over as groundsman in the 1990's, overseeing the rise of the 1st XI into the Premier Division of the Surrey Championship in 2003. John continued to spend every spare minute maturing and nurturing the ground receiving compliments from players and spectators for his outstanding work. Giving up was something John never did lightly but after two operations on his damaged shoulders he had no option. This gave him time to concentrate on another passion having qualified as a panel umpire for the Surrey Championship.

John will be a sadly missed character at Cobham Avorians CC and around the Surrey Championship. An annual memorial match between a John Lane XI and an Avorians select XI will be held each September at Convent Lane in support of cancer charities (see www.avorianscc.co.uk for details). Bruce Macdonald 1953 – 2013



Bruce started playing club cricket in 1968 aged 15, and was immediately identified as one of the most promising youngsters at Sunbury for years.

To see him then, small and wearing framed glasses, he did not look a high quality cricketer in the making but appearances can be deceptive. Bruce had been well coached at the Alf Gover cricket school, had a good batting technique and a wide range of shots which would stand him in good stead for 1st XI cricket. 1000 runs scored in his second full season in the team proved the point. His fielding, however, was the source of frustration to Sunbury bowlers over the years!

He opened the batting with Les Wood for more than 12 seasons, two left handers with contrasting styles.

In 1974, in the National KO Final at Lords, the first ball Bruce received, bowled by a former Kent county cricketer, was dispatched past extra cover for 4 and in no time he had scored 24 to set Sunbury on the way to victory. This typified Bruce – sometimes a bit too cavalier but a real batting talent and an opposition nightmare when playing well.

In the 1970s he played for Surrey 2nd X1, helped with coaching Sunbury colts, and in 1978 scored a club and 1st X1 record of 1530 runs in the season, which stood for many years. He played for Sunbury for more than 40 seasons, some 25 in the 1st X1, and more than 22000 of his 31000 runs were for the 1st X1 - a fantastic achievement.

Bruce worked as a groundsman, including several years at Sunbury; his whole life was sport-related with hockey, and, later, hockey umpiring at a high level, being his winter activities. He played the game the right way, respected the traditions and spirit of the game and was a true 'Clubman'.

Unfortunately he was too ill to be at the Club's 75th anniversary in October to be presented

with a 'lifetime of sporting commitment to Sunbury CC' award. He would have been proud and delighted. He will be sadly missed and Sunbury will not seem the same place without him around.

Neville Marshall 1937 – 2013



It was with pride that Hampton Wick Royal Cricket Club woke up to the sight of Neville Marshall, in umpiring garb, festooned across the Oval gasometer for the 5th Ashes Test last year. There was no mistaking him, approximately 20 feet tall and unmistakably Neville!

Somehow it was a fitting tribute to Neville, who died in May 2013, that he gazed down on a Test for five days and that his image was there to imbue the essence of fair play. Because, as the memorial service and the celebration afterwards showed, that summed him up to a T.

Neville was one of those 'once in a generation' people that transform the cricket clubs they are part of. Not necessarily the heart and soul of the place, nor the charismatic leader, but they make sure the thing ticks. There is beer in the pipes, a wicket cut, fixtures to play and new folk rolling up. Nev was the Wick man of his generation from 1970 until the 2000s when his declining health told him it was time to hang up his umpire's coat.

Neville was born in Hull in 1937. He attended Kingston High School in Hull, excelling in cricket and football. His first job was as a Railway Clerk, the beginning of a lifelong addiction to cricket was through the Railway Clerks cricket team.

He emigrated to Australia in the 1960s on the £10 assisted fare scheme and when he returned made his home in Twickenham and his second home with Hampton Wick Royal.

Neville was diagnosed with diabetes in his 50s and had several illnesses and operations, including a heart by-pass, but until a decade ago was the lynchpin of the club. Neville's passion was cricket, but he had other interests; rugby, jazz, country and western and classical music. He was described at his funeral by his closest friend as "the kindest and best friend I could ever have wished for – he spent his life helping other people but never bothering to care for himself".

Neville passed away two weeks before The Wick celebrated their 150th anniversary. Little did we know that later in the season his face would be prominent in front of thousands of cricket lovers at The Oval and millions more on TV.

Mike Taylor 1941 – 2013

Sport was a big part of Mike's life, when he was very young he used to go with his family to watch Culvers Sports play cricket. As Mike grew up he began to play cricket and football for the club. Mike played representative football and cricket at county level and for several clubs. Cricket took him eventually to Epsom where he captained championship winning sides in 2nd and 3rd XIs. During his time with all these clubs, Mike realised that there was always more to be done than just turning up and playing each week, and always volunteered for roles like secretary, treasurer, or club representative at league meetings. Mike's motto was 'if you are going to do something do it right or don't bother'.



During his days playing football Mike was the type of forward defenders loved playing against because more often than not he was a gent. The only thing that concerned him was trying to score. He was never interested in the physical side of taking a piece of the defender, he had 'a game over, have a beer, all friends' attitude.

When he packed up playing football he decided, having taken abuse from one of the dads on the side line during a game of kids' football that he was refereeing purely to help out, that he would go on the course and become a qualified ref. Not only did he do this but he also became secretary of the local referees association; a job he ended up doing for 15 years.

Mike had a brief sabbatical from sport when work took him and Maureen to Belgium for 2 and a half years. However, on his return, it was not long before he got the phone call, "fancy a game of cricket?" Within a couple of weeks he was back in the fold and playing for Epsom, a club he served admirably for 20 years as captain, secretary, social and fixture secretary, board rep, and colts head coach.

Mike loved being involved, at times some may say too involved, but his contribution to this life and everyone who knew him was immense; all who met him were privileged to have known him.
