Players from nine different clubs went home with individual trophies. The League does not have an official player of the year, but Trafford MV's Vicki Dean finished over 100 runs clear of her nearest rival in the division one batting award category, and also claimed second place in the division one bowlers' award and third place in the T20 batting standings.

The most decisive individual winner though was Appleton's Annie Rashid, who took 23 wickets in division one, nine more than anyone else.

Di Totty, who won both wicketkeeping gongs, was the only winner of two individual trophies.

Other Individual Award - President's Award (Outstanding Contribution to Cheshire Women's Cricket): Annette Axon (Chester Boughton Hall)

The next significant date in the League calendar is the AGM, which will take place at Oakmere CC on Tuesday November 10 at 1930. This meeting will include an assessment of the applications of any new clubs wishing to join the league's senior competitions. Any club seeking to do any of the following should make their intentions known to Secretary Leesa Mellon a minimum of one week ahead of the meeting:

- Join the league
- Be promoted to 40 over cricket from the existing division 3
- Return to development cricket from the existing division 1/2
- Field a second team in 2016
- Resign from the league

The Rules meeting will then take place on Tuesday January 5 2016. However, any changes to the Constitution must be proposed for the AGM.
