- On paper, Chester are arguably the toughest opposition Porthill will face in the Western Division this year, so the Potteries-based club are in an excellent position after their third resounding victory. In the final overs, Chester's Tilly Buss finally became the first bowler to dismiss Evelyn Jones this year, but not before the former England Academy and current West Midlands Regional elite batsman had become the league's first centurion of 2020. Her runs aggregate from three matches was 290 after this match. Becky Cripwell also enjoyed a fine all-round match here and Lauren Kenvyn conceded just four runs in five overs in addition to taking three wickets.

After her dismissal for 50, Evelyn Jones' batting average for the year fell to 170. A fine spell from Grace Potts followed as Porthill completed their latest victory.

 More evidence of the exciting strides being made at Nantwich as they beat Chester with all of 10 overs and eight wickets in hand.

That certainly didn't look a likely outcome at 31-7 after 14 overs of the first innings as the Stockport club's fine young attack, spearheaded by Lucie Gater and Liv Bell, ripped through AOM's top order. It was two players who both batted for 16 overs who helped to turn the tide. Becky Baldock came in at 19-4 and Jordi Matthews at the fall of the seventh, with Matthews duly occupying the crease to the end despite scoring just nine runs. Then it was Matthews herself who took the first two wickets in the Georgians reply. Amanda Gettins then contributed a superbly accurate spell of three wickets for seven runs in six overs and the scoreboard soon read 25-7. Natalie Bell and Grace Woosey doubled the score in their partnership to give their side hope, but again it was not to be Georgians' day. Amelia Sammons supplied the crucial breakthrough eighth wicket – she really is a fine addition to the AOM squad this season.

 Hannah Jones and Zara Matthews have won a number of matches for Didsbury in recent years as a spin bowling partnership, but here they combined to score 78% of their team's runs in rapid time. Leigh must have fancied their chances earlier when opening bowlers Kasey Bentham and Poppy Donohue reduced Didsbury to one run for two wickets after 20 balls of the reply.

Important message about junior players in open age cricket in 2020:

Following further discussions with the Director of the Cheshire Cricket Board, the County Welfare Officer, the Performance Manager and the Women and Girls Manager, a final decision has been reached over juniors playing in open age cricket for the remainder of the 2020 season.

Children who started school year 7 in September 2019 are not permitted to play any open age.

Children who started school year 7 in September 2019 are not permitted to play any open age cricket. Any child wishing to play in open age cricket must have been in Year 8 or above in September 2019.

Cheshire Youth Cricket will not be selecting age group squads for the 2020 season, therefore any child in year 7 does not meet ECB criteria for playing in any open age cricket.

Players in year 7 can train with other juniors up to and including the Under 17 age group, as long as the club take steps to ensure it is a suitable training environment for each player.

SENIOR REPRESENTATIVE CRICKET

With regret I have to report that the MCC have withdrawn from Thursday's scheduled fixture. The MCC were concerned about the Covid-19 restrictions in Greater Manchester and that there could be an impact on the match if these restrictions were tightened at short notice very close to the match date. A number of the MCC players travel significant distances for this fixture.

However, I am pleased to report that the League is now planning to stage a match involving 22 Cheshire club players in place of the scheduled MCC fixture. This will again be at Nantwich this Thursday, August 13, and it will be 40 overs per side with an 1130 start.
