

DEATH OF MRS. A. CONDON, CHURCH STREET, CAHIR.

Deep and profound regret was occasioned in Cahir and district by the unexpected death of Mrs. Annie Condon, wife of Mr. Philip Condon, photographer and licensed vintner, which took place at her residence, Church street, Cahir, on Tuesday, 9th inst. Deceased, who had attained her 55th year, came of an old and highly respected family (the Carews, of Knockgraffon). She was of a kind and amiable disposition, and was a general favorite with all who knew her. She was in her usual health up to Monday night, when she took suddenly ill, and in spite of all that Drs. Cusack and Walsh, who were soon in attendance, could do, she passed peacefully away at about 1.30 p.m. of Tuesday. In her last hours she was attended by Rev. R. Power, P.P., and Revs. Father Burke and Father Meskill. She leaves a husband and four young children to mourn her loss. Sincerest sympathy is felt for her husband in his very sad bereavement.

On Wednesday the remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, and Thursday morning at 10.30 o'clock Requiem Office and High Mass were celebrated. Rev. R. Power, P.P., Cahir, presided, the celebrant of the Mass being Rev. R. Meskill, C.C. In the choir were—Rev. M. Walsh, P.P., Ardinnan; Rev. W. P. Burke, C.C., Cahir; Rev. J. Murphy, C.C., New Inn; Rev. The above-named priests assisted in the recitation of the last prayers at the graveside. The attendance of the general public, both at the removal of the remains to the Church and again at the interment, was large and representative, testifying in a marked manner to the respect and esteem entertained for deceased and family.
