## Families at Mosstown and Philipstown in 1852

Sir Frederick Foster succeeded to the baronetcy and the Louth estate on the death of his father, Augustus, in 1848. Although he never became a resident landlord he devoted considerable time and attention to the housing of his tenants and the care of his estate.<sup>2</sup> A memorandum<sup>3</sup> submitted to Sir Frederick in February, 1852 states: ". . . With respect to the townlands of Mosstown, Lismanus & Philipstown I consider them much overrented—particularly the last mentioned. The land generally is very bad—not at all suited to large tenants except at very depreciated value—therefore politic moderately to enlarge holdings of present occupants. . . . Since the list<sup>3</sup> here published is endorsed September, 1852 it can be assumed that it was drawn up with a view to implementing that recommendation.

Vere Foster, Sir Frederick's brother, had launched his major emigration scheme a few years previously<sup>4</sup> and it is obvious from the list that the New World and remittances from relatives there had begun to play their part in the scheme of things. Emigration was not confined to

America since a pencilled note says that one family was going to Australia.

The summary given at the end of the list is not precisely accurate, a common enough fault with such documents. The number of families is correct provided we count the two households in the Widow Flanagan's as separate units. The actual number of individuals is 198, 107 males and 91 females as opposed to 202, 108 males and 94 females, in the summary.

Although more or less contemporaneous with Griffith's Valuation<sup>5</sup> the list has a number of names which do not appear in that work. It is given here exactly as in the original.
