STATE OF IRELAND. A London Paper says, it has good reason to believe, that the Duke of Wellington is determined to proceed in good earnest with the settlement of Ireland. One measure on which his Grace is said to place comparatively reliance is the strengthening of the Police of Ireland, and composing exclusively of Englishmen and Scotchmen, free from all local partialities and connections. It is also intended that the expense of the police force shall fall on the district calling for it. To this measure it is intended to add a modified provision for the poor, which it is expected will have the effect of uniting all men of property in the good Government of the country, and tending to the security of continuing an enormous military establishment in Ireland.

The two years allowed for the use of the old Weights and Measures, under Mr. Peel's Act, are nearly expired, and the public must be cautious how they use any other than the Imperial, as there are penalties attached, of which we doubt not the informers will avail themselves.

Articles of association are agreed upon between the Calvinistic Ministers and the Unitarian Members of the Synod of Ulster. The Archbishop of Tuam is about to dispute the right of the corporation of Galway to appoint a Warden of the town.

The Bazaar for the Protestant Colonies through Ireland. One gentleman has transmitted from London 5000 l. in support of the fund for establishing Protestant Colonies through Ireland.

Mr. O'Connell states his intention immediately after arrival in Dublin, to propose the plan of a society, whose object will be, a repeal of the Union. In the letter to which we refer, Mr. O'Connell expresses a sanguine confidence in the co-operation of all Irishmen of all parties.
