

## **The Pupil Premium**

Pupil Premium refers to the additional funding from 2011 provided by the Department for Education (DfE). The amount of funding is calculated on the number of children in our school who are in receipt of free school meals or who are Looked After Children (LAC). There is requirement for us to publish the amount of funding we receive each year, evidence how this was spent and what the impact has been on raising standards.

### **2012-2013:**

Kirkstall Valley Primary School received £42,000 as part of its Pupil Premium allocation (April 2012 – March 2013). This was used to fund the following:

Teaching support for intervention teaching	£ 22,880
Small group tuition for targeted children	£ 12,097
Support for children / families through pastoral TA	£ 12,551

### **2013 – 2014:**

Kirkstall Valley Primary School received **£61,200** as part of its Pupil Premium allocation (April 2013 – March 2014). This is being used to fund the following:

Teaching support for intervention teaching	£ 50,220
Small group tuition for targeted children	£ 5,563
Support for children / families through pastoral TA	£ 5,467
Opportunities for targeted families through our Cluster	£ 1,500
Subsidised after school clubs for targeted children	£ 2,000
Learning opportunities for targeted families	£ 2,000

**TOTAL £66,750**

Kirkstall Valley Primary School is committed to its aim of ensuring all children reach their full potential in these important primary school years. Pupil Premium children and Looked After Children also benefit from the following:

- small group interventions;
- additional daily interventions and teaching provided by trained Teaching Assistants;
- daily interventions, based on the Individual Education Plans (IEPs) by teaching assistants under the direction of the class teachers;
- our ongoing increase to our reading resources – guided reading books, library books, class readers;
- our ongoing increase to our ICT resources – class set of laptops, update of computers in ICT suite, ICT packages;
- Breakfast Club – run by 3 staff every morning;
- curriculum enhancement through outside services visiting school – Science, Drama, Writing, Languages and Dance workshops;
- subsidised trips out of school to stimulate learning.



There were 4 FSM children – 1 child being on SEN Register as SA+.

1 child was not Homegrown and joined us at the beginning of Year 5.

There were no looked after children in this cohort.
