RAF	The Royal Air	<input type="checkbox"/>	World War Two in Europe began on 3rd September 1939, when the Prime Minister of Britain, Neville Chamberlain, declared war on Germany. It involved many of the world's countries. On 8 May 1945, the Allies accepted Germany's surrender, about a week after Adolf Hitler had committed suicide.			
Refugees	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war	<input type="checkbox"/>	The heavy and frequent bombing attacks on London and other cities was known as the 'Blitz'. Night after night, from September 1940 until May 1941, German bombers attacked British cities, ports and industrial areas. Other cities and towns were also heavily bombed, including Swansea, Cardiff, Bristol, Southampton, Plymouth, Birmingham, Coventry and Liverpool.			
Armistice	An agreement by both sides to stop fighting while a peace treaty is negotiated.	<input type="checkbox"/>	Evacuation means leaving a place. During the Second World War, many children living in big cities and towns were moved temporarily from their homes to places considered safer, usually out in the countryside.			
Christmas Truce	The Christmas Truce was an unofficial cease fire between the two sides of World War I on Christmas.			<p>War is incredibly expensive - and this war was no different. Just one day's worth of bullets cost £3.8 million in September 1918.</p> <p>Before the war, Britain was in fact the world's economic superpower, with significant levels of wealth and resources. But war took its toll and the effect of how much it cost was felt for many years to come. It left much of Europe in severe economic hardship. Germany, especially, had to pay an enormous bill of £6,600 million for the damage caused, as well as provide other compensation.</p> <p>World War Two began when Adolf Hitler, the Nazi Party leader of Germany, decided that Germany should expand and become the biggest and most powerful country in the world. Hitler's forces invaded Poland on September 1st 1939. Some countries, including Britain, did not wish to allow Hitler to do this and so on September 3rd 1939 Neville Chamberlain, the Prime Minister of Great Britain declared War on Germany.</p>
