Additional information

Assessment

The course is 100% exam and is examined at the end of the course, pupils will sit one 2hr exam (see below sections).

There will also be assessments for each topic during each term and a mock examination in Yr11.

Section A Beliefs and Teachings

Pupils are required to study the beliefs and teachings of both Christianity and Islam, this will include, the nature of God/Allah, core beliefs, the Trinity and Prophet-hood as well as other topic areas.

Assessment: 60 marks

Section B Relationships and Families

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Pupils will study this topic from a Christian perspective: this will include marriage, cohabitation, divorce, sex, the role and purpose of families and issues around gender, equality and discrimination.

Assessment: 30 marks

Section C Dialogue between Religious and Non-Religious Beliefs and Attitudes

Pupils will study this topic from a Christian perspective: this will include the challenges faced by religion and dialogue between and within religious groups and dialogue between religious and non-religious groups.

Assessment: 30 marks
