- Unacceptable behaviour on our school grounds, e.g. fighting
 - Children and adults feeling frightened on school grounds
3. If you see, or hear, something that concerns you regarding the welfare of one of our pupils:
- Come into school and speak to Debra de Muschamp, Gill Littlemore and Carolyn Trueman
 - Make a note of the concerns including the time, date, factual details and names where possible; pass this information to school. You can remain anonymous if you wish.

Talking on Facebook

Please refrain from discussing the school, or its staff, on a social networking site such as Facebook or Twitter. This protects not only the school but yourselves too! Members of staff can, and will, contact the police if there are malicious comments made about them.

Photographs

If you would like to upload any photographs of your children at school events such as school productions or sharing assemblies please remember that only your own child should be on the picture. Safeguarding Children at Valley Road Community Primary School



All adults coming onto school premises, including the playground and inside the building, have a duty of care towards the welfare of the children at our school and that of all adults.

Together we have a collective responsibility!

What is safeguarding?

Every child can potentially be hurt, put at risk from harm or abused regardless if their age, gender, religion or ethnicity.

Safeguarding means that:

- Children are protected from mistreatment.
- A child's health, or development, is protected.
- Children grow up with safe and effective care.
- Action is taken to ensure the best outcomes for all children.

Safeguarding is the action we take to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. It is everyone's responsibility!

Equally we are all responsible for ensuring we all safeguard each other as adults.

Child protection

This is the process of protecting children who may be suffering from, or at risk of, significant harm. This includes physical abuse, sexual abuse, neglect and emotional harm.

Child protection promotes the rights and welfare of all children. Our school Child Protection leaders are Gill Littlemore and Carolyn Trueman. These members of staff are responsible for speaking to parents if concerns arise, and making referrals to Children's Social Care with, or without, parental permission. School guidelines

By following these simple guidelines you safeguard pupils at our school and yourself.

1. Parents must never approach other people's children to discuss any type of issue with them. This is unacceptable and the school will take immediate action should this happen. This will involve calling Children's Social Care as this is our legal duty. We may also call the police. When threatening and unfamiliar adults approach children, they feel:

- Frightened
- Vulnerable
- Unsafe
- Scared
- Intimidated

You wouldn't like your child to feel this way. Take the right approach — come into school and let us deal with it!
