## Our responses:

- Report cards are sent out in the autumn and spring terms. They are to give a
  simplified overall picture of attainment and progress. Parents are then given the
  opportunity to discuss the outcomes at parents' evening which follows. A full
  detailed report is given at the end of the school year. Many schools only report
  annually.
- We have taken on board comments about communication in the Early Years. We now
  have Tapestry up and running which will provide a picture of what your child is
  achieving. We will also introduce for next year an earlier more informal parent
  consultation meeting.
- We are always willing to discuss any concerns that you have so please do not wait for a parents evening or report card if you wish to receive updates on progress and well-being.
- Participation in sport has greatly increased over the past year. We run after school sports clubs, have twice weekly PE lessons (one led by a specialist) and enter a variety of inter school sports events. Our most recent sports day was differentiated and more competitive. The school currently holds the bronze School Games Mark and is aiming for silver next year. Transport to competitive events can sometimes be an issue so we are always looking for parent volunteers who are prepared to assist with transport.
- This year, all our KS2 children are involved in a drama project with Anvil Arts and will be part of a performance of Ghandi, at the Anvil theatre in March. We are currently developing our curriculum to include more art and drama.
- Our school improvement plan has a focus area on developing children's awareness of
  cultural diversity and this has been improved through curriculum topics, visits from
  cultural groups and projects such as Anvil Arts. KS2 children have a short French
  lesson each week. If any parents are available to support us with these areas please
  let me know.
- If parents are interested in specialist music lessons (as an alternative to Rocksteady) we can contact Hampshire Music Services or other providers. Please

let us know if you are interested and what instrument your child would be interested in learning.

- 26% did not know if the school dealt effectively with bullying. In every school and sometimes workplaces, bullying can occur. I assure you, however, that bullying is not tolerated at our school. Through assemblies and lessons we promote tolerance and respect to others and this is part of our school ethos. We monitor pupil well-being and if we notice any changes to behaviour we record this and deal with it with great sensitivity. The school has an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant who works with 'vulnerable' children. Children who may have been bullied or indeed bully are coached and mentored for support. The school has positive behaviour and anti-bullying policies which can be viewed on the website.
- Homework is always a contentious issue and we do not expect everyone to agree with homework. The response though has been a positive one from the majority of parents. The school believes and can evidence through children's progress that homework supports the acquisition and learning of the basic skills, particularly in English and Maths.
- In the questionnaire we asked whether parents would be interested in a breakfast club. We had 16 parents who said yes (24%) so this is something we will now look into for September and discuss a proposal with our Governing Body.
