


Sport Premium Grant 2013/4 Expenditure



Impact of primary school sports funding 2013/14

Sports Premium Funding has been used to support the development of staff confidence and skill levels in delivering PE lessons (through CPD for two Subject Leaders, who were then able to support staff). Self evaluative questionnaires were completed, with a six month gap between, to embed some specific training. The results of the questionnaires show that there is a significant rising trend in staff confidence and an awareness of the various aspects that make good and outstanding PE teaching.

Additionally, money was spent bringing in a sports specialist, to upskill teachers in relation to games. Data analysis had shown that there was a need to focus on above average attainment in games. The most recent results show that the amount of children working at above age expected levels in KS1, in games has almost doubled.

Sport Premium Grant 2014/5

Background

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum for academic years 2013/14 and 2014/15 to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children / develop healthy lifestyles.

The purpose of the funding is that schools will have to spend the sport funding in improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Allocation

Funding for schools will be calculated by the number of primary aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11) as at the annual census in January 2013.

Based on a full year all schools with 17 or more primary aged pupils will receive a lump sum of £8,000 plus a premium of £5 per pupil. Smaller schools will receive £500 per pupil. Cottesbrooke Infant School will receive £5191.66 in November 2014 and £3708.34 in May 2015.

Funding Period

The sport funding will be paid for the two academic years 2013/14 and 2014/15. Beyond this period is still to be confirmed.

Accountability

Schools will be held to account for how they spend the sport funding. Ofsted has strengthened its coverage of sport and PE within the Inspectors' Handbook and supporting guidance, so that schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the school's overall provision offered. Schools should publish the amount of grant received; how it has been spent (or will be spent) and what impact the school has seen on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment as a result, to help to ensure that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles.

Cottesbrooke Infant School

Spending:

The school will receive a grant of £8900 for the academic year 2014 /5. This money will be used in a number of different ways to support the provision of improved quality of sports, PE and physical activity for all pupils:

How we plan to spend the funding:

During the academic year 2014/5, Cottesbrooke Infant School aim to increase the physical activity of pupils, at times other than in PE lessons. We also intend to continue to develop staff confidence and skills, raising standards in the teaching and learning of PE.
