



Midgley School Pupil Premium Statement

What is Pupil Premium?

The pupil premium is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers.

Pupil premium funding is available to both mainstream and non-mainstream schools, such as special schools and pupil referral units.

Funding for 2016/17

In the 2016 to 2017 financial year, schools will receive the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years:

- £1,320 for pupils in reception year to year 6
- £935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11

Schools will also receive £1,900 for each pupil identified in the spring school census as having left local-authority care because of 1 of the following:

- adoption
- a special guardianship order
- a child arrangements order
- a residence order

If a pupil has been registered as eligible for free school meals and has also left local-authority care for any of the reasons above, they will attract the £1,900 rate.

Children who have been in local-authority care for 1 day or more also attract £1,900 of pupil premium funding. Funding for these pupils is managed by the virtual school head (VSH) in the local authority that looks after the child.

Plans for 2016/17 Pupil Premium and Pupil Premium Plus allocation

Pupil Premium Funding for 2016/17 is projected to be £9240

Barriers to Learning at Midgley School:

Low Achievement – The pupil premium allocation will be used to support low attaining and low achieving pupils by providing a facility for small group work using Teaching Assistants who are also able to deliver interventions where needed. We also use Teaching Assistants to support the class, allowing teaching staff to deliver catch up sessions with identified pupils.

Emotional Wellbeing – Pupils who are targeted for intervention in KS2 and any other pupils identified as needing emotional well-being support can also have sessions in Forest School. This will support pupils with emotional wellbeing problems as they are boosted in self-confidence, self-esteem and have opportunity to work closely with peers in a team. An emotional well-being company called Invictus was also bought in to support pupils dealing with personal/family issues

Measuring the Impact:

Half-termly pupil premium progress meetings will be held with teaching staff to specifically track progress and attainment.

Books will be scrutinised and the school tracking system will be used for data analysis.

The Standards Committee of the Governing Board will receive termly data in relation to pupil premium pupils.

A review of the strategy used to spend the grant for pupil premium children will be held in July 2017.

Funding for 2015/16

The allocation for 2015/16 was £6660

The pupil premium grant was used to support low attaining and low achieving pupils by providing a facility for small group work using Teaching Assistants and Higher Level Teaching Assistants and also 1:1 intervention.

Impact of Pupil Premium Funding 2015/16– end of KS Results

Key Stage 2

At the end of 2015/16 - 50% of Y6 pupil premium pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, maths and SPAG

Key Stage 1

There were no Y2 pupils in receipt of pupil premium money

In other year groups

Across the rest of KS1, 100% of other pupils receiving pupil premium achieved expected or higher in terms of Age Related Expectations in Reading, Writing and Maths.

Across the rest of KS2, 50% of pupil premium pupils attained expected level in Reading, 25% of pupil premium pupils attained expected level in Writing and Maths.
