We aim to ensure

- That all children, staff and visitors are safe.
- That adults and children take responsibility for their actions.
- That issues are dealt with consistently and in line with school policies.



What school will do

Follow safer recruitment practice when recruiting staff.

Ensure all staff and adults who work with the children have current DBS clearance.

Ensure all staff receive Safeguarding training and know what to do if they are worried about a child.

Ensure that the school site is safe and secure.

Ensure that appropriate records are kept of Safeguarding/ Child Protection incidents within school.

How you can help:

Please keep your contact details including mobile numbers and Emergency Contact Details up to date with the School Office.

Please let the school know if your child has an accident at home.

Let us know as soon as possible if your child is going to be absent.

Let the school know of any changes at home that might affect your child's behaviour.

Attend any meetings school may call to discuss your child.

Collect your child as soon as possible if they become poorly and you are asked to come and collect them.

Understand that sometimes we may need to speak to other professionals before yourselves if we are worried about a child's wellbeing and safety.
