



PE Sport funding – School Website Document 2016 - 2017

What is PE Sport Funding?

The Government provides additional funding for physical education (PE) and sport in schools.

This ring fenced funding is to be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision resulting in increased numbers of pupils developing healthy life styles, raising their performance levels and engaging in PE and sport..

Haworth Primary School received £8,618 altogether for the academic year 2015 – 2016 and this amount is predicted to be similar in 2016 - 2017.

Purpose of funding

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they have the freedom to choose how they do this.

How is it spent?

The additional PE and sport funding pays in part for the:

- Employment of a specialist PE teacher
- Bikeability sessions for KS2 and balancability training for EYFS / KS1.
- Olympic Sports Visitor
- Hula Hoop workshop day for the whole school
- Additional play equipment to provide resources for the Sports Leaders at lunchtime
- Assisted places enabling vulnerable pupils to attend school clubs
- Additional PE Apparatus – including alternative sports.
- Forest School Training
- Yoga in Schools Training
- Bradford PE Conference
- Subscription to Bradford PE support Service
- PE Network Meetings
- Change 4 Life training.
- Purchase of indoor archery kits
- Support for outdoor education residential visits - KS2 classes (Blackhills, Robinwood)
- Development of 'Forest Schools' outdoor education activities across school through the use of Wildways to train teachers in developing active outdoor education linked to the curriculum.

Below is a list of how schools can spend the funding and how this is developed at Haworth Primary School

Possible uses	How Haworth Primary is using the funding
Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE	At Haworth Primary, we have an outstanding specialist PE teacher working with the children from Year 1 through to Year 6. She introduces a wide range of new sports (including alternative sports), develops the competitive element of team games, coordinates our school clubs, advises on resources and supports in specialist advice. She has led the school to become a PE Centre of Excellence and is now leading training for schools across the district. This demonstrates the impact of how the funding is being effectively used. She ensures active participation in competitive sports across the whole school and has built a sustainable model for managing these. In addition, she has created intra school competitive sports through House Challenge activities and close links with specialist coaches through local clubs to enhance staff training.
Supporting and engaging the least active children through Change4Life clubs and targeted Intra school competition.	At Haworth, staff received training in the Change4Life activities and received resources to help develop these activities in school. We have a regular Change4Life club, where targeted children are invited to work with The PE specialist.
<p>Paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport</p> <p>Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport</p>	<p>At Haworth, we work very closely with the local schools in training each other and developing our PE expertise. We are now leading the new PE network for the Bradford district and also for West Yorkshire Sport. The appointment of a PE specialist has ensured that we are at the forefront of high quality provision.</p> <p>The PE Specialist has attended a range of training events over this academic year and last year this included the Start to Move research led training. This led to the school being invited to the House of Lords to celebrate the impact of groundbreaking programme. Our targeted training has led to the range of provision across the school being broadened to include non-traditional sports e.g. Ultimate frisbee, new age curling. New resources have been purchased to support this whole school approach.</p>
Running sport competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in the School Games	The school has always been involved in the many competitions within the area, including multi-skills, football, tag rugby, netball and rounders and many more. We run a wide range of sports clubs in school which allow for a competitive element and development of skills as well as encouraging an active lifestyle. We also keep abreast of national and international events and develop opportunities for children to be involved with them in their own way, such as the locality annual torch relays. We have achieved the Sainsburys Gold School Games award for the second year, which reflects the impact of our commitment to games provision. We are finalists in the Bradford Schools Games for the second year in a row and we have seen an increased participation in out of school sports.
Buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE and sport	Not only have we purchased new PE equipment for the structured lesson time, money has also been used to provide better resources for children to be active during lunchtime. This has included training for the lunchtime supervisors and the teachers. This is now being implemented during the 2016 – 17 academic year.

Possible uses	How Haworth Primary is using the funding
	<p>In addition, we brought in specialist coaches for a range of activities; such as tag rugby, cricket, football which has also provided high quality professional development for staff as they work with the children.</p> <p>This year we have also used Wildways, to provide high quality training for all staff. The leader is working alongside class teachers to provide high quality, outdoor, adventurous activities with meaningful cross-curricular links. This will provide a sustainable model for the use of our extensive grounds.</p>
<p>Providing places for pupils on after school sports clubs and holiday clubs</p>	<p>We trialed the introduction of TSC sports club holiday activities and provided funded places for disadvantaged children. Unfortunately the take up for this was low, so we are currently investigating alternative solutions for holiday activities.</p> <p>We have also funded club places for children who may be talented at a particular sport in our extra-curricular activities. Families who do not come under the Pupil premium heading but have financial difficulties, or have a number of children at the school may find it difficult, at times, to pay for places at the sports clubs their children wish to attend. The school has a policy of supporting the children to ensure that all have equal opportunities. The PE Premium Funding is supporting us with this in order that it does not impact on our core budget. We have provided funded places, in order to allow children to attend high quality sports coaching.</p>

Accountability

Schools are required to include details of their provision of PE and sport on their website, alongside details of their broader curriculum, so that parents can compare sports provision between schools, both within and beyond the school day.

From September 2013, schools have been held to account over how they spend their additional, ring-fenced funding. Ofsted have strengthened the coverage of PE and sport within the 'Inspectors' handbook', so that both schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed as part of the school's overall provision.

Ofsted will also carry out a survey reporting on the expenditure of this additional funding and its impact. It is anticipated that this funding will increase at the end of the next financial year, therefore school will need to consider how we ensure that this high quality provision is retained and extended with the new provision.
