

**Copy of Mr F.A. Stannard's (CCI) Report on the work of this School.  
Date of visit: April 23<sup>rd</sup> 1914**

The school is ably conducted: the scheme of instruction is generally suitable and supervision on the part of the Master continues to be thorough. The teachers in all classes prepare regular forecasts of the work to be attempted day by day, and, as usual, the periodical reports of the master are of a helpful and discriminating character.

Tone and order continue to be very good indeed in the first class; the scholars manifest great interest in their work and the standard of proficiency is creditable to the master. The class immediately below the first is in the charge of a new teacher; he is evidently desirous of doing well, but if good results are to be achieved he must be more successful than he is at present in securing the interests and cooperation of the scholars generally. It is satisfactory to place on record the improvements exhibited by the teacher of the third standard; her class is now in good order, the scholars being attentive and alert. The lowest class continues to be ably handled.

Of the routine subjects, handwriting is good and some creditable specimens of composition are exhibited, though the scholars as a whole might with advantage write at greater length.

Arithmetic is a subject requiring further attention in the fourth, fifth and sixth standards; the scholars should display greater aptitude in applying principles to the solution of simple and varied problems.

The scholars in the first class give a creditable response when questioned in geography, and their sketch maps are decidedly good. The needlework of the older girls should be cleaner and they should receive more practice in cutting out. An extension of the Handwork exercises on the lines indicated at the time of the inspection is desirable. Drawing, both with the pencil and brush is good.

The arrangements made in connection with the lessons in religious instruction are of a very satisfactory character.
