Definition of a Drug

A drug is a substance which, when taken into the body, changes the way we perceive things and the way the body works.

This policy covers a range of drugs including medicines, tobacco, alcohol, solvents and illegal drugs

Rationale

Current research indicates that the use of drugs, both legal and illegal, is prevalent in the lives of young people. . As part of the school's care and welfare of its pupils, we believe we have a duty to inform and educate them about drug use. Schools share responsibility with parents and the community to educate pupils about the consequences of drug use and misuse and to encourage them to make healthy, informed choices by increasing knowledge, challenging attitudes and practising skills. We also believe that the misuse of any drugs by members of the school community cannot be condoned and will be dealt with consistently and clearly with regard to the needs of the school and the individuals concerned. Fundamental to the schools values and practice is the principle of sharing the responsibility for the education of young people with parents, keeping them informed and involved at all times. Effective communication and co-operation is essential to the successful implementation of this policy.

The Catholic Primary Schools of the Waveney Valley are committed to the health and safety of everyone in our community and we will work together to enable pupils to make healthy, informed choices and discourage the misuse of drugs.

Purposes

- To develop a whole school approach to drug education in the context of the curriculum of the school, both formal and informal, with particular reference to Science and PSHE & Citizenship and as part of our Healthy Schools Work
- To provide accurate information about a range of drugs, including medicines, alcohol and tobacco
- To explore attitudes and develop skills in making decisions about drugs
- To have a clear and agreed understanding among everyone in the school community about the implications and possible consequences of drug use / misuse
- To establish an atmosphere / environment / situation in which the schools are free from the misuse of any drugs
- To clarify appropriate procedures in the management of drug related incidents
- To respond to any individual in the school community in need of support
- To enable pupils to identify sources of confidential advice and support, as school staff are unable to guarantee absolute confidentiality in serious cases of drug misuse.

Guidelines

Pupils at The Catholic Primary Schools of the Waveney Valley will follow an integrated drug education programme which is responsive to needs and relevant to their age, experience and maturity. It will be delivered through the existing curriculum, mainly Science and PSHE & Citizenship. It will focus on the development of knowledge, skills and attitudes and will emphasise self-esteem and decision making skills.

Management of drug-related incidents

The Headteacher is responsible for co-ordinating the management of drug-related incidents. Support for dealing with incidents will be sought from outside agencies as appropriate.

Procedures

- 1.1. It is the policy of The Catholic Primary Schools of the Waveney Valley Primary School, that no child should bring any drug, legal or illegal, to school. If a child will need medication during the school day the parent or guardian should notify the school and ask permission for the medication to be brought. This should be taken directly to the relevant school office for safekeeping. Any medication needed by a child while in school must be taken under the supervision of a teacher or other adult worker.
- 1.2. The school will take very seriously misuse of any substances such as glue, other solvents, or alcohol. The parents or

guardians of any child involved will always be notified. Any child who deliberately brings substances into school for the purpose of misuse may be punished by a fixed-term or permanent exclusion depending on the circumstances, and the police and social services will be informed. If the offence is repeated, the child will be (if they were not previously) permanently excluded, and the police and social services will be informed.

- 1.3. If any child is found to be suffering from the effects of alcohol or other substances, arrangements will be made for that child to be taken home and a referral will be made to Social Services.
- 1.4. It is forbidden for anyone, adult or child, to bring onto the school premises illegal drugs. Any child who is found to have brought to school any type of illegal substance may be punished by a fixed-term or permanent exclusion depending on the circumstances, and the police and social services will be informed. If the offence is repeated, the child will be (if they were not previously) permanently excluded, and the police and social services will be informed.
- 1.5. If a child is found to have deliberately brought illegal substances into school, and is found to be distributing these to other pupils, the child will be permanently excluded from the school. The police and social services will also be informed.

We will share responsibility for the education of pupils with parents, who will be kept informed and involved through newsletters, awareness raising evenings and individual discussions when appropriate.

The school works with the Local Authority to provide relevant information and co-ordinated support.

The school has a policy / procedure for the administration of medicines that must be followed for everyone's safety.

Both school sites are designated 'non-smoking areas'.

Advice and Support

Where appropriate, pupils will be offered support by the LEA Drugs Adviser / Off The Record / Social Services or the police.

Conclusion

The welfare of our pupils and staff is of paramount concern and we will work together with everyone involved with the school to ensure the continued education and well being of all of our children
