


PRU's News!

Wrenthorpe site have had students on work experience, several on travel training, we have had an enterprise day, successful off site visits, are piloting a community cyber café for the elderly of our Wrenthorpe community, taken part in the local churches Christmas event and have had an art exhibition in a local church. The Hospital Site.

At our hospital site, based at Pinderfields, we provide education for children and young people whilst they are sick or injured and support their transition back to their own school. We work with children between the ages of 5 and 18, but we also accommodate older children if there are special needs to consider.

Children who are inpatients for less than 3 days are taught from our planned topics which are based on the National Curriculum. Children who are inpatients for longer periods have their own school curriculum delivered to them to enable them to keep in line with their peers as much as possible.

We are also a registered exam centre so we are able to accommodate and deliver exams such as GCSE's.



Student council success.

Some people might think that student councils are for big mainstream schools but our first PRU student council meeting couldn't have gone better. Our unique student perspective helped us come up with creative ideas to make Pinderfields Hospital PRU a better place. Subjects on the agenda include recycling bins, year 11's celebrations, and ordering from a local café at lunch time. We even took an anonymous vote on what activity to do on the year 11 trip and we decided on a trip to Xscape. Everyone's voice was heard in a way that wouldn't work in a large mainstream school. Student representatives were also elected, these roles included secretary (to take minutes) and vice and head chair. The head chair took the minutes to the head mistress and she had the final decision on what ideas to carry out. As a result of the student council every Friday we are allowed to bring money in to order from the local café in Wakefield. Student council has the potential to improve our education at Pinderfields Hospital PRU and make sure our voices are heard.

Management Committee:

My name is Olive Hughes and I am Chair of the Pinderfields Hospital PRU Management Committee.



Firstly, may I thank students and staff for inviting the Management Committee to contribute to their newsletter. We are very pleased and proud to do so and thought it would be useful to begin with a description of the committee and what we do.

The Management Committee is part of the leadership and management of the PRU, working with the Headteacher, who is a member of the committee, alongside the Senior Leadership Team. The Headteacher is responsible for the day-to-day management of the PRU; the committee's main responsibilities are:

- ◇ Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction;
- ◇ Holding the Headteacher to account for the educational performance of the PRU, its pupils and the performance management of the staff;

Overseeing the financial performance of the PRU and making sure its money is well spent.

In addition, Members have a duty to ensure that staff and children are kept safe.

The membership of the committee includes representatives of parents, staff and the Local Authority. Other members are recruited from schools, where possible, and from the local community.

The committee meets six times during the academic year. At each meeting, members receive very comprehensive reports from the Headteacher and PRU Business Manager, as well as a presentation from a member of staff about their areas of responsibility within the PRU.

SNAKE HUNT

On Friday mornings every week we do a P.E. lesson mostly off site. Last term we went to the gym at the sports and social club in Pontefract. We did many different activities. This term we are currently going on countryside walks. We have been to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park and we have been to Newmillerdam.
