Addington School Transition Information

The transition process to adulthood starts in Year 9 and continues until the young person leaves education or training. This age has been set by the Government to support young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) in mainstream settings. All students at Addington have the option to stay until the end of the academic year in which they are 19. This will mean two years in Key Stage 4 (14 -16) and up to three years in Key Stage 5 or Further Education (FE) as it is known at Addington. Our more independent young people usually stay for a year or a maximum of two years in FE.

Recent changes by the government mean that currently every young person legally has to be in full time education or training until they are 18. This does not mean that young people have to stay in school but it does mean that they need to stay in education or training.

Curriculum at Addington

Key Stage 4 (14 – 16)

- Key Stage 4 students follow the National Curriculum for core subjects adapted to suit their needs and functional skills e.g. Mathematics and English. Science and ICT may be delivered as discrete lessons, but are also delivered across the whole curriculum. PSD (Personal and Social Development) is also considered a core subject at Addington.
- All students work towards English and Maths either under ASDAN* Personal Progress or at Entry level*. (*See note below)
- More independent students at Key Stage 4 have the opportunity to work towards ASDAN Personal Development at Bronze or Silver Challenge.
- Some students will get the opportunity to enter a Level 1 Functional Skills exam for English and or Maths.
- There is an emphasis on communication skills and developing practical skills within the community which will prepare students for future adult life.
- Where appropriate Year 12 students attend the Links taster course at Reading College and links with other local colleges. These opportunities provide students with an invaluable experience of college life and opportunities to work on a range of subjects in a new environment sometimes with students from other schools.
- All Year 10 and 11 students access internal and external work experience placements.
 There is greater emphasis on work related learning and careers work at this stage, in
 order to prepare the young person for leaving school and moving on either to College or
 work. We work closely with the external organisations including the Education Business
 Partnership and Optalis to ensure our curriculum suits the needs of the students as they
 move into adulthood.
- All students have the opportunity to use community facilities for some of their PE sessions as part of their accredited courses.

^{*}ASDAN is a curriculum development organisation and awarding body, offering programmes and qualifications that explicitly grow skills for learning, skills for employment and skills for life. (www.asdan.org.uk)

^{*}Entry Level is the lowest level in the National Qualifications Framework and lies below GCSE. Qualifications at this level recognise basic knowledge and skills and the ability to apply learning in everyday situations under direct guidance or supervision. Learning at this level involves building basic knowledge and skills and is not usually geared towards specific occupations. Entry Level qualifications can be taken at three levels (Entry 1 -lowest, Entry 2 and Entry3 - highest). They are targeted at a range of learners, including students with learning difficulties. The level after Entry Level in the National Qualifications Framework is Level 1, which includes GCSE grades D-G. After which is Level 2 which includes GCSE grades A-C.

Key Stage 5 or Further Education (FE) (16 – 19 as appropriate to young person)

- The curriculum in KS5/FE focuses on preparing the students for the next stage in their education or for the work place. The emphasis on communication and development of practical skills continues, and there are now more opportunities for these skills to be developed within the local community. We are committed to developing personalised learning for our students ensuring they have the opportunity to develop their skills and interests. There is an emphasis on encouraging students, as appropriate, to manage their own learning.
- All students are working on accreditation under 16 -19 Programmes of Study
- Some students work towards Entry Level Qualifications in Functional skills English and Mathematics either under ASDAN Personal Progress or through discrete Entry Level Qualifications.
- More independent students follow ASDAN Employability at Entry Level 2. Other areas covered include PSD (Entry Level), Citizenship, Mini enterprise, Food technology / Meal Preparation, the Arts, Leisure Activities, Music, ICT, Horticulture and Hospitality.
- PE is generally held at different community venues e.g. Rivermead Sports Centre, Loddon Valley Leisure Centre, golf driving range, Oakwood Centre.
- Most students attend a weekly Links taster course at local colleges and there is an emphasis on using facilities in the community.
- Key Stage 5 more dependent students may attend a Links Course run by Reading College but based at Our House, Wokingham.
- Some more dependent students may have the opportunity to attend placements, for example Wokingham Adult Services (Optalis) in preparation for transition and life after school
- The majority of students will take part in a bespoke period of work experience either internally or externally, dependent on their levels of independence and individual needs.
- Some more independent students will have the opportunity of an extended period of external work experience lasting over a number of weeks.
- We are also developing very successful supported work related learning placements for our more dependent students.
- We are currently running a supported internship with the Wokingham division of the National Grid (NG). Our final or penultimate year students remain on the school roll but are based at NG, over the course of the year they will work in two to three departments supported by trained job coaches in order to develop their awareness and skills in the world of work.
- During the summer term leavers who are moving to a college placement will be given the opportunity to spend additional time at college as part of the transition process.
- We make timely referrals and review each student's EHCP to ensure appropriate services are signposted and we try hard to get those in place before the student leaves school.





<u>Accreditation at Addington School (Upper School - Key Stage 4 and 5 – 14-19)</u>

- **Accreditation** is used to provide a rich diversity of subject areas and practical activities to meet the personalised learning needs of all our students.
- We provide a curriculum with sufficient breadth to enable a wide range of
 experiences for our students. This ensures that they become increasingly independent.
 Every student will have the opportunity to engage in externally accredited work. The
 accredited schemes we use are practically based and allow our students to be active in
 their learning. All students are following appropriate accredited courses suiting their
 learning needs.
- All students work on the core subjects to improve literacy including communication, numeracy and personal and social development skills.

16-19 Programmes of Study

The needs of students with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) can vary widely, but the study programme principles still apply. Students should follow a programme that stretches them, prepares them for adulthood, and supports their progression into work or further study. For students with SEND who have a learning difficulty assessment (LDA) or an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan, a study programme can apply up to the age of 25. Institutions, in discussion with the student, need to assess what type of programme is most suitable given their career aspirations.

While some students with SEND should be on study programmes which help them achieve stretching qualifications, others will benefit from a study programme which concentrates on high quality work experience and other non-qualification activities to help them prepare for employment and adult life more generally, rather than on qualifications. As part of their study programme, students should be supported to find routes through to employment, building on work experience, and independent living. Young people with a special educational needs (SEN) statement, LDA or EHC plan, can undertake supported internships which aim to prepare them for employment through extended work placements with employers.

An Access to Work (AtW) grant can cover the additional support a young person may need for the in-work element of a supported internship or traineeship. Providers are advised to communicate the existence of AtW to employers when they are setting up a supported internship or traineeship, or where they are helping a student with SEND to progress to employment when they complete their course.

Study programmes for students with less complex needs can also focus on substantive work placements and support to make them work-ready.

Study programmes should always include English and maths, but at an appropriate level. Some students with SEND will be able to work towards achieving GCSE grade C or above, whereas others may qualify for exemption from the condition of funding. More information about this exemption can be found in the EFA condition of funding guidance.

Education, Health, and Care Plan (EHCP)

Under the Special Educational Needs Code of Practice, all Statements of Educational Needs should be replaced by Education, Health, and Care Plans (EHCP) by April 2018. These plans will run from 0 -25 years, provided the young person is in education (not including uni). These plans will be updated annually and will support the transition of young people to their next destination, for example, for a student leaving school to attend college. The plan will support colleges and other services to provide appropriate resources and support for young people. The LA is responsible for updating the plan following an Annual Review.

As part of the changes under the Code of Practice, all Local Authorities (LA) provide a 'Local offer' – this database should support young people, parents and carers to find all the services / activities on offer in the local area. This information will aid transition to other services

We would recommend that all parents consult the 'Local Offer' on LA websites . Below are the current web addresses found via a search engine 'LA name' local offer eg Wokingham local offer

Please remember you may not be restricted to only accessing services from your local borough, for example currently Reading and Bracknell young people (18+) can use their personal budget to buy in services from the Wokingham service Optalis.

Wokingham Borough - Disabled Children's Team (DCT) works with children and young people up to 18 years old. From 16 years old these young people are referred either by the DCT or school to the Adult service, initially to Transition Social Workers and then once a plan is in place to Optalis (Adult Service). Prior to the young person's 18th birthday an assessment of needs will be carried out. This assessment will be updated if needs change and prior to leaving school

Reading Borough Council – since September 2013 the Children's and Young Peoples' Disability Team have responsibility for young people from 0 to 25 years old.

Bracknell Forest – Disabled Children's Team takes responsibility to 18, this is then followed by ASCHH (Adult Social Care, Health and Housing)

Oxford – Works with children and young people until 18 years old. Adult services then take over responsibility for the young person.

West Berkshire – Disabled Children's Team (DCT) works with children and young people until 18 years old. From 18, young people are referred to Adult Services (CTPLD).

Adult Services

Adult services are available to students from 18 years of age. There is a planned transition from Children's Services to Adult Services, facilitated by either a Transition Social Worker or Social Worker.

Personalised Package - Post School

For some students college options will not be suitable and a more personalised package would need to set up. Alternative opportunities exist and can be accessed through Adult Services of local authorities:

- All students should have the support of a Transition Worker or Social Worker attached to Adult Social Care.
- All young people with learning difficulties and disabilities should be known to social care.
- If you are currently not accessing Wokingham Children's Social Care then school will ensure a referral is made to the adult team. This needs to happen in Year 11 in the term when your young person reaches 16.
- Parents from other Local authorities need to ensure their young person is known to the service. School can support on request.

OTHER AREAS TO CONSIDER

Housing – although this can be a difficult subject, it is essential that young people and parents start to investigate possible future housing options and begin to make plans. It may be useful to ensure that young people's names are registered on the housing list. Some young people access supported living, (living with a small group of adults with an appropriate level of support) or live in residential settings. These are issues which need to be discussed with Social Care. Considerable planning and time is needed to ensure the most suitable placement is found and the transition is as smooth as possible.
