

What is the purpose of homework?

We believe that homework plays an important role in:

- Consolidating knowledge, understanding and skills;
- Preparing for lessons;
- Being ready for assessments;
- Deepening enjoyment of a subject;
- Fostering creativity and independence.

Is homework actually useful for learning?

Research by the Sutton Trust and the Education Endowment Foundation suggests that homework tasks which are closely linked to learning help to boost educational achievement. How will I know what homework has been set?

We use an online programme called Show My Homework. A teacher sets a task and a deadline and this will appear in a student's personalised homework calendar. Both students and parents can log on to view homework tasks. It is possible to set up notifications, so that you can be alerted when homework is set by your child's teachers. The website is well designed and user friendly. If you experience problems, the helpdesk is very supportive. If the helpdesk is unable to resolve your issue, please inform your child's form tutor.

How much and how often?

In Years 7, 8 and 9, students can expect between 20 and 50 minutes of homework per subject per week. The exceptions to this in Years 7 and 8 are drama, PE, ethics, ICT and religious studies, who do not set homework due to the infrequency of lessons. English and mathematics, having more frequent lessons, will set more extensive homework.

Key Stage 4

In Years 10 and 11 students can expect between 30 minutes and 1 hour of homework per subject per week. This means students might spend between one and two hours per evening, five times a week. Purchasing a relevant revision guide for each subject and creating revision notes is also a good way to spend additional homework time during Year 10 and 11. Please contact subject teachers for advice on revision guides. If you have any financial difficulties in obtaining study guides, please contact your child's Head of Year.

Science x2	1-2 hours
Option 1 (which may also be science)	30 minutes - 1 hour

Option 4	30 minutes - 1 hour
Total: Minimum 4 hours 30 minutes – Maximum 9 hours

Key Stage 5

In Years 12 and 13, students can expect an hour of independent learning for every hour spent in the classroom.

(only applicable to students sitting four A Levels)

Where can my child go for help and support?

To enable all students to access Show My Homework and have a supportive place to complete work, there is a Homework Hub, with a member of staff present every lunchtime.

The Homework Hub will be in Tech 8 where there are plenty of PCs and printing facilities to use. Please note that students receive £10 of printing credits per year. Any additional printing will need to be paid for through Parent Pay.

Tutor Time

Once a week, form groups will go to a computer room to review homework. These rooms are as follows:

Year 7	Tech 2
Year 8	IL2
Year 9	IL4
Year 10	IL1
Year 11	Tech 8

During this tutor period, the tutor will check your child's usage, submissions and statistics, as well as giving them a chance to log on and raise any issues or concerns. The tutor will also be proactive in identifying issues (a student not logging in for a week, for example) and addressing any problems students are experiencing.

Whilst some homework tasks might be undertaken in this tutor session, this focus will be organisational, rather than being a chance to complete homework.

What happens if homework is not handed in?

- The teacher will record completion or non-completion in SMHW;
- If homework is not completed, students can expect to attend a teacher detention, or be directed to the Homework Hub in the event of a technical issue;
- If students fail to submit three pieces of homework for a subject, the subject teacher will email or call home;
- A record of homework submission will be available at parents' consultation evening.
