Pupil Premium Grant Expenditure: 2016-2017

The Pupil Premium is an additional sum of money that is allocated to schools to support the learning of vulnerable groups of children. It is aimed specially at supporting children in receipt of Free School Meals (F.S.M), Children Looked After by the Authority (L.A.C) and children of armed forces personnel. The intention of the funds is to raise pupil achievement and to ensure that these children can access the same educational opportunities as their peers.

How can you ensure school receives this funding?

If you think that you might be eligible for Free School Meals, then we would encourage you to apply. If you are successful it will help us to support your children at Oakworth Primary School and will ensure that they have the provision that they are entitled to.

Nature of support provided for pupils
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Teaching assistants allocated to each class to carry out daily and weekly interventions. • Pastoral Assistant employed to offer emotional and social support to disadvantaged pupils and their families, so that children could achieve optimum learning and attendance. • Behaviour Mentor employed to support positive behaviour and learning in the classroom. • Breakfast Club provided, to improve punctuality and attendance. • Transport costs met (to and from school) to improve attendance. • Regular 1:1 feedback and support sessions facilitated for disadvantaged pupils in Years 2 and 6, to support SATs preparation. • School trips and residential heavily subsidised or paid for. • Out of school hours' clubs/activities provided free. • Grants given for holiday activities. • Provision made for specific dietary needs. • Daily small group work to promote learning in the Prime Areas (Early Years)

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2016/17



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- Year 2 and 6 pupils provided with regular feedback and support from Cover Supervisors, in order to accelerate their progress in writing and maths.
- Teaching Assistants deliver bespoke interventions in English and Maths, to pupils working below age related expectations.
- Daily 1:1 reading (20 minutes) delivered to pupils where needed.
- Before school RM Maths Club provided for Year 6 (Autumn/Spring terms) and Year 5 (Summer term).
- Extension activities facilitated beyond the classroom.
- Extra support given to challenge the most able (aiming for Mastery).

The impact of Pupil Premium spending

Evaluation focuses on a number of factors, including:

- Academic performance (attainment and progress)
- Impact of classroom interventions
- Attendance
- Behaviour support (if applicable)
- Pastoral support (if applicable)
- Attendance at out of school hours' clubs and holiday activities.

Our key priority is to close any gap between Pupil Premium children and that of their peers across the school, especially in English and Mathematics. All our work through the Pupil Premium is aimed at accelerating progress and moving children to at least age-related expectations.

In 2016/17:

- 80% of Reception PP pupils achieved a Good Level of Development (main cohort – 82%).
- 100% of Year 1 PP pupils passed the Phonics Screening Check (main cohort 97%)
- 100% of Year 2 PP pupils achieved Expected Standard+ in reading (main cohort 87%); 75% in writing (main cohort 80%); 100% in maths (main cohort 85%) and 100% in science (main cohort 87%) in the Key Stage 1 SATs.
- 67% of Year 6 PP pupils achieved Expected Standard+ in writing (main cohort 81%); 58% in reading (main cohort 75%), 75% in maths (main cohort 78%) and 100% in science (main cohort 92%) in the 2017 Key Stage 2 SATs.
- Average progress from KS1 to KS2 in 2017 was Reading: +0.3 (0.0 for main cohort), Writing -0.5 (+1.2 for main cohort) and Maths 0.0 (+0.4 for main cohort).

Across the school (Years 1-6), 70% of Pupil Premium children were working at age-related expectations or above in reading; 64% in writing and 74% in maths.

11% of Pupil Premium children were also children identified with Special Educational Needs or Disabilities. The average attendance for Pupil Premium children (to 19/7/17) was 93.86% (compared to 96.18% for non-pupil premium children).

How will the school use the PPG in 2017/18?

In 2017/18, the initial estimated Pupil Premium funding allocation is **£55,440** (based on 42 eligible pupils). The school aims to maintain the range of initiatives from 2016/7, as it is committed to ensuring that all children, regardless of personal circumstances, can achieve success and have equal access to wider educational experiences. Particular focus will be placed on achievement in English in KS2 and on continuing to improve attendance.
