We recently held our first Traveling Book Fair for 12 years. We held numerous events to promote this including: inviting children from each Key Stage to come along for Breakfast with a Book where families came and had either a croissant or toast with hot chocolate and an opportunity to share a book together.

Families could also come along to buy books after school each night. We raised a brilliant £1,243 which gave us £685 to spend on books. We also won an award of £100 for being the first school to 'Share Your Fair'.

Fabulous Phonics



Parents from both Nursery and Reception classes came into school for two sessions on phonics and letter formation. Mrs Royle and Mrs Ezgu shared with parents how the children are being taught at school so that parents can support their children's learning at home. It was wonderful to see such a good mix of mums, dads and grandparents at the sessions.

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Faith Week

We held a Faith Week during November. We were delighted to welcome Imran, who worked with children in Years 5 and 6 to share his Muslim faith. The children even went on a pilgrimage to Mecca (AKA the Hall). Meanwhile, Pritty led a workshop in the EYFS where the children listened to stories about the Hindu faith, dressed up in traditional Hindu clothes and wore henna hand decorations.



It's Good to Give!

The St Margaret Ward School community have supported many charities during the Autumn term. During Advent, each class raised money for the SVP's Sudan Baby Appeal. Initiatives such as FIFA 18 tournament, as well as selling candy sticks and reindeer food raised £444 — that will feed 11 babies in Sudan for a year. Also in the build-up to Christmas, you kindly donated to the local foodbank to help our families in need closer to home. Earlier in the term, there were also collections for the Cornerstones homeless shelter during Harvest, as well as donations of second-hand shoes, clothes and books to the Africa's Children in Education (ACE) charity.
