## Need to know more about social networks?

The mobile phone company 02 and the NSPCC have set up a fantastic website that allows parents and carers to find out more about the social networks their children use. [www.net-aware.org.uk](http://www.net-aware.org.uk) allows adults to search for the network or app their children currently use and provides really useful information about privacy settings, safety and support.

There are also 'top tips' which give practical advice about how to check security settings for each app.



## **Do you over-share?**

How much information do you share about your children? Almost 71% of parents in the UK share more than 5 images of their children each week on social media and 21% of parents have set up a social media account for their child. UNICEF recently published a 'State of the World's children' report, which looks at how digitally literate our children are and how digital technology is affecting their lives. It reports that one in three internet users are under 18 and highlights the need to safeguard children's privacy and identity online. This also involves teaching children more about digital literacy, so that they are kept informed, engaged and safe whilst using the internet. Our safety message at school reflects this – we teach the children what a wonderful tool the internet can be and encourage them to explore the net to support their learning, whilst also teaching about safety and being responsible online.
