



NAFFERTON PRIMARY SCHOOL SPORTS PREMIUM REPORT FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2017-2018

What is PE Sport Funding?

The Government provides additional funding for physical education (PE) and sport in schools. This funding is to be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision resulting in increased numbers of pupils developing healthy life styles, raising their performance levels and engaging in PE and sport.

The additional PE and sport funding allocated to Nafferton Primary School for the 2017 / 2018 academic year is £18,499 (including carry forward).

Every year we as a school are responsible for reporting how, where and why the sports funding is spent as it is.

In response to parents' questionnaires and to enhance our sports clubs.

At our recent parents' evening, parents were given the opportunity to share their thoughts on various aspects of school, including opportunities beyond the school day. Again, opportunities for Key Stage 1 to participate in extra-curricular activities were identified. This year we have continued to run clubs in the same way as in previous years, again using sports funding to provide a free extra-curricular club for Year 1. Part of First Steps Sports' remit is to also provide training for Play Leaders who run fun games and activities, particularly for Foundation children at lunchtimes. 10% of our Sports Premium budget was spent allowing us to enhance extra-curricular provision for Key Stage 1 pupils.

To improve our already high skills base.

Again we have employed First Steps Sport to provide sports coaches who have been shadowed by a range of teachers and teaching assistants to allow them to continue their professional development. These members of staff have evaluated and reflected upon their experiences with these experienced professionals, with the aim of developing their own practice in PE and Games lessons. From these feedback forms, it has become apparent that staff are developing their knowledge of sports, games and drills which they can work on with the children in class. We are currently reviewing how best to continue this process for the 2018/19 academic year with a percent of next year's budget being allocated to in-house continual professional development (CPD) and external courses. Staff have identified a need for CPD in gymnastics, rugby and cricket. This year we have also started to develop a Forest Schools programme at school, with a proportion of our Sports Premium budget being spent on a Level 3 Forest School Leader course for one of our members of staff. They are now building an appropriate programme to allow the children (and staff) in school to participate in activities in local woodland to develop teamwork, resilience and co-ordination. Finally, we have invested in the appointment of a Sports and Forest Schools subject leader within the UPS threshold as this will ensure that all children within the school can be supported and lead through a broad range of exciting activities. This member of staff has been responsible for mapping the PE curriculum, monitoring safe delivery of PE lessons and advising new & less-experienced members of staff. He has also been responsible for arranging a Forest School programme which will benefit the whole school when it is rolled out to other year groups once it has been piloted with the Y6 cohort. 46% of our Sports Premium budget was spent on staff CPD.

To enhance our clubs.

Some of our Sports Premium money has been used to pay for transport to competitions and to purchase equipment for, our huge range of sports clubs and opportunities. Particular financial support has been allocated to attending Sportshall Athletics and will be used for Cricket and Multi-sports events in the Summer term.

To play in competitions with other schools.

Again, the Driffield sports cluster has employed its own Sports Co-ordinator who has run a whole range of activities – football, cross country, hockey, etc, across all age groups. Some of the sports premium has been used to pay for a co-ordinator for the cluster. 3% of our Sports Premium budget was spent funding our entry into inter-school competition.



Transport

This is a major cost for our school, so we have used some of the Sports Premium to subsidise transport. A coach to Driffield can cost up to £100. Transport to Sportshall Athletics for Y3/4 and Y5/6 in Driffield to was subsidised by the Sports Premium, whilst Summer events will also be subsidised in this way. Y6's transport to Robinwood Activity Centre for Outdoor and Adventurous Activities is also paid for through the Sports Premium. 5% of our Sports Premium budget was spent on transport to sports activities to ensure costs to parents could be minimised to allow maximum participation.

Over and above

Our funding for sport this year exceeds that of sports funding. The school budget. Y3 swimming lessons are fully-funded by the Sports Premium, but as a school we take the decision annually to offer a second year of swimming tuition to our Year 4 pupils, which is paid for by school. Small parental contributions are also requested to help cover the cost of transport to and from sports events in Driffield. 16% of our Sports Premium budget was spent funding additional swimming lessons.

Basic cost.

This year we have purchased more equipment for PE, particularly indoor apparatus for gymnastics. We took this decision as we hope that nurturing a love and enjoyment of gymnastic activities in school will encourage children who might not enjoy outdoor team sports to discover new and exciting ways in to sports and an active lifestyle, other than those clubs which are more regularly evident in the media. 14% of our Sports Premium budget was spent supporting the basic cost of providing stimulating and exciting PE and Games lessons.

More activities

We are again sending all of Year 3 and Year 4 swimming. Although the PE curriculum has been redrafted in recent years, we still send Y3 for their initial input of swimming teaching, which is then supported a year later when the children reach Year 4.

Releasing teachers

Some funding is used to pay for support and supply staff to cover teachers who are required to attend matches, to attend sports partnership meetings, to support swimming and to support outdoor and adventurous activities e.g. Robinwood. This ensures that child do not miss out on activities due to a lack in staffing forced by an otherwise limited school budget. 1% of our Sports Premium budget was spent releasing staff to enhance our sports and PE provision.

How is it spent?

At Nafferton School, we have looked into a number of different ways to use this funding in order to support the participation of pupils aged 4-11, all the way through the school, through the purchase of resources, employment of external coaches and teachers, and to partially fund sports trips and events. Below is a more precise breakdown of the way this year's sports funding has been allocated so far.

What is the impact of the additional PE funding on pupils?

- Funding used to develop the curriculum through visits and visitors to support new curriculum.
- Funding used to employ external coaching through First Steps Sport, ERYC swim coaches and Goalsports for PE & Games sessions. 100% of children in school benefitted in some way from employed external coaching (YF & KS1 through First Steps Sports Coaches, Y3 & Y4 Swimming and First Steps Sports, and Goalsports) Approximately 40% of children in school have benefitted from sessions led by coaches from at least 2 of these organisations (specifically Y3/4 through First Step & Swimming and some Y5&6 pupils through First Step PlayLeaders and GoalSports)
- At present, 77% of our current Year 6 cohort are able to competently swim 25m as is required in the National Curriculum. We consider this a very positive result of offering swimming to the children in two year groups, rather than just the one as is legally required. We cannot offer data regarding the percentage of last year's Year 6 cohort who were able to swim 25m by the time they left Key Stage 2 as requirements for this figure were laid out after they had left. Based on their swimming lessons in Year 4, approximately 80% were able to swim at that time, although this may have changed since then.
- Funding used to purchase equipment and resources to enhance lessons and develop enthusiasm for different activities.
- Enthusiasm and positive feedback from children and staff following sessions / activities support decisions made. Children enjoy sessions with First Steps Sports. Dance club continues to be successful. Swimming, as always, remains a vital life skill which we will always support as long as it is financially viable.

Curriculum Balance

- Sports funding has been allocated across a balance of year groups and curriculum areas. Spending covers Foundation up to Year 6. Spending is spread across all sporting areas, from Football to Swimming. Spending supports curriculum time (First Steps Sport lessons, swimming lessons, Goalsports lesson coaching), extra-curricular clubs (hockey club, Jumping Jacks) and improving break & lunch time provision through training for Y5&6 play-leaders for leading lunchtime games.

Staff Continuing Professional Development

- Through the employment of First Steps Sports coaches, our staff have developed, are developing and will continue to develop their personal knowledge and understanding of curriculum. By



observing and working alongside these professionals, our staff develop, improve and broaden their skills base and bank of activities from which they can build their own sessions in future units of work.

Specialist sessions

- Year 3 & 4 swimming sessions have again been funded by the sports funding. This has meant that swimming could be provided to nearly 80 children free of charge to parents.
- Year 1 'Jumping Jacks' club, run by First Steps Sports, has again been funded by the sports funding. This has meant that an extra-curricular club for Y1 could be run by external coaches and be provided free of charge to parents.

The Future

- Before the end of the 2017/18 academic year, we hope to have arranged further CPD for staff in rugby, cricket, OAA and gymnastics, and we will have made a decision regarding next year's in-house CPD through the employment of external coaches in PE lessons for staff to shadow and learn from.
- Following an evaluation of the school's long term plan (LTP) for Physical Education, it has been redrafted to continually address the balance of sports and activities which we offer and deliver across the school. It has also had to be slightly altered to allow for swimming to be delivered at the time of year which fits best with the ERYC swimming instructors' timetable. Next year's LTP will again be redrafted if the ERYC need us to move to a different slot.
- We will continue to monitor the impact of our PE lessons and assess the need to replace resources, equipment and apparatus in order to maintain the children's interest and enthusiasm in lessons in the hope that we can nurture their love of physical activity, and potentially seek further participation beyond the school day, eg at local clubs.
- The timetable of extra-curricular clubs will be decided upon towards the end of the Summer term in readiness for the 2018/19 academic year, with a Sports Premium budget in mind should any external coaches be required to run these clubs too.
