BW E-safety Policy 2015

- set out the key principles expected of everyone
- safeguard and protect the children and staff
- assist staff to work safely and responsibly with technologies and monitor their own standards and practice
- set expectations of behaviour and codes of practice
- set clear structures to deal with online abuse
- ensure everyone is aware that unlawful or unsafe behaviour is unacceptable
- support all members of the school community to keep children safe when online

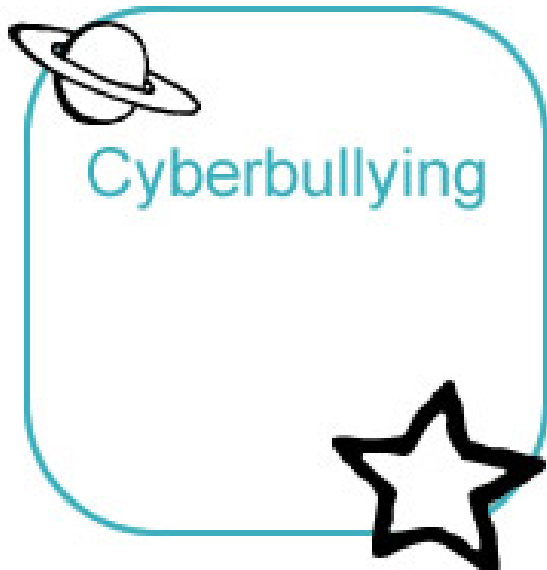

Parental Controls



Set controls on:

- Computers
- Laptops
- Tablets
- Mobile devices
- Games Consoles
- ALL internet enabled devices

Set on all devices
that link to the
internet

Remember... they are not 100% accurate and not a substitute for open communication!



Parental controls



How can they help?

- Block sites that are not age appropriate
- limit inappropriate and illegal material
- Set timings – automatic switch off at bedtime
- Monitor activity



Social networking: Privacy



Is my child too young to have a Facebook account?

- Help set up their profile
- Add your email as the main contact (if possible)
- Set the privacy settings to “friends” only and ensure they are children you know
- Show them a CEOP safety resource which outlines the risks (www.youtube.co.uk/ceop/jigsaw)
- ‘Like’ the Click CEOP page
- Check in and keep updated

What is online grooming?

What does an online friend mean to your child? Is it the same for you?





Top tips



- *Talk to your child about online grooming*
- *Talk to them about their online friends*
- *Let your child know that you are always there for support and you understand how easy it is for things to get out of control online*
- *Learn how to report any inappropriate contact made to your child online*
