

PE Premium – 2017-18

The government is providing additional funding to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - is allocated to primary schools each year.

This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Lees Primary School received £17,800

### Purpose of funding

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Below is a bullet point list of how schools can spend the funding.

For example, you can use your funding to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- Make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- Provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- Introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and Change4Life clubs
- Run sport competitions
- Increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- Run sports activities with other schools

### Accountability

Schools will be held to account over how they spend their additional, ring-fenced funding. Ofsted will strengthen the coverage of PE and sport within the 'Inspectors' handbook' and supporting guidance so that both schools and

inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the school's overall provision.

Schools will also be required to include details of their provision of PE and sport on their website, alongside details of their broader curriculum, so that parents can compare sports provision between schools, both within and beyond the school day.

Outdoor Education via WildWays	
<p><b><u>Outdoor Learning</u></b></p> <p>Outdoor learning through a Forest School approach, outdoor adventurous and learning outside the classroom has been a key developmental focus for us. We have introduced outdoor learning residential visits for all children from year 3 upwards, giving all children access to activities such as caving, climbing, walking, kayaking, orienteering, teambuilding etc. We have structured this so that these skills are developed over the four years and have assisted families by ensuring that all these are accessible, regardless of financial constraints.</p> <p>We have sought the support of Mike Burtoft, a specialist Outdoor Learning Instructor, who has not only worked with the children on developing their skills but with empowering the staff too in leading low risk outdoor learning activities.</p>

Extended PE Provision	
<p>To supplement after school sports activities provided by our own staff, we also have a Table Tennis Club and a company called Sportscools working with children on competitive games and multi-skills who use our facilities solely for our children before and after schools. The hire of our school, use of facilities and the use and purchase of equipment is met through our PE premium funding. We also support families who find the cost of the coaching difficult.</p> <p>Additional clubs include- Karate &amp; Football</p>

Existing outdoor storage for PE equipment were no longer viable- equipment, including that purchased in previous years Via PEP was not being stored in a way that would allow its life to be prolonged. As a key aim of PEP is to ensure provision for future years, 3 new sheds which will keep equipment safe from damage were purchased and erected on site.
