The Pupil Premium Funding will also continue to allow the school to subsidise school trips, provide a uniform grant for identified pupils whose families are experiencing financial hardship, provide additional resources throughout the school and give pupils access to opportunities to attend after school clubs to help them develop their talents. Additionally, contributions will be made towards music and private educational tuition for vulnerable pupils.

All of the children who were identified as needing targeted intervention made good progress in reading, writing and maths, with some making better than expected progress.

All of the six **disadvantaged** pupils made good progress in all areas with one pupil making better than expected progress in writing and one pupil making better than expected progress in reading.

Year 4

All of the children who were identified as needing targeted intervention made good progress in reading, writing and maths, with one pupil making better than expected progress in all areas and another making accelerated progress in maths.

All of the four **disadvantaged** pupils made good progress in all areas with one pupil making better than expected progress in all areas and two pupils making accelerated progress in maths.

Year 5

All of the children who were identified as needing targeted intervention made good progress in reading, writing and maths, with two making better than expected progress in reading and one pupil making better than expected progress in reading and another pupil making better than expected progress sin maths.

The one **disadvantaged** pupil made good progress in all areas of the curriculum.

Year 6

Achievement and attainment at Scotts for pupils at the end of KS2 was again very high, compared to other schools in the Local Authority and schools nationally:

Reading: 100% of pupils achieved the required standard, with 73% achieving above.

Writing: 97% of pupils achieved the required standard with 47% achieving above.

Maths: 97% of pupils achieved the required standard with 77% achieving more than this.

SPAG: 100% of pupils achieved the required standard with 83% achieving more than this.

All of the four **disadvantaged** pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, maths and SPAG at the end of KS2. Three pupils achieved the higher standard in reading and three pupils achieved the higher standard in maths. Two pupils achieved the higher standard in writing. Two pupils achieved the higher standard in reading, writing and maths.

Progress measures from KS1 to KS2 for **disadvantaged** pupils at Scotts compare favourably to national figures:

- Reading at +13.1 (compared to -5.0 for non-disadvantaged pupils nationally),
- Writing at +10.3 (compared to -5.0 for non-disadvantaged pupils nationally)
- Maths at +11.8 (compared to -5.0 for non-disadvantaged pupils nationally).

High attendance has remained stable within the school over the past three years with attendance rates for vulnerable pupils similar to that of other pupils within the school.

		Twelve families were financially supported over 2017-18 with the cost of school trips, extra-curricular school clubs, out of school clubs, residential school trips materials to support learning at home, equipment to promote well-being, uniform, music tuition and milk. Fourteen pupils received counselling within school which was funded through
