Pupil Premium Report – 2017/18 and 2018/19 Strategy

Aims

We are committed to providing high quality outcomes for all our children. We ensure that children are at the heart of everything we do in school. This equally applies to the use of Pupil Premium Funding.

Background

Pupil Premium is a Government initiative which provides additional funding to schools for supporting pupils who are currently entitled to Free School Meals and those that have been entitled at any point during the last 6 years. Pupil Premium is also available to children in care and to those pupils whose parents serve in the armed forces.

The premium is provided in order to support these pupils in reaching their potential.

Our Approach To Pupil Premium

We use the funding to ensure that children are provided with the appropriate support to enable them to make good and outstanding progress in their learning and close the attainment and progress gap between themselves and other pupils. For the last three years, as we have a relatively small number of children able to access this funding, we have tailored support to the needs of the individual and continuously track the impact that this has. Children receive an individual action plan, reviewed on a termly basis, to address any gaps in their learning or to accelerate progress.

Due to the very small number of children eligible for Pupil Premium it is not possible to identify general barriers to learning, needs are identified on an individual basis. Although cohorts are small, the attendance of Pupil Premium children is below that of non-Pupil Premium children.

Previous Academic Year -2017-18 Report

Funding

In the financial year 2017/2018 we received £26,800 Pupil Premium funding.

Pupil Premium in 2017-18 was used in the following ways:

- Deputy Headteacher time to monitor and track progress (£1,000)
- 1-1 tuition delivered by a qualified teacher (£19,500)
- TA nurture group and 1:1 support (£5,000)
- Educational Visits and Clubs Subsidies (£1,000 across the school)
- Education Welfare support for attendance (£1,000)

Total- £27,500 (+£700)

Impact 2017-18

2018 Outcomes

Due to very small cohorts it is extremely difficult to identify any trends or patterns for our Pupil Premium children.

Early Years Foundation Stage

- Pupil Premium Cohort: 4
- Pupil Premium children achieving a Good Level of Development -100%
- Non-Pupil Premium children: 90%

Year 1 Phonics Check

- Pupil Premium Cohort: 1
- Pupil Premium children achieving the pass mark: 100%
- Non-Pupil Premium children: 97%

KS1 Outcomes

- Pupil Premium Cohort: 2
- Pupil Premium children achieving National Standard in Reading, Writing and Maths – 50%
- Non-Pupil Premium achieving National Standard in Reading, Writing and Maths – 77%

KS2 Outcomes

-Pupil Premium Cohort: 5

The figures in brackets relate to Non-Pupil Premium outcomes. A significant proportion of our Pupil Premium cohort were Level 1 at the end of Year 2 and have therefore made significant progress over Key Stage 2. Average Scaled Scores for the Pupil Premium cohort were- Reading 106, Mathematics 104 and GPS 104. DfE Analyse School Performance indicates that progress for this group of children was very strong. Progress measures were +7.67 in Reading, +1.76 in Writing and +6.23 in Maths.

New Curriculum Steps Progress (Target – 3 steps) Years 1,3,4 and 5

Average progress measures across the school were broadly in line with all pupils.

Academic Year -2018-19 Strategy

For 2018-19 we anticipate receiving £26,820 Pupil Premium funding.

Pupil Premium in 2017-18 will be used in the following ways:

- Deputy Headteacher time to monitor and track progress (£1,000)
- 1-1 tuition delivered by a qualified teacher (£19,500)
- TA nurture group and 1:1 support (£5,000)
- Educational Visits and Clubs Subsidies (£1,000 across the school)
- Education welfare support – attendance (£1,000)

Total - £27,500 (+£680)

The Sutton Trust

The Sutton Trust has undertaken a significant amount of research into the effective use of Pupil Premium through the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF).

In the EEF summary of educational research the effectiveness of the strategies that we are employing are as follows:

Phonics - 4 star effectiveness rating

Early Years intervention - 4 star effectiveness rating

Social and emotional learning - 4 star effectiveness rating

Behaviour interventions - 4 star effectiveness rating

Meta-cognition and self-regulation - 4 star effectiveness rating

Our Success Criteria

To respond to our children's needs swiftly by removing barriers to learning thus ensuring that our children make good and outstanding progress year on year.

Attainment for children in receipt of Pupil Premium Funding to be in line with others.

Monitoring

The Pupil Premium attainment and progress outcomes will be monitored on a regular basis in school through termly Pupil Progress Meetings. The governing body will be informed of Pupil Premium progress through the termly Headteacher Report, in addition, the Standards and Curriculum Committee will look in greater detail at progress and attainment and report back to the governing body on a termly basis.

Pupil Premium funding is based on a financial year allocation. We will update our report in July 2019 to reflect the outcomes of national tests and also to identify spending plans in the 2018-19 academic year.
