PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING

The School Information (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2012 (S12012/1124) requires Pupil Premium Funding information to be published on the school's website from September 2012.



Pupil Premium allocated to Halberton Primary School in respect of the current financial year 2018/19 amounts to £15,840.

The monies from the grant have been allocated, as appropriate, towards:

- The cost of intervention programmes including e.g. From Counting to Calculating
- 1:1 teaching assistant support and class support
- Access to school trips and visits
- Speech and language therapist assessment and advice
- Funding the social and emotional programme, THRIVE
- Reading and phonics intervention/booster groups
- Opportunities for teachers to work individually with children e.g. providing 1:1 feedback
- Reducing the class size of year groups with higher numbers of children who attract Pupil Premium Funding.
- Funding the training of staff to upskill them in deploying strategies to narrow the gap in attainment between Non-Pupil Premium Children and Pupil Premium Children.

The effect of this expenditure on the educational attainment and progress of the 9 eligible pupils **(of whom 89% were also SEN)** at Halberton Primary School, during the academic year 2017/18, for whom the grant funding was allocated has been as follows:

- At KS2 100% of entitled children achieved the expected standard in reading, writing & maths combined compared to 70% of non-Pupil Premium children nationally.
- At KS2 100% of entitled children achieved the expected standard in reading compared to 80% of non-Pupil Premium children nationally.
- At KS2 100% of entitled children achieved the expected standard in writing compared to 83% of non-Pupil Premium children nationally.
- At KS2 100% of entitled children achieved the expected standard in maths compared to 80% of non-Pupil Premium children nationally.
- At KS2 100% of entitled children achieved the expected standard in Grammar, Punctuation & Spelling combined compared to 82% of non-Pupil Premium children nationally.
